TERRIFIC STORM VISITS HAMILTON

Telephone and Street Car Services Out of Commission - Barns Burned.

J. WEEDEN KILLED

Falling Scaffold Buried Engineer - Richard Gregg Overcome by Heat.

HAMILTON, Ont., Aug. 22.—This city was visited yesterday by one of the worst electrical storms in years. In many places telephones, poles, chimneys, orchards and fences were leveled to the ground. In the city the storm was mostly confined to a heavy rain, with terrific flashes of lightning, which put the telephone service out of commission and delayed the street and radial car lines.

On the mountain top, however, the storm assumed the proportions of a hurricane; the large barn of D. Gallagher, valued at \$4000, was struck by lightning and destroyed. Two brick houses belonging to D. A. Gallagher and Raymond Gallagher were struck by lightning, but owing to the heavy downpour the fires were quenched, but not before the chimneys had collapsed. A fire belonging to Peter Murray on the adjoining farm was struck by the same bolt and leveled to the ground. Fences in the vicinity were torn loose and scores of young trees were lifted up by their roots and thrown in all directions.

James Weeden was accidentally killed yesterday afternoon when a scaffold which was blown loose by the wind, fell upon him. Weeden, who was 35 years of age, was a stationary engineer and had charge of the service of a New Mercury Mills plant, for which Controller Churns has the contract. The accident was unwitnessed. Weeden is survived by a wife and child.

Scarcity of Labor. Scarcity of labor has been assumed as the cause for the delay in the completion of the Toronto-Hamilton highway. Controller Jutten yesterday declared that when the necessary secured men for the work they would be induced to leave by higher wages being offered elsewhere.

donian front, the general situation in the Balkans is one to be viewed with optimism. Recent developments on the Saloniki front have abundantly vindicated the judgment of ex-Premier Venizelos of Greece, and even King Constantine is showing signs of repudiating his obstinate refusal to lend active aid to the entente powers. Bilgar aggression has reached a point of exceeding humiliating to Greece, and unconfirmed reports have it that Greek troops are at last in clash with the invaders. While such reports are probably premature, it is generally recognized that Greece is in an impossible situation and must decide quickly.

Roumanian participation in the war on the side of the allies is again said to be imminent; in fact, a definite decision is reported already reached, with only waiting until the tide had clearly turned in the allies' favor to the entente allies, as popular demonstrations have frequently proved, but the cabinet has been sharply divided, hence inaction.

In the house of commons last night, Major Baird of the British Aerial Board made the interesting statement that 35 zeppelins have been destroyed by the allies since the war began and that Britain's air defences have improved to a point that may well make the Germans pause before trying further raids.

Winston Churchill, always striking in his views on war policy, has come out with the proposal that Britain take control of the food supplies of the Ottoman Empire in view of the admitted grain shortage. Recent Ottawa despatches have suggested the probability of further commandeering of wheat along the line taken last year.

"I think in the dim distance we can see the end," said David Lloyd George, British Minister of War, in the house of commons yesterday, during a speech on the extraordinary change in the past couple of months French and British, he stated, had captured positions on the Somme front, however, that in order to bring the war to a successful conclusion, all the resources of the allies would be required.

Between Martintup and Bazentin, British troops made another important advance yesterday, capturing a hundred yards of enemy trenches, in the Leipzig salient, near Thiepval, fighting was so intense that the enemy was forced to abandon the position, and that British troops now are within 1,000 yards of Thiepval. At the other end of their line, in the same salient, the British troops are near Courlelette.

On the French front the situation is unchanged, according to official reports. An artillery duel is in progress on both flanks of the Somme and at Fleury in the Verdun section. Bombing attacks by the enemy in the Vaux-Chapire Wood were repulsed.

Further ground has been gained from the Turks by the Russians in the Caucasus, who have occupied considerable territory west of Lake Van, in Armenia.

BURIED SOLDIERS' PET CROW WITH FULL MILITARY HONORS

Sportsmen's Battalion Turned Out in Full Force to Take Part in Extraordinary "Ceremony."

CAMP BORDEN, Aug. 22.—When the members of the 180th (Sportsmen's) Battalion paraded in full force tonight to take part in the funeral of a pet crow, they staged one of the camp's strangest spectacles. Practically all the battalion, including the brass band, participated in the "ceremony."

The crow had met an untimely end at the hands of one of the officers because of its intruding in the mess tent. It was to show the battalion's resentment of the officer's rash act that the unit buried the bird in such an impressive manner.

LITTLE SON TELLS HOW MOTHER DIED

Verdict of Criminal Negligence in Death of Mrs. Bastable.

JURY ADDS RIDER

Legislation Should Prevent People Learning to Drive in Parks.

"That Daisy Bastable died in Grace Road from injuries received by criminal negligence in being struck by an automobile driven by Albert J. Anderson for the McGuire man, Dr. Geo. W. Graham of Avenue Road, conducted the post mortem and found that the injuries were such as to be the result of a fall from a height of 155 Highfield avenue at the public highway, also that legislation should be enacted to prevent people learning to drive cars in public parks."

The accident occurred in High Park near the 13-year-old son of the dead woman, who was being driven by Mrs. Bastable, who was driving with her two sisters and a cousin, they went into High Park and sat on a bench facing the road with another man about "Look out" and had managed to get out of the way of the automobile but his mother could not and was struck against the tree that was right at the back of the bench in which they were sitting. His sisters and cousin were thrown and one of them was hurt.

Robert McKay, foreman of High Park, saw the accident, having crossed in front of the car, he saw it being driven by Mr. McGuire, and was not going more than thirty miles an hour. SOLDIER MOURNED AS DEAD REPORTED CAPTIVE

Pte. Leonard C. Moore, Declared to be Killed in Trenches, is Located in Germany.

Special to The Toronto World. GUELPH, Aug. 22.—Mr. and Mrs. Norman Hill of Guelph Township received a telegram from Ottawa, stating that Pte. Leonard Charles Moore, who had previously been reported as wounded and missing, was officially declared to be deceased. A few weeks ago a message announcing that he was wounded and missing was received, and this message was followed by a letter written by Pte. Leonard C. Moore, a comrade in arms, stating that Moore had been instantly killed when a shell blew up one of their trenches. The letter stated that there were four men killed instantly, and that he saw Pte. Moore die soon after. This letter was accepted as final and the soldier was mourned as dead.

EXPLOSION IN FACTORY WAS CAUSED BY FIRE

Workers Were Warned and Loss of Life Not So Great as Feared.

WORKS WERE DEMOLISHED

Number of Firemen Were Killed When One of the Engines Burst.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—The munition factory in Yorkshire, in which an explosion occurred yesterday was demolished, but the loss of life was not as serious as first reported, says an official statement received here this evening. The explosion was preceded by a fire, which gave sufficient warning to enable most of the workmen to escape. The statement follows:

"The explosion in the Yorkshire munition factory began with a fire outside one of the smaller magazines, which exploded. This was followed at short intervals by further explosions until the largest magazine exploded and caused the greater part of the damage. The loss of life is not so serious as it first seemed, due to the fact that the fire which preceded the first explosion, gave sufficient warning to enable most of the men and all of the women workers to escape."

"The munition works were virtually demolished and some works close by were set on fire and burned down. With this exception the neighboring works escaped substantial damage. A quantity of rolling stock on railway sidings was destroyed by fire and the bursting of one of the fire engines caused the death of a number of firemen."

WOUNDS ADMIT GUNNER TO ENGLISH HOSPITAL

### TWO KILLED, ELEVEN WOUNDED ON LIST

Casualty Statement Bears Fifteen Names of Toronto Soldiers.

#### DEATHS UNOFFICIAL

War Office Hasn't Notified Relatives of Ptes. Fairclough and McCann.

Fifteen names of men who went overseas with Toronto units were published in yesterday's casualty list. Two have been killed in action; two are ill, and 11 are among the wounded.

Pte. E. R. J. Fairclough, 48 Hawthorne avenue, Rosedale, was killed in action on Aug. 11, according to word received by his parents, although official notification has not yet been received from Ottawa. He was a student before enlisting, and joined a second contingent battalion. He has been in the trenches for a year.

Pte. A. J. McCann, reported killed in action, went overseas with the 15th Battalion, and had been in the trenches less than three months. His next of kin are in Redcliffe, Alta.

Sergeant Wounded. Sgt. A. Hozack has been wounded. He enlisted last September and went overseas in January. He came to Canada six years ago and was married here, but his wife is at present in Ireland. He was admitted to the hospital at York on Aug. 14, suffering from a fractured clavicle.

Corp. Alex. Jerritt, 1125 Ossington avenue, has been shell shocked and was admitted to No. 3 Divisional Rest Station on July 17, but has since returned to duty. Before the outbreak of war he had been serving in Bermuda with the Royal Canadian Regiment, and has been at the front ten months.

Sgt. C. M. Hill, 41 Gladstone avenue, is reported as being dangerously ill and has been admitted to No. 3 Casualty Clearing Station. He enlisted with the 83rd Battalion last fall, after undergoing an operation in order to pass the medical officer. He was born in Toronto and formerly employed in the parliament buildings.

Corporal Believed Dead. Lance-Corp. W. Bugshaw, missing since June 1, is now believed to have been killed. He enlisted in Toronto in February, 1916, and reached England in August of the same year. He was formerly employed as a silversmith at the Standard Silver Co. He has two brothers in uniform and his next of kin lives in Sheffield, England.

Private Is Ill. Pte. R. J. Nash, 292 Jones avenue, who left Toronto about five months ago with the 14th Battalion, is reported as being seriously ill. After arriving in England he was transferred to another unit. His next of kin live at Gormley, Ont.

Pte. Martin Jones, whose wife lives in Fairbank, has been admitted to No. 3 Casualty Clearing Station, suffering from shell shock. He is 37 years of age and has been in Canada ten years. He is a mechanic by trade and enlisted with the 59th Battalion last September.

Pte. C. Chapman has been wounded in action, according to word received by his wife, who lives at 48 Summerhill avenue. He joined the 75th Battalion as a recruit from the Mississauga Horse, and has been at the front less than three months. He was born in Wisconsin, and before enlisting was a teamster in Toronto.

### PROHIBITION ONLY CAUSE OF DEFEAT

Ferguson and McGarry Claim Hydro and Nickel Unimportant Issues.

#### LIQUOR MEN ACTIVE

Government's Spokesmen Declare Campaign by Liquor Interests Won Fight.

Hydro and nickel had "not a particle" to do with the "Southwest Toronto" landslide, in the opinion of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson and Hon. T. W. McGarry yesterday. Prohibition, they said, was their one and only stumbling-block. To it and it alone, they attributed their defeat. Everything else was just "hysterical screaming by one of the newspapers." The liquor men had worked against them, and had defeated them, that was, in the opinion of these ministers, the whole matter in a nut-shell. "The result demonstrated that the sober thinking men were not alarmed or stampeded by hysterical talk about nickel or hydro," said Hon. Mr. Howard Ferguson. "If they had responded to that criticism, you would have found more than fifty per cent. of the normal vote polled, and you would have found strong condemnation of the government in localities where these two issues were not befogged and overshadowed by the liquor question. There is no doubt that the carefully prepared campaign of the liquor men was responsible for the result. They have been working hard for this for some time and an analysis of the vote shows that where ever their influence dominated, Mr. Dewar secured his majority. The liquor interests were taking their revenge. I do not take the result as conclusive of any condemnation of the government."

"I'll give it to you frankly," said Mr. McGarry. "My opinion is that Southwest Toronto is the wettest riding in the province. Neither nickel or the hydro had anything to do with the result. The provincial treasurer—here and there you count a man who talked hydro or nickel, but it was the prohibition issue that did it. We have known for some time what the liquor interests had set out to do," he said, intimating that the landslide was not altogether unexpected.

#### PRIVATE STACKHOUSE DIED UNEXPECTEDLY

Member of Irish Battalion Was Suffering From Bronchitis.

The death occurred unexpectedly at the base hospital yesterday morning of Pte. G. Stackhouse of the 208th Battalion. Pte. Stackhouse had been admitted to the hospital two weeks ago suffering from bronchitis, and no cause has been ascertained for his sudden death. His wife was living close by at 110 Sumach street, but the hospital authorities were unaware of her address. She was out time later that she learned of her husband's death. Private Stackhouse was born in St. John, N.B., 38 years ago, and served with the 1st Canadian Dragoons. He was then employed as groom by Major-General Lessard. He enlisted with the 208th Battalion in May, and has been in the hospital two weeks. Funeral arrangements will be completed by the 208th. Besides his wife, he is survived by three little children, the eldest of whom is only six years old.

#### INFANTILE PARALYSIS SUSPECT IS WATCHED


Officials Believe Child Contracted Disease at Resort Frequented by New Yorkers.

#### WAR WILL BE LONG OPINION OF VIVIANI

PARIS, Aug. 22.—A difficult and prolonged struggle before the war is ended was prophesied today by former

Premier Viviani, who is minister of justice in the present cabinet. In an address before the general council of the department of Creuse, held at Gueret, he said:

"Although victory is certain, it will require hard and prolonged efforts to break Prussian militarism and prevent recurrence of its crimes. There can be no peace before the attainment of victory, before adequate reparation is made and before justice triumphs." In an address before the general council of the department of Aube

Bienvenu Martin, the former minister of justice, said:

"The French will not submit to the peace of the German Emperor, who boasted he would force his adversaries to accept peace on bended knees. They will accept only such a peace as assures them legitimate reparations, as well as their independence and security, and they will bear patiently all sacrifices in order that, in conjunction with the efforts of their faithful allies, such a peace may be imposed."
