Aug. 10 .- (By Canadian Press.)-That an increase in freight rates would mean a much greater advance in the cost of commodities to the ultimate consumer was the assertion of Hugh Blain, president of the Canadian Wholesale Grocers' Associat tion, before the railway commission this afternoon. Mr. Blain said that the profit of Jobbers, wholesalers and retailers was figured as a percentage of the cost of a commodity plus the freight rate. If a manufacturer sold an article for one hundred dollars, and the freight on this article amounted to eight dollars, the wholesaler figured his profits as a percentage on one hundred and eight dollars. If a commodity passed thru several hands before reaching the consumer, the rate would consequently be greatly en-
