## INSTRUCTIONS RESPECTING VALUES FOR DUTY.

In determining the dutiable values of goods imported, the following particulars should be kept carefully in view :-
" customs act, 1883."

1. The value must be that at which the goods are sold for home consumption in the country where they are purchased. (Section 68).
2. The value must be that prevailing in the principal markets. (Section 68).
3. Said value must be that current at the date of exportation to Canada. (Section 68.)
4. It must be the value at the nsual and ordinary credit and not the cash value, except in the case of articles known to be usually sold for, cash only. (Section 69).
5. Invoices of goods usually sold on credit, made out at cash values, are subject to a sufficient addition to bring up to credit value. (Section 69.)
6. Drawbacks allowed by foreign Governments must always be taken as part of the value for duty, and if not shown on invoice or included in prices, they must be added. (Section 70.)

## DEDUCTIONS NOT ALLOWABLE.

7. For drawback paid or to be paid or, for special arrangement respecting exportation, exciusive biaht to territorial limits, royalties on patent rights, or ANY OTHER consideration which reduces values. (Section 71.)
8. For assumed value of packages. (Section 72.)
9. On account of charges for Packing, \&c. (Section 73.)

## SUGAR, MOLASSES AND SYRUPS, \&C.

10. Values of these articles include all charges and packages being free on board.
Note.-This skeleton outline is not intended to save the necessity of conmulting the Act, but to enable Officers of Customs to keep the leading features of the valuation sections prominently in view.

## NON-ENUMERATED GOODS.

Goods not enumerated in the Tariff are nominally subject to duty at 20 per cent. ad valorem, but in dealing with them it is necessary to enquire whether they are simple substances or compounds, and, in the latter case, to apply the provisions of Sections 6, 7 or 8, of the Customs Act, 1883. These are commonly known as the "similitude clauses" of the Act.

Special care should also be taken to detect misdescription in such cases, which is very frequently practised, to the great detriment of the Revenue.

An Act to alter the Duties of Customs and Excise.
[Assented to 15th May, 1879.]
Amended by 48 Vic., cap. 18, 44 Vic., cap. 10, 45 Vic., cap. 6,

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Proamble. Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:-

1. No refund of duty paid shall be allowed, because of any alleged inferiority or deficiency in quantity of goods imported and entered, and which have passed into the custody of the importer, under permit of the Collector of Customs, nor because of the omission in the invoice of any trade discount, or other matter or thing, which might have the effect of reducing the value of such goods for duty, unless the same has been reported to the Collector of Customs within ten days of the date of entry, and the said goods have been examined by the said Collector or by an appraiser, or othar proper officer of Customs, and the proper rate or amount of reduction certified by him after such examination; and if such Collector or proper officer reports that the goods in question cannot be identified as those named in the invoice and entry in question, then and in such case no refund of the duty or any part thereof shall in any case be allowed; and all applications for refund of duty in such cases shall be submitted, with the evidence and all particulars, for decision of the Minister of Customs, who may then order payment on finding the evidence to be sufficient and satisfactory.
12. The whole or part of the duty of 'thirty per centum ad valorem imposed by this Act upon wines imported into Canada, may be remitted upon Proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that the Governments of France and Spain, or of either of them, have made changes in their tariffs of duties imposed upon articles imported from Canada in reduction or repeal of the duties now in force in the said countries.

## Exports Prohimited.

657.
