





His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir EDMUND WALKER HEAD, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Governor General of British North America, and Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Island of Prince Edward, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., being seated in the Chair on the Throne, the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to let the Assembly know "It is His Ex-"cellency's pleasure they attend him immediately in this Honse."

Who being come,

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to open the Session by a Gracious Speech to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council : Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

I have much pleasure in announcing to you, that your Joint Address of last Session inviting the QUEEN to visit *Canada*, has been laid at the foot of the Throne, and that Her Majesty's Most Gracious answer will forthwith be placed in your hands. You will see with satisfaction that we may hope for the honour of receiving His Royal Highness the PRINCE OF WALES, in such a manner as will prove the hearty loyalty of all ranks among us.

Negotiations have been carried on by the Post Master General, for securing the transmission through *Canada* of a large portion of the correspondence between *Europe* and *America*. The result of these negotiations has been such as to show that the advantages of the route by the St. Lawrence are fully appreciated. At the same time care has been taken to represent properly to Her Majesty's Government, the position and claims of *Canada* with reference to the postal subsidies granted to Ocean Steamers.

The Commissioners appointed to report on the boundary line between Upper and Lower Cauada, have completed their labours, so as to enable you to pass a bill for the settlement of this long pending question.

The Government have received suggestions from many sources with reference to the measure introduced last Session for the Consolidation of the Municipal Law of *Lower Canada*, and a bill will be submitted to you, which may enable you to effect this important object.

I congratulate you on the issue of the Consolidated Statutes of *Canada*, and of *Upper Canada*. I trust soon to see the same work completed for *Lower Canada*, and when this is done, we may hope that it will be followed by the further assimilation of the Laws in force in both sections of the Province.

I desire to call your attention to the expediency of considering the law of Debtor and Creditor in Commercial matters, as it exists both in *Upper* and *Lower Canada*, with a view to further legislation on this difficult subject, and I think too that the present system of Currency and Banking deserves your early and serious consideration.

A measure will be laid before you for the purpose of facilitating the administration of the Crown Lands.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

If I may not congratulate you on having completely surmounted our financial difficulties, I think you will find that the income and expenditure for the past year have been such as to cause us no fear for the future.

Papers will be laid before you having reference to the Consolidation of the Public Debt, and the successful exertions made by the Minister of Finance during the recess with a view of securing this important object. You will see that the depression under which we have laboured has not diminished our credit, but it has forcibly impressed on myself and my advisers the necessity of a strict and rigid economy. It is with this conviction that I ask you again to consider the propriety of making the requisite provision for the Queen's service.

The accounts for the several departments shall be placed in your hands with as little delay as possible.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen:

It pleased Almighty GOD in the last autumn to bless our land with a plentiful harvest and we see around us, at the present moment, the signs of a revival of commerce. I earnestly pray that these marks of returning prosperity may continue to increase, and that our people may have abundant cause to be thankful for the welfare of their Country, and the maintenance of Law and Order.

It is at your hands that they expect such amendments and changes as may from time to time be needed, but I rejoice to think that few subjects of a broad and important character yet remain to be dealt with by immediate legislation.

I now leave you to the discharge of your legislative dutics.

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the Legislative Assembly withdrew.

In that Address, the Legislative Council and Commons of Canada earnestly pray the QUEEN to receive in person the tribute of their unwavering attachment to Her rule, and to honor with Her presence Her subjects in British North America, upon the occasion of the opening of the great Victoria Bridge, accompanied by the PRINCE CONSORT, and such members of the Royal Family as it may please Her Majesty to attend Her on the occasion.

3. Her Majesty values deeply the attachment to Her Person, and the loyalty to Her Crown, which have induced this Address, and I am commanded to assure the Legislature, through you, how lively an interest is felt by the QUEEN in the growing prosperity of Ca-uada, in the welfare and contentment of Her subjects in that important Province of Her Empire, and in the completion of the gigantic work which is a fitting type of the successful industry of the people.

It is therefore with sincere regret that Her Majesty is compelled to decline compliance with this loyal invitation. Her Majesty feels that Her duties at the Seat of the Empire prevent so long an absence, and at so great a distance as a visit to Canada would necessarily require.

Impressed however, with an earnest desire to testify to the utmost of Her power, Her warm appreciation of the affectionate loyalty of Her Canadian subjects, the QUEEN commands me to express Her hope that when the time for the opening of the Bridge is fixed, it may be possible for His Royal Highness the PRINCE OF WALES to attend the ceremony in Her Majesty's name, and to witness those gratifying scenes in which the QUEEN is Herself unable to participate.

The QUEEN trusts that nothing may interfere with this arrangement, for it is Her Majesty's sincere desire that the young PRINCE, on whom the Crown of this Empire will devolve, may have the opportunity of visiting that portion of Her Dominions from which this Address has proceeded, and may become acquainted with a people, in whose rapid progress towards greatness, Her Majesty, in common with Her subjects in Great Britain," feels a lively and enduring sympathy.

Downing Street, 27 August, 1859.

SIR: Her Majesty's Government have had for some time under their consideration the Act passed by the Canadian Parliament on May 4th last, "to impose a duty on vessels "admitted to Registry, and the Coasting trade, in this Province, and belonging to Countries "not admitting the vessels of this Province to Registry, and privileges of General and Coast-"ing trade, in such Countries," transmitted with your Despatch No. 65, of May 13th last.

It would be impossible for them to advise Her Majesty to assent to this Act, for a reason which is imperative upon them, although very naturally overlooked by the Canadian Legislature. Its provisions are inconsistent with the clauses in several treaties, commonly called "most favoured Nation" clauses, which bind the good faith of the Empire. For instance, by Article X of the Treaty with *Russia*, which I annex, Bussian subjects are entitled to "every privilege which is granted or may hereafter be granted to the subjects of any other "power." But the Canadian Act purports to subject foreign vessels of Countries "not "admitting British vessels to like privileges" to a peculiar customs duty.

It is obvious that this retallatory measure of the Canadian Parliament is increasistent with the rights insured to Russian subjects by the Treaty, and might give rise to just reclamations on the part of *Russia*, or any other power to which we are bound by a similar treaty. But independently of this international objection, I am bound to add that Her Majesty's

But independently of this international objection, I am bound to add that Her Majesty's Government could not with consistency advise Her assent to Colonial enactments embodying the principle of retaliation in Commercial matters. That principle has been disavowed, and the contrary principle of freedom adopted in British Legislation, by the very gradual and deliberate action of the people and of their representatives. If any slight deviations from the principles of freedom still subsist in the British Commercial code, they cannot in justice be regarded as any thing more than the remnants of a past system, which cannot be entirely got rid of by summary reforms. But to initiate again measures of this description would be to retrace steps deliberately taken. And the highest respect for Colonial selfgovernment in domestic matters is not inconsistent with adherence to the rule, that commercial freedom cannot be maintained by the Imperial Legislature, while systems of exclusion, protection, or retaliation, are maintained, or rather recommenced, by that of a separate portion of the Empire. I trust that the Canadian Government and Legislature will fully weigh the force of these reasons, and will acknowledge that (all discussion as to speculative truth in political economy left aside) the advisers of the Crown in this Country could do no less than maintain, as far as in them lies, unity of Legislation, in this most important subject, throughout Her Majesty's Dominions.

By Mr. W. F. Powell, Report connected with the Survey of the Ottawa Ship Canal. The Committee recommend that this Report be printed, but without the Map: accompanying .it.

The Committee also recommend that the Report (Preliminary) of the Inspectors of Prisons, be printed, and that the Documents attached to it, vis the Reports from the Reformatory Prisons, and from the Provincial Lunatic Asylum, be also printed, and that the Report from the Penitentiary be printed in a condensed form.

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the subject of the Legislative Print-

ing beg leave to make the following as their Tenth Report - That in compliance with the Order of the 11th April, viz : "That the seventh Report be referred back to the Committee, with an instruction to enquire whether, by causing to be printed a number of volumes, exceeding that proposed by the number in the Loglish and French languages, required for Lower Canada, the price would be reduced;" the Committee having inquired from Mr. Lovell, find that a considerable reduction in price will be effected, as is shown in his tender, which is as follows:

The Committee also recommended that, should any doubt exist as to the said Statutes being read in Evidence in the Courts, that a Declaratory Act should be passed making them legal.

The Honorable Mr. Allan presented to the House, a Bill intituled, "An Act to extend "to this Province, Letters Patent, granted to William Edward Newton, for certain im-"provments in the method of effecting the separation of the fibre of wood, for the manu-"facture of paper therefrom, and for the separation of other substances for similar, or "other purposes."

The said Bill was read for the first time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be read a second time on Wednesday next.

The Honorable Mr. Alexander presented to the House, a Bill intituled, "An Act to incorporate the Woodstock Woollen and Cotton Manufacturing Company."

The said Bill was read for the first time.

Ordered, that the said Bill be read a second time on Wednesday next.

The Honorable Mr. Simpson presented to the House, a Bill intituled, "An Act to "amend the Act to incorporate the town of Lindsay."

The said Bill was read for the first time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be read a second time on Thursday next.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Prince, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Patton, it was Ordered. That the Petition of Bridget O'Hara, widow of the late Timothy Neary, in his life time one of the Messengers of the Legislative Council, praying for relief, be referred to the Select Committee appointed to examine and Report upon the Contingent Accounts of this House for the present Session.

The Honorable Mr. de Blaquière moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Knowlton, To Resolve.-1. It having been proved beyond the power of contradiction that a much shorter route exists from this Continent to Great Britain and the Continent of Europe, by direct communication from the British North American Provinces, than that by New York; it become of vital importance to the future prosperity of Canada that every possible effort be made to render this greatly improved route generally available in the interests of Commerce.

2. That the Province of *Canada* presents the shorest, cheapest, and best line for the transmission of the vast Agricultural productions of Western *America*, and is capable of embracing, with like advantage, a large portion of the Cotton Tradefor transit to Europe. 3. That it offers, equally, the power of adaptation for conveyance to Europe, of the in-

exhaustible supplies of Timber of every description, including Masts of the first quality and

Staves, for the entire consumption of *Great Britain*, and her West Indian Colonies; and of *France* and *Spain*; together with Pine Timber, now much sought for in *Great Britain* for general domestic use, and difficult of procurement in any other Country.

4. That the recent Commercial Treaty concluded between Her Majesty the Queen, and the Emperor of the French, if carried out to its full development affords (under Divine Providence,) the surest and best guarantee for the preservation of the future peace of the world. In fostering close and enduring ties between two great and powerful nations, ancient hostile feelings will become extinguished, and be replaced by friendly intercourse cemented by mutual interest.

5. That the Treaty alluded to does not as yet extend to the Colonial possessions of either country, with one exception, but His Imperial Majesty having already endeavored to ascertain if a direct Commercial intercourse with *British North America* would not be attended with mutual advantage to *France*, and *Great Britain*; and having, with this view, nominated as His Majesty's Consul to *British America* a gentleman of much experience in Commercial affairs; it would seem very desirable that these advances should be met with corresponding endeavors to effect arrangements in themselves so eminently conducive to the prosperity of both Countries.

6. That France offers to Canadian enterprize, if existing prohibitions in France be withdrawn, a continuous sale for Ships, well adapted for French Trade, of Canadian construction, of excellent quality, and at prices far below those at which they could be built in Europe; also, unbounded markets for Lumber of every description, including Masts and Staves, and for realizing the benefits presented by Fisheries, unsurpassed in the world; on the other hand, France can supply in exchange productions in general use and request in this Province, susceptible of great extension, and increased consumption.

7. That this vast and beneficial trade, if established, would speedily develope some of the most productive natural resources of Canada; increase its population and wealth; extend immigration and settlement into her remotest confines; and render productive and effective the efforts zealously making by the Canadian Government for opening out the Province in every direction, and particularly in the valley of the Ottama towards Lake Superior, and the Northern and Eastern portions of Lower Canada.

8. That one of the means to this great end, is the perfecting all the routes of commercial transit.

9. The enlargement of the Welland Canal is essentially necessary for this purpose, so that vessels which now, from the insufficient size of the Locks on this Canal, discharge at Buffalo on Lake Erie three fourths of the grain traversing that Lake for the Sea-board at New York, may be enabled to pass through British waters.

10. Similar injury to Canadian commerce arises with respect to the transport of masts, lumber and staves, from *Western Canada*. Vessels of a size much greater than those which can alone now pass through this Canal are indispensable for securing their transit through British Territory. The use of such Vessels, by reducing freight to its minimum charge is a material element for successful competition with this trade from *New York*.

11. That in the same view and object the tolls on Canadian Canals ought not to be in excess of those of the United States ; the requirements for the securing and extension of commerce naturally preceding the question of Revenue from such Works.

12. That the enlargement of the Welland Canal, highly necessary as it undoubtedly is, cannot produce the advantages expected, if unaccompanied by the deepening of the Locks of the Lower Canadian waters, as pointed out in the able and comprehensive Report of the Honorable Mr. Rose, the Commissioner of the Board of Works, as well as the immediate erection of certain Lighthouses in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, so strongly urged by him; and it is evident that what is required for the development of the downward trade, applies with equal force to traffic from the Sea-board upwards. The Canadian waters should throughout their extent be adapted to Sea-going Ships, for the prevention of breaking bulk, except at the Port of destination; thus also encouraging the enterprises now partially commenced, but susceptible of great extension in Ship-building throughout Canada, if these necessary requirements are fully perfected.

13. That under the present commercial policy, of Great Britain, which utterly extinguishes every obstacle to Free Trade, in so far as she is concerned, but which in its operation directly injures the interests of British North America in one of its most important and fertile resources, that of Timber, it would seem but natural and just to extend to these Provinces, the same principles, and to permit the free passage of their industry, to any place where success may attend it; and hence it is contended, that all restrictions which Imperial Legislation imposes upon the extension of British North American Commerce, should at once, and be for ever removed; upon the broad and incontrovertible plea, that British Possessions ought to be governed, and can best be preserved, by the full enjoyment of British Laws and Privileges.

14. That whilst Canada disclaims any wish to interpose her interests, when conflicting with existing Treaties, between Great Britain and Foreign States, she naturally looks to and claims from the Parent State the permission to exercise those rights, and enjoy those privileges in common with their brethren in Great Britain, pre-eminent amongst which is the liberty to carry the fruits of their labour to the best market, and to seek their requirements wherever they may be most cheaply obtained.

For all which reasons it is moved that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, founded on these Resolutions, and praying that His Excellency, under the advice of his Council, will be pleased to take such steps as may be necessary, consistent with due regard to the fulfilment of public engagements already entered into, and the maintenance of the public credit of the Province, for the accomplishment of the several objects herein set forth, in such manner as His Excellency may deem expedient.

After a long Debate.

The said Motion was, by leave of the House, withdrawn.

The Honorable Mr. de La Terrière moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Prince.

That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause to be laid before this House all the documents and proceedings relating to the Society called the "Mechanies' and Literary Institute" in the Parish of *Alphonse* in the Township of *Bagot*, and a statement of the sums of money received each year by that Society, and of the manner in which such sums have been laid out.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and it was

Ordered, That such Members of the Executive Council, as are Members of this House, do wait on His Excellency the Governor General with the said Address.

The Honorable Mr. Walker moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Boulton,

That upon the consideration, to-morrow, of the Bill for the Incorporation of the Pilots for and below the Harbour of Quebec, as amended by the Select Committee, leave may be granted to the Petitioners against the said Bill, to be heard by Counsel at the Bar of this House.

The Honorable Sir E. P. Taché moved in amendment, seconded by the Honorable Mr. de La Terrière,

That after the word "House" the following be inserted: "and also, that the parties "praying for the passing of the said Bill may be heard by their Counsel at the Bar of this "House."

Upon which, Debates ensued, and

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Walker, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Boulton, it was Ordered, That the further Debate upon the said motion of amendment be postponed until to-morrow.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Bill intituled "An Act to incorporate the Compton High School," was, as amended, read a third time,

The question was put, whether this Bill as amended shall pass ?

It was resolved in the Affirmative.



The Joint Committee of both Houses on the subject of the Legislative Printing, beg leave to make the following, as their FOURTEENTH REPORT.

The Committee have carefully examined the documents referred to in the following Motions for Printing, viz :--

By the Honorable Mr. *Brown.*—Return to an ADDRESS, Statement relative to payment of Rebellion Losses. The Committee recommend that this Return be printed in the Sessional Papers only.

By Mr. Walker Powell.—Return to an ADDRESS, Statement from the Clerks of the Peace, in each of the Counties or Union of Counties in Upper Canada, of the names of Jurors, &c., selected in 1859 for 1860. The Committee recommend that this Return be printed in a condensed form.

By Mr. Bureau.—Report of the Select Committee appointed to enquire as to the most efficacious plan for promoting Colonization in this Province, &c. The Committee recommend that this Report and evidence attached be printed.

By the Honorable Mr. Brown — Return and Supplementary Return to Address, Faners and Returns relative to Consolidation of the Public Debt. The Committee recommend that these Returns be printed.

The Committee also recommend that the following Return.—Statement of Fees received for the Fee Fund of *lpper Canada*, and of Salaries paid to County Judges and Recorders, during the year 1859, be printed in the Sessional Papers only. And that the Return to Address, Statement relative to amount of Public money annually granted to and contributed by Agricultural Societies in *Upper* and *Lower Canada*, be not printed.

The Honorable Mr. Morris moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Christie,

1. That the Act of Union affords no efficient check against increasing the Public Debt, nor does it provide for restraining the public expenditure, or for creating a Sinking Fund to liquidate the existing debt of the Province. It appears, from official Returns, that in 1841 the Public Debt was under \$6,000,000, and the yearly expenditure did not exceed \$1,826,050; whereas the Public Debt now stands at \$54,299,409, and the yearly expenditure has reached \$11,403,587.

2. That the enormously increased expenditure, the ...exvy addition to the taxation, and the rapid increase of the Public Debt, call loudly for constitutional changes, and render imperatively necessary the imposition of stringent restraints, on the power of the Executive to spend money without the authority of Parliament, and on that of the Legislature to borrow on the Public Credit.

8. That an humble Address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that Her Majesty may be pleased to authorize His Excellency the Governor General to take immediate steps for the election, by the Parliamentary electors of the Province, of twenty-four Delegates, (twelve from each section of the Province,) to a Convention, charged with the preparation of a Constitution for the future government of *Canada*, and for the submission of the same, when prepared, to the approval or rejection of the people of the Province, and subsequently to the Imperial Parliament.

After Debate,

Your Committee have examined the Clerk's Accounts from the 1st day of May, 1859, being the day to which the last Audit of his accounts extended, to the 31st December last.

On the first mentioned day there was a balance at the credit of the Clerk, of twelve thousand five hundred and sixty-two dollars and forty-one cents (\$12,562 41), in addition to which he has since disbursed fifty-two thousand one hundred and fifty-seven dollars, twenty-three cents (\$52,157 23), for the expenditure of which he has accounted to the satisfaction of Your Committee, by vouchers, numbered from one, to three hundred and forty-five, both inclusive.

These two sums, making together sixty-four thousand seven hundred and nineteen dollars, sixty-four cents (\$64,719 64), form the Credit side of the Clerk's Accounts, with your Honorable House, for the period above referred to.

The Joint Committee of both Houses, on the subject of the Legislative Printing, beg leave to submit the following as their FIFTEENTH REPORT:---

The Committee would, in the first place, direct attention to the Report of a Sub-committee of their own body, hereto appended and marked A, which establishes the gratifying fact, that the expenditures of the Legislature for Printing, Printing Paper, Binding and Lithography, were about fifty per cent less in 1859 than they were in either of the years 1857 and 1858; and the Committee feel great satisfaction at being enabled to state that a considerable reduction has taken place under the same heads in the various Public Departments. For the year 1858 the Committee estimated the total cost for the Executive and Legislature at \$350,000, for the above services. For the year 1859 the Public Accounts show the whole expenditures under these heads of the several Departments to be

And the Report of the Sub-committee states those of the Legislature (assuming the Stationery for both Houses to be equal) at - 114,096 54

Making a total of - - - - - - - - - \$229,663 71

which is a reduction of - - - - - - - - \$120,336 29

The new contracts entered into by your Committee, took effect on the first day of January in the present year, and the working of these, and of the regulations appended to this Report marked B, and recommended for the adoption of your Honorable House, will effect a still further and very material reduction,—indeed, it is hoped, will bring the Legislative expenditure for 1860 somewhat below sixty thousand dollars.

In order to carry out faithfully, and perpetuate, the system of economy which the Committee feel some pride at having initiated, they deem it a duty to reiterate the recommendation contained in their fifth Report of last session, namely:— That the whole of the Printing, Binding, Advertising and Stationery required by the Government, the Legislature, and the several Public Departments, should be placed under one system of management constantly controlled and regulated by a competent head, with the aid of regular contracts in all cases where the contract system is practicable.

The Committee have to express their deep obligation to their Chairman, for the assiduity and care with which, during the recess, he discharged the various duties incumbent upon him.

The payments made for the like services in the two preceding years, were, in 1857, \$21,641 51, and in 1858, \$17,436 47.

It is worthy of remark that nearly one-fourth of the entire expenditure during 1859 was caused by the publication of two Reports, those of Professor Hind and Mr. Dawson, the cost of the former having been \$11,494 86, that of the latter, \$10,395 54. The number ordered was 6,000 copies of Mr. Dawson's Report and Maps, and 3,000 copies of Professor Hind's, but in consequence, as Mr. Lovell, the Printer, explains it, of directions given by the Standing Committee on Printing, some years ago, and of which the Committees of this Parliament were ignorant, the number ordered was considered to be in addition to the ordinary quantity stipulated for in the standing regulations, and the result was that 11,620 sets of Maps accompanying Mr. Dawson's Report, and 8,620 of the Maps accompanying Professor Hind's Report, were printed by Mr. Lovell; of Mr. Dawson's Report, 8,400 copies, and as many sets of Maps, were bound up separately, as were 5,400 copies of Professor Hind's Report's and Maps. The remaining 3,220 copies of each set of Maps will appear in the Appendix to the Journals of the Legislative Assembly, which is still in the hands of Mr. Lovell, and from a statement submitted to the undersigned by Mr. Lovell, it appears that of the 8,400 copies of

Dawson's Report and Maps bound up separately, the following is the state of the distribution :-Delivered to Mr. Spink, for distribution among the Members of the Legislative Assembly, (equal to 47 copies for each member), -- 6107 copies. Delivered to Mr. Taylor, for distribution to the Legislative Council, 600 " (or about 14 copies to each member.) Delivered to Mr. Dawson, M. P. P., -396 " Delivered to Public Offices and Translators, &c., by order of 183 " Mr. Spink, In the hands of Mr. Lovell, awaiting distribution, 1097 " Deficient, 17 " 8,400 copies.

The Committee will observe, also, that although the Appendix and so large a portion of the bound copies are still to be delivered, the whole of the work has been paid for. Mr. Spink has kept no record of the number of copies sent by him to each Member of the Assembly; but the Members themselves can say whether they received the quantity charged against Parliament, and the Committee must determine the manner in which the thousands remaining on hand are to be disposed of, and prescribe the form in which, for the future, an accurate record shall be kept of the manner in which such costly works are distributed.

The undersigned feel it their duty to call the attention of the Joint Committee to the great expenses attending the publication of the Reports of the Superintendents of Education. The one for Lower Canada last year cost \$3,165; that for Upper Canada, \$5,334. Each of these Reports is printed in both languages; but the undersigned cannot perceive the necessity for, or use of, a French edition of the Upper Canada Report. Moreover, they doubt the benefit of an annual publication of documents so voluminous. It is, of course, necessary that the cash transactions of these departments should be stated yearly; but the undersigned think that the other matter set forth in these bulky volumes might be published at longer intervals, and in a much abbreviated form.

The undersigned conceive it their duty to call the attention of the Committee to another fact. In the accounts submitted to them, they observe that considerable sums are charged by the Printers under the head of "alterations," for changes made in the text of documents after they are placed in the Printer's hands. A practice more dangerous than this can hardly be imagined, and it should not be tolerated.

The undersigned have further to observe upon the singular fact, that not a single account for Stationery supplied to either branch of the Legislature, has been submitted to them. From a statement obtained from the Accountant, they find that the Stationery accounts charged against the Legislative Assembly, amounted in 1857 to \$5,679; in 1858 to \$6,884; and in 1859, to \$4,430. The same description of accounts charged to the Legislative Council amounted to, according to the Journals of that body, in 1857, to \$4,913, and in 1858, to \$5,087 With regard to 1859, the undersigned have no information.

The undersigned had marked for comment a great number of items in the accounts submitted for their consideration. But, inasmuch as the matters meriting complaint and censure belong to the past, and are amply guarded against by the system adopted by the Committee last Session, as embodied in their Fifth Report, if that system is efficiently and faithfully worked, they deem it most advisable to abstain from any further observations.

REGULATIONS.

1. That all accounts for the Printing, Printing Paper, Binding and Lithography of the Legislature, for the present and subsequent Sessions, be paid by the Accountant of the Legislative Assembly, upon the certificate of the Clerk of this Committee, that the same have been duly examined, and compared with the contracts, and upon such examination and comparison were found correct.

2. That all orders for Legislative work unprovided for by contract, shall be given out solely by this Committee, when Parliament is in session, and during the recess, by the Clerk of this Committee, upon the requisition of the Clerk of that branch of the Legislature for which such work is needed, payment for which shall be also made by the Accountant of the Legislative Assembly, upon the certificate of the Clerk of this Committee.

3. That no public Officer, or other person submitting reports or other documents to the Legislature, shall be permitted to make any alteration therein, after they have been laid before either House of Parliament.

4. That all work not provided for by existing contracts, shall be performed by special agreement, entered into with parties by this Committee, when the Legislature is in Session, and by the Clerk during each recess.

5. That when this Committee gives an order for the Printing or Binding of any specific number of Reports or Documents of any description, that number shall not, on any pretence, be exceeded.

6. That it shall be the duty of the Clerk of Records of the Legislative Assembly, and of the proper Officer of the Legislative Council, to see to the distribution of all Parliamentary documents, in accordance with the scale prescribed by this Committee, and to keep an accurate account of the number of copies of each received by him from the Printer or Bookbinder, and the dates when such were received, and also of the dates when such copies were distributed by him, to whom they were issued, and the number distributed to each person.

7. That in future no French edition of the Report of the Superintendent of Education for Upper Canada shall be published, and that the Superintendents for both Upper and Lower Canada be recommended to curtail their Reports, adhering so far as in their judgment may be advisable, to the idea embodied on that subject in the Report of your Sub-Committee.

Ordered, That that said Report do lie on the Table.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Bill intituled, "An Act to authorize the Corpo-"ration of the City of *Montreal* to acquire a site upon which to erect a Terminus for the "Grand Trunk Railway of *Canada*," was, as amended, read a third time.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows :--

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

Committee Room, 3rd May, 1860.

The Select Committee to whom was referred the Memorial of the Honorable *René* Edouard Caron; praying that the Resolutions adopted against him on the 16th March, 1857, and appearing on the Journals of your Honorable House, may be re-considered by your Honorable House, beg leave to report:

1. That they find that the said Honorable *René Edouard Caron* was summoned to your Honorable House on the 9th day of June, A. D. 1841, and that in pursuance of such summons he became a member of, and took his seat as such in your Honorable House.

2. That on the 15th day of August, 1853, the said Honorable *René Edouard Caron* was appointed a Judge of the Superior Court for *Lower Canada*, in conformity with the Provincial Statute passed in the 12th year of Her Majesty's Reign, and chaptered 38, and thereupon entered upon his duties as such Judge, and continued to discharge the same until the 27th day of January, 1855, when he was transferred to a Judgeship in the Court of Queen's Bench, created by the Provincial Statute passed in the 12th year of Her Majesty's Reign, and chaptered 37.

3. That the said the Honorable René Edouard Caron discharged the duties of the said last mentioned office from the time of his said appointment thereto, until the 4th day of February, 1859, when he was appointed as one of the Commissioners for Codifying the Laws of Lower Canada, still retaining, as he does now, his position as a Judge, though the actual discharge of his judicial duties is suspended, while he is engaged in the said work of Codification.

4. That, from the time the said Honorable René Edouard Caron was summoned, as aforesaid, to your Honorable House as a member thereof, up to the time he was, as aforesaid, appointed a Judge of the Superior Court of Lower Canada, he, the said the Honorable René Edouard Caron, regularly attended the sittings of yourHonorable House, and did not, for two successive Sessions during that period, fail to give his attendance in your Honorable House.

5. That in the first of the Acts above referred to; under which the said the Honorable *René Edouard Caron* was appointed such Judge as aforesaid, is contained a clause in the following words :

"That no such Judge shall sit in the Executive Council, or in the Legislative Council, or in the Legislative Assembly, or hold any other place of profit under the Crown, so long as he shall be such Judge."

6. That in the second of the Acts above referred to, under which the said the Honorable René Edouard Caron was appointed to the Court of Queen's Bench, is contained a clause in the following words:

"That no such Judge shall sit in the Executive or Legislative Council, or in the Legislative Assembly, or hold any other place of profit under the Crown."

7. That on the 12th March, 1857, the Provincial Parliament being in Session, the following Message from His Excellency the Governor General was communicated to your Honorable House:

" Edmund Head,"

"The Governor General, having had his attention called by an Address from the Legislative Council, on the subject of the non-attendance of the Honorable René E. Caron, and the Honorable Louis Méthos, for the last two years, recom-

mends that the subject be taken into consideration by the Legislative Council, with a view to carry out the provisions of the 7th clause of the statute 3rd and 4th *Vict.*, chap. 35.

"Government House,"

" Toronto, March 12th, 1857."

8. That on the 16th March, 1857, your Honorable House, after having resolved itself into a Committee of Privileges on the said message, adopted the following Resolutions, reported from the said Committee, viz.:

"Resolved, That it appears by the Journals of this House that the Honorable René Edouard Caron, and the Honorable Louis Méthot, have for two successive Sessions of the Legislature, failed to give their attendance in this House, without having obtained permission for such absence from Her Majesty or the Governor General of this Province, whereby the seats of the said Honorable René Edouard Caron, and the said Honorable Louis Méthot have become vacant;

That although several other seats in your Honorable House have been declared vacant under the provisions of the Act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the Session held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to reunite the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, and for the Government of Canada," by reason of Members having respectively failed to give their attendance in your Honorable House for two successive Sessions without permission, yet, it does not appear that in any case, save one, namely, the case of the late Honorable John Macdonald, was Notice of the proceedings, or intended proceedings, to render such Seat vacant, given to the party affected thereby, nor was he, in any case, heard thereupon in defence of such his Seat; and your Honorable House has on all such cases, save the case of the said Honorable John Macdonald is to be found in the Journals of your Honorable House for the years 1847 and 1848.

The Members, on behalf of the Legislative Council, of the Joint Committee of both Houses for the direction of the Library of Parliament,

Beg leave to report :---

The Committee have received a Report from Mr. George Coventry, who was appointed, last Session, to collect documents relating to the early history of Upper Canada, from the first settlement of the Province to recent times. They have much satisfaction in stating that the labours and researches of this gentleman have been attended with considerable success. He has obtained, from various sources, a number of interesting papers; and has been especially favoured by the receipt of an extensive collection of manuscripts, formerly belonging to the late Lieutenant-Colonel Simcoe, the first Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, and relating to public events in that Province during the period of his administration of the Government. Thanks are due to the Reverend Mr. Simcoe, through whose liberality these papers have been placed at our disposal, with permission to transcribe any portion of their contents that it may be desired to preserve. The Committee have given directions to their Secretary to take the necessary steps to obtain careful copies of all such papers, at a cost not exceeding three pence per folio; the same to be hereafter bound, and deposited in the Library.

In order to continue researches so auspiciously commenced, the Committee have renewed their engagement with Mr. Coventry for another year, allowing him the same rate of remuneration given for the past year, namely, one hundred pounds, payable in quarterly instalments, from the tenth of March last. Mr. Coventry's future endeavours will be principally directed to procure manuscript and printed documents touching the early French settlements on the Ohio, up to 1759; also, papers from that period to the setting apart of Upper Canada as a separate Province, in 1791; and unpublished papers illustrative of the war with the United States in the years 1812 to 1815.

To further this important undertaking, the Committee have resolved to associate with Mr. Coventry, for the ensuing year, J. P. Merritt, Esquire, of St. Catherines, whose zeal and energy in these historical investigations first induced the Committee to sanction an outlay of public money in aid of the same. Mr. Merritt has recently examined the papers in the Manuscript Department of the British Museum, and in the State Paper Office, in London, and has ascertained that they contain much interesting matter concerning the past history of Western Canada. At the request of the Committee, Mr. Merritt has agreed to pay another visit to these repositories, and to procure from thence copies of such documents as may be of value in the present enquiry. For this purpose, the Committee recommend the appropriation of a sum of money not exceeding two hundred pounds.

The Committee have considered a Petition, referred to them by Your Honors, from Mr. John Lovell, of Montreal, for aid in the publication of an English translation of the Réla-Mr. Lovell has submitted to the Committee specimens of the English tions des Jésuites. version, which appears to have been executed with spirit and fidelity. He proposes to publish the work in four volumes, to be issued at intervals within the next three years, and at a price not exceeding seven dollars for the complete work, unbound. The general interest evinced by the English portion of the community in this curious and entertaining work, replete with interest to the student of early Canadian history, has induced the Committee to recommend a large subscription to this edition. As Government assistance alone enabled the projectors of the French edition to issue their valuable reprint, so it has been evident that without similar aid it would be impossible for Mr. Lovell to incur the outlay necessary to translate and print the English version, and that private subscriptions could not be depended upon to any adequate extent. The Committee, accordingly, recommend that five hundred and seventy-two copies of this work be subscribed for, on the terms above-mentioned, payable on the delivery of each printed volume. The copies to be deposited in the Library of Parliament, and distributed according to the directions of the Committee.

In reference to the Petition of *L. F. Gouin*, of *Three Rivers*, author of "A New Sys-"tem of French and English Pronunciation," referred to the Committee by the Legislalative Assembly, the Committee recommend that copies to the value of forty dollars be purchased, for the encouragement of the Author, who appears to have executed a very meritorious little work, although labouring under the melancholy deprivation of sight.

The Committee recommend that the appropriations of money in this Report, if sanctioned by Your Honors, should be defrayed out of the Contingencies of the Legislative Assembly.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, COMMITTEE ROOM, 14 May, 1860.

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Legislative Council for the present Session, beg leave to make their Fourth Report.

In obedience to the order of reference of the sixteenth of April last, your Committee have considered the petition of *Bridget O'Hara*, widow of the late *Timothy Neary*, in his lifetime one of the messengers of the Legislative Council, praying for relief; and in obedience to the order of reference of the seventh instant, your Committee have further considered their Third Report; and thereupon your Committee recommend that one hundred dollars be paid to the Petitioner, as a gratuity, and that the said Report be adopted.

Your Committee have also examined the Clerk's accounts from the first day of January last to the eighth instant.

On the first mentioned day there was a balance in the Clerk's hands, to the credit of your Honorable House, of four thousand eight hundred and six dollars and forty-one cents, (\$4,806 41) as appears by the second report of your Committee. The Clerk has since received twenty-four thousand five hundred and forty-one dollars, (\$24,541) making in all twenty-nine thousand three hundred and forty-seven dollars and forty-one cents, (\$29,847 41) to be accounted for by that officer.

The Clerk has accounted, to the satisfaction of your Committee, by vouchers numbered from one to two hundred and twenty-seven, both inclusive, for the expenditure during the above period of thirty thousand three hundred and nineteen dollars and forty-six cents, (30,319 46), so that, on the eighth instant there was a balance of nine hundred and seventytwo dollars and five cents (\$972 05), due to him by your Honorable House. To cover this sum, and to enable the Clerk to defray the current expenses of your Honorable House during the remainder of the Session, and throughout the approaching recess, your Committee recommend that application be made in the proper quarter for advances to the Clerk of such sums as he may require from time to time, until the commencement of next Session. Such advances not to exceed, in the whole, seventy thousand dollars, (\$70,-000).

Your Committee find from the Clerk's accounts, that Joiner's work to the amount of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1600), and certain other work, done to that part of the Parliament Building occupied by your Honorable House, has been paid for out of the Contingent Fund.

Your Committee recommend that, in future, application be made to the Commissioner of Public Works whenever any works of construction or repair, or any articles of furniture are required for the service of your Honorable House.

And with reference to any such works or furniture already ordered on behalf of your Honorable House, your Committee recommend that the accounts for the same be not paid until they have been examined and approved by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Nor until the Company, or some one of their number, or the Directors named in the "said instrument, have paid to the Treasurer of the Company six per cent. upon the "amount of the Capital Stock mentioned in such instrument, and have registered such "instrument with a receipt from the Treasurer of the Company for such payment or "instalment, by leaving the original instrument and receipt with the Registrar of any one "County in which such road or other work connected therewith is wholly or partly situated.

CLAUSE C.

"Thenceforward all and every the provisions of the said Act relating to Companies formed under the same, and to the incorporation thereof, and to the instruments executed "by the Stockholders thereof, shall extend and apply to such Company, and to the incor-"poration of such Company, and to the instrument executed by the Stockholders thereof."

CLAUSE D.

"It shall be lawful for any company formed and duly incorporated under the said Act, "to sell the road and works constructed by them to any company formed and duly incor-"porated under this Act; and such latter company shall, after such purchase, or after any "purchase of such road or works under any power granted by such former company, or "under any legal process against such former company, stand in the place and stead of "such former company, and possess all such powers and authority as such former company "theretofore possessed and exercised in respect to such road and works, and be subject to "all and every the provisions of the said Act: and the Seventieth Section of the said Act "shall apply to all such sales."

CLAUSE E.

"This Act shall apply to Upper Canada only."

The Select Committee above named, to whom was referred the Resolution of Your Honorable House, of the thirtieth day of March last, setting forth "that it is important, "for the navigation of the River St. Lawrence, to ascertain whether the Port of Bic, and "that of Father Point, one hundred and sixty miles east of Quebec, or any other Port in "Canada, east of Quebec, are Harbors where Ocean Steam Vessels may arrive during "any part of the season during which the navigation is usually stopped at the Port of "Quebec, and to the west of Quebec," have the honor to present their Report. In order to obtain the necessary information on the subject submitted for its consider-

In order to obtain the necessary information on the subject submitted for its consideration, Your Committee summoned and examined several witnesses, with a view to establish the period at which the River St. Lawrence is navigable, in spring and autumn, from the Gulf to Bic or Father Point.

It appears, from the testimony of these witnesses, that that part of the river is navigable three weeks later in the autumn and six or seven weeks earlier in the spring than the part between *Bic* and *Quebec*.

The importance of having in the Lower St. Lawrence a Winter Harbor and a Harbor of Refuge, which vessels, ascending and descending the River St. Lawrence, might safely enter, has long been a subject of remark by the press, and in the Legislature; and the Honorable Commissioner of Public Works alludes to it in his last Report as follows :---"As "a means of still further shortening the route by *Canada* to the West, it is recommended," says he "That measures be taken to ascertain whether the Gulf of St. Lawrence may not "be navigated with safety for a longer period than it now is, and whether a Harbour "accessible during the whole year may not be found on Canadian Territory. It is believed "that the ice in the Gulf, offers less obstruction to the navigation, during a great part of "the winter, than during the late autumn and early spring. An experimental voyage of "a Steamer in winter, which might be accomplished at a moderate expense, would solve "this question, which is one of some importance to the Province."

This question is invested with more actuality and interest, now that the Grand Trunk Railway has been extended 114 miles to the East of *Quebec*.

There are only 36 more miles of it to be made in order for it to reach *Bic*, and ten miles in addition to those will carry it to *Father Point*.

At the latter place the Ocean Steamships of the Canadian Line touch on each of the upward and downward voyages, to take in or land their pilots, and to send or receive messages through the Telegraph Station there.

This route is destined to acquire still greater consequence, when the project is realiczd, of extending the telegraph line to the Straits of *Belle Isle*, which it is supposed that vessels from Europe will be able to reach in five days.

The advantages to commerce, and to the passenger traffic, which would result from the existence of a Port in the Lower St. Lawrence, accessible during the greater part of the winter, are, from their importance, of a nature to induce and justify the adoption by the Legislature of measures calculated to realize the execution of the project.

Your Committee have confined themselves, however, to collecting useful information on the subject they had to consider, and they refer to the evidence taken before them.

Your Committee have concluded to recommend to Your Honorable House, that an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, praying him to be pleased to recommend that a survey may be made of the Ports of *Bic*, *Rimouski* and *Father Point*, or of any other place in the Lower *St. Lawrence*, in order to ascertain whether it is possible to construct there a Harbour of Refuge for vessels navigating the River *St. Lawrence*, below the Port of *Bic*, and to order that the keepers of the Lighthouses in the Lower *Saint Lawrence*, under the control of the Government, be instructed to make observations as to the state of the Gulf and River *St. Lawrence* during the winter, and that such practical trial may be made as His Excellency may deem expedient, in order to ascertain whether it is possible for steam vessels to run with safety, (and at what period) in the Lower *St. Lawrence*, after the closing in the autumn, and before the opening in the spring, of the season of navigation at the Port of *Quebec*.

All which is respectfully submitted.

The Members, on behalf of the Legislative Council of the Joint Committee of both Houses for the direction of the Library of Parliament;

Beg leave to Report :

The Committee have re-considered their first Report, and beg to submit the same in an amended shape.

They have received a Report from Mr. George Coventry, who was appointed last Session to collect documents relating to the early history of Upper Canada, from the first settlement of the Province until recent times. They have much satisfaction in stating that the labours and researches of this gentleman have been attended with considerable success. He has obtained, from various sources, a number of interesting papers, and has been especially favored by the receipt of an extensive collection of manuscripts formerly belonging to the late Lieut. Colonel Simcoe, the first Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, and relating to public events in that Province during the period of his administration of the Government. Thanks are due to the Rev. Mr. Simcoe, through whose liberality these papers have been placed at our disposal, with permission to transcribe any portion of their contents that it may be desired to preserve. The Committee have directed their Secretary to take the necessary steps to obtain careful copies of all such papers, now or hereafter to be procured, at a cost not exceeding three pence per folio; the same to be bound, and deposited in the Library.

In order to continue researches so auspiciously commenced, the Committee have

257

renewed their engagement with Mr. Coventry for another year, allowing him the same rate of remuneration as before, namely, one hundred pounds, payable in quarterly instalments, from the 10th of March last. Mr. Coventry's future endeavours will be principally directed to procure manuscript and printed documents touching the early French settlements on the Ohio, up to 1759; also, papers from that period to the setting apart of Upper Canada as a separate Province in 1791; and unpublished papers illustrative of the War with the United States in the year 1812 to 1815.

To further this important undertaking the Committee have resolved to associate with Mr. Coventry, for the ensuing year, J. P. Merritt, Esq., of St. Catherines, whose zcal and energy in these historical investigations first induced the Committee to sanction an appropriation in aid of the same. Mr. Merritt has recently examined the papers in the Manuscript Department of the British Museum, and in the State Paper Office in London, and thas ascertained that they contain much interesting matter concerning the past history of Western Canada. At the request of the Committee he has agreed to pay another visit to these repositories, and to procure from thence copies of such documents as may be of value in the present enquiry. For this purpose the Committee recommend the advance of a sum of money not exceeding two hundred pounds.

In reference to the Petition of L. F. Gouin, of Three Rivers, author of a "New System of French and English Pronunciation," the Committee recommend the purchase of copies to the value of forty dollars, for the encouragement of the author, who appears to have compiled a very meritorious little work, although labouring under the melancholy deprivation of sight.

The Committee suggest that the appropriations of money in this Report, if sanctioned by Your Honors, should be defrayed out of the Contingencies of the Legislative Assembly.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was severally pronounced by the Clerk of this House in the words following:

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to this Bill." The Clerk of the Crown in Chancery read the title of another Bill to be passed, as follows : "An Act respecting the management of the Indian Lands and Property."

To this Bill the Clerk of this House did thereupon say :

"His Excellency the Governor General doth reserve this Bill for the signification of "Her Majesty's pleasure thereon."

Then the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly addressed His Excellency as follows:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

Wet Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, attend Your Excellency with our Bill of Supply for the service of the current year.

Among the subjects which have engaged our attention during the Session, the Commercial interests of the Province have occupied a prominent place.

With an earnest desire to obtain for *Canada* her share in the advantages derivable from the great and increasing trade between the Old and New Worlds, we have largely augmented our subsidy to the Ocean Steamships plying between the Ports of the *St. Lawrence* and the Mother Country.

We have also agreed to remove the Tolls heretofore levied on vessels availing themselves of our internal communications on this great highway, in order to afford additional facilities to ships navigating the Lakes and Rivers of *Canada*, and to abolish the restrictions heretofore imposed on the free passage of Commerce by way of the *St. Lawrence*.

We congratulate Your Excellency on the completion of the great project of consolidating our Statute Law, in the enactment of the Act for the consolidation of the Statutes of *Lower Canada*. In connection with this branch of our labours, we have, during the course of the present Session, brought to maturity two important Statutes affecting *Lower Canada*, one for the consolidation of the Municipal Law, the other to make provision for the administration of Justice therein.

Looking forward with pride and satisfaction to the approaching visit to *Canada* of the Eldest Son of our beloved Queen, we have authorised Your Excellency to incur whatever expense may be necessary for the suitable entertainment of His Royal Highness, as the Guest of this Province, and we rejoice at the prospect which has been afforded to us, of meeting together to welcome in person this illustrious Prince, and of expressing the sentiments of loyalty and affection to our Sovereign, Her Throne, and Family, which so eminently characterize the people we represent.

I have now to offer to Your Excellency a Bill appropriating the sums voted for the service of the year, to which I respectfully solicit Your Excellency's assent.

To the said Bill, the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:

"His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill in Her Majesty's name."

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to deliver the following Speech : Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

The time has come when I am able to release you from the labours of the Session, and I think that I may express satisfaction at the result of your deliberations.

The prosperity of the country is reviving. The measures which you have sanctioned for extending our trade, and facilitating the free navigation of the *St. Lawrence*, involving as they do, some sacrifice, will contribute, in the end, to increase our resources.

The establishment of a Free Port at the Eastern and at the Western extremity of *Canada* will attract commerce to our shores, and must hasten the settlement of districts hitherto waste and unproductive. The Fisheries of the Gulf, and the Mining interests of the Upper Lakes, will benefit greatly by these liberal measures.

You have destroyed the last remnants of the Seigniorial Tenure, which remained in a few *fiefs* in the district of *Montreal*. The Act for improving the administration of Justice in *Lower Canada*, will cause the expense of juries to be defrayed from local funds. This change, and the completion of the system of the Registration of instruments affecting land will have carried a step further the assimilation of the laws in force in either section of the Province.

You have completed the steps necessary for adding the Consolidated Statutes of *Lower* Canada to the body of the Statutes of Canada and Upper Canada, already promulgated in a compact form; and you have brought into a more convenient shape the Municipal law affecting the Eastern section of the Province.

All these are steps tending to strengthen that bond of union which I believe to be essential to the progress and the future greatness of your country.

I should add, that the Common School Law of *Upper Canada* has been amended and improved, and that a Bill will be submitted for the Assent of Her Most Gracious Majesty, providing for the future administration of Indian Affairs by the Provincial Government. The terms of this enactment are such as to shew a desire to uphold the rights, and protect the property, of those most nearly concerned in it; and I cannot doubt, but that, if sanctioned, its provisions will be carried out in perfect good faith by the Executive Government of *Canada*.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

I congratulate you on the successful steps taken for consolidating the Public Debt, and on the saving which will be effected by the investment of the Sinking Fund, in securities of a different description. I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Public Service, and I earnestly hope that the temporary depression of our finances, may disappear in the course of the current year

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen:

There is one subject on which I have not yet touched, and that is the promised visit to this Province of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. Your invitation has been most graciously responded to by Our Queen, and your reception of Her Son will now shew the warmth of those feelings which dictated the Address of last Session, and the deep sense of loyalty to the Throne, and of love for the laws and institutions of *Great Britain*, which animate the population of *Canada*.

Then the Honorable the Speaker of this House said :---

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure that this Provincial Parliament be prorouged until Wednesday, the twenty-seventh day of June next, to be here held, and this Provincial Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Wednesday, the twenty-seventh day of June next.

APPENDIX No. 1.

To the Honorable the Legislative Council of the Province of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled.

The Report of the Librarian upon the state of the Library of Parliament,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH,---

That upon the removal of the Seat of Government, after the close of last Session of Parliament, it was considered, by the Government,—who did not then know what accommodation could be provided for the Books,—inexpedient that the whole Library should be immediately transferred to Quebec. Accordingly a Minute in Council was passed, and communicated to your Librarian by letter from the Provincial Secretary, dated 11th July, 1859, directing him for the present to forward to Quebec a selection of Books, not to exceed ten thousand in number, and to include such books as might be especially necessary for the use of Members during a Session of Parliament. This direction was complied with, and a selection of works of reference forwarded to Quebec before the close of the season of navigation.

Upon the completion of the building erected for the accommodation of the Legislature, it was ascertained by your Librarian that the room assigned to the Library would receive nearly the whole collection; whereupon the Honorables the Speakers were pleased to direct that the entire Library should be despatched to Quebec.

By judicious management of the apartment, and careful economy of space, your Librarian is happy to state that nearly the whole of the books have been accommodated in the new Library. A portion of the remainder, comprising the collection of works on the History of America, some scientific publications, seldom consulted, and a series of Periodicals and Parliamentary Papers, have been placed in a room at the Laval University, in close proximity to the Parliament buildings, which has been kindly placed at the disposal of the Legislature for that purpose, by the Directors of that institution, and is under the exclusive control of the Librarians of the Legislature. The collection of works on French Law has been placed in the office of the Commissioners for the Codification of the Laws of Lower Canada, under the sanction of the two Speakers, for the convenience of the Commissioners. The books, however, will be accessible to the Members of Parliament at all hours.

The removal of such a large collection of books in the depth of winter, from a distance of nearly six hundred miles, and the careful arrangement and classification of them, within a period of two months, without the loss or damage of a single volume, is a subject for congratulation and thankfulness.

Since last Session the Library has been enriched by the addition of several hundred volumes on English Law, including an extensive series of Law and Equity Reports. These books were purchased in England, by Mr. Speaker Smith, on very favorable terms, and have rendered this important section of the Library perfect and complete.

Few other additions have been made to the Library during the recess; nevertheless some works of novelty and general interest, published in Europe and America during the past year, will be found upon the shelves.

To facilitate reference to the books in the Library, a Supplementary Catalogue or Index to the Volumes, added to the collection since the 25th February, 1858, has been printed. This supplement will be distributed to Members without delay, and will be found to include all additions to the Library to the present date, with references to the pages of the Manuscript Catalogue, by consulting which the titles of the several works enumerated will be found at length.

A list of the Donations to the Library within the past year is appended to this Report.

The total number of Volumes in the Library at present may be estimated at 45,000, the whole of which are in good condition.

Your Librarian would not do justice to his own feelings, nor to the zeal, industry, and ability of Mr. Lajoie, the Assistant Librarian of the House of Assembly, and of the other Officers connected with the Department, did he not bear testimony to the fact that, it is to their untiring exertions and intelligence that the present convenient classification and arrangement of the books in the Library may be mainly attributed.
