Rev. Bruce Hunter. "I am decidedly not in sympathy with Bishop Williams' stand. It's a big surprise to me. His views are among the best I have heard of."

Rev. John Garbutt. "Although I am heartily in favor of prohibition, I hesitate to make any extensive comment on Bishop Williams' statements now. But I do think that the prohibition which is being proposed is consistent with the teachings of Jesus Christ."

Rev. A. E. M. Thomson. "He who opposes prohibition opposes the kingdom of Christ. That's my stand. I do not know what authority Bishop Williams has for saying that it is not consistent with the teachings of Christ."

Rev. R. J. Murphy. "I cannot see where Bishop Williams' prohibition is based on his statements from the New Testament. Prohibition is the best of blessings."

Rev. A. Burgess. "My views are very far from those of Bishop Williams. The underlying principle of prohibition is the most commendable. I am opposed to open saloons and think that the O. T. A. is a move in the right direction, but I am opposed to give a complete comment at the present time."

SPLENDID RESULTS OF SIGHT-SAVING PLAN ARE TOLD

Trustee Mrs. Rose Explains Work of Classes to the Members of Board.

RECOMMENDED HERE

Trustee Mrs. Rose of the local board of education, in explaining to the board of the use of sight-saving classes in the schools and in recommending their introduction in the city schools, said that in the places where they had been used they had effected a saving in the vision of every pupil in the class.

The second of these classes was opened in the Orde Street School in Toronto in 1921, and the record of this class shows that of the twenty-seven pupils enrolled, several children registered a marked improvement, some showed no change, whereas without this special class they would probably have had a declining vision, and in general, educational authorities believe that the class has effected a great saving in the eyesight of children.

Statistics are yet too meagre, and quite possibly may vary too much between different communities in which local conditions are dissimilar, to make it possible to state with any accuracy the number or proportion of children who are saved from blindness by the sight-saving class provision.

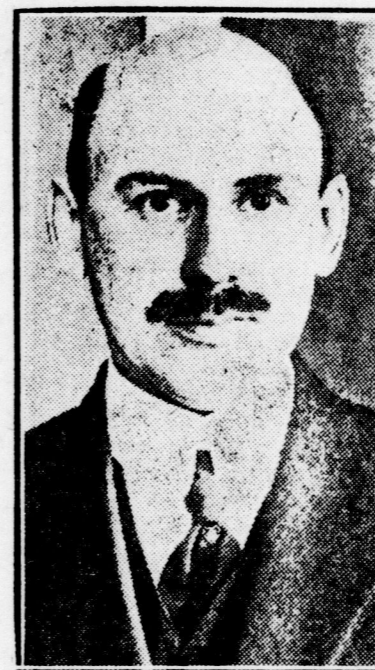

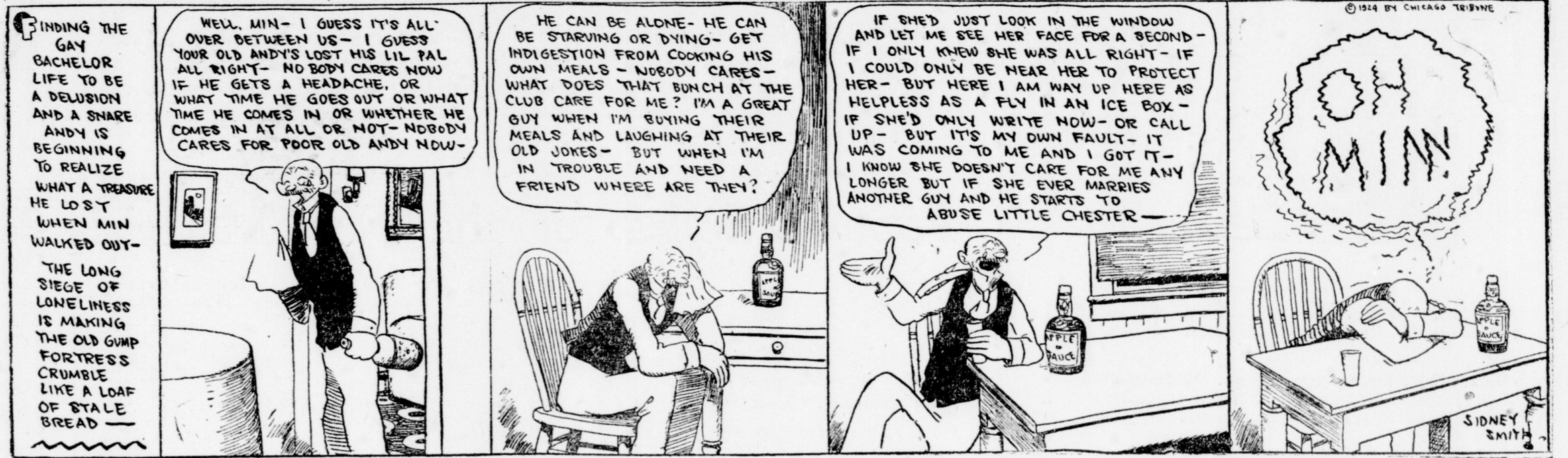
L. J. Laidner (Conservative, S. Vancouver) believed the budget disregarded Canadian industries and that it was a stab at the industrial life of British Columbia.

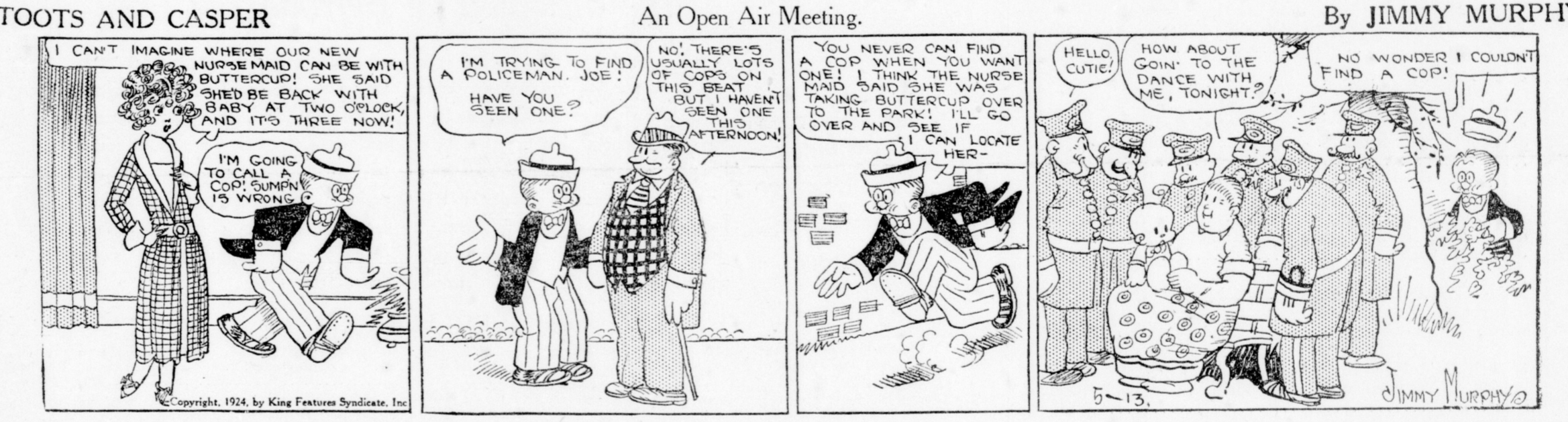

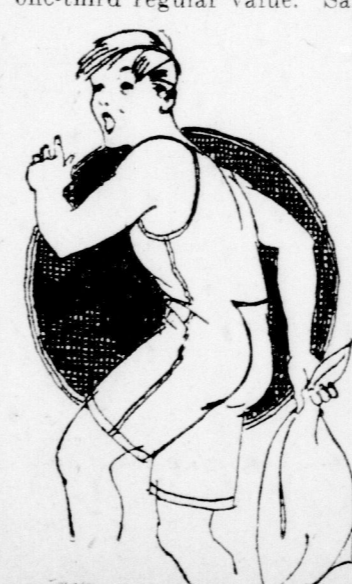
