## ALD. M'COIG WAR MEANS

Chancellor of the Exchequer Preparing British People for Inevitable.

ntimates That Next Year He May Have to Ask the People to Bear Even Greater Burden.

London, Nov. 4.-What is regarded as an important announcement, preparing the people of Great Britain for new taxes and fresh loans, was made to-night by the Chancellor, of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, in speech at Bristol.

After alluding to the enormous inncrease in the ordinary expenditures of the government, he reviewed the war taxes, and said that the ever-in-creasing demand of the national ex-chequer gave reasons for careful thought and even anxiety for the fu-

"The cost of the war in South Africa is enormous," said Sir Michael "It still drags on. It may be, when next year comes, that I may have so ask the people of this country to bear even greater burdens and to make even greater sacrifices."

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach announced

that the government was communicating with the authorities in South Africa with a view to a change of the situation of the concentration camps and to an amelioration of their condi-

# ENVELOPED IN

Business is Almost Suspended Throughout London and Half the Kingdom.

ways Deranged-Scenes

London, Nov. 4.-A fog such as Great Britain has not experienced for years enveloped London and half of the United Kingdom to-day, blockading shipping, deranging railways and throwing business in London, Birmingham and other provincial cities into confusion. So dense was it that a walk into the streets was an adven-

ture. The fog descended upon the streets of the metropolis and the sub-urbs so thickly that between four and five o'clock in the afternoon the principal avenues of traffic resembled the steam room of a Turkish bath. Hundreds of thousands of London's suburban population vainly endeavored to grope their way to the railway sta-tions. The few who succeeded found the trains all stalled. Around Trafalgar Square and the Houses of Parlia-ment, scenes unparalleled for years were witnessed. Hundreds of omnibuses, cabs, carts and wagons formed an inextricable and immovable mass. The mounted police, in trying to clear away the jam, got lost themselves. Many vehicles were in collision. The drivers, not knowing where they were, stood at the heads of their horses, patiently awaiting the lifting of the premature darkness. Lanterns were at a premium. Newsboys transformed r papers into temporary torches. Highwaymen pursued their vocation. Casualties were frequent and even hardened Londoners freely expressed a dread of the continuation of such

fogs, which to-day reached a climax.

If the fog had not lifted somewhat
toward night London would have been so situated that the housing resources so situated that the housing resources, commodious as they are, would have been taxed beyond their limits by the forced accommodation of the fogbound suburbanites. Among children and old people the deleterious effect of such a fog can scarcely be estimated. ### CANADA'S NEWS SERVICE.

Reference was made yesterday in these columns to the miserable foreign news service of Canadian newspapers and to the colored Anti-Brit ish rot which is too often carelessly dished up by Canadian editors. There is no doubt that this is a decided detriment to the Motherland as well as to Canada. The reason why the Canadian newspapers cannot command a really good, reliable service of news from abroad, and especially from Great Britain, is on account of the exceeding cost of collecting and transmitting news. Canadian newspapers cannot afford it. But it seems to us that it would

repay the Canadian Government a thousand fold if it would assist the Canadian newspapers generously in securing a direct and reliable firstclass news service from abroad and especially from Great Britain. We are sure that every daily newspaper in Canada and most of the weekly papers would assist in a combination to secure this reliable news service. The Canadian newspapers are, as whole, at present struggling pluckily against big odds. Few of them are making the money which their efforts deserve. The customs tariff bears with especial heaviness upon them, and the last straw was the reimposition of newspaper postage.

Canada ought to have a direct for eign news service by cable, pure and undefiled by contact with the hostile news agencies of the United States. This is obvious to all Canadians, and we think that the Canadian Government would be well justified in materially assisting the newspapers of Canada to secure a good direct cable service from Great Britain, for the general good of Canada and Canalians.—Brockville Times.

### BRITISH POLITICS.

A high tribute to the cleanliness of

British politics is 'paid' by A. L. Hayes, of Illinois, who recently passed through Washington, says a correspondent on his way home after a proonged visit to Great Britain. He said: "In one particular, at least we Americans must take off our hats to England, and that is in regard to clean politics. Over there such a thing as municipal corruption is almost unknown, while here, I suppose Washington is about the only city where the boodle politician does not predominate in municipal affairs. In England I believe the people would almost mob an office-holder who submitted to bribery or to bad influences of any kind, I inquired the cause of clean politics there, and found it is the result of the intense interest all the people take in public affairs. No matter what question is up, whether it is the election of a member of parliament, or simply some local affair, everybody votes. The records show that at every election 90 per cent of the voters of the community cast their ballots, and in some instances the percentage runs as high as ninetyfour or ninety-six. Public questions are actively discussed by every one In this country it is impossible to ge the people to vote. They are too busy running after dollars. They do not seem to care who is their mayor, or governor, In fact, they show a lamentable apathy, even regarding the Presidency unless some particularly important question is up for consideration." There is a pointer for Canadians as well as for Americans in the above, for it is an increasing task in Canada to get the vote out. With a really healthy opinion the vote should come out spontaneously.



### CHEAP STATUETTES.

HOW THEY ARE MADE, HARDENED, FINISHED AND COLORED.

Italians From Tuscany Excel the World In Their Production-The Demand For These Casts That Comes From Our Schools.

While it is not difficult to secure good American workmen for carrying out chemes of interior decorations, it is impossible yet to get native born men capable of modeling statuettes and busts such as are sold on the street corners and in many of the art shops. All the workmen employed in factories that produce these are Italians, chiefly from Tuscany. This is equally true of those who follow this trade in Germany and France. The Tuscans appear to have a natural ability for that sort of work that has given them the nonopoly of it.

The great majority of these busts and statuettes are copied directly from the originals wherever they happen to be, and then the molds are made from that copy and sent to all parts of the world. the statues being cast in the place where they are to be sold. In the larger shops in New York city, however, a certain amount of original work is done in order to keep pace with the popular demand for representations of the hero of the hour. A great many of our most distinguished poets, authors and statesmen whose busts are exposed for sale on the street corners never sat for these portraits. Some workman modeled the head after a photograph and occasionally has produced such good work that it is almost a pity the sculptor's name should remain un-

The chief purchasers of these casts from the larger makers are the high schools all over the country. They demand, of course, not only classical subjects and copies of ancient bas-reliefs and architectural details, but also busts of famous men and women from every period of the world's history. Such wide range of subjects is covered by this demand that seven and eight thousand titles are included in some of the catalogues issued. The factories where these figures are turned out exhibit in their showrooms an assortment and confusion of time, place and nature bewildering to look at.

The process of casting these statuettes is a comparatively simple one when the mold is once completed. The material used, plaster of paris, is cheap, and a very excellent quality is produced in this country. When the statuette comes out, it is pure white and covered with ridges made by the different sections of the mold. These ridges are carefully removed, and then the cast is placed in an oven heated at about 180 degrees. After it has been baked for a certin length of time it is plunged into a solution of stearic acid and kept there until thoroughly saturated. Then, when it has dried, the yellow color is gained by applying to the surface a solution of beeswax, turwill not wash off, and, of course, any

shade can be produced at will. "The demand for nude statues in the art schools is growing less every year," said one of the largest makers of these casts. "That is because people are realizing more and more that artists must draw from the human figure itself if they wish to understand the human form. We get more orders now for draped figures in the art schools and for busts in the high schools. Until very recently the busts of most of the celebrated Americans which we sell had been made in Italy from photographs sent over from this country, and many mistakes occurred in matters of detail, like the cut of the coats and collars. We are trying to do these now in a more modern and characteristic way and occasionally have been furnished with photographs by their

The statuettes which are carried about the streets wrapped in harmonious yellow tissue paper or are displayed on the sidewalks or on the steps of unoccupied houses are made by quite a different set of manufacturers. The larger dealers do not sell to these street peddlers at all. The peddlers have their own little workrooms, which furnish them with their stock at a much lower rate than the regular dealers charge. No originals are made in these ateliers, and most of the molds are gained by taking them from a cast bought from some other firm. The stearic acid bath is left out of the process, and consequently the color of these cheaper

works washes off. The peddlers of these statuettes stand in about the same relation to sculptors and sculpture that the hand organ players do to music and musicians. They reflect fairly accurately the popular taste, and, according to their testimony, it is the Tanagra figurines that in the long run sell the best of all their stock. From time to time there is a market for the bust of some particular man, and those sales are always temporary. Grotesque figures are always in demand and copies of the various models of Venus with which the public are familiar. Rows of Cupids and of monks' heads, winged Victories and busts of Wagner come and go as popular favorites, but the Tanagra figurines have a steady sale that insures their presence in the stock of nearly every street peddler. \_



# UGLY FIRE

And the Burly Officer Gathered Prompt Alarm and Good Wo by Firemen Save Serious Conflagration

> Blaze Broke out in the Shaving Vault of the Campbell Factory and Considerable Time was Spent in t xtinguishing it.

What might have proven to be very serious fire occurred in the city last night about a quarter after eight

shavings vault of the Manson Campbell Fanning mill Company's factory, Shortly after eight o'clock, the watchman in making his regular rounds noticed a considerable amount of smoke coming from the vault which is placed at the rear of the engine coom. Upon investigation he found that the shavings were on fire. promptly gave the alarm and the fire-

men quickly responded.

The fire was confined to the vault and not much damage was done. Had it not been noticed as soon as it, was it would have undoubtedly resulted in

very serious fire. The vault is 50 feet high, 14 feet square at the base and 12 feet square at the top, and is surrounded by a 8x5 foot brick wall. All of the shavings and refuse from the saws are dumped in this warls. and refuse from the saws are dumped in this vault. At the bottom of it is a door, which, when opened, throws the shavings into the engine room where they are used to feed the fur-naces, It is supposed that when the fireman opened the door, yesterday a spark from the furnaces flew into the vault unnoticed. As there is no draught, it kept smouldering all day draught, it kept smouldering all day and finally broke out at night.
