HUNDRED AND SIXTEEN BODIES CONIGNED TO DEEP

WOMEN'S AUXILIARY IN SESSION CABLE SHIP BRINGS 190 FETTERED BY TITANIC'S DEAD TO BE CLAD BY MOURNERS IN HALIFAX

People Hold Aroof in Respectful Attitude as Gresome Cargo of Death Ship is Laded

On Body of Colonel Astor Sum of \$2,500 Was Found—Not Certain of Identity of Mr. Widener—Work of Removing Bodies to Shore Was Expected to Take up all Day

Halifax, April 30.—While the city's church bells tolled and British flags draped down at half mast, the cable ship Mackay-Bennett steamed slowly into the harbor this morning, bearing the new cargo of the world, upon which is destined the western world in relief. The corners of the globe are guarded by eagles in stone. The figure of Columbus is seen standing on the prow of a caravel which projects into the harbor. On either side of the shaft are replicas of two men, one indicative of the old world (an aged patriarch), while the other represents the new world (an Indian). The ship carries a medallion of Ferdinand and Isabella.

Two Men Drowned While Fishing Off Sable Island Probably Overloaded Their Dory And it Was Swamped

Halifax, April 30.—The Lunsburg schooner W. C. Smith, Captain Seaborn, arrived from the Banks yesterday and reported the loss of two men while fishing off Sable Island. The men were Austin Allan and Calvin, both young married men, leaving young children.

The trouble is a recurrence of an illness experienced about six weeks ago. The sitting of the commission will go on under the chairmanship of Dr. Arty Scott, K. C.

WIRELESS RATES TO UNDERBID CABLES British Postmaster-General Makes Announcement in Commons

London, April 30.—Yesterday, in the House of Commons, Postmaster-General Samuelson announced that he had arranged with the Marconi Wireless Company to transmit messages between England and America. The full rate to New York and Montreal, Mr. Samuelson said, would be six cents a word, as against the cable rate of twenty-five cents a word by the other companies.

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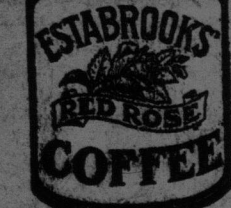

Daily Hints For the Cook

WASHINGTON PIE.

One cup sugar, four teaspoons melted butter, two eggs (beaten), half cup sweet milk, one and a half cups flour, two teaspoons baking powder, salt and flavor.

COFFEE WHIP.

One tablespoon cornstarch, two table- spoons sugar, one cup coffee, quarter teaspoon vanilla, whites of two eggs. Measure one tablespoon starch and two of sugar into a pan and rub down with a little of the coffee, put on stove and let mixture boil until thick.

STUFFED HADDOCK.

Take a good-sized haddock, remove the tail, fins and head, and thoroughly dry the fish. Prepare the stuffing of three table- spoons of chopped suet, three table- spoons of bread crumbs, one des- ertspoonful of chopped parsley or mixed herbs, one beaten egg and seasoning of salt and pepper.

Engagement of Lord Northland - Cozey Island, in Ireland a Family Possession

The announcement of the engagement of Lord Northland to Hilda, daughter of the late Sir Daniel Cooper, of the present Sir William Charles Cooper, bears out what I stated in these letters that it would be impossible for him to wed Mrs. Stirling, with whom his name had been coupled in the divorce suit brought by the Scotch lady, John Alexander Stirling.

Now the Scotch divorce laws are very peculiar. They do not forbid divorced people to marry again. The guilty party may marry immediately after the decree is pronounced, anybody except the co-respondent in the case. This rule, which is most strict and imperative, dates in its present form in Scotland, from the year 1800 and has always been vigorously enforced.

Lord Northland is about forty years of age. He has seen a great deal of the world having among other things, acted as A. D. C. to the father when the latter was Governor General of New Zealand, where he achieved so much popularity that when he completed his term of office, the colonials petitioned the crown to appoint him for six years more.

Lord Northland is the only child of Lord Charlesment, who for many years was so familiar a figure at Dublin Castle, as Ulster of the Black Rod to the Order of St. Patrick, and as controller of the viceregal household.

As Lady Ranfurly is the only child of Lord Charlesment, she will inherit at his death, no less a place than Cozey Island, I do not mean the Cozey Island on the coast front of New York City, however, but the Cozey Island in County Armagh, named in the memory of Saint Cozey. It is difficult for those who have visited New York's Cozey Island at the height of the season, to realize that it owes its name to a saint, who was also a recluse. She is called a saint, though as a matter of fact she has not been raised above beast condition. Her island is situated in Lough Neagh, and was a favorite retreat of St. Patrick.

According to tradition, Saint Cozey was a pious woman who lived in a lonely cave in the woods of Tyrone. She practiced the art of healing with so much success as to win the respect and love of the natives. But when in the fourteenth century, O'Neills advanced from the Derry side to displace the O'Connors who held possession of the southern coast of Lough Neagh, their chief, Dermot, fell seriously ill, and he was carried to the cell of Saint Cozey. However, his condition did not improve, and he died. His followers accused the saint of being a tool of their enemies, and swore vengeance. But the O'Connors came to her assistance, and carried her off to the island, which bears her name to this day. There she continued for many years, and when she died, the O'Connors erected to her memory a tower, the ruins of which have been converted into a manse, by the Charlesment family.

The Ranfurly motto is "I move and reform." and the present representative of the name is Lord Northland, who has a better knowledge than Lord Ranfurly.

The will of the Marquis was a constant source of solicitude to him. He is said to have visited every Maori village in the colony, and during his term of office had the satisfaction of signifying the royal assent to an act of parliament giving to them certain lands and power to deal with local and native affairs. The Maoris have a definite place reserved them in the constitution of New Zealand. They have four seats in the house of representatives, and so on.

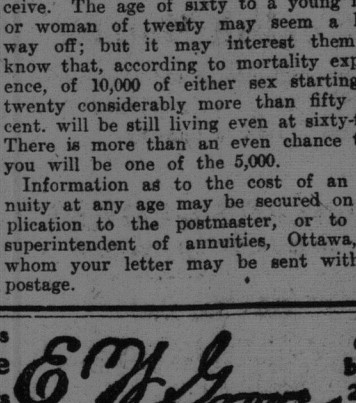

Practical Education

The Maritime Merchant makes a very strong appeal for such a change in our educational system as will make the training better suit the pupil's probable vocation in life. It makes these pointed remarks: "We have put considerable stress on education and are proud of it, as well as of our standards and our success; but what we have done with all the clerical and petty or lawyers we have made? We have sent them away, because we have been absolutely unable to make use of all the young people we have educated along these lines. We might have trained some of them for mechanical pursuits, and some of them we might have trained for the farm, and of these the majority would probably have lived happier and more successful lives than in the vocations to which they have given themselves. Incidentally, by favoring professional callings to the prejudice of more practical ones, we have drawn away from our farms the very element necessary to perpetuate agriculture—the young people. As a part of our agriculture is a part of the price we have paid for higher education."

Quebec's Example Again

There was a general feeling in this province at the time of the immigration congress in Fredericton that the government might be induced to take practical steps to make a larger expenditure to induce immigrants to come to New Brunswick. The legislature has been prorogued, however, without such action having been taken; and there is no evidence that Premier Fleming has any comprehensive plans in view. It is worth while to note what the Liberal government of the province of Quebec is doing in relation to this question. A strong delegation from the Eastern Townships waited upon the government and presented its case much after the same manner as that adopted by the immigration congress at Fredericton. As a result the Quebec government has undertaken to carry out the following programme: 1. An attractive Eastern Townships booklet, equal to that issued for any other section of Canada, adequately illustrated, and with a first edition of at least 10,000 copies, will be published for distribution in the Old Country. 2. Expenses will be borne of an Eastern Townships agent lecturer, fully equipped with lantern and Eastern Townships slides for illustrating his talk, who will work in the Old Country, probably in Scotland, on behalf of the Eastern Townships, during the greater part of the year, beginning in September. 3. A receiving and distributing depot will be maintained in Sherbrooke, and organized in connection with the Government's labor bureau which is to be established here. A provincial government office will be at the port of landing at Quebec to carry out his efforts on behalf of the Eastern Townships. If we had a Liberal government in the province of New Brunswick there would be a much better prospect of having a progressive immigration policy adopted.

Prices and Middlemen

A correspondent of the Bangor Commercial declares that nearly one half of the earnings of the farmer has gone to enrich the middleman. One quarter, he says, has been lost through lack of organization and co-operation in the sale of farm products, and the other fourth in the purchase of articles required for use on the farm. This writer declares that through organization and co-operation the following results are obtained: "Increased price of potatoes, 10c. to 20c. per bushel at shipping point; apples, 40c. to 50c. per bushel; beans, 50c. to 75c.; decreased price of fertilizer, \$11.00 per ton in large lots; wire fencing, 40 per cent. four 50c. to \$1.20 per barrel; oil, 8c. to 10c. per gallon; paraffin, 7c. per pound; blue vitrol, 5 1/2c.; grain, farm machinery, and, in fact, nearly everything purchased for use on the farm in proportion." This, of course, implies co-operative buying as well as selling; and, if anything like the results which this writer quotes is obtainable, it is evident the farmers who fail to co-operate are heavy losers. There is, however, another side to the story, and it relates to the consumer. There is good reason to believe that the consumer of farm products suffers more through the activities of the middleman than does the farmer himself. The farmer is not suffering nearly so much as a result of low prices as the consumer suffers through high prices. Whoever can devise a plan by which the farmer and the consumer can get together and the former receive a reasonable profit without compelling the latter to pay unreasonable prices, will be the greatest benefactor of this age. That has been a long and weary wait at Halifax for the arrival of the Mackay-Bennett with the bodies of the Titanic's dead. The Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, who will address the local Canadian Club this week, is a brilliant speaker who is always heard with pleasure. The St. Lawrence is open for navigation and the scene of activity will soon be transferred from the wharves of St. John to those of Montreal. The season at St. John has been a record one. Captain Moore of the steamship Mount Temple was not only able to convince the commission of inquiry in Washington that he did not fall in his duty in any particular with regard to the Titanic, but he also was publicly thanked for his testimony and the assistance he was able to give to the committee. Senator Smith, head of the commission of inquiry in Washington, has not only arranged recognition in England, but is being roundly censured by the members of the committee. A politician of the stamp of Senator Smith is very much out of place as the head of a judicial inquiry. In the British parliament yesterday the under-secretary of state for foreign affairs pointed out that the United States Senate was acting quite within its rights in making an inquiry into the cause of the Titanic disaster and that this was not only right but reasonable. The State of Minnesota has spent more than \$75,000 to keep its lakes stocked with game fish and to protect the large game in its woods. In a letter to this paper the commissioner of immigration for that state declares that Minnesota seeks to maintain its position as the best fishing place in the United States. British Columbia, Alberta and Manitoba all produce more butter than the province of New Brunswick. Indeed, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island are the only provinces which produce less than is produced in New Brunswick. This province, however, produces much more cheese than any of those mentioned with the exception of Prince Edward Island, which in 1910 produced nearly twice as much. The St. John Standard is evidently convinced that the loyalty of Canadians is so feeble that they could not be trusted to increase their trade with the United States. That may be true of the Tory party, which always has an ample stock of lip-loyalty, but no naval policy, while, on the other hand, it has a sneaking regard for Mr. Bourassa and the Nationalists. It is announced that the contract for one section of the Valley Railway has been awarded, and that work will begin at once between Fredericton and Woodstock. By midsummer there will be quite an army of men engaged in railroad construction in this province. The work will create an active demand for material and supplies, which will be of benefit to the cities and towns as well as to the agricultural districts. It is difficult for people in the other provinces to understand the opposition in Prince Edward Island to the use of automobiles. The motor car has come to stay, and to be of increasing use in every country. In an agricultural province like Prince Edward Island, it ought to be of great value in connection with the marketing of produce. Sooner or later the prejudices will be broken down, and the people will wonder why there was ever any serious opposition. Col. Henry Waterson of the Louisville Courier-Journal is greatly scandalized by the spectacle of a president and an ex-president of the United States racing through the state of Massachusetts denouncing each other "in an unseemly public quarrel." Mr. Waterson, however, lays most of the blame upon Roosevelt, whom he declares to be a madman. "He carries all the marks typical of the perverted understanding, the devilish streak of viciousness, the ignoble malignancy, the logical intensity and inaccuracy of the lunatic," and much more to the same effect. It has been long since any public man in the United States received such a scorching from a reputable newspaper as that which the Courier-Journal gives the ex-president. Meanwhile, the despatches indicate that Roosevelt has been making many friends in Massachusetts, and the present indications are that he will get a majority of the Republican delegates to the national convention. The primaries are being held in Massachusetts today, and the result will be awaited with intense interest. NEW AUSTRALIAN RAILWAY IS TO BE 1,070 MILES LONG Will Be Built by Government Without Intervention of a Contractor

Melbourne, April 29.—The biggest thing which Australia will undertake this year is the construction of the great federal trans-continental railway from Port Augusta in South Australia, to Kalgoorlie in western Australia. The enterprise will cost at least \$25,000,000, though the official estimates are nearly \$1,000,000 below that figure; yet the labor government is determined to do the work itself without the intervention of a contractor. British manufacturers of railway material will probably receive a considerable preference in all iron goods, and makers supplying internal combustion engines should obtain ample opportunities of demonstrating their ability to compete. Tenders are now being invited (in London and Australia only) for 125,000 tons of steel rails. They must reach the high commissioner's office in London by 2 p. m. on May 29. About 2,000 men will be engaged on the work, 1,000 starting at each end. The two parties will meet in the middle of the route, in a desert, and will have to be supplied with water at enormous cost. The gangs will need to be accompanied by camel commissariat corps, and will for many months encounter grave risks. The line is to be 1,070 miles long, and in the opinion of King O'Malley, the labor minister for home affairs, is the longest that has been ever undertaken, as one job. The great American lines have been in most instances built in sections.

A CARD TO THE CLUB. Old Col. Dick Bright, of Washington, was shaved for years by a colored barber, who, not being blessed with the longevity of the colonel, finally died. Bright went to the funeral and, at the dinner table that evening, said he put his visiting card in the old barber's coffin. "That's the cruelest thing I ever heard of," remarked a friend. "What on earth did you do it for?" "Well," explained the colonel, "if he goes to Heaven he won't need it. But if he goes to the other place, it will introduce him to a lot of good fellows."—From the Popular Magazine.

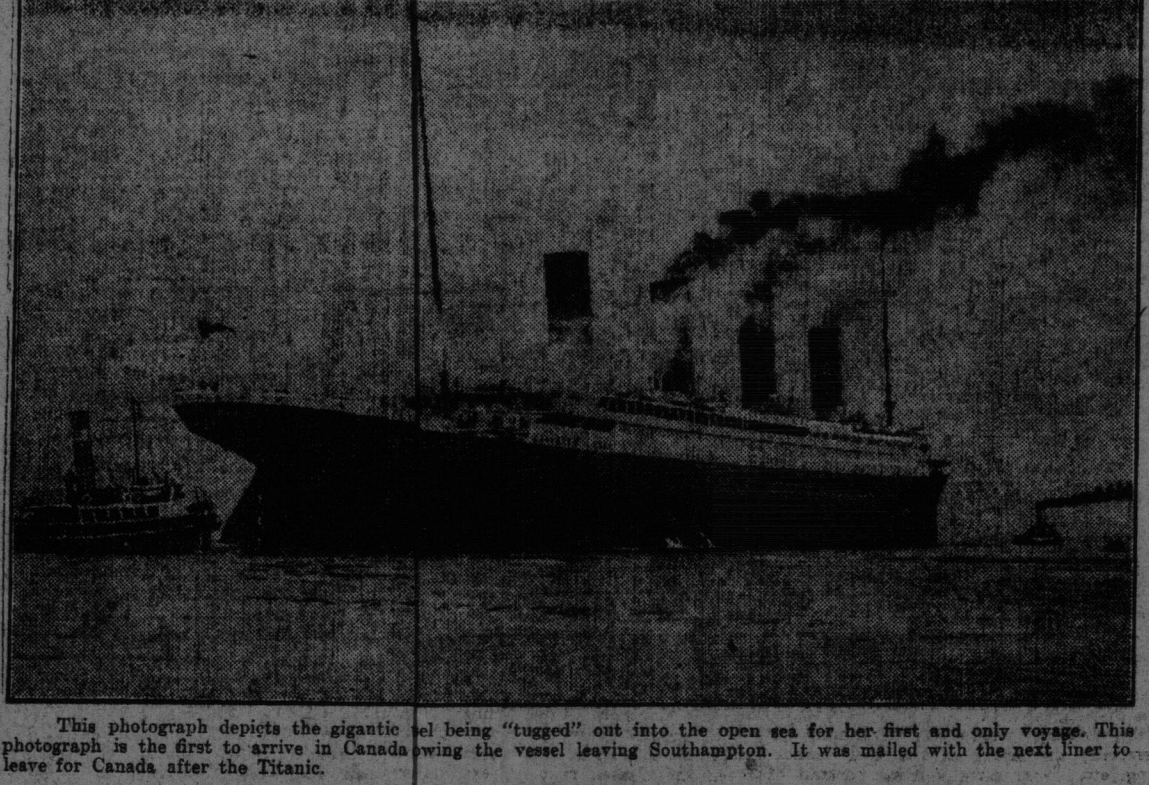

PERJURY CHARGE TO FOLLOW

John Beatey's Evidence Gets Him Into Trouble—Brennan's Memory Comes Back

Quite a sensation was caused in the police court this morning during the hearing of a case against James Miller, charged with selling liquor illegally in his store in Britain street on Saturday night last, when John Beatey of West St. John was called to give evidence in the case.

Beatey swore that he went to Miller's on Saturday night and was given a drink by Alexander Brayley while there, while as a matter of fact Brayley had been in jail since Thursday last. He was cautioned several times by the court while giving evidence but seemed to pay little heed to the caution. He said that he went to Miller's on Saturday night, but had not bought any liquor there. He swore that Alexander Brayley was there and had a bottle out of which he, the witness, had a drink.

Brayley, who was in jail, was brought into court, and the witness went so far as to identify him as the man who had been at Miller's. Beatey himself had been in jail since Saturday night, on the charge of drunkenness. He was further remanded and was told an additional charge of perjury would be preferred against him.

Miller pleaded not guilty to the charge of selling liquor. He was represented by W. B. Wallace. The latter asked for adjournment and the matter was adjourned until two o'clock on Friday afternoon.

The case against Sarah Morris, charged with being the proprietress of a house of ill repute in Sheffield street was also continued this morning. William Brennan, the star witness in the case, who had to be sent back to jail yesterday morning to recover his memory, seemed to have fully recovered his mental faculties, for he told a straightforward story to the court, different from the one he related yesterday.

J. Starr Tait appeared for the defendant. The witness was asked by counsel for the defence how he accounted for his excellent memory today. "Well," answered the witness, "I am not going to take any chances of getting a two year sentence just to shield someone else."

Policeman Henry and Acting Sergeant Dixon, testifying as the partner of the prisoner. The latter was remanded until half past two o'clock this afternoon. Kathleen McIntyre, Gertrude Gibson and Fred Erik Martin, charged with being inmates of the house were also remanded.

Seven prisoners charged with drunkenness were also dealt with. Two of them were fined \$8 or thirty days in jail, and one was given the light penalty of \$5 or five days in jail. Daniel Gillis, charged with drunkenness and also with resisting the police was fined \$4 or ten days in jail on drunkenness charge and \$10 or two months in jail for the resistance.

The three accused were Frenchmen who professed to know nothing whatever about what the court was talking. After some hesitation they decided they could talk English alright and said that they had finished two bottles of whiskey each last night. They were remanded.

The police court has been very busy and the present one very bright appearance now.
