

> Halle, Saxony, March 26 .- Reinforcements of the Communist rioters at Mansfield and Eisleben were in progress this morning. Armed workmen were moving from Halle and vicinity in the direction of these two towns. Their declared purpose was to join their comrades, notably the party which, after many hours of fighting, had been driven out of Eisleben by the security police. According to information from both police and Communist quarters, the purpose of the movement was the surrounding of the police at Eisleben. The fugitives from Eisleben were reorganizing today on the hills northwest of that town, Communists here reported.



SCIENCE SEEKS PHTHISIS VIRUS

Pasteur Experts Believe They Are On Right Track—To Experiment On Apes.

PARIS. March 25 .- For the last year rvants at the Pasteur Institute in Paris have been making important exeriments toward the perfection of a ocine against tuberculosis.

Professor Calmette of the institute i discussing the results of his research work, recently admitted that up to the ent time the institute has not been wholly to shield humanity against

'Laborious experiments are still

mecessary to complete our research work," he declared. "So far we have found that it is possible by cultivating the Koch bacillus in certain nutritive media to modify its character and virulence. This bacillus, cultivated in successive series on glycerine media containing bile, although it goes on living and is capable of reproduction, loses its croperty of infecting man or beast with suberculosis.

'Inoculation of cultures of these bacilli into a human organism is harm-less. It realizes bacillary infection, but does not produce tuberculosis. This tubercules infection, non-virulent and barmless, develops in the organism a perticular state of resistance to subsequent virulent infection, whether due to artificial inoculation or prolonged association with tuberculous animals. "In other words, in our test animals more particularly in young bovines, irulent bacilli are tolerated or thrown out without producing tubercular esions. This bacillus cultivated on bile nediums behaves then like true vacine. That is where the matter stands easy to understand these facts, and they mark an important progress along the road to anti-tuber-ular vaccination."

To Experiment on Apes.
In order that new progress leading to human vaccination may be realized, Professor Calmette thinks that it is inensable to undertake experim on big anthropoid apes, such as the dility to tuberculosis is well known. Bu hese experiments can only be carried out in the native country of the apes.



"The effect of this," according to the New International Encyclopedia, "is that the fourteenth of the calendar (Imaginary) moon, which from the time of Jewish law has been considered the 'full moon, for ecclesiastical purposes, falls generally on the fifteenth or sixteenth of the real moon. Easter, then, is the next Sunday after this "imaginary" full moon. If the full moon falls on Sunday, Easter is a week later.

Further investigation of the "imaginary" moon is discouraged by encyclopedias, which assure one the western usage, establishing Easter as the Sunday after the fourteenth whole thing has been figured out in day of the Jewish month or moon.

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BIRD NOTES

(Contributed by McIlwraith Ornithological Club.

February added nothing to the annals of the club, except Flicker on 6th, a Meadow Lark wintering by the Grand Trunk tracks near the Coves, and a Kingfisher on the 28th, possibly a spring bird.

On March 3rd, the spring birds began to arrive. Bluebird was the first. March 5, a single Redwing at the Cove island in the river; March 7, Klideer Plover; 8th, Cowbird; 10th, Fox Sparrow, whose song from the thickets east of the pumphouse is one of the treats of the early spring.

March 10th, Rusty Grackle. This and the Fox Sparrow are the only two, so far, of those that never nest as far south as London. MODERN PUBLIC HEALTH

SCHOOLS.

We have been hearing a great deal about under-weight children lately. but how much of this under-weight is due to tuberculosis, rather than merely to improper feeding, late tonsils and adenoids, eating candy beef, and such other

drawbacks? This is not an easy question to answer off-hand, and is one of the very important questions that should and must be answered—one of the first questions for our whole-time medical school superviser to answer-when we get him! Meantime, we can make a more or less accurate guess at it.
EARLY SYMPTOMS OF TUBER-

C ILOSIS. First of all, let us say that tuber-culosis in school children from 5 years old to 14 or even 16 is rarely "frank"—is rarely well-developed and evident, in other words. Usually it can be detected after (not before!) the most careful, painstaking ob-servation by skilled medical men who are permitted to see the patient over and over again, sometimes for three or four months, before arriving at a decision. In the old days a physician was considered no good at all if he couldn't tell everything that was the matter with the patient as soon as he saw him walk into the office! Any physician in those day who really sat down carefully and quietly to examine the patient and so get at the real facts, was at once put down as a poor ignoramus, a mere beginner, or at best very slow and stupid. curious ideas the public had then,

The locksmith who attempted to fix a lock without finding out first what was wrong with it would be set down as a fool and lose all his business; but a doctor who did try to find out what was wrong was considered not to know anythingelse he wouldn't have to find out! It was the inheritance of the old mystery days, when to the dense ignorance of the times all science was occult, bordering on magic—and especially all science related to the human body. Even now some of those who cling to the old-time ignorant views expect a doctor to "diagnose" his case by some sort of second sight or intuition, not by honest hard work and using his brains and special training in the ways that make his brains and special training of value—that is, in detecting the various slight, in tricate changes in the body that indicate disease: different sorts of and combinations of changes in different diseases, of

SLIGHT AND UNRECOGNIZED SIGNS.

One reason why it was apparently easier to make a diagnosis fifty years ago than it is now is this up to fifty or sixty years ago almost the only diseases brought to a doc-tor at all were far-advanced, welldeveloped cases, in which hardly anyone could fail to make a fair guess at the trouble. Even today this is far too often true—people don't go to a doctor until they have exhausted all the neighbors' advice and let the disease get a real good start. This is on the principle of not calling the fire engines while the blaze is small—wait until the whole house is burning brightly—for then you are sure there is something

developed only-and correspondingly Slowly, slowly, but steadily, people are beginning to realize that the good physician is not necessarily a magician or a seventh son of a seventh son, able to see through a millstone without a hole in it-or anything else but an exceptionally bright man (he must be if he is going to get through a modern university course in medicine successfully) who has devoted his brains and years of hard plugging to learning how the body conducts itself, and how to help it run smoothly and well—what things harm it and how to get rid of these things, and how to induce the body to suit itself to them if they can't be removed. In other words, modern medicine is applied science, purely and simplyphysics, chemistry, biology, physiology, anatomy, bacteriology, etc., all worked out in relation to the tremendously intricate physics, chemistry and biology, etc., of the machinery of the human body. There can be only one science of one science of mathematics, of


physics, of chemistry, or anything else. The old terms, homoeopath, allopath, and the new ones that spring up every day now, are merely labels of ignorance—they designated artificial systems based on mental cogitation, not on painstaking, fundamental scientific experiment and observation. In other words, our medical forefathers did in medicine what everyone else did in those days—they thought up some sort of plan in their own heads, or took one ready-made from some-one else—then went out and proclaimed it as the final solution for everything in the world! They never thought of examining the thing itself to find out what was really doing. They made up their minds first—and then what was the use of bothering with an examina-tion at all? It wouldn't change their preconceived ideas! It was said of ne of these dyed-in-the-wool ad herents of preconceived prejudices that he maintained bitterly that it was far better for a patient to die under his "system" than to recover in any other way! Of course it is hard in these scientific days to believe that there even existed such a dunder-headed idiot-or, rather, that the state of public opinion and information could ever have been so low as to allow such a man a prominent place or any SCIENTIFIC MEDICINE.

In these days the study and con-trol of the operations of the human body is a scientific business in which preconceived ideas have no more place than they have in any other scientific business. The modern physician, fully trained in the necessary fundamentals, goes to his patient exactly as the really expert machinist goes to the automobile brought to him for repairs. Both doctor and expert machinist know the way the machine (body or auto) is put together, down to the finest details. That is anatomy. They know all about how it is supposed to run normally. That is physiology. Then they know all about the variations. ous troubles that are caused by this or that, affecting some part of the machine. That is pathology. The expert machinist considers every-thing, the quality and quantity of
