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TRAGIC SCENES WITNESSED IN AFFECTED AREA

Girl Uses Body As Shield For Two Sisters

TOWN DESTROYED

Prayers of Citizens Are Answered When Wind Suddenly Changes

MELBOURNE, Australia, Feb. 17—

Most pitiful scenes are being witnessed in the fire-affected districts of Victoria, where the death toll is now 31, with five missing, as well as six seriously and scores slightly injured.

AMENDMENT IS BEATEN BY 10

Division in House Test Was 118-108; Groups Back Government

T. H. Bird, Progressive, Gains Floor and Moves Previous Question

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—Immediately following the division, T. W. Bird, Progressive member for Nelson, Man., in a short but aggressive speech moved that further amendments to the address be debated and the subsequent debate must be confined to the address itself.

At the conclusion of his speech, C. H. Cahon, Conservative member for a Montreal riding, adjourned the House.

There was considerable difficulty when Mr. Bird rose to speak, as Mr. Cahon had jumped to his feet, too, to move another amendment to the address in the form of a motion of want of confidence and it was only after a struggle of "sit down" by Mr. Cahon from the Liberal seats that the Speaker "saw" Mr. Bird and he was able to proceed.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—The Conservative amendment to the address was defeated in the House of Commons tonight by ten votes. With Liberals, Progressives, Labor and Independent members opposing and the Conservatives supporting, the amendment was negated by 118 votes to 108.

The Government received the solid support of all the groups in the house with the exception of the Conservatives. There were no "switches" and only a few pairs.

The amendment which went down to defeat shortly before midnight expressed regret that "resulting from the policy and recent trade agreements made by the present Government, the dairy products industry of Canada is now being subjected to most unfair and unwarrantable competition from other countries, and that the Speech from the Throne gives no indication of any remedial legislation which would remove the discrimination under which the industry suffers."

MOVED BY SUTHERLAND.

It was moved by Donald Sutherland, member for South Oxford, and has been debated exhaustively by members on the Conservative side of the chamber.

Just before the vote Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Opposition leader, made the final attack on the treaty. He declared that it exposed practically all the farming population of Canada to unlimited competition from a country which was almost the largest exporter of meat in the world, and one of the greatest exporters of dairy products. He believed that since the treaty went into effect more butter had come to Canada in a month than had formerly entered this country in a year.

PORPOISE HUNTING

New Sport Seen as Result of French Official's Order

PARIS, Feb. 17.—In the coming summer a new sport of porpoise hunting is likely to be popular in the French Riviera. The idea has been launched by the Under-Secretary for Merchant Marine, M. Danielou, who has declared war on porpoises as a source of great damage to the French sardine industry, through their wholesale destruction of nets.

Fishermen will be authorized to take "hunters" in their boats all through the summer season. M. Danielou sees no reason why, for example, a "Deauville Porpoise" Hunt and a "Salles d'Olonne Anti-Porpoise League" should not be constituted, and even challenge cups offered for the most successful clubs.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—At a luncheon of the British and Latin Chamber of Commerce, at the Savoy Hotel mentioned by the Spanish Ambassador yesterday, the Prince of Wales so much relished that he set a personal example by learning it himself.

"I am glad to say," the Ambassador added, "that I have had the pleasure of conversing in my own language with His Royal Highness."

STORMY DEBATE IN S. AFRICAN SENATE

Attempt to Use Paul Kruger's Name to Advertise Brandy Resented

CAPETOWN, South Africa, Feb. 17.—A bottle of brandy was the cause of a stormy debate in the South African Senate.

Senator Serfontein set the ball rolling by a resolution protesting against the use of Paul Kruger's name to advertise the liquor known as "Oom Paul" brandy.

He pointed out that, although the late President Kruger always objected to the use of his name for any kind of advertising, "Oom Paul" brandy was now exhibited in every bar in South Africa.

Allure for Men is a Gift of the Gods That Gives to Woman a Come-Hither Look in the Eye—It is Neither Beauty Nor Wit, Nor Virtue, But Utter Femininity That is Irresistible to Men.

GIRLS are always asking me why some other girl who is neither more beautiful, better dressed, more intelligent or a better dancer than they, has men swarming around her like bees about a honeypot, while they have never a beau or a date to bless themselves with.

The heart-breaking query, I can only reply that the secret of a woman's fascination for men lies neither in her looks nor her wit nor her accomplishments. It is the come-hither look in her eyes. And to say that is merely to substitute one mystery for another, for no one knows just what it is. It is just something that a man recognizes at sight and goes down before like ripe wheat before the sickle.

Nor does any one know why one woman has it and another woman has it not. Neither can it be acquired by any art or artifice or by fasting or prayer. It is the gift of the gods.

IT HAS to do with a woman's looks. Yet the whole of it is not beauty, for we all know women of classic form and features whom all men admire at a distance, but never desire to approach closely. Some of the handsomest women in every community are old maids, the traditions of whose youth-fairness lingers like a halo about them as long as they live. It is also notorious that great beauties seldom make big marriages.

On the other hand, there are girls with no claim whatever to pulchritude who could have as many husbands as they have fingers and toes were not one husband as much as any woman can stand missing around the house. Indeed, it is almost an axiom that any woman who can marry once can marry again should Providence or the divorce court free her from her spouse.

NOR does a woman's fascination for men have any relation to her worth of character. Theoretically, men worship goodness, purity, amiability, modesty and domesticity in a woman, but personally they do not run after the model of virtue who possesses all of these shining attributes. That kind of a girl is generally the girl that a man recommends other men to marry but doesn't marry himself.

The women who have held men in thrall from the time of Adam's first wife down to the youngest flapper have not been conspicuous for their goodness. Nor have they fooled men. Men have despised them, but they have had the come-hither look in the women's eyes and followed it to their doom.

If, then, neither beauty, wit nor virtue light the beacon in a woman's eyes, what does? Primarily, it is sex. There are women who are human beings and stars are other women who are just women. There are women in whom femininity is raised to the sixth power. There is not a line in their bodies nor a quality of their minds nor a fiber of their characters that isn't just all woman, and these women, by the very law of nature, draw every man they meet toward them as a magnet attracts a bit of metal.

THESE women cannot stand alone in the world or fight their own battles. They are bound to have something to hang on to, and they never stretch out their tendrils in vain. Some man always rises up and qualifies for the role of the sturdy oak.

The more utterly feminine a woman is the more irresistible her charm for men, and this is why the business girl, the good-fellow girl and the athletic girl find it hard to marry. Probably no man in the world ever popped the question to a girl when she was wearing knickerbockers.

UNDOUBTEDLY, also the come-hither look in a woman's eye is a look that expresses willingness. It is a gentle, soft, inviting look. It is not the hard predatory look of the huntress who is determined to chase down a husband and catch him and bear him as a sacrifice to the altar. Nor is it the cold, self-satisfied, self-contained look of the bachelor maid that says that her heart is an impenetrable fortress that she dares a man to try to break into. That look affronts a man's vanity and drives him away instead of toiling him on.

TODAY'S RECIPES Prune Bread—To one baking of long-process white bread add one cup of sugar, grated rind of two oranges, one cup of butter, one pound of cooked prunes, pitted; one cup walnut meats. Add these extra ingredients to the bread before kneading.

Mackerel Plate—Place one can of imported blue mackerel (these are small fish packed in olive oil) on a platter of crisp lettuce leaves. Surround with halves of deviled eggs, alternate with quarter lemons. Before placing the fish on the platter pour off olive oil, then after the whole plate is arranged, pour a little of the oil over the fish.

Pomogranate Salad—Peel an orange two large grapefruit. Remove pulp from fiber and seeds. Hold over mixing bowl while separating, so as to save all juice. Add one can pineapple, diced one-half cup sugar dissolved in the juice of two lemons, the juice of two pomogranates. Serve very cold.

Isabel Sponge Cake—Beat separately the whites and yolks of six eggs, add to the stiffly beaten whites a boiling hot syrup cooked to the hatching stage, made of one cup sugar and one-half cup water. Add yolks, one cup of sifted flour (no leavening agent), flavor delicately with extracts of almond, lemon and vanilla. Bake 40 minutes in moderate oven. Invert pan until cold.

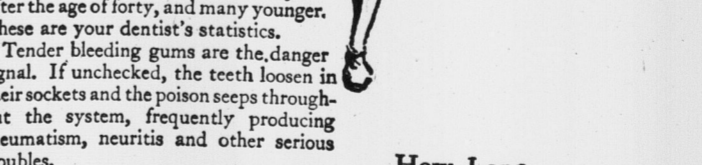

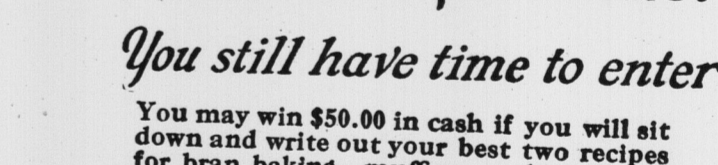

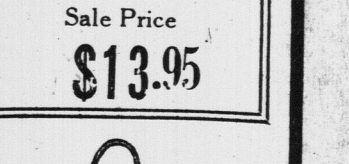

MADE IN CANADA

CANADIANISM IS ADDRESS TOPIC

Rev. Canon Shatford Makes Plea for United Dominion

Expounds Principles in Speech at Joint Meeting of Canadian and Gyro Clubs

The cardinal principles of four-square Canadianism on which Confederation was built formed the theme of a masterly and eloquent address by Rev. Canon Allan P. Shatford, noted Montreal Anglican clergyman, before the combined Canadian Club and Gyro Club gathering in the Admiral Beatty Hotel here yesterday at noon.

He made a powerful and moving plea for a united Canada, "moving as an irresistible platoon with the stars and stripes of our fathers to guide us and, when he concluded, he was tendered prolonged applause. W. Grant Smith, vice-president of the Canadian Club, presided.

RESOURCES VAST. The material and human resources of Canada, Canon Shatford said, in opening, had been told of innumerable times and all agreed that they were powerful and vast. Canada's resources in ideals and principles also was a vital factor to her future and with such possibilities and all that was needed to make Canada great was unity, he declared.

SECOND PRINCIPLE. The second principle that helped toward the founding of Canada was that of defence against aggression from outside powers. He declared that it was the Fenian raids that practically drove New Brunswick into Confederation and it was the fear of invasion from the south that made Quebec take such a determined stand for unity.

UNITY WITH OTHER COUNTRIES. The third principle was strengthening of the ties between Canada and the Motherland and in this connection, the speaker said that Canada's future depended on its partnership in the British commonwealth of nations.

The fourth and final principle was the development of a Canadian national spirit. Who is not disturbed by the sectionalism of the times, the speaker asked, and proceeded to show how detrimental such provincial movements were to the common good.

In a telling plea for a united Canada, Canon Shatford concluded his address by reciting Charles G. D. Roberts' poem "Ode to Confederation."

TAIL OF COMMA MAKES WILL VOID

Court Holds Second Document False And Denies It Probate

Sends Alleged Will of Editor to District Attorney For His Consideration

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Feb. 16.—Holding that the signature on a purported second will of the late Edwin A. Oliver, of Yonkers, was a forgery, Surrogate George A. Slater has handed down a decision denying it to probate and ruling that a previous will should be recognized. He also announced that he was sending the second document to District Attorney Rowland for analysis and consideration.

COMMA'S TAIL A FACTOR. The tail of a comma, discovered by microscopic examination near the top of the second document, strengthened the surrogate's belief that the document was not really Mr. Oliver's, it was learned. The blank on which the second will had been written had been cut off at the top, supposedly to leave the name of the printer, Julius Blumberg, of New York. A tiny streak of black, all that was left of a comma in Blumberg's printed address, induced

handwriting expert to compare the blank with others, and it was discovered that the blank had been printed in October, a month after the dating of the will.

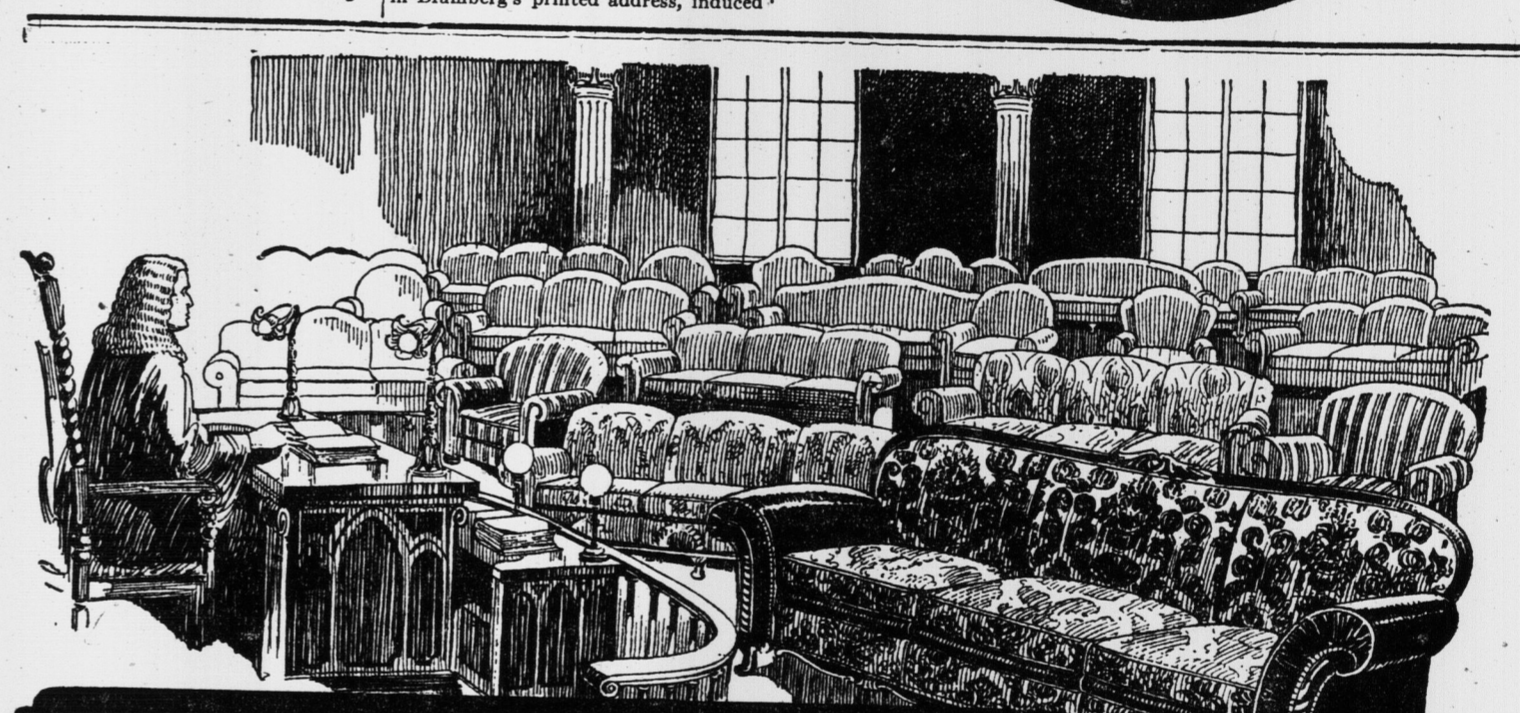
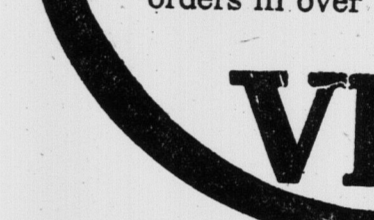

THINK BRITAIN MUST CHANGE INCOME TAX LAW

Experts See Important Revision Necessary following Lords' Decision

LIABILITY UNDER AVERAGE SYSTEM

London Correspondent Deals Interestingly With Topics of Metropolis

Correspondence of Times-Star LONDON, Feb. 4.—Expert opinion regards an important revision of the income-tax law as the inevitable sequel to the recent House of Lords decision against the Treasury on a point of common occurrence. The question briefly was one of a taxpayer's liability, under the three-year-average system, for income earned during a year when there was no income. The legal decision against the Chancellor of the Exchequer obviously entails upsetting a long-established practice of the Treasury department. Even the least sympathetic citizen will recognize that if taxpayers have the benefit of a three-year-average they should not be able to escape its possible disadvantages. So amending provisions are likely to be included in Mr. Churchill's next finance bill, which may entirely change this peculiar income-tax practice. But the House of Lords' decision reveals the importance to the general public, especially in days when bureaucratic tendencies are plainly in political favor, of the commissioners whom more than once the Treasury has proposed to abolish as the one independent tribunal between the citizen and the state.

A HAPPY RECLUSE From a reliable first-hand source gather some interesting facts about the ex-Kaiser. Its bright pageant still holds a fascination. There is the royal coach, incredibly blazoned as an Eastern sunset, with a real King and Queen, bowing to cheers. There are the glittering Life Guard squadrons, in bold cuirasses and Waterloo helmets, plumes bravely flaunting, and pioneers, in sable instead of scarlet tunics, carrying their huge axes that somehow smack of Henry VIII's time, and grim work on Tower Hill. There are the Foot Guards, in sprigged grey-coated flutes tipped with gleaming steel, with dandy wasp-waisted officers straight out of Ouida. There are the royal householders whose physiognomy retains all the hauteur of Georgian footmen, flitting by noiselessly, with just a fleeting glimpse of illustrious cabinet ministers and their ladies. And there are, moreover, as the final touch of spectacular medievalism, the genuine beefeaters, a whole platoon of them, fantastic as birds of paradise from their towering hats to their rosetted shoes, marching clean out of their true century, but still keeping step like old soldiers. Strange how the medieval dress makes the faces of the wearers look medieval, too! They are all veterans—dear old gentlemen, really—but how bravely they step out. They are the chief magnet of popular interest. It is Grandpa's day out. All their pageant passes and the cheers of thronged streets, the clangor of bells from the old Abbey, the throb of military drums, and the regal sound of trumpets.

PRINCE HENRY TO AUSTRALIA A decision will be made by the King very soon as to which of the princes will go to Australia in the late summer to represent him at the formal opening of the new government buildings at Canberra. I hear that it is practically certain that Prince Henry will receive the King's command. It will be the first time His Royal Highness has performed a mission which has taken him to one of the dominions. Indeed, it will be the first of any real importance that he has undertaken for the King. It will be an opportunity which His Royal Highness will embrace with genuine delight. As an army officer he has not had the chance of his younger brother, George, to see the world in the course of his professional duties. Prince Henry is, in fact, the least traveled member of the royal family. It was thought at one time that the Duke of York would be entrusted with the Australian mission, but an interesting domestic event at home renders that out of the question.

RUSSIAN SETTLEMENT NEXT? I hear that in the near future it is the intention of the Russian Government to open pourparlers with Downing Street on the question of debts and compensation; moreover, that, early in the coming session, an announcement will be made to this effect by the Foreign Secretary, and that the whole Russian question will then be threshed out once and for all. The Russians simply cannot wait until a Labor Government is in power in this country, and there is a steadily-growing feeling among them that they are likely to get as square a deal from the Conservatives as from any other political party in Great Britain. Also, the fact that the French have already made complete preparations for discussion on the matter of debts and compensation makes it an opportune moment for the Russians to show their favorite diplomatic astuteness, and play one nation against the other. A leading Russian official told me today that he was quite satisfied that they would obtain even more favorable terms from Britain than they did from France.

GERMANY HARD UP? The managing director of one of Germany's biggest industrial companies has been in the city today, trying to arrange finance for his company, and also negotiating for the manufacture of certain classes of goods in England. Germany, he tells me, is starved for working capital, and companies which have made profits of over £100,000 a year actually find it difficult to finance an order for £2,000. The German banks require interest to be paid on loans at the rate of 18 per cent, a rate that makes it practically impossible to grant any credit to customers. The result is that export business is diminishing. Several concerns, therefore, are making arrangements for their goods to be made under license in England, to supply the foreign market.

OIL STRUGGLE COMING. Negotiations are now progressing in London and Paris for the organization in the autumn of a new rival in the world's oil market to the supremacy of the Royal Dutch and Standard Oil companies. In August and September some seven or eight small companies become free at the same time from agreements under which they were bound to sell all their production to one or other of the big ones, and the present proposal is to merge those small companies into a single independent organization, with its head office probably in London. The scheme, however, is bigger than this, because there is a report that there will be brought into the same merger an important concession for all the oil in Adjeraija, which is now being negotiated with the Soviet by one of the shrewdest men in the oil world. He was in London yesterday, and conversations were taking place at offices off Lendenhall street.

ADMIRAL TROUBRIDGE

Sir Ernest Troubridge, whose death occurred suddenly at Biarritz, was a naval man of impetuous frankness. He said what he thought, even about superior officers, in a way that is usually fatal in the services. During the war he was flying his pennant in the Mediterranean, and came in for a lot of hard criticism, as well as cut short his active sea career, by his failure to round up the Goeben on her dash for Constantinople. That was, as it proved, a real disaster. It brought Turkey into the war on the wrong side, and it may have helped to keep Italy out, for a time, on the right side, because naval supremacy and efficiency received a rude shock throughout Italy when the Germans got safely through

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Collieries in the Welsh anthracite district will spend more than \$2,000,000 during the next three years in increasing production. It has been learned. At least three new pits will be sunk and improvements will be made in the present machinery.

QUEBEC CUT PUT AT 1,500,000,000 FEET

Lumbering There Held Up in January by Lack of Snow

QUEBEC CITY, Feb. 16.—The lumber cut of the Province of Quebec for the winter of 1925-26 is expected to be about 1,500,000,000 feet. It was announced by C. G. Piche, chief forester in the Provincial Government. Lack of snow during January

throughout the province made little difference in the lumbering operations in the 250 camps which have been opened, for, whereas in some districts too much snow fell early in the season, the fact that practically none fell during January stabilized matters, and rendered the roads just right for active work. In all, some thirty thousand men are scattered throughout the province. Hygienic conditions are reported to be vastly improved over previous years, for the forestry men employed by the Provincial Government, some two hundred in number, are visiting each of the camps in turn, and seeing that the new rules and regulations laid down by the Provincial Health Bureau were observed in full. In addition to this work these foresters are also charged with enforcing the law regarding the minimum growth of timber that can

be felled. The 1925-26 timber-cut is expected to be completed about the end of April, but long before that the provincial forestry department will have started their plans in connection with the operations for next winter's work in the forests of the province.

SARGENT'S HOME SOLD

LONDON, Feb. 17.—The former home of John Sargent, noted American-British painter, has been purchased by Sir Charles Higham, Alfred Orr, a young portrait painter, will be given the use of the home. Sir Charles is Orr's patron, and said he wanted the young artist to have the inspiration of the surroundings of the master.

B. C. ASKS RETURN OF 14,000,000 ACRES

Wants Control of Lands Handled to Federal Govt. in Railway Grants
Canadian Press
VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 17.—That the federal government return to provincial control all lands handed over to it by the province in the railway grants is the request which British Columbia will make to the Federal authorities, Premier John Oliver announced yesterday.

An order-in-council formally outlining the province's proposals has been prepared by the premier and will be laid before the cabinet immediately. Formal action will be taken before the end of the week. The province is asking for the control of 14,000,000 acres handed over to the Federal government when this province entered Confederation to assist the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in-cluding 3,500,000 acres in the Peace River block and a broad belt along the main line of the Canadian Pacific.

Gasoline Goes Up One Cent in Ontario
TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 17.—The increase of one cent a gallon in the price of gasoline, which went into effect today, in Ontario, is due, according to S. E. Parsons, of the British American Oil Company to the advance in the price of crude oil.
The local price of gas was 27 cents a gallon plus three cents tax. Today the actual cost to the consumer is 31 cents.

Canadian Newspaper Output Tops Record
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Production of newspaper in the United States in January amounted to 140,000 tons, was the greatest quantity for any January, and compared with 129,442 tons in January, 1925. The output of Canadian newspapers for the month was 139,088 tons also a record, against 121,605 tons a year ago.

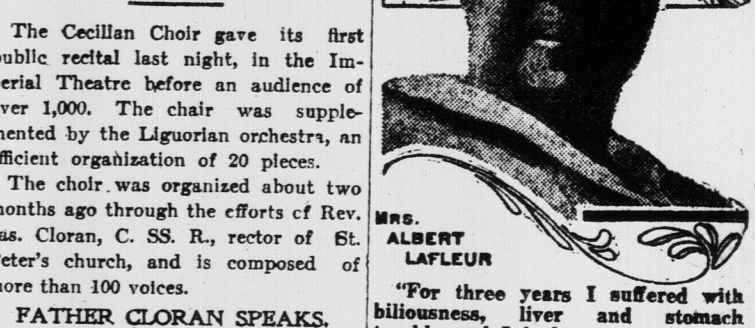

SICKLE IN AN ELM

British Workmen Make Discovery While Sawing Old Tree

LONDON, Feb. 17.—An unusual discovery was made by workmen employed in the saw mills at the London, Midland, and Scottish Railway's carriage and wagon works at Wolverton, who were engaged on sawing up a large elm tree into planks. They found a complete sickle embedded in the heart of the tree. CANADIAN RADIO CHIEF IN CITY

Local News

Head Inspector and Maritime Superintendent Visit Red Head Station

Re-equipping There—Official Coming to City to Trace Interferences

Donald Manson, Ottawa, chief inspector of the radio telegraph branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and Alexander Sutherland, Halifax, superintendent of the government radio stations in the Maritime Provinces, are in the city in connection with the proposed re-equipping of the Red Head station. They drove to the station early this forenoon and it is said the proposal is to re-fit the Red Head radio station with what is known as a W. equipment—a system characterized by a continuous wave. The present method is the spark system, now considered by officials as not modern enough for an important port like Saint John.

In installing the continuous wave or valve set here there may have to be some changes made in the building itself. Under the present conditions the Red Head depot has been an efficient one, but Mr. Manson's visit is expected to result in its being placed on a par with the best under government control.

HELP SET OWNERS.

The proposed changes at Red Head would, it is said, reduce and practically eliminate the interference to privately-owned radio sets have been experiencing from the clacking spark system employed there. This ought to vastly improve local reception conditions.

A complete check-up of local radio troubles will be carried on this week or next by an interference inspector. It is thought by some radio experts here and technical electricians that street lighting leaks, motor elevators, etc., are causing havoc to radio in some localities.

Inspector Horan, who looks after radio equipment on the shipping calling line, has been a very busy official this winter. He has a particularly important duty.

A leading radio fan told The Times-Star today that radio reception has been consistently poor all over the continent this winter, but on occasions there have been wonderfully clear exceptions.
