Four Hundred Employes of Canadian Vickers in Maisonneuve, Montreal, Walk Out-Strike in Colorado Coal Mines.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Montreal, Sept. 1.—Four hundred workmen, boilermakers, blacksmiths and workmen, boilermakers, blacksmiths and carpenters, employed by the Canadian Vickers at their plant at Maisonnewe quit work today because of a wage cut of 7 to 15 cents per hour which the company has decided to put in force. In all about 2,000 men are employed and as yet all the employes are not affected. A meeting will however be held tomorrow at which all employes will be present to hear the report of the special committee appointed by the men to discuss the situation with officials of the company. The company advertised yesterday in the local press calling for men at the reduced wage and received hundreds of applications for the positions.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 1—Annauncement has been made by the Colorado state industrial commission of notification by John McLenon, president of district 15 of the United Mine Workers that all miners in the Walsen and Cameron coal mines of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company had gone on strike today following the putting in affect of a reduced wage scale.

Refineries Wage Cut.

New York, Sept. 1—The National Sugar Refining Co. announces that a third wage cut will be made at once in its refineries at Yonkers. Day labor will be paid forty cents an hour instead of forty-five.

Wilmington, Del., Sept. 1—The E. I. DuPont de Nemours Company and the Du Pont Powder Co. announce a salary cut of ten per cent.

Paper Mills Cut Down. Woodland, Me., Sept. 1—A reduction in wages varying from ten to twenty-five per cent has become effective at the nills of the St. Croix Paper Co. The cut also became effective in eleven mills in Canada and the United States.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 1—The American Steel and Wire Co. announce a wage reduction of twenty per cent for 5,000 hands. The total cut made this year is Ten Per Cent Cut.

New Britain, Conn., Sept. 1—The North and Judd Manufacturing Co., hardware, announces a wage reduction of ten per cent. Slash for 15,000.

Pittsburg, Sept. 1—Anouncement is made that on Sept. 6 the wages of 15,-000 employes of the National Association of Window Glass Manufacturers will be cut twenty-eight per cent. General Electric Paring.






