Boston, June 19-Miss Gertrude A. Lovring, reader and elocutionist, of 18 Fellsway West, Somerville, was found drowned in a bathtub in one of the bath-rooms on the fourth floor of Hotel Hollis at 247 Tre-

the fourth floor of Hotel Hollis at 247 Tremont street.

At 8.30 p. m. a man who gave his name of John Sullivan and said he lived at 185 Putnam avenue, Cambridge, walked into the bath-room and was startled to see the body of a woman floating about in the tub, which was three-quarters full of water. Believing that she had fainted and fallen into the tub he lifted her to the floor and made every effort to resuscitate her, at the same time calling for assistance.

Occupants of the rooms on the floor came to his aid and the police were notified. For a time it was feared that the case might be one of murder but Medical Examiner Leary after viewing the body said that the drowning was probably accidental.

Miss Lovering went to the hotel at 3.30 in the afternoon and registered as Madeline Miller. She was assigned to a room on the fourth floor. That was the last the employes of the hotel saw of her until she was found dead.



The Standard of Wales in the Coronation Procession Next Thursday—Law Suit Over Cumnor Castle Where Amy Robsart was Murdered — Gets Great

Lord Mostyn, who has been appointed by King George to bear the standard of Wales at the coronation ceremony in Westminster Abbey on Thursday next, is the head of one of the most ancient and illustrious families of Wales, and holds the title of Vice-Admiral of North Wales and of Carnarvon. A frequent visitor to the United States, he is thoroughly identified with Welsh life, presides almost every year at the national Bardie gathering known as the Eisteddfod, and is descended like the Thdor kings, and consequently like George V., from Marchudd Ap Cynan, Lord of Abergeleu, contemporary of Rhodri Tawr, King of Wales in the ninth century.


Lord Mostyn's chief country seat is Mostyn Hall in Flintshire, where the family have resided since the fifteenth century, and there is no ancestral home in the United Kingdom more rich in ancient manuscripts, especially those affecting the history of Wales. Mostyn Hall may be said to have passed into the possession of Lord Mostyn's forbears through the plague. The latter in 1443 killed within the space of a week, the owner of the castle, his wife and seven of his children, leaving one daughter, Marjorie, as his sole heiress. She married Hiwel Ap Tevan Vichan, of Mostyn, and the castle and estates have been owned by her descendants ever since.



FUSILIERS IN **BOSTON MAKE** A GREAT HIT



A FRACTURED ARM.


