GERMANY BIDS FOR BIG CANAL

Ready to Buy Rights for the burg, and is reported to be dying. Dr. Panama Ditch.

\$40,000,000 FOR A CONCESSION

Canadians Quit S. A. Constabulary-A Number Returning Home -Britain's Big Trade.

London, Jan. 9.- The Washington correspondent of the Daily News states, on what he claims is unquestionable authority, that the Panama Canal Company has received a German offer to buy for \$40,000,000 all the company's rights and concessions if the United States does not exercise its option, which expires March 4. The German Government has offered to buy Colombia's shares in the company, agreeing to take them at par in full liquidation of all German claims against

Colombia. The German view of the right to build the canal without violating the Monroe doctrine is that the Colombian constitution is not alienated nor the sovereignty thereof trasferred to a foreign government. Therefore, if German capital builds the canal, neither Germany nor individual Germans acquire sovereignty in Colombia or perpetual occupation of Colombian

territory. Furthermore, the United States, in not opposing the French company in building the canal, established a precedent that such building is not regarded as a violation of the Monroe doctrine, for which reason the United States would have no justification in interfering with Germans completing the French company's work.

YEAR OF BRITAIN'S TRADE. London, Jan. 9 .- An official report says the exports of England for the year 1902 amounted to £283,539,980, or \$1,417,639,900. The exports for the previous year were £280,022,376, or \$1,400,111,880. The imports for 1902 were £528,360,284, or \$2,641,801,420, as compared with \$2,619,950,990 for the previous year.

The monthly statement of the Board of Trade shows that during December imports increased \$7,002,500, and exports decreased \$472,500.

CANADIANS DISGUSTED. London, Jan. 9 .- Some Canadians who were members of the South African Constabulary arrived in England on Tues-

day, and twenty or thirty more are ex-

pected soon. Inquiry shows that some were discharged in certain cases for bad conduct, and it is alleged that others resigned because they resented being transferred to different sections under other officers than their own. Some difficulty exists regarding their passage back to Canada, but negotiations are now being carried on with the Colonial Office, as the men were enlisted in the Dominion, but most of them expect to return home on Satur-

chinery of The Hague tribunal. When the commission meets, it is stated, they will have instructions from the principals to endeavor to adjust the dispute out of hand at Washington. If not, the commissioners will proceed according to the original plan, to draw up the protocol for submission to The Hague tribunal. It is improbable, in the judgment of the officials, that the blockade will be raised until the commissioners do one of these two things-either reach a complete settlement or sign a protocol providing for arbitration.

LORD KITCHENER **LEADS THE TROOPS**

Superb Military Spectacle at Delhi-Closing Scenes of the Durbar.

Delhi, India, Jan. 9. - The review by the Viceroy, Lord Curzon, of 30,000 British and native troops, led by Lord Kitchener, was the last important event of the coronation durbar. The Duke of Connaught, the Grand Duke of Hesse and the Viceroy, surrounded by a brilliant staff, took up their positions at the saluting point. From every side an immense multitude of Europeans and natives watched the parade and cheered the favorite regiments. The Duchess of Connaught and Lady Curzon witnessed the re-

view from carriages. The scene yesterday was not less brilliant in coloring than the preceding events, and it equaled them in pic-turesqueness. There was a particularly effective maneuver after passing of the horse artillery. The cavalry, field batteries and the infantry in the order named, the cavalry in line of regiments, followed by the artillery, galloped past again and formed half a mile in front of the grand stand, and from this position charged down in long and magnificent line to within a short distance of the

saluting point.

Of all the soldiers reviewed none made a better impression that the na-tive volunteers, who were led by native 'princes, magnificently uniformed and horsed. The Imperial Ser-vice Corps composed of natives who saw service in China, excited great admiration

STRONG TALK BY CHAMBERLAIN

Boers Need Not Expect General Amnesty—Should Recognize British Generosity.

Pretoria, Jan. 8. - Mr. Chamberlain, replying to the address of the burghers, said the terms already granted to them were decidedly generous, and that there was no prospect of a general amnesty. The cases of the burghers now in Europe would be considered individually on their merits, said Mr. Chamberlain, and these burghers should prove their loyalty by account-The secretary said also that the annexation of the Vryheid and Utrecht districts to Natal was irrevocable, and that the natives would be compelled to observe their obligations. He declared he would have been better pleased had the address of the burghers, instead of consisting merely

HOW HE TRADED OFF HIS WIFE

of demands, contained some recognition of what his Majesty's Government had already done for the Boers.

Peculiar Bigamy Case on Trial at Cobourg—Gave Spouse for a Watch.

Port Hope, Jan. 9.-A case was tried at Cobourg yesterday in the county court before Judge Benson, preferred by County Crown Attorney Kerr against George Albert Reynolds, of Percy Township, near Dartmouth, of inciting to commit bigamy. On Dec. 10, 1900, George Albert Reynolds and Annie Clark were married by the Presbyterian minister at Norwood, and they lived together as man and wife until last fall, when an elder brother, Walter Reynolds, aged 26, came home from Michigan, and revived a former intimacy existing between hiself and George's wife. George resented this, or else he was tired of his wife, and offered to sell his wife and household effects to Walter, the consideration

being a watch bought in Michigan for

A bargain to this effect was made, the marriage license procured under false pretenses by the two brothers at Roseneath, and husband No. 1 took charge of his two children, while his wife and brother were being married in innocence by the Methodist minister at Warkworth, in November, 1902. After which husband No. 2 took immediate charge of his brother's wife, two children and household furniture. The affair culminated today in Walter Reynolds and Annie Reynolds, who were defended by Mr. E. C. S. Huycke, K. C., of Cobourg, pleading guilty to charges of bigamy, and receiving sen-tences of four months each in the county jail at Cobourg. George Albert Reynolds, the first husband, who was defended by J. B. McColl, M. P., was convicted of the charge of inciting his brother and wife to commit bigamy, and received three months. In passing sentence his honor pointed out that the lightness of the sentences was due to the fact of the ignorance of the parties concerned, and because their offense against society and morality had affected no innocent party in-juriously. The parties in this unique domestic mixup remain unaffacted in their relationship, husband No. 1 having promised to take back the wife and children he had sold as soon as the sentences expired.





THE CONDITION OF CITY'S HEALTH IS SATISFACTORY

Statement From M. H. O.

Mortuary Statistics Include List of 18 Violent Deaths in Year.

The regular meeting of the board of health was held yesterday afternoon, those present being Ald. Campbell, ex-Ald. C. C. Taylor, and Wm. Skinner, Mr. H. C. McBride and Dr. Hutchinson. After the report of the last meeting had been read by Secretary Bell, Medical Health Officer Dr. Hutchinson submitted his annual report, as

To the Chairman and Board of Health: Gentlement.—In presenting my annual report for the year ending Nov. 15, I have to repeat what I said in last year's report as to the very satisfactory condition of the city's health. Five hundred and seventy-four deaths oc-curred during the year, exclusive of 34 still-born, which are not counted in mortuary statistics. Consumption, as usual, carried off the largest number, viz.; 65, as compared with 48 last year, and 60 the year before. Pneumonia, also a disease of the lungs, comes second in the list with 48 deaths. Leaving out what is called heart disease, which may mean anything, organic diseases of the heart caused the deaths of 48 persons and cancer 29. There were 18 deaths by violence, of which 2 were suicides. There is a very satisfactory and comforting increase in the number of deaths from old age, viz., 36; from octogenarians to the century mark. The number of deaths due to infectious diseases is comparatively small, viz., 25, as follows: Diphtheria 20, typhoid fever 8, measles 2, and none whatever from scarlet fever. This is a very low death rate from what is called preventable diseases for a city of London's popula-tion, and breaks the record for typhoid and scarlet fevers. It is especially so when the difficulties contended against are considered. Many parents show an utter disregard of the Golden Rule, allowing their children, while convalescing from mild forms of scar-let fever, to mix with other children; send them to stores and sometimes to school. Placarding a dwelling is a no-tice to the public to keep away from that dwelling, and that the inmates cases where it would require the establishment of a "peaceful blockade"

Board of Health Hears Gratifying by a police constable to effect complete isolation. Some of the city physicians are equally culpable, for they, knowing the requirements of the public health act, at the solicitation of the parents, do not report all the cases coming under their notice. Although there were no deaths during the year from scarlet fever, there was an unusually large number of sporadic cases of a mild type, many of them due to the carelessness of parents and neglect of physicians. Hereafter physicians and householders neglecting to promptly report all cases of infectious diseases in accordance with the act, will be given opportunities in the police court to explain why they did not do so.

The death rate for the year is 14.6 in One hundred and seventy-eight herds and dairies were examined during the One cow had actininycosis bovis (lump-jaw), and was destroyed. An examination of 161 samples of milk gave an average of 4 per cent of butter fat; 2 samples had cream added, and 2 cream removed. The average shows that London is be ing supplied with good milk. This school is heat-ed and ventilated by the Smead-Dowd system, and as long as the doors and windows are kept closed the furnacestacks will both heat and ventilate, but these large furnaces can only be used the winter. For ventilation, when the furnaces are not in use, and also for the destruction of waste material. two small stacks are kept burning during the summer, and accomplish what they are intended for. During the holidays these are not kept burning, consequently, when the school opened in Sentember, one or two weeks elapsed before all waste matter was rendered inocuous. This is the way the Smead system works, and it can work no other way. It will heat buildings well, but for ventilation purposes it is not safe. So far as the Talbot street school is concerned, I do not think there will be any further trouble there, and the janitor is a very efficient one.

Sober Second Thought.

This province has been so long accustomed to good government that, like good health, we take it as a matter of fact, and fail to realize what we have until we lose it. We believe this view of it had much to do with the bye-election results, as compared with the general elections. Take, for instance the temperance vote and our own city. The Ross Government lost a supporter and Whitney gained one by the presence of the temperance candidate in the field. Many voted for Mr. Daly sincerely believing they were thereby furthering the cause of temperance, when in fact, they were | Helen mine, for a principle of suffistriking a blow at the best friend the temperance cause ever had. They were playing into the hands of their opponents. Subsequent events, particularly the vote polled in the referendum, have shown how unjust were some of the accusations against Mr. Ross, and if tomorrow a vote was taken in many constituencies where Conservatives hold seats, the verdict of the general election would be reversed. Doubtless the temperance electorate, having had time to weigh the facts, and desiring to do right, helped to return the Government supporters in the north ridings of Perth, Grey and Norfolk

Mr. Ross has earned fresh laurels. He fights like a man. His "life is in the right." He worthily and ably follows Sir Oliver Mowat, and the province can rest assured that the past policy of the Ross Government will be continued and that whatever a government can do to advance and perfect the conditions of life in this province, will be done. Well done, Ross!

The Roorbach.

It is almost 60 years since the thing that has come to be popularly known as a roorbach came into existence under that title, although under other designations it has doubtless been known for a very much longer time. The bye-elections that took place on Wednesday last have settled which party is to hold power in the Province of Ontario for another term of years. The Dominion elections are also some distance removed from us in all probability, and it might be well for those who have used the roorbach in the past to consider in these calmer moments that supervene after the strife, whether it were not well to let this thing that was conceived in iniquity, die, and pass into a merited oblivion.

For one thing, it is cecidedly unfair. That which lends a true zest to all contests is that the game should be played fairly, and the grasping of victory by unfair methods is no real triumph. "Not the winning counts, but the winning fair." Even then if an election is to be gained by aid of the roorbach, no honorable man should wish to gain advantage by this unfair method. If men are so foolish as to change their vote and opinion because of some startling story published the last day before the polling. no political party worthy of the name should wish to take such unfair advantage of an opponent.

But does it ever serve such a purpose? The trick is well-known, and even the electors whose intellectual gifts are of a low grade have come to realize that the story published of some monstrous iniquity that has just been discovered is almost sure to be unworthy of eredence. There is perhaps no way by which it could be shown to a demonstration how many votes are gained in any particular case by such tactics, but the probability is that they are exceedingly few, and frequently, instead of changing votes as they were Intended to do, by their every extravagance effect an opposite result. It was heralded far and wide that there had been some underhand method to control the vote of the employes of the Grand Trunk shops in Stratford, and early struggles: that Mr. Whitney and his lieutenants had expesed this wickedness and had received assurance from headquarters that there was no thought of pressure being applied to influence the elector's free choice. The silliness of the tale was manifest on the face of it, and judging by the results, if any effect was produced it was the opposite of that which was desired. One can easily magine one or more of the Grand frunk employes, men of intelligence, waxing wroth when this fairy tale appeared in the newspapers, and saying to themselves that any man who was posing as the defender of their liberties as freemen was not the sort of man to receive the votes which they night poll. The day has passed for railway corporations to interfere with iny man's right to vote, as his conscience may lead him, and there is no such defender needed to stand or to pretend to stand between such tyranpical power and the workmen of Ontario.

This case is given as a timely illustration of the apparent uselessness of the roorbach, although no election is held that we have not the same fauit in evidence. It has not always been on one side, but whatever proportion of blame may be assigned to the opposing parties and their newspaper advocates, it is pretty plain that the trick has become, in Ontario at least, stale, flat and unprofitable, and that it is time it was laid away on the shelf with other worn-out political armor. We are some distance from the ideal state of

taken when, by common consent, the contending parties will depend on the presentation of their claims as they have been brought forward in the campaign, without endeavoring to sway men in the last hours by some absurd tale of discovered iniquity, which has opportunely been laid bare, and which calls for judgment on the sinners.

Mr. Blake's Letter.

Mr. Blake's letter was made the text for attacks on the Government during the contests in North Perth, North Grey and North Norfolk. It is much to be regretted that Mr. Blake wrote the letter referred to, as the name Blake has been for many years associated with the Reform party in this province and always with honor, his father, the late Chancellor Blake, having been regarded as even a more eloquent man than either of his sons, the Hon. Edward Blake or the Hon. S. H.

Where the error appears to have been made by Mr. Blake, was in mistaking what was at most a personal contest between two claimants for the cient magnitude to justify him in attacking the Government. What he complains of is similar to the complaints made every day regarding the results of law suits. Both sides cannot win; the losing side naturally feels aggrieved and frequently alleges that there has been a miscarriage of justice. It is said in one of our courts a lawyer was pressing, with little success, for a verdict for his client, and finally blurted out, "But how am I to explain it to my client?" The judge said, "Just tell him you couldn't get it" through the judge's thick skull. I've known that explanation to be given more than once." It would have been far better if Mr. Blake had followed some similar course, rather than the one he did, but we must allow the best men sometimes to stumble. We must not forget the good he has done. He is a man whom Londoners have delighted to hear and honor in time past. In private life he has been open-handed in his benefactions, giving large sums to charitable and religious purposes. His great ability commands respect, and we hope personal differences will not prevent him from continuing to ally himself with the Reform party, which has always sought the best interests of the country, whose past, in which he and his family have taken a prominent part, has been a glorious one, and whose future, unless all signs fail, will be more glorious still.

Although the crop of 1902 was much the largest ever gathered in the Canadian Northwest, there has been at no time any deficiency of banking fa-cilities to handle it; nor has there been any rise in the rate of interest in consequence of the movement. On the contrary, Canadian bank facilities have also been largely used for crop-moving purposes on our side of the line during the same period. The gist of the matter is that in Canada there is substantial freedom of note issue. The banks can put out their circulating notes whenever there is a demand for them. They are not required to buy bonds and lock up their capital and go through a rigmarole beforehand. These facilities for note issue are denied to our banks; hence the superiority of the Canadian system in its power to respond quickly to the demands of the crop-moving sea-

France Favors Russia's Policy in Regard to Developing a Naval Force in the Mediterranean.

Archduke Joseph Ferdinand, younger brother of the Crown Princess of Saxony, is going to pay a second visit to his sister at Geneva. This is interpreted to mean that Emperor Francis Joseph is renewing his attempt to induce the Crown Princess to permanently break off her relations with Prof. Giron. The Crown Princess remains in strict seclusion. She has given the fullest powers to arrange everything so that the divorce proceedings can take place on Jan. 30. She has been induced to do so by a suitable financial allowance being offered by the Saxon royal family. It is announced here that Emperor William of Germany will reach Rome April 26 on a visit to the Italian court. The Czar of Russia will

visit the court May 11. Right Rev. Dr. Davidson, Bishop of Winchester since 1895, has been appointed Archbishop of Canterbury, in succession to Dr. Temple, who died on

There was another violent earthquake at Andijan on Wednesday, but it did not result in any further loss of life. John Dillon, the Irish leader, has arrived at Queenstown from New York on the White Star liner Celtic. At his own request there was no public de monstration.

Gen. Botna has reported that \$525,000 has been collected in America and Europe for the relief of destitute Boers. Gens, Botha, Dewet and Delarey strongly urge the necessity for a moderate attitude and organization to assist the present Government.

WINDSOR TRACK LEASED. Detroit, Jan. 7.-Sam Wagner, of Chicago, has leased the Windsor track for a number of years, and contem-plates holding a meeting of larger proportions than has ever been held on the Canadian course. There were several eastern applications for the course, but as Mr. Wagner had the lease several years ago and then disposed of it to Messrs. Chambers & Walker, his bid was given first consideration. Wagner is identified with the Worth Jockey Club, and will hold the meet-ing at Windsor immediately after the spring session at Worth, which will be May 20. The Windsor session will be an extended one, Mr. Wagner reserving the right to run as long as he sees fit. This plan brings Windsor a month before the Grosse Point meeting and two months in advance of Highland Park.

CANADIAN STAKES INCREASED. Detroit, Jan. 7.—Secretary Parmer, of the Highland Park Club, announces the list of stakes that will be run at the meetings to be given by the club at Fort Erie and Highland Park, Detroit. The club's financial success last season, both at Fort Erie and at High-land Park, has permitted the organization to raise the values of its stakes considerably above the regulation thousand dollars in vogue last year. The Frontier stakes, which will be run at Highland Park, will be worth \$2,000, and the other three stake races \$1,500. At each course there will be a stake race for the jumpers. The star event at Fort Erie will be the Canadian Derby, open to 3-year-olds. The value of this event will be \$3,000. Races of a uniform value of \$1,500 complete the Fort Erie programme, which includes three more stakes than the Detroit meeting. At the meeting yesterday of the Western Jockey Club the Highland Park Club reserved June 2 to July 11 as its racing dates. This will bring the spring meeting immediately after the Grosse Pointe event.




