More Austrian Territory Has Been Taken-Artillery Battle on Trentino Front

Rome, May 28—A successful raid upon the Trieste-Nabresina railroad by a squadron of Italian hydro-aeroplanes together with the occupation of additional Austrian territory along the Tyrol frontier and on the Frieuli front are reported in an official statment issued last night by the Italian war office."

"On the Tyrol-Trentino front," says the report, "an artillery combat continues between our fortified positions and those of the enemy at Tonalt and on the Asiago plateau. To the north we have extended the territory occupied up to the mouth of the Chiese River in Lake Idro and have occupied the rugged, mountainous zone extending between Lakes Idro and Garda.

"Notables of Tezz in Val Sugana and other occupied parts presented themselves to our authorities, expressing sentiments of patriotism and the devotion of the population.

(H. O. Bonk, Y. M. C. A. Instructor).

For many years swimming instructors were fully satisfied when they were able to teach a few at a time to swim. 



Shrapnel

Who is One of the 6th Mounted Rifles-Young Soldier Had Enlisted in the West

When the war broke out he was with a dominion survey party in the Peace River district, 200 miles north of Edmonton. The news that Great Britain was at war and that Canadians were to take their share in the fighting appealed to his adventurous spirit as well as to his loyalty, and, with eight of his comrades, he set out at once for Edmonton. On their arrival there they enlisted in the 9th Battalion and soon were at Valcartier. Later he was transferred to the 1st Western Ontario battalion and it was with them that he took part in some of the heaviest battles of the war. He bassed safely through the fight at Langemarck and it was somewhat later, after ix days and seven nights continuously in the trenches, that he was wounded by bursting shrapnel shell.

The first word received was contained in a letter from a chum to a friend in it. John which was received here on lunday, but which merely said that Roy was slightly wounded. His chum, named accarthy, was another adventurous pirit who had seen service with Villa in Mexico, but who hastened north to nlist when he learned that Canada was a the war.




