Speaker Points Out Great Value and Possibilities of the Albert County Deposits

Hear About Shale

Moncton, June 29.—The Moncton Rotary Club had as its guests at today's luncheon, the Messrs, Mathew Lodge, "The king pin of Albert oil and shale development"; Mr. John Henderson, of the D'Arcy Exploration Company, and Mr. George W. Wallace of East St. Louis, inventor of the retort and certain machinery now being used at the shale reduction plant of the D'Arcy Exploration Company at Rosevale, Albert County.

Mr. Wallace was the speaker at the flancheon and pointed out some features of the shale industry, as well as forecasting a great future for Moncton in event of this industry being developed along the lines as was now proposed.

Give Much Employment.

He pointed out that shale development in Albert County would give aid to many unemployed men and benefit tradesmen of Moncton and its suburbs, two things which would be bound to occur. Touching on the shale in Albert County Mr. Wallace pointed out that his experience had brought him to the belief that the N. B. shales were the best. He compared them to the Oklahoma shales which he stated had a lower proportion of ammonia, lubricating oils and gasolene, than have the Albert County Shales. He predicted a good market for the Albert County shale products, believing, he said, that the marine would call for a large proportion of the oil production, pointing out that although industries were at a stand still in the United States at least 88 per cent. of the oil production was being consumed in the United States today.






