GREEKS CLASH IN BALKANS

Russian Success at Mush Upsets Turkish Campaign in Armenia

RUSSIANS HAVE SMASHED TURKISH FLANK MOVEMENT AND AGAIN CONTROL EAST

Re-occupation of Mush a most Important Victory.

INITIATIVE AGAIN WITH MUSCOVITES.

Success of Entire Turkish Campaign in Armenia and Persia Broken Down by Most Recent Gains of the Czar's Troops.

Petrograd, Aug. 23, via London—The Turkish attempt to encircle the left flank of the Russian Caucasian army appears to have received a crushing blow from the troops of Grand Duke Nicholas in the region of Lake Van. The Turke'scheme of encircling the left flank and regaining Erzerum, thus nullifying all the successes of the Grand Duke in Turkish Armenia appeared to be well on its way to a successful outcome, but the Russian fe-occupation of Mush, and their re-establishment of their positions west of Lake Van, appparently has put a definite quietus to the ambition of the Turkis. The initiative now appears again to be with the Russians at all important points in Asia Minor, and now that the Turkish offensive on the left flank has been stopped Grand Duke Nicholas can continue his march toward Asia Minor.

The task of turning the left flank of the Russians in Southern Armenia and Western Persia was entrusted to the Mush group of the Turkish forces, lich, reinforced by troops from every part of the European and Asiatic Turkey, until they far outnumbered the Russian army opposing them, began the eastern drive in the direction of Erzerum. Although constautly halted by the Russian fire, and forced to send in a continuous stream of reserves to repair the ravages to their lines caused by Russian counter-attacks, the Turks appeared early in August, after the occupation of Mush, and Bitlis, and the successful expedition into Persian territory as far as Hamadan, to be in fair way toward accomplishing the task which they had undertaken.

BRITISH AGAIN DRIVE HUNS FROM TRENCHES NEAR GINCHY

London, Aug. 26.—The repulse of a German attack on the British trenches west of Ginchy is reported in the official statement issued by the war office at midnight. The text of the statement follows:

"West of Ginchy the enemy last night, to the strength of about two companies, attempted to attack our trenches, but were driven back by our machine gun fire. The enemy's guns maintained a fairly heavy fire last night on these trenches and this continued today. He also bombarded trenches we captured last night near Delville Wood.

HUNS TRY NEW BLOW IN WEST.

British and French Successfully Repel German Attacks Driving Enemy Back After Fierce Fighting.

The Balkan eltuation again looms large on the horizon of the world war with the official announcement in Paris that the Bulagrians have attacked Drama and the seaport of Kavala, both of which are garrisoned by Greek troops. This announcement is confirmatory of press despatches received from Greece during the last few days in which it was stated that fighting was in progress between the Greeks and Bulgarians. The reported attack on Kavala threatens to render the eltuation between Greece and the Central Powers acute. Ever since the first Balkan war Sofia has claimed that Kavala was one

has claimed that Kavals was one of its rightful fruits of victory, and its concession to Greece has been the source of much lil-feeling between the two countries.

Apparently from the French statement, the Allied troops do not plan an advance on the right wing, as British cavalry detachments are reported to have destroyed bridges over the Angistariver. On the left wing Paris reports "appreciable" progress for the Serblans, and the capture of several hundred prisoners. In the center, where the main effort of the Allies is expected, heavy artillery action is taking place, but there is no report of infantry operations.

FRENCH REPULSE GERMAN ASSAULTS AT ST. MIHIEL

Paris, Aug. 25, via London—The Germans have made a new assault on the French line at the tip of the famous salient of St. Mihiel, but have been repulsed after gaining a footing in French trenches, according to the official statement issued by the war office tonight.

The text of the statement follows:

"On the Somem front we continued our artillery fire on German organizations. We took 600 prisoners in yesterday's fighting, and eight new machine guns were found in the part of Maurepas which we captured.

"Southeast of St. Mihiel a German attempt during the night against La Croix St. Jean was stopped by our fire. Another attack against our positions in the Bois D'Ailly, in the same sector, resulted in the enemy gaining a footing in our advanced positions from which he was immediately ejected by our counter-attacks.

"The usual cannonading took place on the remainder of the front."

EXPLAINS CENSORSHIP

Not Undertaken with Idea of Capturing American Trade, Says Lord Robert Cecil.

London, Aug. 25.—The activities of neutral traders are of no interest to the British censorship, said Lord Robert Cecil, minister of war trade, in a statement today in elaborating upon the remarks he recently made in the House of Commons on the subject.

"The suspicion evidently is entertained in certain quarters in the United States," he said. "that the British censorship is being used as a means of capturing American trade. It already has been denied in the most formal manner that the censorship is being put to any such use, but this opportunity may well be taken to emphasize my previous statement.

"It cannot be emphasized too strons by that the general and statistical information extracted from trade letters, which have proven so invaluable to His Majesty's government in cheeking the supply of material sent through neutral to enemy countries and suppressing the export of enemy goods, is used for these purposes solely, and never for the purpose of substituting allied trade for neutral trade. Washington, Aug. 25.—Senator Hitchcock, Democrat, has prepared an amendment to the revenue bill intended to check the soaring prices of news print paper. He said today he would bring it up in the Senate when certain sections of the bill were reached for debate. Mr. Hitchcock himself is a newspaper publisher.



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



GERMAN BABY KILLERS ONCE MORE RAID ENGLAND FROM AIR; WOMEN AND CHILDREN ARE KILLED

HOW GRIT GRAFTERS FLEECED **PEOPLE OF SASKATCHEWANOUT** OF THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS

Haultain Commission Shows that Battleford Asylum Con tract was Veritable Gold Mine for Friends and Heelers of the Scott Government-Complete Expose of Sordid Crookedness Practised with Connivance and Knowledge

(Special Correspondence.)

Regina, Sask., August 25.-Just a few illustrations of how the graft on the Battleford Asylum was operated have so far been disclosed before the Haultain Commission, now sitting here. The Conservatives charge that in the construction of this asylum, the total contract price of which was \$1,200,000, the contractors were allowed excess profits of \$401,660. Before the Haultain Commission they are now engaged, with fair success already attained, in proving the truth of the charges.

Some of the things the Commission has already ascertained may be

Some of the things the Commission has already ascertained may be briefly set out.

It was found that, although the contractors were allowed to substitute cheaper materials than specified in nearly two hundred items, and were allowed to omit a great many things the specifications called for, there was only one deduction made from the contract price. This was in the amount of \$3,200 for the omission of the temperature control. The government engineer had previously estimated that it would cost the contract or \$5,000 to install the temperature control specified.

It was found that the footings on the main building were reported by the government inspector to have been increased 37 1-2 per cent, while the government paid for a fity per cent. increase.

It, was found that changes in the drainage system were authorized, which would, according to the letter of the government architect to the contractors, result in "a considerable savins," and that four days later the deputy minister awarded the contractors \$1,000 for making the changes which were to have resulted, according to the government architect, in a saving.

It was found that, of three tenders for the contract on the main building, two were of the "friendly" variety; i. e., put in by other contractors at the request of the successful tenderer at a higher figure to justify his tender. It was found that 1400 sections of radiators in the main building were found unnecessary and removed, and that these were sold by the deputy minister to the contractors for the trifling sum of \$150. Subsequently another deputy minister being appointed, the deal was upset because of the ridiculous price. The contractors, under protest, turped back 100 sections, and what became of the rest the government doesn't know.

It was found that Hon. A. P. McNab, minister of public works in the Scott government, had let the contract for the plumbing and heating to the Regina Plumbing and Heating Company, at \$245,000, though the government engineers had estimated the cost of the work to be \$176,000, and though the architects, Messrs. Storey & Van Egmond, protested vigorously against the excessive price, and though a conference had already been held at which changes were suggested by which the cost could be reduced from \$176,000 to \$150,000, without waiting to make inquiries or to get a better

It was found that Ernest Brown, who drew the plans and supervised the asylum, was to get five per cent. on the cost for his services; that he had drawn \$1,000 on this account before he was made deputy minister of public works, when his commission was supposed to have stopped; that Storey & Van Egmond had put in a bill for \$4,800, less the \$1,000 already paid Brown; that Brown as deputy minister O K'd the account; and that Storey & Van Egmond, after deducting \$100 for inspecting the plant one day, had sent the rest of the money back to Brown. Air Raid on England Caused Death And Property Damage; 40 Bombs Dropped on London

Airships Concerned in Most Daring Attempt Yet WATER SYSTEM
Made—Casualties Included Three Non-Combat-Six Airships Concerned in Most Daring Attempt Yet ant Men, Three Women and Two Children, Seven Persons Seriously Injured and Fourteen Slightly.

London, Aug. 25-Several persons were killed and injured by a Zeppelin which dropped a large number of bombs in the neighborhood of a town on the southeast coast of England early today, says a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. Several houses were damaged. At another place on the southeast coast, many bombs were drop ped. One fell into a railway station yard and demolished some railings, while another bomb completely wrecked a dairy nearby.

There was great excitement in a town on the Thames estuary at one o'clock this morning. When the news was received of the approx of the Zeppelin, mist obscured the raider, but it could be heard approaching rapidly from the coast. Shortly afterwards a series of vio lent explosions, followed by cannonading, shook buildings and lighted the sky. The people thronged the streets, calmly watching these oper-ations, which lasted for half an hour.

THE WAR OFFICE REPORT.

An official statement issued by the war office gives details of the raid by hostile airships which crossed the east and southeast coast of England between midnight and three o'clock this morning. It states:

"Six hostile airships raided the east and southeast coasts of England last night at intervals between midnight and three o'clock this morning. One airship made her way westward well inland. The remainder of the fleet carried on short inroads over the coast. The number of bombs dropped by the raiders has not yet been ascertained. Several bombs are reported to have been directed at ships at sea. The damage effected by the raid was slight.

"In one locality a railway station and some houses were damaged and two horses were killed. At another point, two houses were wrecked.

ed.

"The total casualties have not yet been reported. To date nine persons are reported injured, some fatally.

"Anti-aircraft guns came into action at certain points, both on land and from ships at eas. Some of our aircraft went up in pursuit. One acropiane succeeded in firing on a raider at close range, but she cluded her pursuers in the clouds. A further report will follow."

London, Aug. 25—A further statement from the war office follows:

"Further reports show that five or six enemy airchips raided the cast and southeast coasts of England. Two or three raiders came in over the eastern counties and dropped over thirty bombs, without causing any casualties or damage. Another raider attempted to approach a seaport town, but being heavily fired on by anti-aircraft guns was driven off to the eastward, after dropping nineteen bombs in the sea without reaching their objective.

"Another airship, which visited the southeast coast, also came under a heavy fire from anti-aircraft defenses and was compelled to unload her cargo of bombs in the sea without doing any damage to life

or property.

"Another raider succeeded in reaching the outskirts of London, where explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped, and it is regretted that casualties occurred among the civilian population as follows: THE CASUALTIES.

"Killed, three men, three women, two children; injured seriously, three men and three women. In addition, one soldier was seriously

and fourteen were alightly injured by broken glass.

"As far as has been ascertained, up to the present, some forty hombs were dropped. Most of these fell either on small property or in the open, but an electric power station was slightly damaged, and engineering works were somewhat damaged by fire. Several amali fires occurred, all of which were promtty extinguished by the London fire brigade, several persons being rescued from positions of danger by

"Fire was opened on this airship, which immediately altered its course. It is possible that the first airship was followed by a second raider, but this cannot, for the present, be verified.

"Some of our airmen went up in pursuit, and one airman succeeded in firing at the raider at close range."

A. R. C. Clarke & Son, of St. John, Complete Satisfactory Contract - Gloucester Council Votes \$10,000 to Patriotic Fund.

Bathurst, N. B., August 25.—The Gloucester municipal council in special session today passed a resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds for \$10,000 to aid the Patriotic Fund. \$5,000 of this amount is to be paid over immediately and the balance as required. All the members of the council were present and the resolution passed unanimously.

The only other resolution considered and passed was one requiring that the counciliors and one clergyman in each parish are to approve of all srants from the fund before the central executive can take action.
