In the old days a physician was con-sidered no good at all if he couldn't tell everything that was the matter with the patient as soon as he saw him walk into the office! Any physician in those day who really sat down carefully and quietly to examine the patient and so get at the real facts, was at once put down as a poor ignoramus, a mere beginner or at best very slow and stupid. curious ideas the public had then, had they not?

The locksmith who attempted to fix a lock without finding out first what was wrong with it would be set down as a fool and lose all his business; but a doctor who did try to find out what was wrong was considered not to know anythingelse he wouldn't have to find out It was the inheritance of the old mystery days, when to the dense ignorance of the times all science was occult, bordering on magic-and especially all science related to the human body. Even now some of those who cling to the old-time ignorant views expect a doctor to "diagnose" his case by some sort of second sight or intuition, not by honest hard work and using his brains and special training in the ways that make his brains and ways that index in bound and epecial training of value—that is, in detecting the various slight, in-tricate changes in the body that indicate disease: different sorts of changes and combinations of changes and combinations of changes in different diseases, of

SLIGHT AND UNRECOGNIZED SIGNS.

One reason why it was apparently easier to make a diagnosis fifty years ago than it is now is this-up to fifty or sixty years ago almost the only diseases brought to a docthe only diseases brought to a doc-tor at all were far-advanced, well-developed cases, in which hardly anyone could fail to make a fair guess at the trouble. Even today this is far too often true-people don't go to a doctor until they have exhausted all the neighbors' advice and let the disease get a real good start. This is on the principle of not calling the fire engines while the blaze is small-wait until the whole house is burning brightly-for then

you are sure there is something MORE SENSE NOW.

But, thank goodness, in these days people understand some things bet-ter than they did, and one of them is the importance of attending to

seventh son, able to see through a millstone without a hole in it—or anything else but an exceptionally bright man (he must be if he is going to get brough a modern uni-versity course in medicine success-fully) who has devoted his brains and years of hard plugging to learning how the body conducts itself, and how to help it run smoothly and well-what things harm it and how to get rid of these things, and how to induce the body to suit itself to them if they can't be removed. In other words, modern medicine is applied science, purely and simplyphysics, chemistry, biology, physiol-ogy, anatomy, bacteriology, etc., all worked out in relation to the tre-mendously intricate physics, chemistry and biology, etc., of the machinery of the human body. There can be only one science of medicine, just as there can be only one science of mathematics, of physics, of chemistry, or anything else. The old terms, homoeopath, allopath, and the new ones that spring up every day now, are merely labels of ignorance—they designated artificial systems based on mental cogitation, not on pains-taking, fundamental scientific experiment and observation. In other words, our medical forefathers did ine medicine what everyone else did in those days-they thought up some ort of plan in their own heads, or took one ready-made from some one else-then went out and pro-claimed it as the final solution for everything in the world! They never thought of examining the thing itself to find out what was really doing. They made up their minds first-and then what was the use of bothering with an examina-tion at all? It wouldn't change their preconceived ideas! It was said of one of these dyed-in-the-wool ad-herents of preconceived prejudices that he maintained bitterly that it was far better for a patient to die under his "system" than to recover in any other way! Of course it is hard in these scientific days to believe that there even existed such a dunder-headed idiot-or, rather, that the state of public opinion and information could ever

have been so low as to allow such a man a prominent place or any respect or following. SCIENTIFIC MEDICINE.
