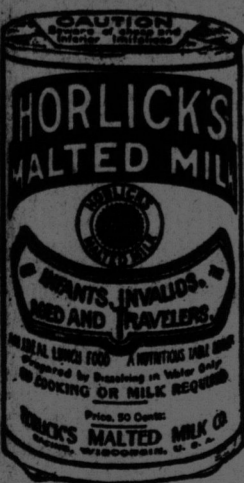

### ST. JOHN FLATS AND LANDLORDS

St. John, April 17.  
Sir—A lot of discussion has been carried on at different times with regard to the housing question in St. John, but I think if the board of health intervened with a little vigor and enforced the power which it is supposed to hold, matters could be considerably improved. I always thought that the owners of landlord was supposed to keep a flat or house in repair, but in St. John the only thing the landlord seems to do is to collect the rent and to raise it occasionally to relieve the monotony of living. And what redress does the tenant have? He complains to the landlord, and is told that if he is not satisfied he can get out, as he can let the place any time. The only convenience our flat has is water, and it possesses every inconve-

ience from cockroaches to rats, and to kill them off seems only to reopen the field for immigrants from other flats, and yet my rent has been raised! The St. John landlord at the present day seems to do exactly as he likes, and the average workman has neither the initiative or the funds to kick. It is all very well to talk about building new houses, but how about making the houses which are already built fit to live in? I've seen better cow-barns than some of the St. John flats, yet the rents increase every year. No wonder the bars flourish! A man can stand in

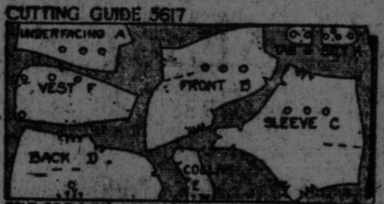
#### A TAILORED MODEL



Required to make the suit are 3 yards of 44-inch or 4 1/2 yards of 36-inch material. In cutting fold the material first creasing carefully; now place the back and collar along the folded edge. After these are being carefully put in place, take the vest and underfacing and place on a lengthwise thread opposite the back. The front and sleeves are now arranged in the same way (on a lengthwise thread) and the back and belt placed in the little space that remains at one side of the sleeve.

To make, adjust underfacing to position underneath front, corresponding edges even. Adjust tab, bringing corresponding small "o" perforations in tab and in front near lower edge together. Pleat front, creasing on slot perforations, bring folded edge to line of small "o" perforations and stitch. Adjust belt on back, corresponding perforations even; pleat creasing on slot perforations, bring folded edge to small "o" perforations and stitch. Lap belt at center-back as illustrated and fasten. Pleat sleeve creasing on slot perforations, bring folded edge to small "o" perforations and stitch. Sew sleeve to front and back as notched, close under-arm and sleeve seams as notched. Sew collar to neck edge as notched; lap over on collar as illustrated, corresponding double "oo" perforations even and tack invisibly.

Adjust vest to position underneath front, bringing corresponding small "o" perforations in vest and in front together and tack invisibly. Stitch shoulder edge to position.

### CAROLINE COE'S TESTED RECEIPTS

**Baked Bluefish or Shad.**  
Bluefish and shad are in season and both baking and broiling are fine ways of cooking these delicate morsels from the salt water.  
Remove backbone and cut into pieces for serving.  
Chop one small Bermuda onion and sprinkle over a buttered agate pan.  
Set pieces of fish on the onion. Add 3 tablespoons of fish stock made by boiling head, tail and bones in a cup of water. Salt and pepper to taste. Cover with oil paper. The paper should rest over the sides of the pan. Let cook fifteen minutes in hot oven, basting 3 times with liquid in pan. Remove fish to serving dish. Garnish with slices of lemon with minced parsley and serve with hot tartare sauce.  
Make the sauce with one cup of white sauce, half cup of mayonnaise, one small green onion chopped fine, one teaspoon of vinegar, one teaspoon of minced parsley, two small sweet pickles and six olives chopped fine. Have white sauce hot. Add the other ingredients. Do not allow to boil.  
Boiling or baking is the best method of cooking fish.

FULL ENQUIRY DEMANDED—NO LIMIT

It may be inferred from the letter of Acting Premier Clarke to Mr. Dugal that the government will make a desperate effort to prevent any full and impartial enquiry into the Valley Railway charges.

The action of the government in the face of the charges made by Mr. Dugal is most extraordinary and can only be interpreted as an expression of fear of the disclosures that may be made.

THE DUGAL CHARGES

The question of the Dugal charges comes up in the legislature this afternoon. So far as the Dugal charges are concerned it only needs to be said that despite all rumors and hints in the government press, designed to create a false impression, they only desire to have a complete investigation of the charges made against members of the Fleming government.

In the course of his speech Mr. Graham amply proved from the report itself that its statements were not justified. The efforts of Mr. Ouellet and Mr. Lynch-Staunton will not injure the Liberal party, but they have inflicted very grave injury upon the country.

AN INJURY TO CANADA

In his great speech on the report of the Gutelius Commission, Hon. George F. Graham dealt with the following clause in that report:

"We find that the Transcontinental Railway Commission, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and those having charge of the construction of the railway, did not consider it desirable or necessary to practice or encourage economy in the construction of this road."

Mr. Graham pointed out that this was not only a sweeping assertion against men who had spent the whole of their lives in the service of the public, among them eminent professional men, including every engineer who was engaged in the work, but against the Grand Trunk Pacific officials, including the late C. M. Hays and his successor Mr. Chamberlain.

Continuing Mr. Graham said that this charge had been placed, not only before the people of this country, but before the financiers of the mother country, who are being asked for money to carry on this great project. We quote further:

"I say this matter will never be complete until the gentlemen who made this report are compelled to substantiate that charge against the Grand Trunk Pacific or retract it on behalf of the Dominion of Canada. Is it an attack on the Grand Trunk Pacific only? Not at all. Even that is serious enough. At the very time when the financial situation in Canada is tense, when some of our great industries are finding it difficult to finance their transactions and carry on their undertakings, when the weak ones in the industrial world are being crowded to the wall, when capital is exceedingly sensitive and it is difficult to obtain it even on good security, this charge is hurled headlong at a company which is linked up with the Dominion of Canada in a great enterprise. That charge against this company is a charge against the Dominion of Canada and the way it manages its affairs. What will the finance minister think when he goes to the old land and that charge meets him? What will representatives of industrial concerns think when they go to the old land, as some of them have done, and are met with this unfounded charge against an old company? . . . This government has a duty which is as clear as the noonday sun, and that is to be on behalf of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company and on behalf of the good name of Canada to repudiate the charge which has been made against that company, and which has not one iota of foundation. This unfounded charge has

had its influence. Men are out of employment in one of the big cities of this Dominion on account of the publishing of that unfounded report. Some of the leading men of Montreal, close friends of the prime minister, politically and personally, have no hesitation in saying that this attack is unwarranted, should not have been made, and will injure the Dominion of Canada if not repudiated. . . . We have in this country great industries. We have great enterprises that are going to the old land every day asking for financial aid, and what we in this house ought to do, and what is the duty of the government above all, is to see that the legitimate enterprise is protected, and that the legitimate borrower is not deprived of his rights by any false reports such as the one before me. I am speaking thus strongly because the matter before me has been pressed on my attention during the last few weeks by many prominent men who have no sympathy with the Liberal party whatever. But they feel that a great error has been made in the present financial situation at least in allowing a report of that kind to be spread broadcast, not only throughout Canada, but throughout the old land and throughout the United States, where it is having the effect, and must have the effect of injuring the credit of Canadian industries and Canadian enterprises, unless the prime minister of Canada, in the words of an eminent statesman, is honest enough to be bold and bold enough to be honest, and repudiates at least that part of this report. I am not pleading at all that he should repudiate the part of the report in which attacks are made of a political nature; we will look after them ourselves in the country. But I am asking him on behalf of the industries of Canada, and on behalf of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, not to allow his government to be tied up to such a report as that, because the injury to Canada from such a report cannot well be estimated."

Permission Given With Provision For Damages—Street Work and Retaining Walls—Mr. Elliott's Complaint

The acting commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommended renewal leases of lots on the West Side to Oscar and Daisy K. Hanson and to Michael Gately, at a ten per cent. advance, and to Margaret Kellogg at \$22. These were adopted.

The Dunlop Tire & Rubber Company's request to be allowed to run a pipe from the second story of their building down an electric light pole to the street for the purpose of delivering air to their patrons from their automatic plant, was referred to the commissioners of safety and public works jointly.

street extension asking for sidewalks, water and sewerage, was referred to the commissioners of water and sewerage, and of public works jointly. All the members spoke in favor of giving some attention to this section as it was exposed to the public gaze during the ball season.

Communications from the W. M. S. of Centenary church and from the Social Service Council of the Presbyterian Church, approved of the closing of the road houses.

A letter from F. H. Elliott, complaining of not being able to secure a satisfactory settlement with Commissioner McLellan regarding the location of an oil tank was read.

Wrong Impression, Says McLellan.

Commissioner McLellan, in reply, said the letter created a wrong impression. He had given his permission for the placing of the tank on the understanding that it was to be in the ground outside of the company's building, either in the private roadway or in a vacant lot. After the tank came, however, the company wished to place it under its own building in close proximity to other buildings in the block, and he refused to take the responsibility for allowing it to be placed. He had understood he was dealing with the Canadian Oil Company and he had asked Peter Clinch, as a representative of the fire underwriters, if he had approved of the location of the tank, and Mr. Clinch said he had not.

Commissioner Agar said that although the council was the last court of appeal from a decision of a commissioner, no action could be taken until all the facts were learned. He suggested that the matter be taken up in committee of the whole, with representatives of the company and of the fire underwriters present, and that the ground be visited. This was agreed to. Commissioner McLellan said that the Imperial Oil Company had made application for a similar privilege, but intended to buy its tank in a private roadway.

Commissioner McLellan called attention to the committee of the public steps in Indianstown, and Commissioner Agar said that it would be as cheap in the end to take the steps off the sidewalk and set a staircase in the solid rock.

It was decided to purchase from the Sun Oil Company a certain of asphaltic road oil at 8.00 cents a gallon and another from the Standard Company at 6.5 cents a gallon. Commissioner Agar said he had purchased a quantity of chlorine for the purposes in Eastern Canada, for less than what was paid to United States firms last year.

Commissioner Agar also reported that he had proposed for the widening of the street in Moore street, which would cost \$1,100, and one in Rockland road, which would cost \$400. The engineers had reported on them, and work would be commenced as soon as the weather allowed.

### WANT LISTS REVISED

At a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last evening it was decided to take up the matter of a revision of the voters' lists at City Hall. It was said that the names of many who were qualified to vote were not on the lists for last Tuesday. It was said that the names not being placed on the list showed a determination to keep the workers from voting. Complaint was made that the practice of disenfranchising large numbers of workmen for non-payment of taxes was unfair, since they had to pay finally.

**SAYS STANDARD  
STORY WAS FAKE**

Official Statement By Acting Premier

**DUGAL DID NOT DELAY**

Hon. Mr. Clarke Announces That He Asked For Postponement—Charges Will Come up This Afternoon—Some Demand For Partizan Committee

Fredericton, April 16.—The desperate exploit of willful misrepresentation of the reason why the Dugal charges were not made in the house last evening, as practised by the partisan correspondent for the government press, has proved a complete boomerang.

The attorney-general and acting premier, George J. Clarke, rose in his place after the reading of the journals today, with the Standard newspaper in his hand, and regretted the false impression that must have been created in the public mind by the article as it appeared in that journal.

He explained how he had first approached Mr. Dugal, asking for delay until today, and of that gentleman's courteous assent to his proposal, and afterward how Mr. Dugal informed him that his counsel, F. B. Carvell, could not be present Thursday, and suggesting Friday, to which he (Mr. Clarke) agreed.

Mr. Dugal followed the attorney-general, and said: "I did not approach first the attorney-general in the matter. He approached me, and asked for postponement until Thursday. I consented, after some talk, but, a few minutes later discovering that my legal adviser would not be here Thursday, I went to the attorney-general and so advised him. He then agreed that the postponement asked for by him should be extended to Friday."

"These are the facts of the case, as I understood them at the time. I was ready to go on when the house met Wednesday night, and am only too anxious to proceed, when my legal adviser arrives tonight."

The members sat amazed during these explanations. Many of them had buoyed themselves up with the hope that the Globe and Standard were right in their estimate of the position of the Liberal opposition, but their hopes were dashed to the ground as they listened to their acting leader.

The Dugal charges will come up tomorrow afternoon and a full investigation demanded by the opposition.

Some Want Partizan Board.

Munro, who are in favor of the partisan board, the disadvantage of Mr. Pelletier would be their advantage; but the people will not stand for any such inquiry and the men who endorse it must answer when the time comes.

Wrong has triumphed too long. It is the turn of right today. The men who are clean should show by some decisive action that they are clean. Such politics as have been practiced by the Tory party under Fleming cannot be tolerated by those who are above suspicion. They will stand for an independent tribunal of inquiry, and the men who want merely a committee of the house will bear watching.

There will evidently be an attempt to make W. H. Berry the scape-goat. That is shown by an editorial in the Gleamer tonight, but will Berry stand for taking the blame that should fall properly upon the shoulders of more prominent men? Berry was, undoubtedly, too willing to obey orders, and if that is a fault in an official, he was very guilty; but the man behind, the man who gave the orders, the man who got the charges—be it on

trial more than the collector or the purse-bearer.

Let nothing cloud the issue. The leader of the government of New Brunswick is on trial, and those members of his government who have been associated with him must also be on trial and suffer with him if they do not hold their heads high, declare their innocence, and retire from an administration that has been so corrupt as to cast shame upon this fair province. Public opinion and public favor will stand behind the men who take this course, just as public opinion will condemn those who do not.

In the legislature this afternoon Hon. Mr. Clarke said he desired to refer to a matter upon which some misunderstanding might otherwise arise. The St. John Standard of this morning contained a despatch, dated Fredericton last night, which purported to give the reasons why the charges preferred by the leader of the opposition against Premier Fleming

were not taken up last night as anticipated.

The despatch being headed: "Dugal Spars for Time," the wording of the despatch was most misleading, and was not justified by the facts. What actually occurred was that he (Clarke) interviewed the leader of the opposition and suggested to him, owing to the lateness of the hour at which the house sat, owing to the delay in arrival of the train from St. John, it might be well to postpone the consideration of the matter until today, when there would be more time to devote to it, and the leader of the opposition was quite agreeable to this. A short time later the latter came to see him (Clarke) and said it would be more convenient if the matter was put off until Friday, as his counsel would not be able to be present today. He (Clarke) agreed to this, the arrangement being satisfactory to both and he thought that the expression "Sparring for Time" was quite uncalled for under the circumstances which actually happened.

Mr. Dugal expressed his concurrence in the attorney-general's remarks, saying that the former had asked him to postpone the matter until today and he had later asked that it be put over until Friday. Personally he was all ready to proceed on Wednesday night but that did not suit the attorney-general and today did not suit him (Dugal), therefore they mutually agreed to stand the matter over until Friday.

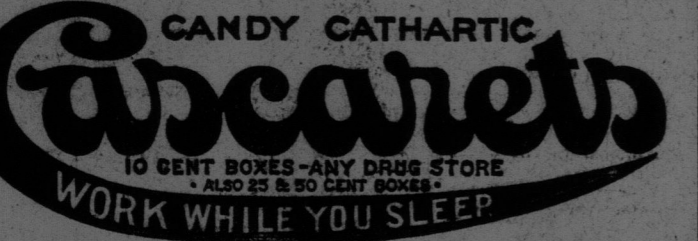

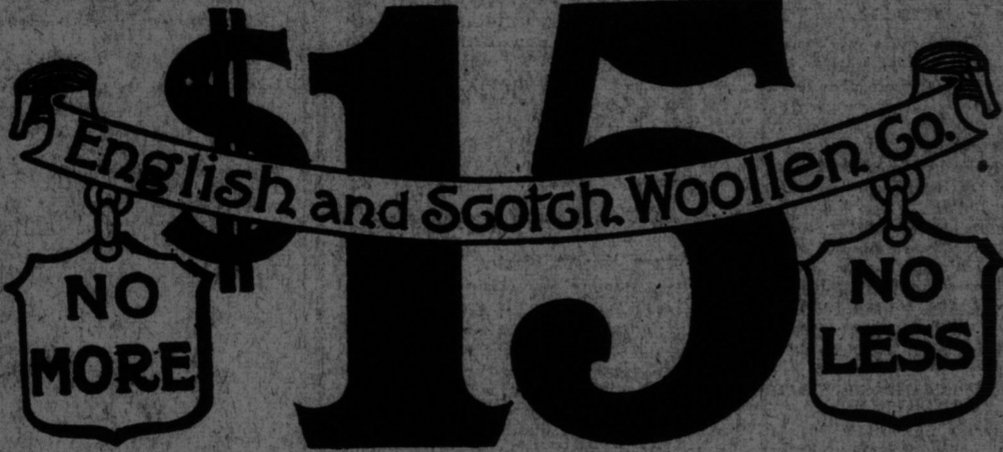

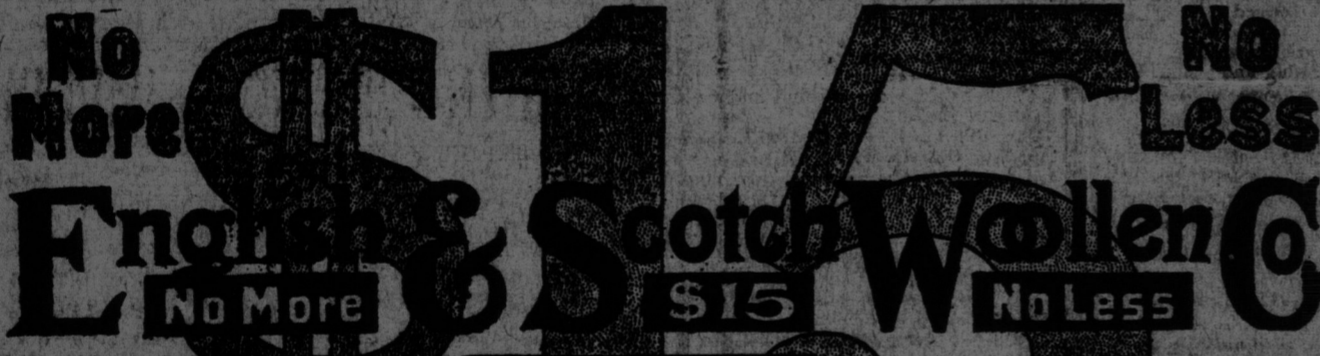

Mr. MacDonald has not yet reached a decision, but the prospects of his departure from Sussex will be learned with general regret.

ST. MARY'S BAND CONCERT. The members of St. Mary's Band gave a concert in the school room last evening and it was greatly enjoyed. After a few opening remarks by the rector, Rev. W. O. Raymond, the following programme was carried out—Selection by orchestra, solo by Mrs. Farris, sketch by James Beasans and Thomas Owens, The Dvorce Case; sword dance by Alexander Gibby and little Miss Gibby; flute solo, Ronald Edwards; sketch by Messrs. MISSING PACKAGE WITH I. C. R. PAY CHECKS OF \$1,000. A registered package containing the pay of about thirty trainmen employed here with the I. C. R. and amounting to more than \$1,000 is missing and no one seems to know what became of it after last Tuesday. The envelope contained the checks of the workmen to be paid on or about the 15th inst. and as yet they have not received their money. A report was circulated about the city that some of the shovellers had gone on strike because of the non-receipt of their checks, and in consequence there had been trouble in loading the trains, but this was said today to be untrue. If the package is not located, duplicate checks will be issued to the men.

FINDS ST. JOHN PAPER EIGHTY-EIGHT YEARS OLD. Mrs. James Walker of South Bay Comes Across a Star of December, 1826. Mrs. James Walker, of South Bay, has in her possession a copy of a newspaper published in St. John, named the "Star" and dated, December 26, 1826. Mrs. Walker found the old paper while looking over some of her husband's effects. The newspaper is of four pages, four columns wide. Out of the sixteen columns, ten are devoted to advertisements, four are used for outlining the doings of congress in the United States and two columns on the last page contain nothing but fiction—a continued story—and a few lines of poetry. The only local news in the paper is contained in the following marriage and obituary notices:

On Saturday evening last by the Rev. B. G. Gray, Mr. Charles King, to Mrs. Agnes Robson, both of this city.

On Sunday last, Robert, son of the late John Allan, aged 8 years and 10 months—Funeral will take place tomorrow at 11 o'clock.

KINGS OF THE CANDLE PINS ARE IN ST. JOHN: POEHLER AND WALSH. Arrivals in the city today at noon were Paul Poehler and Archie Walsh, from Boston, leaders in the world of bowling with many championships to their credit. Poehler, who is known by bowling fans as "Peerless Paul" has the distinction of holding the world's record of 1218 for ten strings, and this is his first visit to St. John to bowl. He and Walsh are to roll 20 strings in an exhibition game on Black's Alley. Walsh is a former North End boy of whose game needs be said, as he is already widely known and greatly liked by local friends. He holds the world's record of 178 for a single string.

MR. ROBB AGAIN WITH LOCAL Y. M. C. A. FOR FEW WEEKS. Andrew W. Robb, formerly secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., from which he severed his connection a year ago, is again temporarily connected with the institution. Mr. Robb, who returned yesterday from a three week's visit to Ottawa, where he was the guest of Senator Dennis, has consented to spend a few weeks here assisting the officers of the association in closing up the year's business.

LOCAL M.P.'S AND RAILWAY PASSES

Interesting Queries and The Answers In Legislature

OFFICIALS AT ELECTIONS

Question Having To Do With Public Works Man—Cases of Bail Forfeited and Not Collected

Hon. Dr. Landry, in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry in the N. B. legislature, said:

Q. 1—Do officials of the government who travel on railway passes charge up their fare in their expense account? Answer—No.

Q. 2—Has the government any system of vouchers for its officials when traveling, such as is in use by officials of the dominion government? Answer—Officials are required to present vouchers for traveling expenses, which are audited in the usual way.

Q. 3—Are the officials required to make any declaration in connection with their expense accounts or are they paid as submitted? Answer—As a rule affidavits are submitted covering all traveling expenses of officials.

Q. 4—How long since the C. P. R. has issued annual passes to members of this house in lieu of trip passes? Answer—Annual passes have been issued by the C. P. R. to members of the house for about four or five years.

Q. 5—Does the government approve of the custom in this province of paying the members of this legislature ten cents a mile, each way from their home to the legislature and return, when each representative's railway passage does not cost him a cent? Answer—The statute "Respecting indemnity to members of the Legislative Assembly," Chapter 8 of the Consolidated Statutes, 1908, Section 4, requires that each member of the legislature shall be allowed mileage to defray his traveling expenses to and from the sessions of the legislature. The acceptance of a railway pass is a matter for the consideration and determination of each individual member.

Officials and Elections. Hon. Mr. Clarke, in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry, said:

Q. 1—Is there any regulation in any of the departments of the government which requires the officials shall not take an active part in provincial or other elections? Answer—There is no regulation, but it has been intimated from time to time to officials that they should take no active part in provincial or other elections.

Q. 2—Has the attention of the government or any member of it been directed either verbally or in writing to the fact that H. M. Blair, secretary of the public works department, took an active part in the recognition of the County of York? Answer—Neither the government nor any member of it has received any formal intimation concerning the subject matter of this inquiry.

Q. 3—If so, did the government reprimand Mr. Blair or take any action? Answer—Answered by No. 2.

Bail Forfeited and Not Collected. Hon. Mr. Clarke, in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry, said:

Q. 1—What amount of bail has been forfeited in the province during the year ending December 31 last? Answer—A recognition in the case of the King vs. Leonard W. Hannan was declared forfeited on December 30, 1913. Under the terms of the recognition Hannan was bound in the sum of \$500 and W. Botsford Beaumont and Ovid Leckhart in the sum of \$500 each.

A recognition in the case of the King vs. Alexander Cohen was declared forfeited at the May sitting of the Circuit Court of Westmorland county. Under the terms of the recognition Cohen was bound in the sum of \$1,200 and Louis Attis and Walter P. Josiah in the sum of \$500 each.

A recognition in the case of the King vs. Ephraim Morton was declared forfeited at the November sitting of the Westmorland County Court. Under the terms of the recognition Morton was bound in the sum of \$500 and George Budd and Alfred Hennessy in the sum of \$250 each.

Q. 2—What amount has been collected and from whom? Answer—No amount has been collected on any of the forfeited bonds.

Q. 3—Were any forfeited bail bonds not collected and if so, why not? Answer—Answered by No. 2.

Hon. Mr. Clarke in referring to these answers, said the case of Dr. Byrnes of Chatham, whose bail was forfeited, had been inadvertently omitted. As far as he was able to ascertain, this and those included in the answer were all that had been forfeited, but owing to the short time he had held the office of attorney general, he had not been able to go through all the papers in the office, and there might be others.

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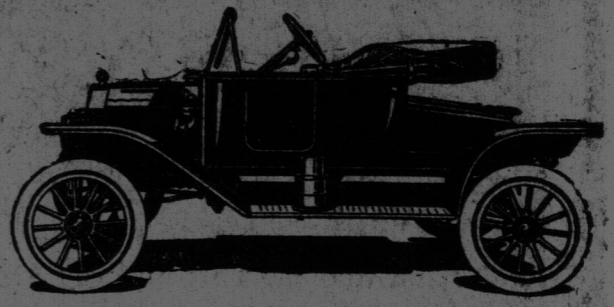
