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

DISTRICT No. 6.—Mr. Gibson: From Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

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DISTRICT No. 7—Mr. Hamilton: From Maria Street southward to Lewis Street and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

DISTRICT No. 8.—Mr. F. H. Chrysler. From Lewis Street southward, and Bank Street eastward to the Rideau River and Billings' Bridge.

DISTRICT No. 9.—Mr. A. Drummond: From Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

DISTRICT No. 10-Mr. Larmonth: Sandy Hill from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to the Rideau River.

DISTRICT No. 11—Lieut. Colonel Macpherson: From Mackenzie Avenue eastward to the Rideau River, and from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

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PASTORAL LETTER.

My Dear Friends:

In so far as the work of our Church throughout the past year can be recorded by means of statements and figures, you will find it clearly set forth in the various Reports which follow; and I hope, therefore, that you will not only read them, but preserve them for future reference.

I take pleasure in assuring you of the substantial encouragement given to my public ministry by your generally faithful attendance upon the services of the Church. Let none of you suppose that your absence is a matter of little moment either to yourselves or to me.

A large number of strangers have joined with us in our worship, and I trust have found some profit in it. I am sure you will do your utmost in making them feel at home.

During the year we have had unusual losses in our membership not only by death and removals to other places, but through the erection of the new church at Stewarton to which, I am glad to say, we have been able to render most substantial aid. Notwithstanding these losses, however, our membership still shows a slight increase over last year, our contributions to the Church's work are greater, and our Sunday offerings the largest in our history as a congregation.

Though there has been no falling off in the attendance at the Wednesday evening services, the reminder contained in the Report of the Kirk Session is most timely, and I trust will be productive of good practical results.

You will find the Reports of the various Church organizations worthy of attentive perusal. They show the difficulties as well as the encouragements of Christian work, and they ought to incite us all to do what we can to increase their efficiency.

A pastoral tour of the whole congregation was nearly completed when the recent epidemic broke out, and, in conjunction with other causes, interrupted it for some time. I hope shortly to reach the districts not yet gone over.

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Now that we are becoming better acquainted, it is not as necessary to ask you to inform me when any special pastoral attention may be of service, or to assure you that I am glad to minister to you to the best of my ability.

I desire to acknowledge with gratitude the great assistance rendered me by faithful allies in various departments of Church work. For many acts of personal kindness and encouragement formal thanks are insufficient, but I can assure you that they have cheered and strengthened me greatly.

In entering upon another year let us leave the things that are behind, and reach forth unto those things that are before. Much remains tor us yet to do as a Christian congregation, and we may well band ourselves still more closely together in earnest effort for the service of God, and in unswerving loyalty to the Church of which we form a part, and which we have pledged ourselves to aid and strengthen.

And now I commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you the inheritance among all them that are sanctified.

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REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

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The Kirk Session in submitting the following statements respecting those matters which are entrusted to their oversight, gratefully recognize the goodness of God in continuing to the congregation those Christian privileges which have hitherto been their heritage.

The Session are unable to tabulate the results which have followed the use of these privileges, but they trust, that through the blessing of the Divine Spirit, they have been the means of strengthening faith in some and upbuilding Christian character in others. There has been no unusual movement in the religious life and work of the congregation, but the various branches of our Church work have been well sustained by the Christian activity and untiring devotion of a small minority of the membership.

There is no change to report in regard to the meetings of the congregation for social worship and religious instruction. Morning and evening services have been held in the Church every Sunday of the past year, and they have been generally well attended, not only by members of the congregation but also by many others in the community who worship with them. This encouraging attendance indicates the continued appreciation of these services, and especially of the pulpit ministrations, which hold so prominent a place in our Presbyterian Diets of worship.

The Mid-week Service which we have been accustomed to designate as the Congregational Prayer Meeting, was held on the Wednesday evenings in nine months of the past year. This means of grace which is intended for Christian edification has been attended by only a comparatively small number of the membership; other Wednesday evening engagements having apparently prevented many members from using the opportunity of Bible study and social worship which it affords. The hope is entertained that in the coming year a larger number may become regular attendants of this service and so participate in the spiritual benefit expected from the Pastor's exposition of the Fourth Gospel, which is announced as the chosen subject of study at these meetings in the ensuing year.

The numerical strength of the congregation has not been greatly changed since last report, new families have been received, and new members enrolled, but in the continual movement of our population it

has so happened, that the outgoing and the incoming members of the past year have been nearly equal in number, the approximate number of families now connected with the congregation is (315) three hundred and fifteen, being a slight decrease in the past year.

On the first day of March last the Communion Roll numbered (535) five hundred and thirty-five memoers, since that date (55) fifty-five names have been added, (26) twenty-six on profession of faith, (26) twenty-six by certificate from other congregations, and (3) three re-admitted after absence; during the same time (51) fifty-one were removed from the Roll, (30) thirty by certificate, (7) seven by death and (14), fourteen by action of the Session, thus reducing the number of the membership to (539) five hundred and thirty-nine, being a net increase of (4) four members since last report.

The unusually large number of removals from the roll is accounted for by the transfer of (21) twenty one members to unite with the Stewarton Presbyterian Church. This new congregation now reports a membership of (75) seventy-five and of this number (31) thirty-one were previously members of St. Andrew's. The Session have pleasure in noticing the rapid progress which this young congregation has made in so short a time, and they hope that it will continue to prosper, and that in addition to the members which it has received from the city congregations it may also be successful in enrolling many others, who have not hitherto been permanently connected with any church and in this way accomplish the special object of its organization in that growing portion of the city.

The Communion Roll, which forms part of this report, has been carefully examined by the Session. Should there however appear on the roll the names of any who have removed from the city, or become connected with other congregations in the city; such instances occur because they have been retained in accordance with the rule observed in such cases, which requires an absence of at least two years from communion, before their names are subject to removal by the Session. Such instances would occur less frequently if the members who withdraw from the congregation would make it a point of duty to apply for their certificates of Church-membership when leaving.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to the congregation four times last year. The largest numbers of our own members present at any one of these communions was (290) two hundred and ninety. The smallest number was (252) two hundred and fifty-two. The average attendance at these quarterly communions was

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to the our own oo) two red and ons was (273) two hundred and seventy-three, which must still be considered much less than might reasonably be expected from a membership numbering over (500) five hundred.

The Session cherish the hope that in future the Communion seasons may be attended by a larger proportion of the whole membership.

The Treasurer's statement shows that the plate collection at the ordinary Sabbath-day services of the Church were slightly in excess of those of the previous year. The appeal made to the congregation in last report and subsequent appeals from the pulpit for greater liberality in the offerings towards this source of Church revenue have not been responded to by the congregation generally. And in consequence of this, and the recent increase in some of the expenses which are paid out of the Session fund, the balance after paying these expenses has proved insufficient to enable the Session to supplement the ordinary revenue of the Church to the extent anticipated. The Session hope that in the ensuing year these collections may be increased according to the ability of the members and the financial requirements of the congregation.

The Session have pleasure in reporting the continued liberality of members in contributing to the schemes of the Church through the medium of the schedules issued to the congregation. The Treasurer's statement shows a slight increase in the number and amount of the contributions.

The Sunday School under the superintendence of Mr. Gibson has been successfully sustained during the past year, the details of this important branch of Church work are given in the Sunday School report prepared for this meeting.

The Bible Class for young men has been continued under the charge of Mr. Chrysler. His report on the progress and requirements of this class is cordially commended to the attention of the young men of the congregation.

The work of the Institute has been quietly but profitably maintained throughout the year, the last public meeting at which two lives of the great Reformers were discussed, proved most successful. A collection was made towards the furnishing of funds to establish a Congregational library.

The District Visitors have rendered valuable service in visiting the families of the congregation, reporting cases of sickness to the pastor, and collecting the promised contributions to the schemes of the church.

The Ladies Aid Society have shown commendable activity in their department of congregational work, the details of their efforts to promote the comfort and welfare of the congregation, and the substantial assistance which they have extended to the benevolent institutions of the city, may be seen in their report for the past year.

The interesting report of the Home Missionary Society cannot fail to be read with pleasure. A further advance has been made this year in membership and contributions; and the Session confidently hope that by the co-operation of all who are able to assist the objects of the society, it will soon be able to furnish the entire amount necessary for the equipment of a missionary in the North West.

The Session record with much gratification the founding of a Young People's Missionary Society in the congregation this year. Though still in its infancy a large number of the young people have already enrolled themselves as members, and the future is full of promise.

In the course of the past summer the Sunday School Teachers petitioned the Kirk Session, "To take immediate steps towards the erection of a Sunday School Hall so that the work of the school might be carried on without serious risk to the health of both scholars and teachers." The Session received and trans-

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this petition to the Temporal Committee for consider-And in anticipation of such building being erected in the near ation. future, the Session appointed a committee to glean information respecting the most approved plan and probable cost of erecting the hall required. This committee, after correspondence with architects who make this class of building a specialty, reported the result of their enquiries to a meeting of the Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, and Glebe Trustees, the joint Committee appointed by the congregation for the purpose of considering this among other matters. This Committee at a recent meeting selected what they considered the best plan and style of building and having ascertained the probable cost of its erection they are now prepared to lay the same before the annual meeting of the congregation. The Session therefore commend the whole subject to the consideration of this meeting.

The strength and efficiency of the Kirk Session having been recently reduced by the death of one and the absence of others the present number of elders is found insufficient to meet the requirements of the congregation. The Session therefore take this opportunity of intimating that the congregation will be shortly called upon to elect five, or more, worthy members as their representatives in the eldership.

The reports of the various departments of Church work submitted to the annual meeting of the congregation afford an excellent vantage ground from which the office-bearers and members may take, not only a retrospective view of congregational affairs, but also, a prospective survey of the possible avenues of Christian service which may be entered in the coming year of our congregational life and work. The annual meeting is also an occasion when each member should endeavor to discover what part he, or she, might take in some of the spheres of usefulness undertaken as means of developing Christian character and promoting the general welfare of the membership.

The careful perusal of the reports presented at this meeting will show, that the several branches of our Church work need the assistance, and afford spheres of activity, for the humble member with only *one* talent, as well as the more highly favored possessor of *ten*. May the Divine Spirit make the path of duty plain to those who seek it and enable them to carry into effect the good resolutions which they may form of future co-operation in congregational work.

The successful accomplishment of our Church work requires the active participation of the whole membership, each individual occupying that place and performing those duties for which their natural or acquired talents may specially qualify them. The Christian of ordinary mental ability and courteous deportment, as well as the man of scholarly attainments and cultured tastes, may find ample scope for the exercise of their respective talents within the sphere of the Eldership and its manifold duties; others, unwilling to accept such official positions, may assist in the important work of imparting religious instruction in the Sunday-school or Bible-class. Some unable, perhaps, to undertake such active work may still render valuable service to the Church and community by manifesting in their lives the graces of the Christian character. Not a few may assist in the benevolent and missionary enterprises undertaken-or as district visitors, become extremely helpful to the minister in his pastoral work. All can do much to promote the welfare and sustain the good repute of the congregation by manifesting a spirit of courtesy and Christian kindness towards their fellow members, and the young people especially can do good service by cordial co-operation in the effort made to develope that sociability which should characterize the fellowship of a Christian Church.

The Session close their report in the words of a recent writer on Social Christian life. "People," he says, "often complain that our churches are cold and selfish, that the members are strangers to each other, that they sit side by side in the same pew Sunday after Sunday and never exchange a single friendly word or look with each other beafter service." In SO far reproach is applicable to us, let us endeavour to remove it. us be kindly affectioned one to another when not only in church, but in the ordinary business and intercourse of life. Let us show that the unselfish and amiable religion of our Lord Jesus Christ is moulding our character and conduct in all things, let us prove that the ties which bind us together are not merely temporary ties which touch only part of our being, and concern only this life, but ties of faith and love in Christ Jesus which have regard to our whole nature and endure for evermore.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Annual General Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, was held in the Lecture Room of the Church this day, Monday, 7th March, 1892, at the hour of 8 p.m.

Rev. W. T. Herridge, Pastor, in the Chair. Meeting was opened with devotional exercises. Minutes of last annual meeting held on 2nd March, 1891, and special meetings held on 4th May, 1891, and 1st June, 1891, respectively, were read and sustained. Reports and accounts of Kirk Session, Glebe Trustees, Sabbath School, Ladies' Aid Society, Home Missionary Society, Institute and Young People's Missionary Society, were read to the meeting. It was resolved that these reports and accounts be received and adopted.

The report and account of Temporal Committee was then read to the meeting. It was moved by J. W. McRae, seconded by C. C. Ray, that the matter of providing funds to pay the liabilities of the Temporal Committee be referred back to the joint committee of Kirk Session, Temporal Committee and Glebe Trustees.—Carried.

It was moved by P. Larmonth, seconded by E. H. Bronson, that James Gibson, Rev. W. T. Herridge, F. P. Bronson, W. Hamilton and Jas. Cunningham be a committee to attend to the printing of the Annual Report, and distribution of same to the congregation.—Carried.

A letter from C. C. Ray, Esq., of which the following is a copy, was read to the meeting:—

I hereby offer one hundred thousand dollars without interest, in payments as stated herein, for the Glebe entire of St. Andrew's Church, including assignment of Government leases. All mortgages on account of sales to be assigned to me. All moneys received on account of sales to be treated as a cash payment by me. First payment of twenty thousand dollars at time of execution of papers. Any further sums not exceeding twenty thousand dollars necessary for School Building to be paid at such times and in such amounts as required.

Thirty-five thousand dollars at due date of mortgage to A. Gilmour, Esq. Balance six years from date of sale. Facilities to be given me to make sales, give deeds, and take mortgages. The Church is to be kept secure to the satisfaction of Glebe Trustees.

Taxes, water rates, rents, insurance, &c., to be adjusted to date of sale.

It was resolved that this letter be referred to joint committee of Kirk Session, Temporal Committee and Glebe Trustees.

Report No. 1 of joint committee appointed at special meeting of the congregation on 1st June, 1891, was then read to the meeting, and is as follows:

The committee appointed to report on the matter indicated by resolutions adopted at a special meeting of the congregation held on the 1st day of June last, the tenor of which is as follows:

"Moved by F. H. Chrysler, seconded by J. W. McRae, that the matter of the erection of a School Building and Manse, and of the revenue and expenses of the Temporal Committee, and of the uses to which principal moneys derived from the sale of Glebe Lands, should be applied, and any other questions or matter arising out of them, be referred to a joint committee, consisting of the Kirk Session, the Temporal Committee, and the Glebe Trustees, and that such committee report to a meeting of the congregation to be called by them, and that Rev. W. T. Herridge be convener or, in case of his absence that Mr. Jas. Cunningham be convener."

Your committee having considered these matters, beg leave to report the result of their deliberations.

That as to moneys coming from sales of Glebe Lands, principal moneys should only be used for the following purposes, and should not under any circumstances be applied to the ordinary purposes of the congregation.

1. Payment of the Church Mortgage of \$35,000.00.

2. In regard to the erection of a Sunday-school building there exists some difference of opinion among the members of the congregation; some think that the present school accommodation is quite sufficient in every respect. But the Sunday-school teachers and those who attend the meetings held in the basement of the church are unanimous in declaring that it is inadequate to meet the wants of the congregation and that at times it is subject to dampness which is dangerous to the health of teachers and scholars, and to others who attend the meetings held therein. And further that the Sunday-school now requires greater convenience in the arrangement of rooms for its several classes.

Your committee while regretting that the basement of the church which is so spacious and has been fitted up at much expense for the use of the Sunday-school is now found to be unsuitable and insufficient for that branch of our congregational work, at the same time recognize the necessity of providing better accommodation for the school and for other congregational meetings, and they recommend the erection of a building adjoining the church and adapted to the present requirements of Sunday-school work, and that it should be proceeded with as soon as the finances at the disposal of the congregation shall warrant the expenditure of the money required for such building; provided that the increased annual outlay required for maintenance is assumed by the congregation.

In reference to the building of a manse your committee think that there should be a comfortable manse provided for the minister, and that the erection or purchase of a suitable house should receive the attention of the congregation as soon as possible after the completion of the proposed Sunday School Hall, and further, that in the meantime and until such time as the funds of the congregation may warrant the outlay of the amount required for the erection or purchase of a manse, your committee recommend the renting of a house for the minister, this course being in accordance with the Rev. Mr. Herridge's wish in the matter. Your committee further recommend that until these most pressing claims on the proceeds of Glebe Land sales have been fully met, no other draft should be made on the said fund beyond those which the Glebe Trustees are legally empowered to make.

The cost of the proposed building is estimated at between \$20,000.00 and \$25,000.00.
- 2. That the committee have been unable to rent a suitable house, but have the offer of a house to purchase, which has the accommodation and situation approved of by Mr. Herridge. The house belongs to Mr. A. J. Stephens, being 329 Somerset street, and is offered for

The committee recommend that the house be purchased as the whole amount can be raised on the security of the property at an annual charge of \$525.00 for interest which is only \$25.00 per annum more than is now paid in rent of the present manse.—March 7th, 1892

REPORT OF THE GLEBE TRUSTEES OF ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH.

The receipts and payments of the Glebe Trustees during the year ending upon the first Monday of March, 1892, are shown in the accounts presented herewith.

The total number of lots sold during the year was 63, of which one only was in Spenceville.

The total amount of the sales made during the year was \$24,935 or an average of about \$395 per lot.

The completion of the Street Railway through the property and its successful operation this winter has in the judgment of the Trustees made the property more eligible for building purposes. Lots in Spenceville are not much in demand, but the Trustees have collected a considerable amount of arrears, and have made arrangements with the purchasers of lots there for completing their payments.

The amount now due upon sold lots in Spenceville is..\$3,635 oo And upon the City lots sold is 17,184 00

\$20,819 00

This bears interest at 6 per cent. During the year the Trustees have handed to the Temporal Committee under the authority of a by-law for that purpose, the sum of \$4,750 paying off the floating debt of the congregation for repairs and alterations in the Church. They also paid off the Ogilvie mortgage upon Spenceville, \$1,600, and expended for surveys, posts, monuments and other expenses of survey \$1,014. They now have a block plan of the whole property, and a survey into lots of nearly all the blocks east of Bank Street. No further expense for surveys is likely to be needed for some time.

There are unsold lots in Spenceville.....93 Unsold, surveyed lots, in the City.....

The unsurveyed blocks will divide into over 500 lots of similar dimensions to those already surveyed.

The Trustees have concluded a sale to the Board of Public School Trustees of four lots on the southern limit of the property, which the School Board are purchasing with a view to erecting thereon a large Public School for the accommodation of the population in the southern part of Wellington and Central Wards and part of Dalhousie Ward.

Since the date of last year's report very little change has taken place in the Society.

The meetings have been held as formerly in the Ladies' Aid room on Friday afternoons at three o'clock, the Poor Relief committee meeting in the vestry at half-past two.

While the attendance has been somewhat smaller this season, owing largely to "la grippe," the society has had the pleasure of welcoming a number of new members, and the meetings have been marked by increased interest and sociability.

The average attendance has been 16 against 22 of last year, the largest number present at anyone meeting having been 22, the smallest 8.

Early in the season the following gentlemen were appointed a committee to constitute Honorary members, Messrs. F. P. Bronson, W.G. Bronson, G. L. Orme, C. H. Beddoe, J. Booth, F. Booth, F. C. Smythe, H. Baine, G. Scott, W. H. Blackadar, Geo. Henderson, Geo. S. May, W. Macoun, W. J. R. McMinn, A. W. Fleck, D. Holbrook, and J. Bangs. This committee has been an exceedingly helpful one to the society, and it is owing to the assistance, cheerfully given by the mem-

bers of the co

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bers of the committee, that the entertainments held during the winter have been so successful.

Five entertainments were given during the year as follows: On the evening of the 23rd of April a lecture was given on Beethoven by the Rev. W. T. Herridge, musical selections were given during the evening by Miss Lampman, Mr. Boucher, and others, the sum of \$66.70 (sixty-six dollars and seventy cents) was realized. On the evening of the 15th of May, in the lecture hall of the church, a piano recital was given by Miss Singleton of Port Hope, realizing the sum of \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars). On the 18th of December the annual Christmas sale was held, realizing the sum of \$237.20, (two hundred and thirty-seven dollars and twenty cents).

On the evening of the 14th of January a recital was given in the Opera House, by Miss Jessie Alexander, of Toronto, realizing the sum of \$160.10 (one hundred and sixty dollars and ten cents), and on the evening of the 26th of January, the Anniversary Social was held in the lecture hall of the church. At this social the ladies realized from the sale of home-made candy and various articles left over from the Christmas sale the sum of \$46.95 (forty-six dollars and ninety-five cents).

The whole amount raised from all sources during the year has been \$573.85 (five hundred and seventy-three dollars and eighty-five cents).

During the year, up to the date of this report, the following donations have been given: To the "Home for the Aged" \$10.00 (ten dollars): to the Young People's Missionary Society \$5.00 (five dollars): to the Protestant Hospital twenty four flannelette wrappers and two jackets: to the Protestant Orphans Home thirteen (two sizes) white quilts, and six tack-downs have been made for the "Lady Stanley Institute," Lady Stanley having provided the material.

The Society would again tender their sincere thanks to the many friends who have so willingly and generously assisted them by donations, lending decorations, and in various other ways, and also to those members of other congegations as well as St. Andrew's, who have so kindly aided them in getting up their programmes.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

This Society, now in its fifth year, continues to flourish and still has for its object the maintenance of a missionary in the North-West. Lake Dauphin, the place assigned to us two years ago by Dr. Robertson, is in a very fertile part of the country, about 75 miles from the railway, and has been settled by a good class of farmers, mostly young men. Letters have been received regularly every month from the missionary, Mr. McKercher, a young student of Manitoba College, who worked there during his Summer vacation, and is now succeeded by Mr. Sutherland, a former worker in the same district. From these letters, the reading of which has been the main feature of the regular monthly meetings, we learn of the rapid increase of the settlement. From a small beginning of a dozen families, there are now over 80 families and 80 single persons. In addition to the church built at Lake Dauphin four other preaching stations have been established within a radius of 25 miles, viz: Leitch's, Gilbert Plain, Valley River and Gartmore, all under the care of this one missionary. Some idea may be formed of the amount of driving necessary to cover this ground when we learn that he has driven over 600 miles in one month. He alternates the services by preaching at two stations on one Sunday and at three on the next, and the largest attendance at any one service has been 40.

Dr. Robertson has also sent most encouraging reports to the Society, appreciative of its assistance and hoping that another year the ladies could raise \$400.00 to enable the board to pay the entire salary of a missionary.

The Thank-Offering was held in April when the largest sum of any year was realized, viz: \$170.00, and as this is the main source of our revenue, the result was very gratifying.

The Annual Meeting was held in November.

It was with great regret the ladies received the resignation of the President, Mrs. McLeod Stewart, who had been the President of the Society since its formation, but who on severing her connection with the church, felt obliged to give up this office also.

This money was raised by seven scholars from the small sum of 25 cents each and illustrating the parable of the talents. This very beautiful and practical illustration may indeed be taken to heart by older heads, and the kindly spirit which prompted the gift be an additional impetus to our thoughts and energies in the year upon which we now enter.

To the Members of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa.

The work of the Institute continues to prosper. An energetic committee, which is an absolute necessity of this organization, was secured at the beginning of the season and the Institute entered at once upon active work. Three public entertainments have been given, one of which was in combination with the Ladies' Aid Society at the annual congregational meeting in January. Three public meetings remain to be held, partial arrangements for which have already been made. In the closed meetings good work has also been done. The study of the Topography of Palestine was begun early in the year and in the discussions which followed considerable interest was taken. These closed meetings are specially designed to help and encourage the younger members of the Institute by removing the restraint of the more formal public gatherings. It is felt, however, that the members do not avail themselves as fully as is desirable of the opportunities which are afforded in this way.

Very much interest has been taken of late years in scientific biblical connection with the exploration of bible lands

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ON. R. and many valuable contributions to a knowledge of these lands have been published from time to time. Unfortunately these books are generally sold by subscription only, and, as many of them contain expensive maps and plates, they are practically out of the reach of all but a few. The recent books on general religious subjects do not find their way, either promptly or regularly, into our public libraries. A congregational library, of standard and useful religious literature was therefore felt to be a desideratum which the Institute might properly, within certain limits, undertake to supply. With this object in view the proceeds of the "Evening with the great Reformers, Luther, Knox and Calvin" have been set aside as the nucleus of a Library Fund.

The Treasurer reports a balance on hand in the General Fund and that the financial condition of the Institute is satisfactory.

In conclusion, the Institute has enjoyed its share of divine blessing and not only has been privileged to grow in usefulness but also looks confidently forward, to possibilities of larger growth and more extended blessing in the near future.

The number of scholars on the roll is 249, a decrease of 40 from the number reported last year. The reduced number in attendance is much to be regretted, and is to be accounted for chiefly by the loss, from various causes, of four or five teachers of advanced classes. Our greatest difficulty is to keep hold of the older boys, and we have lost whole classes of them, from the fact that we have lost their teachers. A few of the older boys have joined the Young Men's Bible Class. We need more teachers who like many of those we now have, are week by week, year after year, at their posts, and allow nothing short of ill-health to keep them away. We need also a staff of supernumerary teachers. Two or three years ago we had friends who rendered valuable aid in this way, taking the place of absent teachers. Now we have not one, and it is the rarest thing for a Sunday to pass, without the superintendent having to teach one or more classes, to the neglect of his own special duties. Last year we reported 28 teachers on the roll, now only 24, having lost 9 teachers and obtained 5.

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We look forward with great interest and hope to the proposed new Sunday School Hall. We believe that with better accommodation, separate class rooms for senior classes, and a school room which can be used at all seasons of the year without endangering the health of teachers and scholars, the tide of prosperity will again flow and a large and better work be done in this important sphere of the church's activity. In last report we referred to the fact that 19 of our scholars went up for examination under the Higher Religious Instruction scheme. We are glad to report that 9 of these received diplomas, 2 book prizes, and 2 silver medals.

The annual pic-nic held on 27th June, at Gilmour's Grove, Chelsea, was largely attended, and much enjoyed. The same may be said of the annual festival, held on 4th February last.

The Sabbath collections in the school are always devoted wholly to missions. This year the amount raised was \$160.00, which by vote of the school has been allocated as follows:—

We are glad to note the formation of a Young People's Missionary Society, which will have the effect of further stimulating missionary effort among the members of our Sunday School.

The Normal class for study of the lessons which was held for some years by the Presbyterian Churches of the city unitedly has been discontinued. Our own teachers now meet for lesson study on Wednesday evenings at 7 o'clock, when a pleasant and profitable hour is spent, in conversation on the lesson for the following Sunday.

While discouraged by the loss of senior scholars at an age too early for their leaving Sunday School we have many reasons for encouragement and thanksgiving. The primary department is being continually reinforced, and from it we obtain material for new classes in the intermediate department. So we need not fear for the future of the school so far as pupils are concerned. Year by year we are gladdened by seeing growth in the knowledge of the Scriptures, and the development of Christian character in many of our scholars, and our earnest prayer is that they may grow up into Him in all things, who is the Head, even Christ.

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REPORT OF THE BIBLE CLASS FOR YOUNG MEN.

The Bible Class, which I took charge of last year has been regularly held in the church every afternoon, except during the warm months of the year. The number in attendance has not, at any time, been large, but about twenty different young men have been in attendance of whom eight or ten attend very regularly and show an intelligent interest in the course. This winter, we have been engaged in reading the Acts of the Apostles, having reference to contemporary history and geography, and to the biography of the apostles and leaders of the early church, reading also in connection the Epistles as illustrating the character and teaching of the apostles. I hope to see a much larger attendance in succeeding years.

It is very necessary that a class of this advanced character should have access to the best modern literature upon the subjects which are discussed in the class.

It is not possible to impart very much instruction in one hour a week, but a good deal might be done in awakening interest which would induce members of the class to read for themselves. I hope that in a short time, we will have a well selected library of books suitable for adult readers and including books of reference, books of travel, of exploration in Bible lands, ancient history, church history, the histories of the times of the Reformation, and such others as may be deemed suitable for a class of this kind.

In an age when much reading matter of all kinds is put into the hands of young and old, it is a growing necessity that the church should assist in directing the reading of its members into the best channels.

I am sure that the adult Bible classes in this congregation could be made much more useful if a sufficient number of good books were at hand to illustrate and amplify the work of the teachers.
