Foresees an Early Return to Real Normalcy in the Dominion.

"I can hardly conceive the railroad men of America actually bringing on a general strike as is promised. Should they do so they must certainly lose, in which event they will set organized labor back thirty years or more. The open shop will eventually follow."

So declared John G. Jones of New York vice-president of the Alexander Hamilton Institute, and lecturer of the Case School of Applied Science, discusse-ing Monday, the general labor situation roughout the United States and Can-Mr. Jones is a practical theorist. In

short, he is no arm-chair critic, but has a wealth of real experience upon which e bases his outlook for the future. He has not always held an executive posi-tion at the Hamilton Institute, nor has he confined his seemingly unlimited energy to a class-room at the Case School.
Upon the other hand, his experiences excepting the last ten years, when he settled down in New York City, have been wide and unusually varied. He has worked and traveled extensively through every section of the Dominion of Canada and the United States.

Was Born in Wales.
Coming to the new world at the age of 18 from his home in Wales, he located in Manitoba and for some years ongaged in farm work not far from Do minion City. Later succumbing to the spirit of adventure and travel he set out with no definite destination in view. But coming as he originally did from the mining district of the old country it was logical for him to drift irresistibly


