THE SCOTT ACT ELECTION.

Tomorrow the election will take place in the North end for the purpose of deciding whether the Scott act is to be continued in force in that part of the city or not.

Did not see the attorney general or any solicitor general to anyone else. I had a note of instructions from Mr. McLellan to Mr. Tibbitts about putting on the seal.

There was never any doubt in my mind after the letter from the provincial secretary to the mayor appeared in the Globe that the contract was given to Leary, and I was never told it would not. Leary is a wealthy man; he is an experienced wharf builder. I do all his business here, lumbering and timber business, etc., and pay all money for him. I never knew of his contract with the government.

Mr. Murray's evidence was continued, and he testified that he had seen the contract after being signed by the secretary by a messenger just in time to run and catch the Fredericton train.

ELLIS IS OUT.

The readers of this Gazette will be glad to learn that the protest of this journal against Mr. John V. Ellis being continued in the position of a School Trustee will bear its effect, and that his name was dropped from the list of trustees elected yesterday by the new Common Council.

The removal of Mr. Ellis from a position which he was so obviously unfit to fill must be attributed to the Union government, and it is to be hoped that the removal of Mr. Ellis cannot control.
