ECONOMY IS URGED

Senator Fowler of the Opinion That Terms Imposed on Germany Are Severe Enough.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.-The address in

reply to the speech from the throne

was moved in the Senate yesterday by Senator Nicholls, seconded by Senator Fowler, and spoken to by Senator Bostock, Sir James Lougheed and Senator Domville. Senator Nicholls declared that the present session of parliament marks an epoch in the advancement of Canada to a dignified position among the great nations of the world. For the first time in the history of this country we have departed from the status of a colony and entered upon the status of one of the great powers. He hoped that terms of peace might be speedily ratified, so that in Canada the work of rebuilding and production might go more rapidly forward. He counselled national and personal economy as a means to this end. The government should set an example to the people in the matter of thrift and economy.

Senator Fowler seconded the address, and, referring to the treaty, said that he could not agree with those who held that Germany was getting off too lightly. The terms were sufficiently severe, and it remained only for them to be carried out, which would be done if the league of nations did its duty.

Senator Bostock's Opinion.

Referring to the peace treaty, Senator Bostock noted that Canada had been admitted to the league of nations as a member, but was not likely to have a representative upon the council of nine, which would be the source of action and decision for the nations of the league. BOARD EXPECTED TO FIX A MAXIMUM PRICE FOR SUGAR

Figure in All Probability Will Be Set At 11 1-2 Cents a Pound.

RETAILERS' PROFIT

More Than That Charged Wholesalers.

Montreal, Sept. 3.-The board of commerce will probably fix a maximum price for sugar for both the whole saler and retailer within the next day or two in order to mitigate the effects of the alarmist statements that were sent out from the wholesale grocers' convention recently, that sugar would go to eighteen or more cents a pound in the near future, it was learned pound in the near future, it was learned here today.

The probability is that the maximum price for the wholesalers will be '1½c a pound, and that retailers will be allowed to charge one cent per pound more than the wholesale price, jlus the freight charges as fixed by the standardized freight rate book issued every six months. The price which the wholesaler will pay will be the same as he pays the refineries, as he is allowed a five percent discount on his order, and the general rule will be that the retailer is allowed double the amount of the discount allowed the wholesaler, to count as his profit and

Ottawa, Sept. 3.-Mr. D. D. McKenzie, Liberal House leader, has given notice that he will move on Thursday for the appointment of a parliamentary committee to investigate the charges of alleged manipulation of the soldier votes during the last election.

Mr. McKenzie's proposed resolution reads: "Whereas, the following telegram was dispatched in code from Winipeg by Hon. Arthur Meighen, one of the ministers of the crown, to Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden, premier of Canada, on or about the 30th

TENANTS INDIGNANT **ABOUT CONDITION OF** HOMES THEY RENT

Ask Council To Investigate Their Complaints.

OWNER TELLS HIS SIDE

Question Referred to Inspectors of Building and Health Departments.

That returned soldiers are being made the victims of real estate agents and landlords, and are being compelled to live in houses which are worse than the trenches of France, was the charge made to the city council by Sergt .-Major Cresswell, secretary of the Grand Army of Canada, last night. He urged that the council take immediate steps to relieve the house shortage so that soldiers would have an opportunity to leave the undesirable houses.

A petition was presented from a number of tenants of William Scarrow asking that the council investigate the condition of their houses on Dundas street west. Sergt. Tustin, one of the tenants, declared that his family had to hold umbrellas over their heads when dining; this condition had been remedied somewhat and the rain now came in only one room instead of four. Seven different kinds of wall-paper adorn the kitchen walls, he said, and the flooring is so thin that his daughter nearly fell through it into the cellar. Only one door in the house will lock and the front door is fastened with a nail, he declared. He labored two days to clear the old tomato cans from the rear door, and then had to use empty ammunition boxes as backdoor steps.

Mr. Scarrow appeared to defend his property. He said the houses were as good as any others in the city renting for \$14 or \$15, and that all his tenants had considered them suitable until they were occupied by "a few disgruntled cockneys." He denied profiteering, and said he was willing to give any profits in excess of 3 per cent to any charitable organization.

STEEL SITUATION BECOMES MORE SETTLED IN U.S.A.

Markets Show Tendency To Come Down-Business Brisk.

THE world to-day is staggering with debt. Some of the leading countries are verging on bankruptcy. The British pound shrunk from \$4.86 to as low as \$4.121 in New York and the Canadian dollar to 95 cents.

Mr. Fisher's Letter

Mr. Fisher has sent us a letter which is pub fished in another column, objecting to comment on his speech at the Liberal meeting and requests further "editorial enlightening." We said the Hearst Government should not be blamed in any way for the failures of the Toronto companies, the Dominion Permanent and the Standard Re-

The Dominion Permanent was organized by the Hon. J. R. Stratton when he was provincial secretary in the Ross Government. These companies and the law relating to them were in his department. He was president of the company from the time of its incorporation until his death. The stock was subscribed for and the debenture debt and other liabilities incurred in his lifetime. The company had more extensive powers conferred on it than ordinary loan companies and investments in railway securities in British Columbia formed the principal investment from the beginning. Mr. Fisher will not blame the Hearst Government up to this time.

The law relating to building societies and loan corporations has been substantially the same for over fifty years. It has been from time to time altered and amended. The law under which the old loan companies in London, the Huron & Erie, the Ontario Loan and Debenture, the Dominion Savings, the London Loan and the People's Loan were incorporated antedates confederation. Returns are made annually, and the companies to which Mr. Fisher referred made their returns in accordance with the law to the provincial secretary's department. The officials, who surance is no longer looked upon as a gamble, but are able, experienced, competent men, could find no fault with the returns.

In one paragraph Mr. Fisher says "What are officers of the Government for if not to safeguard the shareholders, depositors and debenture-holders of these companies?
