FIGHTING IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 21.—According to official advices received by the new confidential agent of the Provisional Government of San Salvador, Geronimo Pon, war between Guatemala and San Salvador began without the usual formalities of a declaration. Guatemala, says Senor Pon, has chosen to interfere in our domestic politics by trying to put into power a president not our own free choice. We sent forces to the frontier to repel attempted invasion of San Salvador, and it appears that they were needed there. On the 5th inst. we had 9,000 well equipped men along the Rio Paz, but I believe there are fully 16,000 along the frontier. I understand the Gautemala forces number 20,000. Senor Pon has received the following: "July 18—The enemy, 9,000 strong, yesterday invaded Salvador. Our forces bravely repulsed them, causing their complete controlled them.



But Mr. Gladstone had no doubt in his mind as to what exemption implied. "An exemption is a gift," he said; "what the State remits to a man it gives to him." And to illustrate the proposition, he said: "If a gentleman has carriages and horses, he is iable to pay a guinea for each horse, and £2 and upwards for each carriage; and, if those sums be levied from his neigh-bor and not from him, it is the same thing as if, having been levied, they had been given back to him." The exemption from taxation, Mr. Gladstone maintained, was a pecuniary premium; "a positive pecuniary premium or State subvention it is." And, to give one more quotation, he said: "I aintain that an exemption is a grant; and that all property should pay the taxes ne-cessary for the enjoyment of all property. But I also maintain that in the case even of the larger charities, and of the very best among them, if they had any claim for a public grant, yet it is most impolitic and unreasonable to make such a grant by way of an exemption, which selects for favor in-stitutions not in want, and leaves to struggle those which stand most in need of assist

So far then as Mr. Gladstone's opinion can settle the question, there is no doubt that in the exemption of church property from taxation there is a connection Church and State, because the exemption is a grant from the Government municipality. How large the gift is in Ontario, we have no means of knowing, be-cause it is only in a few of the large city and town municipalities that the practice of valuing church property is followed by the assessors. 
