Canadian Sealers' Claims.

LONDON, April 12 .- In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Buxton, Parliamentary Secretary to Colonial Office, said that the Canadian Government attached considerable importance to the matter of compensation for illegal seizures of sealing vessels which have been made in the past. The United States Government had intended that as soon as the legislation on the award of the tribunal should be completed they would begin negotiations looking to settlements of such claims. Spain, Portugal, Italy, Greece and Algeria have all been searched for new varieties, and some of the rarer sorts are very curious, ranging from the delicate little Angels' Tears, the appropriately named Hoop Petticoat, and the cyclamenflowered Narcissus-a variety lost to horticulture for two centuries-to the bold

The Latest Parisian Freak.

Paris, April 13.-Paris has this season developed a young man named Max Labaudy, who has spent 6,000,000 francs in less than a year, and who will inherit 20,-000,000 more within the next two years. He is a small, pallid person, who pays \$50 for an artificially tinted gardenia for his buttonhole and smokes cigarettes until his heart begins to beat like a trip-hammer. When his heart begins to beat rapidly Mr. Labaudy sets up a yell which can be heard for blocks. Then his friends soothe him, and he ceases smoking cigarettes long enough to equander a few hundred thousand more francs. Mr. Max Labaudy is at present in Paris. CHICAGO, April 22.—The lockout of building trades, which occurred to-day, was not as general as was expected, not more than 10,000 employes being thrown out of work. PITTSBURG, Pa., April 12.-The 900 men employed by the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal Company in the Turtle Creek Valley have voted unanimously to resist the proposed reduction in the price for digging from 65 to 55 cents per ton. The strike

LEAPING FOR DEAR LIFE.

Destructive Fire in Buffalo-Scores of Lives in Peril.

BUFFALO, April 12 .- Sixty men were employed at night on the top floor of the American Glucose Company's building. A number jumped from the eighth story into the Hamburg Canal. How many escaped is not known at this hour (10 o'clock). The fire is not yet under control.

At midnight the fire was got under control. The main building of the grape sugar works, eight stories in height, had with its dependencies a frontage of 225 feet on Scott street, extending to the corner of Scott, and a depth of 180 feet, reaching to the banks of the Hamburg Canal, while the other subordinate structures occupied the south side of Scott street and stretched nearly to Perry street, 30 feet to the southward. The loss on the grape sugar works will exceed \$1,000,000, which is covered by insurance to the extent of \$500,000. Outside losses will reach \$200,000.

At the time of the fire breaking out 60 men were at work in the building. Of these 48 are accounted for up to midnight, and the fate of the others is still in doubt. It is generally believed that some of them have met their deaths in the flames.

Of those accounted for a number are seriously injured. Wm. Maurice will die, James Young and Wm. Lawndowski same time and place, the stock are probably tatally hurt. John Stern is Jernie E. Poile, Chatham, amountalso badly injured, but will recover. Lieut. Schrader and Pipeman Weber, of the fire department, was severely hurt by falling walls, and also badly burned. Weber had one leg broken.

Gratifying Reports Presented at the Annual Meeting.

YEAR OF PROSPERITY.

Nearly Ten Million Dollars' Worth of Business.

The Company Extends Its Operations Beyond the Seat-The Old Board of Management Re-Elected.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of this company was held at its offices in the company's building, Notre Dame street, on Friday, March 30, the president, Mr. Robertson Macaulay, in the chair. The following report was presented:

The directors have pleasure in presenting to the shareholders and policy-holders the record of the transactions of the company for the past year. The accompanying statements show that not only is its financial position eminently satisfactory, but gains of a very substantial and gratifying character have been made in every depart-

ment of the business. During the year 5,472 applications were received for life assurances to the amount of \$9,539,155.83. Of these, 5,213 for \$8,791,902 80 were accepted, and policies were issued therefor. The policies written were thus over \$800,000 in advance of those for 1892, and much beyond those secured by any other Canadian company in any one

The number of policies in force at the closing of the books was 17,132, assuring \$27,799,756 51, being a net gain for the year of 2,414 in number and \$3,898,709 87 in amount.

During the past twelve months the company has materially extended the area of its operations by opening branch offices in London, England, and elsewhere, and from these new fields it is expected that a steady and profitable business will hereafter be secured.

The financial statements hereto annexed give evidence of the rapid progress being made. The income from premiums, interest and rents amounted, after deducting reassurances, to \$1,240,483 12, an increase for the twelve months of \$105,615 51. An addition of \$598,076 02 has also been made to the assets, bringing them up to \$4,001, 776 90. The company has thus been able to add to its accumulations more than 55 per cent of the life premiums received during the year, a fact which speaks for itself. The surplus also shows a substantial increase, and now amounts to \$288,-595 65 over all liabilities and capital stock. This showing is especially gratifying in view of the fact that profits are now divided yearly on a large proportion of the company's policies, and the undistributed surplus cannot, therefore, accumulate as rapidly as under the old system, when gives us much pleasure in certifying to the

maturity. The investments continue to receive careful attention, and the directors have pleasure in bearing testimony to their high quality. All securities of a fluctuating character, such as railway stocks and bonds, bank stocks, etc., are studiously avoided. About 85 per cent of the invested assets consist of municipal debentures and first mortgages on real estate valued at considerable over \$6,000,000. The remainder comprises loans on the company's own policies, the company's head office building and other minor items. The real estate held as the result of foreclosure is only \$81,023 67, or about 2 per cent of the assets, and even this small amount has been decreasing year by year. And although the assets are thus in excellent condition, a substantial sum has, nevertheless, been written off to the credit of real estate and mortgage accounts as a precaution against any losses which may possibly arise in the future.

The return derived from these investments is as satisfactory as their security, the rate being 5.83 per cent on the average realized assets.

With this year the accident department practically disappears from our books. As explained in the last report, the policies of this branch were re-assured in the Canada Accident Assurance Company, as at Dec. 31, 1892, and hereafter the only accident premiums payable to the company will be the small amount due under policies which combine life and accident under one contract, as this class was not covered by the

re-assurance arrangements. The directors would add, in conclusion, that while the past progress and present position of the company are most gratifying to them, it is also true that there never was a time in its history when the outlook

for the future was so encouraging. The report of the committee of the board appointed to examine the securities is appended hereto, as also the usual certificate from the auditors.

The directers who retire this year are: Hon. A. W. Ogilvie, Mr. J. P. Cleghorn and Mr. Robert Anderson, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

Mr. Ross then briefly traced the history of the Separate School Act of 1863, and the amendments subsequently made thereto in regard to the status of voters, which amendments had been, he said, the natural result of the municipal development of the Province. Surely honorable gentlemen would not pretend that the act of 1863 was to remain as it was passed, and never to be amended, no matter what developments might take place elsewhere, or what necessities might arise in regard to the education of the children attending separate schools. (Mr. Meredith-Hear, hear.) The Legislature had full right, Mr. Ross maintained, to amend the Separate School Act by making any changes necessary to educating the children of Roman Catholics in every way



NATIONAL WOMEN'S COUNCIL.

A Brilliant Reception at Rideau Hall.

Important Resolutions Adopted by the Delegates-The Secretary's Report.

OTTAWA, April 12 .- There was a brilliant reception at Rideau Hall last evening to the delegates to the National Women's Council. The whole lower range of the hall was thrown open to the guests, while in the large ballroom a number of instrumental and vocal selections were given by local amateurs. Refreshments were served in the dining-room all evening. Their Excellencies and suite did everything possible to make the guests feel at home. The affair did not break up till midnight.

This forenoon's session of the National Council of Women was spent in discussion and adoption of resolutions, as follows: Favoring the promotion of patriotic feeling, and that the Provincial Governments

be asked to prepare a new and improved

history of Canada.

That the local councils unite in a petition to the Provincial Governments for the appointment of women inspectors for factories and workshops where women are

That all international disputes be settled by means of international arbitration. That all local councils take steps to obtain the appointment of a sufficient number of police matrons for female prisoners in their own districts, was carried.

Also that the council do all in its power to promote the introduction of a system of manual training for girls into the public school system of Canada, copies of the resclocion to be sent to the Ministers of Education of each Provincial Government.

The next annual meeting is to be held in eronte.

The secretary's report presented by Mrs. Willougnby Cummings, reviewed the hisory of the movement since the organization of the national council and the local councils, and submitted the amended constitution which had been passed by the executive yesterday. There are now affiliated with the local councils the following number of philarthropic, religious and other associations: I ronto, 23; Hamilton, 25; Montreal, 32; Octawa, 33, London, 11, and Winnipeg, 7. The report was adopted.

The proceedings of this afternoon's session consisted in the reading of a number of papers pertaining to many classes of work within woman's sphere. The conference was public and fully 500 people were present. His Excellency Lord Aberdeen and Lieut. Gov. Shultz of Manitoba attended the conference.

A crowded and enthusiastic meeting of the Women's National Council of Canada was held this evening. His Excellency the Governor-General proposed the first resolution, heartily indorsing the formation of the woman's council in the belief that it would conduce the welfare of the community by promoting greater unity of heart sympathy and purpose among the women workers of all sections and classes of the people. Lord Aberdeen made a most acceptable address, winning frequent and hearty applause. The resolution was seconded by Sir John Thompson. Principal Grant supported the resolution in an eloquent, humorous and forcible speech, and other resolutions and addresses followed. The whole of the proceedings were most successful and enthusiastic.

Hon. Wilfrid Laurier Criticises the Emasculated Tariff,

And Shows It To Be Inadequate and Insufficient.

Sir Charles Tupper's Recent Utterances Scathingly Dealt With.

It Costs \$2,000 Apiece to Graduate Cadets from Kingston Military College.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 12 .- Mr. Laurier on rising to resume the debate on the budget was loudly cheered. The Liberal leader began by alluding to Mr. McCarthy's speech of last night as one of the most remarkable he had ever heard in Parliament. It was, he said, a most comprehensive arraignment of the policy of the Government. In considering the question whether the changes in the tariff afforded a measure of relief, he declared that the measure was inadequate and insufficient. He characterized Mr. Foster's speech as a plea for the maintainance of the old tariff and yet the end of the speech was an inconsistent conclusion to destroy the old tariff to which it was claimed the country owed a great measure of prosperity. He could only attribute this inconsistency to a fear of the people. The Government found itself between two dangers the fear of the people and the fear of the beneficiaries of the tariff, and their conclusions were therefore inconsequential, halting, half-hearted and ineffective for the accomplishment of any good object. After a reference to the delusive promises of 1878 under the attractive policy of protection which was to increase the price of wheat, Mr. Laurier pointed out that the Conservatives now shirked responsibility for the low price of wheat by claiming that the price was regulated in England, a proposition contested on every platform in Canada in 1878, when it was put forward by the Liberals. As the prices of agricultural products were low in open competition with the world, the object of a Canadian tariff should be to add as little as possible to the price of manufactured goods consumed in Canada. This was the policy of the Liberal party and was easily understood. Alluding to the speech of Sir Charles Tupper, he strongly condemned the assertion of the Minister of Marine that England under free trade had declined so low as to be reduced to force her wares upon uncivilized communities by force of arms. This, in indignant tones, Mr. Laurier denounced as a slander upon the fair name of a great nation and an insult to England such as was sometimes seen on the pages of continental pamphlets, but nowhere else, and this, too, from such a source. The slander had fallen from the lips of a Tory who had only recently been

In conclusion, Mr. Laurier made the following declaration in impassioned tones: "Speaking in my matured years, and under convictions formed after deep reflection and thought, I am voicing the sentiments of all Liberals in the country, that whether the future relations between Canada and England remain unchanged or bacome closer or looser, it shall always be our aim to cultivate, maintain and promote in the most friendly manner the most ample trade relations with the great nation which, notwithstanding the taunt of honorable gentlemen opposite, is to-day by all odds the greatest and foremost nation the world has ever seen." shown up. Engineer Graynon-That portion relating to wagons having precedence might as well be struck out.

Chairman Jones-I think so, too. The engineer went on to tell of a bylaw that the city of Toronto was thinking of adopting. In it the speed was limited to eight miles an hour, bicyclists must register and pay a license of 50 cents, carry bells and lanterns.

McCarthy and O'Brien are against the Government, and Mr. Calvin is uncerain, as he voted last year for Sir Richard Cartwright's amendment. Messrs. Mac-Donnell and McKeen are Conservatives. The absentees do not therefore alter the result, and 56 may be taken as the full majority of the Government. Gloucester, N. B., is vacant. There was a very full vote. There were 200 voted out of 215 members. On the occasion of the division on the Jesuit estates resolution there were 201, or only one more. The following members were paired for the amendment: Mulock, Livingstone, Bowman and Bourassa. Against the amendment: Corbould, Barnard, Hughes and Baird. This was the first division of the session. The Govern-

ment had a majority of seven more last session in a full House. The railway committee this morning passed the bill extending the time for the construction of the Canada and Michigan Tunnel until the year 1900. This is the first act of Parliament extending its jurisdiction into the twentieth century. Dr. Montague had charge of the bill.


