NEW BOAT ORDERED.

By the New Company for Bay Service.
A TWIN SCREW STEAMER
To be Built in Scotland by Messrs Russel & Co. of Port Glasgow.

Our readers will be glad to learn that the new Company recently organized for the purpose of building a boat for the Bay Chaleur service are meeting with every success in their undertaking. A charter has been granted by the Dominion Government, the incorporators being Messrs D. Richards, H. O. Sheals, Geo. McKenzie, Joe. Boudreau and F. S. Blair of Campbellton; John G. Guitte of Maria, The Earl of Port Daniel, E. LeMayhand, Newport, J. A. Lavoie, Percé, A. Carter, Gespey. The Company, which will be known as the Interprovincial Navigation Co. of Canada, Ltd., is capitalized at \$90,000, and the head office is at Richardsville.

At a meeting of the stockholders at New Carlisle on the 6th inst, all arrangements were made for the construction of the new boat and other routine business transacted. Mr. D. Richards was elected president of the Company and Mr. F. S. Blair, Sec'y-Treas.

The boat to be built will be a steel, twin screw steamer to Lloyd's highest requirements. Her dimensions will be 180 feet in length, 31 feet beam, 11 1/2 ft. depth of hold. She will have a speed of 12 knots an hour and her draught when loaded will be 10 feet. She will have accommodations for 100 first class passengers and 100 second class, while she will be able to carry about 250 tons of freight.

LIEUT. COL. MALTBY

Relieved of Command of Battery Without Notice.
A GENERAL SHUFFLE.
Lieuts. Sargeant and Ferguson Also Out. Others Follow.

Without official notification Lieut. Col. Maltby was relieved of the command of the Newcastle 12th Field Battery on Thursday last. The only intimation Col. Maltby had of the change was contained in a personal letter from Colonel Drury arrived here last week and transferred the command including stores and equipment to Capt. Lawlor.

Col. Maltby's tenure of office as commander of the Battery expired in 1902. In that year a military order was passed making a regimental list for a field artillery Lieut. Col. Maltby was one of six who were available for brigade division command and he was forthwith appointed. At the same time he was instructed to remain in command of the 12th Field Battery until further notice, principally because there was no one qualified to take command. And now comes word that he has been relieved of his command, but there has been no official notification.

Col. Maltby has been in the militia for thirty years. He joined the 73rd Regiment in 1877, and after serving one year became a member of the 12th Field Battery, to whose service he has practically devoted his life. He has never missed a drill, and is recognized as one of the ablest field artillerymen in Canada. It is also learned that Lieuts. Sargeant and Ferguson have resigned their commissions. This leaves Lieut. Anslow as the only commissioned officer outside the commander of the Battery.

FIRE AT EEL RIVER.

The Mill of Wm. Currie & Co Burned.
LOSS ABOUT \$3000 00.
The Company were About to Abandon Lumbering Operations There.

About noon on Saturday fire was discovered in the mill of Wm. Currie & Co at Eel River, and although a hard fight was put up against the flames, they had gained such headway that the efforts were of no avail. The mill and most of the machinery were completely destroyed. The mill was down for repairs on Saturday and it is difficult to tell just how the fire started. There was no insurance and the total loss is estimated at about \$3000, but as the company were about to abandon lumbering operations on Eel River, the lumber being about all cut, the loss is not considered a serious one.

FIRE IN CHATHAM.

LOSS ABOUT \$18,000.
INSURANCE \$6,000.
The most disastrous fire that Chatham has experienced for many years occurred this morning. About 4:30 o'clock some men returning from a dance discovered a blaze in the rear of S. Hoffman & Son's store where some boxes were located. The fire department was quickly at work but the fire gained great headway for some time. The flames partially destroyed a warehouse in the rear of the Hoffman building, burned through the walls of J. Egan-Breen's barber shop and attacked the interior of the Hoffman store.

The fire extended to the rear of the Hoffman building, the excellent work of the firemen and their assistants in handling the fire was not spoken too highly of. One of the workmen, Wm. Lobban, was killed in the fire.

BURNED HOME.

In a Sudden Fit of Insanity.

Percé, P. Q., Sept. 14—John Paré, a carpenter of Corner of the Beach, Percé, was suddenly seized with an attack of insanity, Sunday morning and set fire to his house while his wife, grown up son and daughter were sleeping. They barely escaped with their lives but the house and contents were completely destroyed. The maniac also attempted to burn his barn and outbuildings but was overpowered after a desperate struggle and conveyed to the goal at Percé pending his removal to an asylum at Québec.

OUR GOVERNOR.

His Powers and His Influence Reviewed.

EARL GREY

Has Considerable Political Experience.—A Satisfactory Appointment.

The office of Governor General is of social importance only, says the Montreal correspondent of the Boston Transcript, lumbered with little responsibility and no political authority. It has been well settled for many years back that the King's representative in the Dominion shall follow the advice of his ministry as implicitly as the King himself is guided by the cabinet that holds a majority in the British House of Commons. Politically the governor is an animated official stamping machine, sent out by the Imperial government to validate whatever the Canadian Commons shall decide. Of course the office is not without reserve powers, analogous to the King's prerogative, which has not been employed for decades, but which might conceivably be of use in emergencies unforeseen by the king-in-council to withhold or refuse to assent to legislation, but if the matter were one of any considerable moment, on which Canadians were united, the assent would have to be given pretty soon, else disruption would come to pass. Meantime the appointment is felt to be so inconsequential that the good old Tory Gazette of Montreal, in its editorial morning in an editorial note of eight lines, while the afternoon papers deal with it in a purely perfunctory way. This indifference fairly represents political emotion, yet it is quite true that Earl Gray's name is received with general satisfaction by any who consider the matter. It signifies that the usual order of things is to continue at Rideau Hall, as Government House in Ottawa is called.

A man of great family, pleasing to the Tory mind is to be there. He is a BROTHER TO LADY MINTO. The Minto social regime has been suitable to the country and the capital, where society is mainly composed of people of what rich Americans would consider very small means. It was a quiet, modest, hospitable regime, as democratic as the circumstances would permit. Lord Minto, his wife and his beautiful children were anything but starchy; they were anything but a great variety of respectable people, big and small; they went on long camping expeditions almost unattended by service and quite in the native manner. From what is known of the Greys it appears that they are the same sort of unostentatious aristocrats. It is of much importance to Ottawa and to all Canada, that the extravagance and the rosette fashions therein shall not flourish in Rideau Hall. The Canadian family purse conjoints with accepted canons of good taste in upholding Dorothea Brooke's opinion that fine dress is the ambition of a huckster's daughter. Probably Consuelo, Duchess of Marlborough, would heartily agree. But at the bottom of the Canadian objection against the Duke's appointment to the governorship was the reasonable fear of an economical society that her New York friends would swarm to the Canadian capital, bringing with them the expensiveness of the Duke and the profuse ways of Gotham. With this work of the anti-American animus of that element of Canadian society which is largely derived from the loins of American Tories who emigrated to this country after the Revolutionary War—an element which often reminds one of Hans Anderson's old fables that boasted superiority because they had knots in their bodies. Not many years ago I heard one of the most conspicuous of these amiable people refer to Americans in general as "rebels." He had an historical conscience, and used his grandfather's terms. It may not be very difficult for imaginative Bostonians to sympathize with the sense of such pre-revolutionary relicts that they would be humiliated did the King appoint to the head of Canadian society a young gentleman distinguished for nothing except a great historic name and a great American heritage, "only three removes from the steamboat captain," as the fable says.

Earl Grey has had CONSIDERABLE POLITICAL EXPERIENCE. He was named English A. F. Grey, years, has been of the House of Lords for ten, and was administrator of

Rhodesia for a year. His business ability is indicated by his directorship of the South African Company. Altogether his career appears an endeavor with which Lord Minto, who came out politically inexperienced, is generally credited—that of trying to set his cabinet to some extent aside. You cannot get any minister to say his words would not drag it out of their official mouths, but it became pretty obvious at the beginning of the South African war that Lord Minto imagined he had some sort of independent authority in respect of the military. He got his lesson then, and the command of the militia has since then been more than ever securely vested in the government of the Dominion. In a more delicate matter Lord Minto appears to have successfully asserted a degree of prerogative. Ministers are sworn not to tell such things, but some how they are revealed, possibly by the governor's talk to indiscreet friends. Lord Minto has caused the King to knight some Canadians hostile to the ministry, and he has prevented the King knighting some whom the ministry wished to have distinguished in that way. This by the way is a theory that the crown is the sole fountain of honor. Obviously the doctrine might be pursued to an extent that would cause serious trouble by making the crown appear sympathetic with the Canadian opposition only. It may be presumed that Lord Grey will take care that this does not occur, and indeed his inheritance of one of the greatest Whig names as well as his own liberal, philanthropic and even Democratic record, lead to the opinion that he will not in heavy agreement with so good a Whig and liberal as Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The Earl, who succeeded his uncle in the title, is grandson to the famous Whig Premier who induced King William to consent that the House of Lords should be swamped by an extensive creation of new peers in case the then existing body should persist in opposition to the reform bill of 1832. That was in Grey's old age. He was then, however, an aristocrat of aristocrats, and one declared that he would never descend and training forbid the opinion that he will prove to be anything but a sane one of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's kidneys.

Lord Minto with all his fine personal qualities is essentially a Tory. He naturally suspects liberals. The Tory mind tends to favor centralization of authority, the liberal mind to repose in the people of every district all the freedom they can get, and to be induced to assume. Though appointed by a Tory government, praised as an imperialist, even by the London Times and ably seconded by the English press in general with receiving an office that will enable him to direct Canadian affairs, it is cheerfully said by all Canadian Liberals, including the French that the Earl's regime will be marked by more than the recent degree of harmony with responsible advisers.

It appears that Lord Grey did not wish to take the place, which involves a sort of banishment that cannot be wholly agreeable to a great noble, of large estates, ample revenues, and not a few civil honors. Frequently the error has been a poor man, to whom Rideau Hall was as good as a better than his custom salary, and who saved money from his salary. It amounts to \$8,666.66, or \$2,000 a year, and the public maintenance of Rideau Hall, his official home. This has cost Canada some millions mostly expended in alterations and annual repairs of the ramshackle, comfortable old place. It is situated near the south bank of the Ottawa River, a couple of miles from the parliament buildings. The governor is allowed a secretary at \$2,200, two aides at \$3,000 for both. The secretary's office has four clerks and an orderly whose joint pay is about \$7,000 a year.

Because of his opposition to trusts Earl Grey is not unlikely to have the experience rare for a Governor of being peculiarly acceptable to the mechanic laboring and small-trading masses as one who has striven to lessen intoxication in England he is approved by the temperance people who are almost as strong in Canada as those who admire him on the ground that his peculiar promotion of public houses tends to moderate drinking altogether the promise that he will be a very popular governor is fair if it is made good if he confines himself to his proper function of registering the decrees of his commons and his ministry, opening hospitals and fairs impressively making the usual tours with a cheerful visage entertaining modestly at his official home and occasionally abstaining from trying to meddle with a administration.

Of course much depends on the Countess. The governor's wife has no sort of official rank or title, as is apparently commonly assumed by American journalists. She is not a vicereine, she is Her Excellency by courtesy only. But the usual clergyman's wife, she has much on her shoulders the credit and popularity of her husband. She is the hostess, she the smile at receptions, she the patron and often, the first organizer of charities, clubs, association of ladies. In all that department Lady Aberdeen who preceded the Countess Minto was more active than any other governor's wife. For the sake of the gale of nations it is rather a pity that the Duchess of Marlborough did not get a chance to try her hand at it. Hoy-in-structive it would have been to witness the haughty Canadian ladies discriminate between the warmth due to her grace as a duchess and the coldness due to her as "that American woman." But even a proud "nation" of six millions must try to be content with the passing show, and certainly it can never be truly said that there is nothing funny in the mimic court of Ottawa.


