

#### INSTRUCTIONS RESPECTING VALUES FOR DUTY.

In determining the dutiable values of goods imported, the following particulars should be kept carefully in view:—

#### "CUSTOMS ACT, 1883."

- 1. The value must be that at which the goods are sold for home consumption in the country where they are purchased. (Section 68).
- 2. The value must be that prevailing in the principal markets. (Section 68).

  3. Said value must be that current at the date of exportation to Canada.
- (Section 68.)

  4. It must be the value at the usual and ordinary credit and not the cash value, except in the case of articles known to be usually sold for cash only. (Section 69).
- 5. Invoices of goods usually sold on credit, made out at cash values, are subject to a sufficient addition to bring up to credit value. (Section 69.)
- 6. Drawbacks allowed by foreign Governments must always be taken as part of the value for duty, and if not shown on invoice or included in prices, they must be added. (Section 70.)

#### DEDUCTIONS NOT ALLOWABLE.

- 7. For drawback paid or to be paid or, for special arrangement respecting EXPORTATION, EXCLUSIVE RIGHT to territorial limits, ROYALTIES on patent rights, or ANY OTHER consideration which reduces values. (Section 71.)
- 8. For ASSUMED VALUE of packages. (Section 72.)
- 9. On account of CHARGES FOR PACKING, &c. (Section 73.)

#### SUGAR, MOLASSES AND SYRUPS, &C.

- 10. Values of these articles include all charges and packages being free on board.
- Note.—This skeleton outline is not intended to save the necessity of consulting the Act, but to enable Officers of Customs to keep the leading features of the valuation sections prominently in view.

#### NON-ENUMERATED GOODS.

Goods not enumerated in the Tariff are nominally subject to duty at 20 per cent. ad valorem, but in dealing with them it is necessary to enquire whether they are simple substances or compounds, and, in the latter case, to apply the provisions of Sections 6, 7 or 8, of the Customs Act, 1883. These are commonly known as the "similitude clauses" of the Act.

Special care should also be taken to detect misdescription in such cases, which is very frequently practised, to the great detriment of the Revenue.

### CHAP. 15.

An Act to alter the Duties of Customs and Excise.

[Assented to 15th May, 1879.]

Amended by 48 Vic., cap. 18, 44 Vic., cap. 10, 45 Vic., cap. 6, 46 Vic., cap. 13, and 47 Vic., cap. 30.

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Preamble.

Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. So much of all Acts and parts or schedules of Acts and Repeal of of all Orders in Council, as imposes any duty of Customs enactments upon goods (which word shall, for all the purposes of this duties of Act, have the meaning assigned to it in the Act passed in customs. the fortieth year of Her Majesty's reign and entituled; "An Act to amend and consolidate the Acts respecting the Customs,")\* or exempts goods from Customs duty when imported into Canada, or is in anywise inconsistent with this Act, is hereby repealed; but any power conferred upon the Governor Saving corin Council by the Act last cited (40 Victoria, cap. 10\*) tain power under 40 V., to transfer dutiable goods to the list of goods free of duty, c. 19. is not hereby abrogated or impaired:—and in lieu and instead of all other duties of Customs upon goods imported into Canada, there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid Duties in upon the goods enumerated in Schedule A to this Act, or Schedule A referred to as not enumerated therein but charged with duty, imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein, the several duties of Customs set forth and described in the said Schedule A and set opposite to each respectively, or charged on them as not enumerated, subject to the provisions hereinafter made.

22. The goods enumerated in Schedules B and C may, Goods free of subject to the provisions and conditions therein mentioned, be imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein, without payment of any duty of Customs thereon.

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Prohibited goods.

3. The goods enumerated in Schedule D shall not be imported into Canada, under the penalty therein mentioned, and if imported shall be forfeited and forthwith destroyed.

Provisions respecting packages containing duty.

4. The value of all bottles, flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, barrels and all other vessels or packages, manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass or any other goods paying material, and capable of holding liquids—crates, barrels and advalorem other packages containing places the containing places are senting the containing places. other packages containing glass, china, crockery or Jarthenware, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases in which bottled spirits, wines or malt liquors are contained, and every package, being the first receptacle or covering enclosing goods for purpose of sale, shall, in all cases not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an ad valorem duty or a specific and ad valorem duty, be taken and held to be a part of the fair market value of such goods for duty, and shall be charged with the same rate of ad valorem duty as is to be levied and collected on the goods they contain, and when they contain goods subject to specific duty only, such packages shall be charged with a duty of Customs of twenty per centum ad valorem, to be computed upon their original cost or value; and all or any of the above packages described as capable of holding liquids, when containing goods exempt from duty under this Act, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per centum ad valorem; but all packages not hereinbefore specified, and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty under regulations and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation only, according to the general usage and custom

- 6. Any or all of the following articles, that is to say, articles to be animals of all kinds, green fruit, hay, straw, bran, seeds of all kinds, vegetables (including potatoes and other roots), plants, trees and shrubs, coal and coke, salt, hops, wheat, peas and United States beans, barley, rye, oats, Indian corn, buckwheat, and all other grain, flour of wheat and flour of rye, Indian meal and oatmeal, and flour or meal of any other grain, butter, cheese, fish (salted or smoked), lard, tallow, meats (fresh, salted or smoked), and lumber, may be imported into Canada free of duty, or at a less rate of duty than is provided by this Act, upon Proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that similar articles from Canada may be imported into the United States free of duty, or at a rate of duty not exceeding that payable on the same, under such Proclemation, when imported into Canada.

An allowance may be made for deterioration by natural Allowance for deeay during the voyage of importation, upon perishable damage to articles, such as green fruits and vegetables, imported into on voyage. Canada, but in assessing the same, and in estimating the damage by breakage upon brittle goods, such as crockery, china, glass and glassware, under the provisions of sections fifty-three and fifty-four of "The Customs Act, 1883," such allowance or damage shall only be made and allowed for the amount of loss in excess of twenty-five per cent. of the whole quantity damaged, and only in case claim is made therefor and the loss or damage certified upon examination made by the appraiser or proper officer of Customs, within three days of the landing or arrival of such goods at the port of destination thereof; and provided the duty has been paid on the full value thereof, a refund of such duty may be allowed and paid on application to the Minister of Customs, in the proportion and on fulfilment of the conditions above specified, but not otherwise.
  - 9. In determining the dutiable value of goods, except Cost of inland when imported from Great Britain and Ireland, there shall tron, &c., to be added to the cost or the actual wholesale price or fair be deemed market value, at the time of exportation, in the principal part of value. markets of the country from whence the same has been imported into Canada, the cost of inland transportation, shipment and trans-shipment, with all the expenses included, from the place of growth, production or manufacture, whether by land or water, to the vessel in which shipment is made, either in transitu or direct to Canada, subject to such regulations as may be made by the Governor in Council.
  - to. The Governor in Council shall, from time to time, Governor in establish such regulations, not inconsistent with law, as make regulamay be required to seeure a just, faithful and impartial tiens for appraisal of all goods imported into Canada, and just and valuation. proper entries of the actual or fair market value thereof, and of the weights, measures or other quantities thereof, as each case may require; and such regulations, whether general or special, so made by the Governor in Council, shall have the Duty of full force and authority of law; and it shall be the duty of appraisers. the appraisers of Canada and every of them, and every person

who shall act as such appraiser, or of the Collector of Customs, as the case may be, by all reasonable ways and means in his or their power, to ascertain, estimate and appraise the true and fair market value and wholesale price, (any invoice or affidavit thereto to the contrary notwithstanding), of the goods at the time of exportation, and in the principal markets of the country whence the same have been imported into Canada, and the proper weights, measures or other quantities, and the fair market value or wholesale price of every of them, as the case may require.

No refund of duty for &c., except in cases.

11. No refund of duty paid shall be allowed, because of any alleged inferiority or deficiency in quantity of goods imalleged inferi any alleged inferiority or deficiency in quantity of goods im-orly of value, ported and entered, and which have passed into the custody of the importer, under permit of the Collector of Customs, nor because of the omission in the invoice of any trade discount, or other matter or thing, which might have the effect of reducing the value of such goods for duty, unless the same has been reported to the Collector of Customs within ten days of the date of entry, and the said goods have been examined by the said Collector or by an appraiser, or other proper officer of Customs, and the proper rate or amount of reduction certified by him after such examination; and if such Collector or proper officer reports that the goods in question cannot be identified as those named in the invoice and entry in question, then and in such case no refund of the duty or any part thereof shall in any case be allowed; and all applications for refund of duty in such cases shall be submitted, with the evidence and all particulars, for decision of the Minister of Customs, who may then order payment on finding the evidence to be sufficient and satisfactory.

Remission of or on duties on wines in certain cases.

12. The whole or part of the duty of thirty per centum ad valorem imposed by this Act upon wines imported into Canada, may be remitted upon Proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that the Governments of France and Spain, or of either of them, have made changes in their tariffs of duties imposed upon articles imported from Canada in reduction or repeal of the duties now in force in the said countries.
