Paris, Oct. 13-The resignation of

Theophile Delcasse, the foreign min-ister of France, was announced at ister of France, was announced at noon today after the cabinet ministers had held a meeting under the presidency of M. Poincare. Premier Viviani presented the resignation of M. Delcasse at the conference and his retirement was sanctioned. An official announcement issued in connection with the change in the ministry stated that Premier Viviani would take the portfolio of foreign affairs with the presidency of the council. Foreign Minister Delcasse's resignation aroused widespread comment in diplomatic and parliamentary quarters in France, owing to the prominent part he had taken in shaping the foreign policy of the government since the first months of the war, when he resumed his old place at the head of the foreign office. His retirement at this particular moment when the Balkan crisis has become acute caused some surprise, though those closely identified with governmental affairs were not entirely unprepared for the change.

One of the main reasons assigned for the retirement of the foreign minister at this time is that he is suffering greatly from fatigue, culminating in a recent sick spell and amounting to nervous exhaustion which has resulted from the burden of anxieties in directing France's foreignn policy.

There were cries in various parts of the chamber of "read the letters." Other members called out "no, no." Premier Viviani answered:

"No one can oblige me to read that letter. I affirm that no discords has occurred between the minister of foreign affairs and his colleagues. All the decisions have been taken in perfect accord and I have nothing more to say to the chamber."

The government at today's cabinet council determined to hold itself ready to answer inquiries in the chamber of deputies this afternoon and it was decided that Premier Viviani should then for the first time speak both as president of the council and as minister of foreign affairs relative to the Baikan situation.

Deputy Jules Delahaye mounted the tribune and made an appeal for_harmony.

"The Republic has two perils," he said. "They are the Germans and our own political quarrels. For forty-five years you have been seeking a man to govern you."

"Whom will you have—an Orleans or a Coburg?" a voice called out.

M. Delahays pleaded with the members to lay aside their differences in order to bring about a final victory. His discourse was continued amid much confusion.

"It is an immense responsibility to undertake to overthrow the ministry in the face of the enemy," said M. Delahaye. "Their successors are obliged to bring about an immediate victory, under penalty of being overthrown in their turn."

Profesor Painleve asserted the foreign affairs, army and navy committees were in agreement last August and had warned the president of the Bepublic and the premier that Germany and Bulgaria were preparing to co-operate, and that steps should be taken to prevent it, also that adequate measures should be taken to force the Dardanelles and capture Constantinople.





SELLING FIREARMS J. W. Andrews, employed by Robertson, Foster & Smith, was fined \$10 in the Police Court yesterday for selling a revolver to Victor Cobham, a boy, with the purpose of making the purchase. H. F. Puddington, who appeared for the firm, protested that they were ignorant of the law, and he would undertake to see that no firearms of this description were sold in the figure.

Commissioner McLellan demanded that the maximum penalty be imposed not on the young man who made the sale, but on the firm who employed

The magistrate stated that under the old law the fine had been \$50 for selling to a minor, but the new law provides for a fine of \$100 for the sale of a revolver to any person without such person having a proper permit.

Commissioner McLellan said the department had gone to a good deal of trouble and expense in working up a case and their efforts went for nought if a fine was not imposed, and he was in favor of the maximum penalty being imposed.

The magistrate differed from the commissioner, and fined Andrews \$10. He wished it to be distinctly understood, however, that this did not establish a precedent, and any person coming before him on a similar offence would get the full limit of the law. This applied not only to hardware firms, but to second-hand dealers.
