TO ENCOURAGE SETTLEMENT ON THE FARMS

Premier Fleming in introducing his bill to encourage the settlement of farm lands made a special request of the opposition to study its provisions and make any suggestions they deemed desirable. He stated that he did not wish it to be considered a political object, but the resettling of areas practically abandoned.

ment furnishing conclusive argument that the increased revenues from that quarter were the direct result of better management and not in any way due to an increased cut of lumber. The value of forests to the country and the importance of their preservation was alluded to. It was said, he stated, that a thousand feet of spruce lumber would give employment to five times as much labor as if it were cut into lumber. He disapproved of the statement that John P. Burchill was the only lumber operator who had been penalized for cutting under-logged logs and for his failure to submit a list of eight other operators who had been subjected to the same treatment for similar offences.

There had been many false statements made concerning the treatment received by Mr. Burchill for violating the timber regulations. The penalty imposed on Mr. Burchill was reduced by the department to about one-half of what could have been legally collected from him and the reduction was made as a result of statements made by Mr. Burchill himself who claimed that he was not guilty to the extent charged. It may be also remarked in this connection that the department of Crown lands dealing with offenders against the timber regulations have always given the benefit of the doubt to the operator existing in cases where violations of regulations were so flagrant that they could not be overlooked. Mr. Fleming was very much in dealing with the members of the opposition are taken into account.

In dealing with the financial position of the province, Mr. Fleming disposed of the rather silly arguments advanced by Mr. Copp regarding the increase of debt by showing that the interest charge which was the real burden imposed upon the people had increased \$12,248 under the present administration while \$137,747 had been added to the sinking fund in the past four years. He defended the course the government had pursued in expending \$236,000 in repairing bridges during the past year and pointed out that the present administration had been content to do as little work on bridges as their predecessors had done instead of a deficit of \$56,000, there would have been a surplus of \$80,000 in the year's operation. He had not been necessary, Mr. Fleming explained, to add to the permanent debt of the province for over expenditure of the present administration and the ordinary expenditure of the province would be kept within its income as had been promised in 1908.

In dealing with the Public Works Expenditures, Mr. Fleming compared the methods of the old government in charging up repairs made to permanent bridges and issuing bonds to pay for them. One remark made by Mr. Fleming caused Mr. Copp to say that the work done in Kent county by the present administration cost twice what it should. Mr. Fleming in reply told Mr. Copp in very plain language that such a general statement would not do, that if he had any charge to prefer it should be made now and the House would remain until June if necessary to investigate it. Mr. Copp resumed his wise look and listened in silence.

Mr. Fleming showed up the inconsistency of the opposition in connection with the Valley Railway and furnished conclusive evidence to show that the department of Crown lands better off by the arrangement made with the present government at Ottawa than was suggested by Mr. Pugsley when in power. This was in answer to the extreme criticism of Mr. Copp quite recently and was also made by Mr. Tweeddale, who also gave Mr. Pugsley a certificate of appreciation.

The Premier in closing one of the most effective speeches of the session made reference to the refusal of the Liberal Legislature of the Province to endorse the good roads legislation of the former government. He stated that the Liberal party must take responsibility for his allusions to the many achievements of the government which had been effected in the financial management of the province, increase in wages paid to workmen and the legislation restricting the liquor traffic and other measures of a like character.

Mr. Fleming was followed by Mr. LaBillois, who again failed to respond to the attacks made upon him as Chief Commissioner of Public Works, to explain the several charges that were made against his management of the public works department. Mr. Bentley, with whom the speaking habit has become chronic was next on the list.
