





Whenever any house owner shall know that any person within his family has small-pox, scarlet fever, or any other disease dangerous to the public health, he shall immediately give notice thereof to the health officers of the Local Board of Health for the Municipality, city or town in which he resides.

For not taking such precautions and concealing the existence of a contagious disease a fine of FORTY DOLLARS can be im-

posed. Ignorance of the nature of the disease is no excuse as a physician must be called when there is any doubt.
