



New Plan Now in Operation Under United States Bureau of Laber.

In case of accident, causing detention from work lasting more than fifteen days, the claim for damages may be established by the person entitled to payment and the amount due or payable shall then be determined by the Secretary of Commerce and Labor of the facts in the case are provided for and blank forms are to be obtained from persons who have supervision over the employes in the branches of the service which fall under the provisions of the act.
