Riley, colored, a life convict, better known by his comrades as "6102." He is forty-two years of age and was sentenced for highway robbery and attempted murder. Although he has a long record of crime he is one of the dest deucated men in the prison. He has served twelve years, when he came to the prison at the age of thry years he could neither read nor write and no desire to be anything but a man of the road with a gun. To-day he is a different man. His cell is lined with books, about two hundred in number, embracing philosophy, estology, astronomy, languages and comparative religion. 
