Have Invented a Newer and Better Way of Flying.

MAY ELIMINATE MOTOR

Develop Method of Soaring Birds De.

Kitty Hawk, N. C. Oct. 3.-Wilbur and Orville Wright are preparing to onduct a series of aeroplane experiments at this place which are expected to be as revolutionary in effect as the historic trials they made here almost ten years ago.

While they are keeping secret the exact nature of the experiments they will make, it is known they believe they have arrived at a solution of the problem how to fly with a minimum of artificial power. In other words, they have elaborated upon the work they originally started here and believe that they can approximately achieve flight with the coaring wing motion

This has been the dream of aeroplane inventors ever since artificial flight first became a scientific study. Lillenthal Langley and others knew for years that it was possible to fly

Real Secret Sought by All. Real Secret Sought by An.

The real secret that they sought was to fly with very little power. To achieve the soaring power of birds practically means that man can skim through the air for hours like a guilt and make the flight from coast to coast with very few stops.

The Wrights have been studying this problem ever since they began to

The Wrights have been studying this problem ever since they began to work on aeroplanes. Their development of the machine they are now producing was simply a step in the evolution of the craft they hope now to perfect.






