Children's Meals. Children should be taught to eat at their meals and to take between meals. This rule applies to infants as well as to older children. A MAGNIFICENT EXHIBIT

Providence did not smile upon the Exhibition held in this town at its opening. The day previous was damp and rainy and many who had small exhibits to bring were kept at home. Nevertheless exhibits in quantity began to arrive on Monday and all that day and Tuesday and about all of Tuesday night the committee were at work and the bare building was being transformed into a veritable fruit show, the equal of which has never been seen here and perhaps never excelled elsewhere.

The large building downstairs was tabled off for fruit all around the sides and ends. In the centre were tables with high and low shelves for the display of potted and cut flowers and articles belonging to the domestic department.

In the centre of the North side a platform was arranged for the speakers for the opening and closing and all around and overhead was a profuse and rich display of flags and bunting.

The decorating committee deserve great praise for the interior arrangements for many were the expressions of delight at the pretty appearance of the building both by day and by night.

The upstairs part was arranged for vegetables, grain etc., and outside under canvas was a place arranged for the fowls.

Opening day proved very unfavorable. Rain fell in slight showers most of the morning. This did not keep the people at home for crowds began to arrive early in the morning. At ten o'clock the building was in readiness for the public and the doors were opened to the public and over fifteen hundred people were present.

A large number came by special train from the West. The Valley Brass Band was in attendance and furnished the music for the day.

Lieut. Governor Jones was to open the exhibition and he arrived on the afternoon accompanied by Premier Murray and Hon. T. R. Black. Hon. J. W. Longley arrived later and Sir Frederick and Lady Borden came from Canaan. At two o'clock the building was completely filled with people when President H. H. Wickwire took the chair and seated his distinguished visitors around him.

The Lieut. Governor was the first speaker. He said we in this country had much to be grateful for. In no part of God's creation could be found better fruits of the land. This country was making great progress East and West. He expressed his great pleasure at being present. He was a country boy and he liked to be in the pure open air. After paying high tribute to the amount of the show and the quality of the exhibits he declared the exhibition opened.

Hon. Premier Murray said it was worth his while to come here and see the magnificent display that was around him. The promoters were to be congratulated on the fair. One could not get a proper idea of what the fruit industry was without an exhibition like this (applause.) He knew the fruit growing industry was as prosperous here as in any country and it was in perfectly safe hands. He asked the Horticulturists to exert their energies so we could say this was the greatest fruit growing industry in the world. It was truly a magnificent exhibit and no one need feel ashamed to show it to the world. It showed the result of industry, care and intelligence and should be continued in the future.

Hon. T. R. Black said he knew he was in the heart of Kings County and also in the heart of the garden of N. S. If the garden of Eden was better it must have been a good place to live in. He had come home from his travels conscious with the feeling that we have here what makes for comfort above all other places.

Mr. Wickwire said we were indebted for much of the responsibility of the exhibition to the municipality and called upon Warden Dr. Balcom. He congratulated the executive in the magnificent display and arrangement and made a strong plea for county exhibitions and the continuance of a local exhibition in this county each year or the east alternat-

ing with the west. Exhibitions in this County had always been a success. Hon. J. W. Longley spoke for Provincial exhibition but stated that we needed local exhibitions especially one that was such a success as he judged this one was from a brief glance.

Sir Frederick Borden said his heart was in his native county and in seeing the rest of the Dominion after the province and the Dominion after than ever before. He held this exhibition if continued would be an auxiliary to the Provincial one. This was a magnificent display of fruit, etc. He believed they could show nothing equal to it in Europe even in peaches. He asked the county and surrounding districts to back up the executive and make future exhibitions here even more of a success.

Palestine is a small country not more than 150 miles in length from Dan to Beresheba, and an average breadth of not more than fifty miles. The area of all Syria, including Palestine, is officially calculated at 108,000 square miles and the population is between 3,000,000 and 3,500,000.

AN EPIDEMIC OF CRIME

Saturday morning Truro was startled by the news of a shooting affair in their usually quiet and peaceable town. Mort McNatt shot his wife and mother-in-law, Mrs. Hamilton and afterwards procured a rifle and shot himself through the neck. Mrs. Hamilton was wounded in her wrist, and her injuries are not considered dangerous. McNatt and his wife will probably die as the result of the fracas. The same paper giving the news of the above also contains an account of the suicide by shooting of a young man named Gardner Crowe, aged 25 years at Crowe's mills, six miles from Truro. Liquor is the indirect cause of both the above tragedies. The Doherty murder is still fresh in the minds of our readers. There are two cases for murder to be tried at the next session of the Supreme court at Halifax. In view of all this, one may well inquire, What is the world coming to? There really seems to be an epidemic of crime.

CONFECTIONS FROM GRAIN.

Wheat and Malt Used in the Manufacture of Candy.

A manufacturing plant in New Jersey, formerly used as a manilla paper mill, is now operated by a corporation engaged in the unique industry of making confections from wheat and malt about the last materials in the world one would expect to find in candy.

In the earlier stages of the process the grain is fanned, ground and mixed in proper proportions. Then it is cooked to a mash, from which a thin sirup is squeezed by hydraulic presses and conducted to a great iron evaporator. Thence the sirup is carried in pipes to a vacuum pan. Here it is vigorously stirred and further evaporated. The thickened sirup is drawn off into huge shallow tin pans, where it is cooled and hardened. Plain or flavored with peppermint, the mass is a rich golden brown in color. Combined with dextrose it is dark as the familiar caramel in the candy shops.

When a batch of goods is needed for the market, the stock in the pans is broken into pieces and put into a boiler surrounded by a steam jacket. It is reduced by heat to the consistency of taffy at an old fashioned candy pull. Skilled workmen shape the mass into long strips that lie like golden snakes on a board table.

They are fed to a cutting machine, a noisy little monster with an insatiable appetite for sweets. You could almost cover the machine with a hat, yet it turns out malt creamlets nearly as fast as a Maxim gun hurls a storm of bullets. The boys who carry the creamlets from the machine to the tables where they are wrapped have little time for meditation.
