### **BAVARIA IS REPORTED** TO HAVE BROKEN OFF RELATIONS WITH THE BERLIN GOVERNMENT

Munich Dispatch Transmitted Via Copenhagen, Tells of Break Between German State and National Government.

London, Nov. 28.—Bavaria has broken relations with the Berlin Government, according to a Munich message transmitted by the Central News correspondent at Copenhagen.

The Munich dispatch states that a message has been sent to the Berlin foreign office, Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian premier, stating that the Bavarian foreign office breaks its relations with Berlin, owing to the efforts of Berlin to deceive the people by withholding the truth about conditions.

London, Nov. 27 .- In an election manifesto the British Labor party warns the coalition Government against opposing the new European democracies, and demands the immediate withdrawal of allied forces from Russia, free trade, the nationalization of lands, mines, rail-ways extensive armaments and electric. ways, shipping, armaments and electric power. The party also demands that taxes be levied on capital, and that there be a complete abolition of conscription.

Members at Border Cities Protest Appointment of Sandwich Postmaster.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Windsor. Nov. 28 .- Members of the Border Cities' Great War Veterans' Association, stirred to action by the appointment of John H. Charlton to the postmastership at Sandwich, and what they regard as the unfair attitude of the Government in not giving a returned soldier the preference, at their meeting Wednesday night passed a strong resolution calling upon the authorities at Ottawa to publish definite and standing orders that suitable returned men be appointed to any and every Government position for which they are at present qualified, or could qualify for within a reasonable time. The passing of the resolution unanimously was accompanied by a general discussion of a warm nature. Members of the association claimed the salary had been raised from \$1,100 to \$1,600 per annum, and that the increase had not been made until after the smaller salary had been quoted to the veterans. ## KING GEORGE IS TO REACH PARIS THIS AFTERNOON

Will Be Given on His Arrival.

Paris, Wednesday, Nov. 27.—King George, who arrived today at the French port of Boulogne, en route to Paris, and drove to Montreuil, British general headquarters, for the night, is expected to reach Paris at 2:30 o'clock Thursday The arrangements provide for the King's reception at the small station at the principal gate of the Bois de Boulogne. The avenues leading to the Place de la Concorde and across the river to the ministry of foreign affairs, transformed during the King's stay into a royal palace, will be lined with eight French regiments, chosen from among those who fought during the war in close conjunction with the British army.

## WHISKEY RUNNERS AND POLICE ENGAGE IN BATTLE TO DEATH

Two Killed Several Injured D uring Gun Fight-Sacks Full of Whiskey Are Cap tured by Detectives.

Toledo, Nov. 28.—Two men are dead, several others wounded, and seven Detroit men are under arrest, following a gun battle here last night between railroad police and fifteen or more whiskey runners from Michigan, a dry state. The dead are: L. L. McCracken, 30 years old, a railway detective, and Tishon Lawachik of Detroit.

## **EX-KAISER CAN** BE EXTRADITED FROM HOLLAND

Prof. Bathelemy of Paris Gives
Opinion on Subject.

Paris, Nov. 26.—William Hohenzollern can be extradited, in the opinion of Professor Bathelemy of the Paris law faculty, who explains that his guiding principle is that when there is an apparent conflict between law and common sense, the solution is always found by following the latter. The theory that a political crime is any crime inspired by purely political motives, the professor declares, has long been abandoned. He notes that Belgium, in 1856, classed regetides among common law criminals.

Crimes such as the assassinations of contents of the c Crimes such as the assassinations of President Carnot of France and King Humbert of Italy were inspired by political motives, he points out, and yet the authors of them were executed. The atrocities ordered by former Emperor William, the professor coninued, are con of war by international law, and con-stitute common law crimes. To main-tain that they are not, because the object for which they were committed was political, is, he argues, an ab-surdity.







### MISSION PROBLEM IN CANADA BIGGEST ANY NATION FACES

Presbyterian Forward Movement Leaders Discuss Plans.

MANY NEW SUGGESTIONS

Conference Committee Will Be Enlarged-Will Frame Recommendations.

The magnitude of the missionary program of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, both home and foreign, was impressed in a striking manner by three speakers representing the church's forward movement at a large gathering held under the auspices of the London Presbytery in First Presbyterian Sunday School room yesterday afternoon.

Rev. Dr. Robert Martin of Stratford told of the responsibility assumed by the church, the evangelization and enlightenment of 15,000,000 non-Christians in foreign lands, or double the population of Canada.

Mrs. McKerrol of Toronto, speaking on behalf of the work of the Women's Missionary Society, the first woman who ever addressed the London Presbytery, declared, "God Almighty has given to Canada one of the biggest problems any nation has ever had to face."







This will not be accomplished without a fight, but the sentiment of the nation as a whole will be with the premier.

No English statesman of recent times seems to have so clearly diagnosed England's internal troubles or so aggressively and effectively furnished remedies. Having soundly trounced the Hun he is again rolling up his sleeves to take a fresh fall out of conditions that are responsible for much misery and unhappiness. Old England, which has so magnificently contributed to the making of the new and happier world that is looming up, must look to her own cleanliness and decency, and no better man could be found to lead the drive against poverty distress and wretchedness at home than the courageous, tenacious and resourceful Lloyd George.

#### NOT TRUSTING THE HUN.

T IS REASSURING to learn that the Entente leaders are taking no chances with the Huns. The announcement that an Allied squadron will enter Kiel and Wilhelmshaven to see that armistice instructions as to disarming are carried out proves that the victors consider the late drawn, and the world will see to it that she enemy the same old untrustworthy Prussian. A doesn't get a new set. chivalrous decent foe, whose word could be depended upon would be spared much humiliation. Such lying blackguards as the Germans have shown themselves, compels the Allies to take the only safe course, that is to back up every demand and agreement with ever-present physical force. For a time there was a fear throughout the Entente world that its war chiefs would loosen somewhat their grip on the enemy's powers to do mischief. But it is evident that "treat 'em rough' is still to be the motto of the German war lords' tamers. Beatty by sea and Foch, Haig and Pershing by land will keep up a steady, relentless pressure that will in time exact from Germany every condition forced upon her by the Allied triumph. Germany's word for it that the armistice agreement is being carried out will not be sufficient. Berlin's bond is worthless.

It is well that the Allies are taking the stand that the enemy cannot be trusted in the slightest. Treachery of the blackest kind has been used by Germany at every turn during the four years of war, and it is not to be supposed that overnight she has been reformed. Germany has been conquered, but not converted, and it will be only the ceaseless policing of the Entente that will prevent a resumption of the old ways. It is not to be supposed that the militarists in Germany have been entirely stripped of their mischief-making powers. The pan-German and the junker, the whole Potsdam-Essen gang, will continue to plot and plan for a "come back." There is undoubtedly an element in Germany today sincerely striving for a decent democracy, but the broad masses of the Thy children sing, with one accord, nation have been intensively educated to follow blin ily the "shining sword," and it is on this the Fair are thy lands which spread from sea to sea. monarchists will rely in their attempts to restore the old regime. EVILS OF POLITICAL CONTROL. NDER the caption "Placeholders by the

Million," the New York Post points out some grave dangers that threaten the United States through the Government's taking over of telephones, telegraphs, railways, express companies, etc. It might be well for the rulers at Ottawa to consider the following criticism of a state of things which to some extent is taking place in this country.

"If so worthy and useful an organiization as the National Civil Service Reform League will forgive us for saying so, the decision of its executive committee to appoint a special committee to devise a plan to keep 'the evils of political control' out of the railroad, telegraph, telephone, cable and express services so long as the Government runs them contemplates altogether too weak a remedy against an enormous danger. If the State Socialists at Washington are allowed to have their way and continue in peace the Government's administration of the great services of transportation and communication; if those two million or more of employees are to become civil servants, the introduction of civil service rules will not prevent nor palliate the use of those millions as a political machine.

"It would be difficult to dislodge an administration and a congress that satisfied the demands of this army of employees. A government in charge of the telegraph and cable system could manufacture and direct or color news and opinions. Its well-paid and continually growing force of two million could be depended upon not to strike the hand

'The National Civil Service Reform League does well to call public attention to 'the grave danger to popular institutions existing' in government administration of these vast and vital public activities; but the right and only sure way of avoiding 'political control' is to end as soon as possible, subject to existing engagements, government control of those activities. It is poison to democratic self-government."

The Vital Tests.

When a little blood from a healthy individual is drawn and put in a tube with a little salt and oxalic acid, it prevents it from clotting. If a little chloride of lime is now mixed with it, the blood clots in about twelve minutes. Into such a mixture, bits of various tissues were dropped and the time for a clot to form was checked off.

In from four to six and a half minutes a clot appeared even in the hemophilic's blood with bits of heart, kidney, brain, adrenals, muscle and other

minutes.

Evidently from these new researches the use of bits of frozen heart, brain, kidney or muscle tissue applied to the bleeding surface or injected into the skin will have an excellent effect upon the clotting power of the blood. In the matter of hemophilia, it should be tried without loss of time.





## **BECK METHODS** NOT PLEASING TO ALL DELEGATES

Ingersoll Mayor and Hamilton Manager Voice Objections to Laudatory Motion.

ASK INDEPENDENT PROBE

Not Satisfied With Clarkson Hydro Audit - Also Want Engineers to Take Look.

TORONTO, Nov. 27.-At a meeting of the executive of the Ontario Municipal Electric Association, held in the city hall today, Mayor Buchanan of Ingersoll, supported by I. E. Sifton, Hamilton, presented a resolution to the effect that the association request permission to appoint an independent auditor and engineer to investigate the books and affairs of the Provincial Hydro-Electric Commission and report back to the association.

"I am doing this," said Mr. Buchanan, "so that we can personally, as an association, refute the charges against hydro on the authority of our own investigation."

An amendment put by W. K. Sanderson of St. Thomas, that no action be taken until the Clarkson audit, made recently, be received and considered, was adopted.

There were only two votes for the original motion by Mayor Buchanan and Mr. Sifton.

Refuse Pat on Back.

The discussion started when Mayor Church, who presided, submitted a motion of thanks to Sir Adam Beck, "for the splendid part played by the hydroduring the war," and congratulating Sir Adam on his own efforts. 'Absolutely nothing doing," said Mr.

during the war," and congratulating Sir Adam on his own efforts.

"Absolutely nothing doing," said Mr. Sifton.

Mayor Buchanan: "It is time we stopped congratulating and started a little criticism. I am willing to give credit to Sir Adam Beck for what he has done in the past, but I do not think he has acted quite right in the past two years. Manufacturers using hydro power are not pleased, and Sir Adam did not co-operate with Sir Henry Drayton as much as he should have done. I object to a man being told that he is a liar when he goes to the provincial commission. Sir Adam Beck seems to have come to the conclusion that he can put down opposition in any way he likes."

Mr. Pocock Satisfied.

Mr. Sanderson: "Sir Adam Beck has done well, and the hydro has done well during these war years."

Mr. Sifton: "I maintain that the record of the hydro can only be indersed by an independent auditor."

Philip Pocock, London, said he was satisfied with the Clarkson audit. "It refutes all the charges."

Mr. Sifton: "I am not satisfied with an audit alone. I want an independent investigation by an engineer as well," Resolutions Passed.

Among the resolutions carried are: "That this association places itself on record as being in favor of all municipalities, commissions, and public service bodies giving preference in employment to the returned soldiers."

A motion that the Provincial Government be petitioned not to allow the Federal Government to alienate or claim any surplus waters of Ontario, as same are the sole property of the people of this province and should be retained for the benefit of the people to be administered by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, was carried unanimously.

A suggestion that a publicity man should be appointed to let the public know what the association was doing was favorably received.

#### BRITISH SEAMEN TO SERVE THANKSGIVING FEAST TO U.S. TARS

LONDON, Nov. 27 .- Via Reuter's .-The British admiralty has sent instructions to all bases directing that United States paval units be entertained on Thanksgiving Day, tomorrow. Crews of the five ships in the American battle squadron will be the guests of the men of the five British squadrons.

In London Thanksgiving services will be held at St. Martin's Church, Trafalgar Square, and in Westminster Cathedral. Four hundred men from American units will have lunch at Albert Hall, an equal number of British seamen acting as hosts.

#### MONTREAL HERALD IN HANDS OF RECEIVER

MONTREAL. Nov. 27.—The Herald today publishes the following:
"During the past four and a half years the newspaper of the world have been compelled to carry heavy burdens. The cost of every item of the administration has risen by leaps and bounds until the total cost has been for a long time, out of all proportion to the revenue. Hundreds of newspapers have suspended publication; hundreds of others have been merged with other journals. with other journals.

"The Herald finds the increasing cost and the accumulated burden beyond endurance, and submitted to a receivership."

#### 60 Times as Many Guns Taken in Three Months As Britain Had in 1914

LONDON, Nov. 28.—(Canadian Press dispatch from Reuter's, Limited.)—In the course of a second speech at Wolverhampton, Premier Lloyd George, referring to Britain's enormous industrial effort mentioned that the guns we had been using for the last 20 years were guns nobody ever dreamed would be taken except for siege purposes. He remembered how great soldiers had scoffed at the idea that such heavy guns could be dragged to battlefields. At the end of the war we had 200 times as many of these guns as we had at the beginning. We captured 60 times as many German guns in the last quarter as we possessed at the beginning of the war.





#### **OUERIES REGARDING** MILITARY SERVICE

Address Your Problems to the Milltary Editor of The Advertiser and They W I Be Answered From Off cial Information.

FARMER. Q.—I am 25 years of age and am exempted as long as I remain larming. When this work is finished am I at liberty to work at whatever capacity I desire?

whatever capacity I desire?

A.—No. You are permitted to work at lumbering or other necessary work during the winter months and should notify the deputy registrar of any change of address. You will likely be allowed to work as you desire in the near future when your case will be struck off the records of the deputy registrar. Until then it would be advisable for you to obey regulations under the military service act, which has not yet been totally suspended.

RETURNED SOLDIER .- The mil-RETURNED SOLDIER.—The mil-itary authorities here have informed The London Advertiser that all sol-diers who are sent home from over-seas and discharged as minors are not entitled to receive three months' post discharge pay, and therefore, you will have no claim for same, as this orders covers your case.

T. H. E. Q.—I have been in the Canadian Engineers in this city for two months, and have now been dis-charged. Ten dollars had been decharged. Ten dollars had been de-ducted from my pay for my uniform, and on discharge I was informed by the paymaster that I had forfelted the ten dollars, although I had a kit clearance on discharge, and was never deficient in any way. If I am entitled to the ten dollars, to whom should I apply for a refund?

should I apply for a refund?

A.—If the facts are as you state and your kit was never deficient you are entitled to the ten dollars, which is part of your own pay held until discharge to cover deficiencies. If your paymaster refuses to pay same, write with full facts of the case to the A. A. G., M. D. No. 1, Wolseley Barracks, London, Ont., winking your regimental number, rank giving your regimental number, rank, and name, and the case will be investigated and all moneys due you refunded.

SUESCRIBER. Q.-I have a son who died in the Canadian army while proceeding overseas. His body is buried in Liverpool, England, and i wish to bring the remains home to Canada. To whom would i apply for permission to do this?

A.—Write a letter, with full facts of case (son's regimental number, unit, rank, name and date of death) to the District Intelligence Officer, Wolseley District Intelligence Officer, Wolseley Barracks, London, Ont., and he will advise you as to correct procedure in or-der to facilitate matters as you desire.





Via Hamilton, Brantford, Woodstock and Ingersoll.

UNDECIDED

Sir William Hearst, premier of Ontario, and Hon. F. G. MacDiarmid, minister of public works and highways, received the visitors, J. C. Elliott, M.P.P., of West Middlesex, introduced the deputation.

A. H. M. Graydon of London, Wardens D. A. Graham of Caradoc, and Annett of Lambton, were chosen by London and Middlesex and Lambton Counties to place the claims of the above route before the Government. Other speakers representing all the municipalities from Hamilton to Windsor also spoke on behalf of what is known as the middle route.

Mayor C. R. Somerville stated on his return, that the deputation was cordially received by the premier and minister of public works and highways. It was said to be the largest and most enthusiastic that has graced the Queen's Park legislative halls for years.

Of this number approximately 250,000 will pass through the American lines, and will be fed by the Americans. Most of the quarter of a million prisoners are French. English, Italian and American soldiers. The army, assisted by the Salvation Army and the Young Men's Christian Association and the Knights of Columbus, is shouldering the bulk of the task.

## POLES CHARGED WITH SACKING

LEMBERG CITY Country Can Pay War Debts | Correspondent of Berlin Paper Says Murder Followed

Capture.

OFFICIALS ARE HELPLESS Jews Leaped From Burning Buildings and Were Later

Slaughtered. Berlin, Wednesday, Nov. 27—(By the Associated Press).—The charge that the Poles, after capturing Lemburg, the Galician capital, sacked the Jewish quarter, where the victims numbered several thousand, is made by the Lemberg correspondent of the Berlin Tageblatt, who says he left the Galician city on November 24. He telegraphs his newspaper from Breslau as follows:


