





### Historic Town Vanishing.

First Capital Being Pulled Down by Mississippi.

Within a few months more the last traces of old "Kaskasia," first capital of the State of Illinois and one of the first settlements in the Mississippi. valley, will have disappeared. The vellow Mississippi is steadily pulling down the renaining land that was once a part of the town site. All that remains now is an old building that was once used as a 'smokehouse'' by some of the citizens. Houses, powder magazines, stockades and fo tifications have all slid into the river.

Kaskasia is still on the maps of Illiois, but the original town is at the bottom of the river. The best efforts failed to check the river's steady advances. A few years ago the Kaskasia river, usually known as the Okaw river, began to cut into its western bank a mile or so above the point where it flows into the Mississippi. At high water the flood from the big river began leaping across the narrow neck of land that divided the two currents. Finally the big river cut entirely across the spit of sand and rock that had separated the two and old Kaskasia became an island.

One hundred and fifty years ago the site where the smokehouse still lingers was the seat of the largest city west of the aliegany mountains. In a few nouths more the last of the old town will have slipped into the river and the sland that was cut off from the mainland will itself disappear.
