## HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

February 13, 1851.  
The House was chiefly occupied to-day receiving bills and petitions.  
The House went into Committee of the whole, and passed a bill to incorporate the Miramichi and Richibucto Electric Telegraph Company.  
Several petitions were presented, by Messrs. Earle, Beardsley and Ryan, in favour of incorporating Orange Lodges.  
There was a conversation about the Stationery required for the House. Two specimens of foolscap were shown, provided for the House, and not of an extra quality, charged respectively 30s. and 41s. per ream!!! Mr. Needham moved that every member should be allowed, for the purchase of Stationery during the Session, fifteen shillings and no more. The motion was not seconded.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.—Since the great debate on the "want of confidence" resolution the House has been occupied with routine business, receiving petitions, introduction of Bills, and formation of committees. On the 13th, a bill to provide for the pay of Members of the Legislature was introduced, and Mr. Tilley gave notice of his intention to propose that the Members' pay be fixed at 10 shillings per day. This is a more in the right direction, but we fear, retrenchment in this case will not be found in the Legislative dictionary. On the 14th, a number of important Despatches from the Colonial Office were laid before both Houses. The reading of the Despatch relative to an Elective Legislative Council, caused a sensation in the Upper House, and drew down some strong remarks, in opposition to the principle, from the Hon. Mr. Hatch, who enquired what action the Government intended taking on the subject. Hon. Mr. Chandler replied, that the matter was under consideration. Hon. Mr. Botsford claims that whatever change was proposed to be made in the Upper House, should originate in that body.

A Committee was appointed to take into consideration the question of reporting the debates, and to report on Saturday.

Mr. Barrie obtained leave to bring in a bill to permit religious newspapers, and agricultural books and pamphlets, to be sent by Post, within this Province, free of postage. Mr. Bliss Botsford introduced a bill, to provide that after the dissolution of the present Assembly, neither the Province Treasurer nor any Deputy Treasurer, nor any Officer of the Customs, shall vote in the House of Assembly, but shall be altogether ineligible to a seat in that body.

The petitions for Scrutinies are ordered to be taken up next month. Boyd vs. Fitzgerald on the 8th and Gilbert vs. Chapman on the 12th march. It is stated that these scrutinies will be gone into once on the days named; but with little prospect of arriving at a decision, during the present Session. Time only will tell.

On the 15th, an important Despatch, relative to the Civil List Bill and the reduction of Salaries, was presented to both Houses. Earl Grey declines at present to yield the surplus of the Civil List to the Province, conceiving that as yet there are no good reasons for reconsidering the solemn agreement entered into upon the settlement of the Civil List. If the House will surrender the initiation of money votes to the Executive, Earl Grey would not then object to placing the salary of the Master of the Rolls upon the surplus of the Civil List—as also compensation to the Judges in lieu of fees, to be paid out of the same surplus, the fees being either abolished or applied to other purposes, as the House might decide.

His Lordship alludes to the Lines of Railway in this Province, and the difficulty of obtaining funds in England, if by any proceeding of the Legislature's doubt should arise as to the fulfilment of any of its engagements. A single instance of such disregard, Earl Grey says, would deprive Legislature of all hope of obtaining the confidence of capitalists, so as to induce them to advance money for works connected with the improvement of the Colony. In the event of any vacancy Earl Grey has no objection to reducing the Salary of the Surveyor General to Six Hundred pounds Currency, and abolishing the office of Receiver General altogether, on proper arrangements being made for the receipt of public money.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT.—A report is in circulation, that a gentleman of high respectability, at Fredericton, has received a letter from the Hon. Joseph Howe, in London, by the last mail, advising him—that Earl Grey will recommend to Parliament, the guarantee of 6 per cent. interest on £6,000,000 sterling for 25 years, on Railroads through the British Colonies, and for Emigration purposes. This is a good news—Talk of British capitalists hide your diminished heads, and let us hear no more of your empty threats and vain boasts! Do not attempt to throw the apple of discord among a contented and happy people, who live under the fostering care of an Empire on which the sun never sets, and whose flag has, for a thousand years braved the battle and the breeze. Long may that good old flag continue to float over us.

WE learn by a telegraph despatch, received by G. F. Campbell, Esq., that the R. M. Steamship AFRICA, arrived at New York, at half past eight o'clock on Sunday evening, bringing the mails and passengers of the missing American steamer ATLANTIC, which vessel put back to Cork, with shaft broken and otherwise seriously damaged. This will be truly gratifying news to many.

WE have great pleasure in copying from the Carleton Sentinel, an address of the inhabitants of that County to Charles Connell, Esq., upon his late appointment to a seat in the Legislative Council. We have already pleasantly observed Mr. Connell's political career as a member of the Legislature of the Province, and can speak unqualifiedly as to his consistency and zealous efforts wherever questions of economy and reform came up. We congratulate the Province on his present elevation to the Council, and have no doubt that the Province at large heartily concur in this feeling—poor St. John kicks (through her nervousness) mightily against the barriers to fat office holdings; but she richly deserves her present position in the House of Assembly. She turned out one of the best men she ever had, both in point of talent, energy, and every characteristic requisite for a representative, and what has she instead—clever men no doubt; but those who are moving the very stones to rise and mutiny against the Government. We have already congratulated the Province on the leader of the present Council, J. A. Street, Esq., and now that we have read his political code of reform, we again affirm what we before said: that he is a fit and competent leader, for the interests of the Province at large.

Our contemporary, the Carleton Sentinel, has copied the letter of a "Colonist," which appeared in the Courier, and contained many sound arguments in favor of our Railroad. The editorial remarks appended to the letter, are not, however, in some cases, based upon correct information, and as our contemporary is desirous to promote the St. Andrews & Quebec Railroad, it would be well to seek better informed friends upon Railroad statistics, when he says:—  
"We would also remark that on the canal from Buffalo to Albany a distance of 300 miles, a barrel is carried for 62 cents and the profit is 3 times greater than on the rail road where 5s per barrel is charged."

Now the facts are: the State of New York owns the Canal, and to protect it compels the Railroad to pay toll to the Canal for all goods passing by rail, and consequently freight or goods by railroad, is much less, than by canal. Again, Coal on the Reading Railroad, in Pennsylvania, is carried a distance of 90 miles for 45 cents per ton weight; this is half a cent a ton per mile. Can heavy goods be brought by water as cheap?—We believe not. Canals may answer in some localities but railroads are rapidly superseding them, and are preferable in new countries.

There was an alarm of Fire yesterday about noon. We learn that the stove pipe in the Grammar School, passing through the ceiling, heated the lathing which took fire, but was immediately extinguished. The new Town Bell—the people's bell—was rung, and its rich tones were heard far and wide. It is to be rung every day for the present, at 8 in the morning and 1 in the afternoon. The contrast in sound, between the new bell and the fine old bell of All Saints Church is not very great.

The Rev. Charles Churchill, in his Introductory Lecture delivered before the Quebec Library Association, extracts from which will be seen on our first page, alluding to the benefits which have resulted to Canada, by the Repeal of the Navigation Laws, says:—

During the last year, owing to the repeal of the Navigation Laws—among the 1078 vessels that entered this port, we had 96 foreign vessels—45 from Norway—25 from the States—19 from Prussia—3 from Russia—2 from Portugal—1 from Sweden—and 1 Dutchman. These vessels have taken our timber home, and we hear none of the ruin or decay which many anticipated from the removal of these restraints, we have ourselves, more ships building than last year, and the wages of the workmen are improved. But could these vessels have proceeded past, Quebec and entered higher up the main artery of our commerce, many, many more would have directed their course hither and our number of arrivals and departures would have rapidly increased.

Then our immediate neighbours, whose own ports for a thousand miles are on these very waters on which we claim the sole right of Navigation, are compelled by these restrictions to seek the sea board from another port

besides Quebec, and where this produce is found to require ships to carry it thence, there will those ships be found. Let this boon be granted—a large fleet of carrying vessels will be built on the upper lakes,—they will be freighted with flour to Quebec, in preference to any of their own ports, from the facilities afforded for sending it home. A vastly increased revenue will repay the outlay of our costly but invaluable canals,—and at Quebec will congregate the fleets of the commercial world to carry the bounties, with which Providence has blessed this land to the uttermost ends of the earth.

## COMMUNICATION.

### THE FISHERIES OF NEW BRUNSWICK, NO. 3.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE STANDARD.  
Sir,—Having in my last spoken of the weirs in connection with this subject, I shall now proceed to take a view of the Herring Fishery at the Southern Head of this Island. It is said "that the taking of those Herring at the time they come there to spawn is another reason why our Fisheries are fast failing (as they have it) so many being engaged in it, and setting so many Nets, the Herring cannot get in to spawn, and are compelled to resort to some distant place for the purpose."—And thus, as well as causing the large Herring to desert our Coasts, will lead to a great scarcity of the young fry or smaller Herring—such as is caught in weirs &c., for smoking." Those who take this view of the matter are endeavouring to get the Legislature to pass an Act prohibiting the catching of them for a period in each year say from 1st August to 1st October. I have seen some of these Petitions going the rounds for signatures quite recently; and taking a view of the manner in which this fishing is and has been conducted—the contention, quarrelling, fighting, stealing and cutting of nets, and what it has given rise to, I too would go for such a measure, were it not that I am persuaded it never can be fully enforced, for it is even now known that if an Act be passed, and the Fishermen from St. John and other parts of the Province and Nova Scotia are prohibited; they, that is the people in this vicinity, can stealthily get what herring they want. But again I cannot see wherein it would tend to promote the prosperity of the Fisheries, by reserving it as a spawning ground, when it is quite clear that these Herring are not at any other time found about the coast. For unlike the herring elsewhere which spawn in the spring, they do not come in for that purpose until the end of August or beginning of September; and as all the kinds of herring taken during the summer on the "Ripplings" and about the shores of the Bay are almost entirely free from spawn, it is fair to conclude that they come from another ground. It may be Grand Manan Banks, near the mouth of the Bay, and I think it quite probable, as they are there in considerable shoals at times, and are said to be spawning Herring. But as yet fishermen do not catch many there, and I believe they are so irregular that it would not pay for any other purpose than Bait to catch the line-fish with on these banks. Therefore all the herring around in different parts of the Bay must be the herring that come in the spring, which they appear to be, and which spawn at the head of the Bay.

As for their having much effect to increase or lessen the small herring I do not assent to. For it would appear that the Bay of Fundy, and chiefly its western coast, is a place of general resort, for all the young herring on the whole North American coast, as I am not aware of their being found elsewhere in even a small quantity, and therefore the few herring that spawn at "Southern Head" and Spencer's Island included, have but little effect to swell the aggregate quantity of small herring about our coasts, when compared to the immense quantities which spawn at the Magdalen Islands, and other places about and near the coast of Nova Scotia.

That the Herring fishing is fast failing at this place is obvious and I believe if it had failed entirely before this time, very few who live here, or those who fish there from elsewhere, would regret it much. It is now fast dying a natural death. Where so many hundreds of Nets are so completely packed in such a small space of Fishing ground, as here at the time of spawning, it is impossible for the herring to continue long to resort, and it is surprising how even a few can find their way in and out among such hedges of Nets. The catch is now so rapidly diminishing, and so much wrangling and cutting nets has taken place, that many are getting heartily tired of it, and are abandoning it, particularly when on account of its being a rough coast, exposed to the sea and Fog, fishing there is attended with hardship and danger; even when pursued in peace and security.

It may be expected that I should go at some length into the nature and extent of these quarrels, as I have alluded to them; but I wish to say as little as possible concerning them, as all parties seem to be getting tired of them, and things are gradually assuming a more becoming state. I will only say in justice to the inhabitants residing in that vicinity, who have generally borne the whole blame of cutting nets and causing the disturbances, that it is unquestionable that some from different places who fish there, have but heretofore cut nets on the credit of Southern Head folks. And further I am quite certain that if the St. John Fishermen had not in the first instance used these people in a very contemptible and unfair manner, by taking up their moorings and gallowing their nets out of the fishing berths, to give place for their own, and again running out long gangs of good nets, over their short and poor ones; and in various other ways showing insolence and indifference towards them, there would never have been any thing of the kind. They should have shown a little

more respect to the rights of the inhabitants, for altho' they were poor and could not have large gangs of good Nets, with such as they had, they possessed the right of occupying the privileges in common with those with whom they could not enter into competition with.

### LATEST FROM FREDERICTON.

February 17.  
A good many petitions were presented today by Messrs. Tilley, Earle, Scoullar and Ryan, to repeal the laws on selling Spirituous Liquors, and to make the sellers responsible for the results arising therefrom. Seventeen petitions were presented by Messrs. Earle, Taylor, Hatheway and Beardsley, to incorporate the Orange Lodges. A message on the Boundary between this Province and Canada was laid before the House by the Hon. Mr. Partelow.

Mr. Needham moved a resolution to discontinue the debates before the members at the public expense, which was negatived by 24 to 10. It was understood that the House was not to pay for sleighs to parties after business hours any more.

The Committee of the House upon reporting the debates have reported in favor of paying Mr. Anglin £75. The matter is to come up on Thursday for concurrence.

The nomination for the County of York, takes place this day (Wednesday). The Polling takes place on Monday next the 24th inst. The contest will be between Messrs. Fisher & McPherson.

Mr. Street's return for Northumberland is sure—his only opponent a Mr. Fraser will stand no chance.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 11.—The magnificent steamer Autocrat, bound from New Orleans to Memphis, with a heavy freight and number of passengers, came in collision on the 9th inst. with the steamer Magnolia, coming down. The Autocrat sunk immediately, and it is supposed that over thirty passengers were lost, including several cabin passengers belonging to Tennessee, five negro firemen and one engineer.

Post Office Arrangements.—We are happy to learn, that besides assenting to the Bill for transferring the Post Offices in British North America to the several Colonies, and establishing a uniform Three penny rate of Postage, to take effect on the 6th July next, Her Majesty's Government have announced another most important concession in our favor. When the new arrangements take place, all printed books, magazines, or pamphlets, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign may be sent through the Post, from this Colony to the United Kingdom, or from the United Kingdom to this Colony, at the following rates of postage:—For a single volume, not exceeding half-a-pound, in weight, Six Pence Sterling; exceeding half-a-pound, and not exceeding 1 lb. weight, One Shilling Sterling; exceeding 1 lb. and not exceeding 2 lbs. weight, Two Shillings Sterling; and so on, increasing One Shilling Sterling for every additional pound or fraction of a pound.

At present, no printed book or pamphlet can be sent to England, or received from thence, except on payment of full letter postage, which amounts to a prohibition. The value of the concession will soon be felt; as soon as the new arrangements come into operation, new publications may be sent out to us by post at a trifling charge, and pamphlets and publications of every kind may be sent to every part of the United Kingdom by post, and we predict that this concession will soon lead to these Colonies being better known to the people of Great Britain and Ireland than they have been heretofore.—[Courier.]

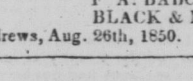
