John Randolph Churchill has been officially notified that his Majesty has assented to the act proposed for the relief of the debtors of the Dominion of Wales. The measure provides for the relief of foreign vessels entering Canadian harbors and failing to comply with the treaty of 1818.

St. Paul's parish church controls Trinity, and Trinity is to be occupied on week evenings by the army and naval societies. The question of the consolidation of the railways of Western Nova Scotia is once more brought into prominence. From day to day various schemes have been proposed to accomplish this desirable end. The changes of ownership have hitherto proved abortive. In 1882 a very feasible plan for the consolidation of the whole railway system of the province, both east and west, was abandoned owing to a change in our political leadership. No company what known as the Great Western Railway company entered into negotiations with the local and Dominion governments for the consolidation of the Western Railway and the Dominion Railway. The Dominion government has been officially notified that his Majesty has assented to the act proposed for the relief of the debtors of the Dominion of Wales.

Every concession asked of the Dominion government, it was hoped the object would soon be achieved. This company tacitly termed "Jostock," from its cable address, demanded of the Dominion Government, (1) to take the company's money and pay for it at 4 per cent., while the government could get all the money it required in London for 3.80 per cent. (2) to give the company a subsidy of \$64,000 towards the construction of the missing link from Digby to Annapolis. (3) to give the company on reasonable terms, running powers over the Intercolonial from Windsor Junction to Halifax, and (4) to give the company the Windsor branch railway from Windsor to the Junction, worth probably \$1,000,000. The Dominion government has complied with all these demands and the company's satisfaction, but a difficulty has arisen which prevents the company from carrying on the work and consequently their charter must lapse. The trouble is owing to a promise contained in an order in Council of the Meekins government in 1878 granting the Windsor branch as a subsidy to the Western Counties railway; a claim which the latter has never given up and which has always been recognized in all negotiations with the government. As with the advocates of the scheme of 1882, so with "Jostock," the government granted the Windsor branch only on the condition that the company should settle the claim of Western Counties railway, and release the government from all further responsibility in the matter. This the "Jostock" Co. finds itself unable to do having excited the dislike of the Western Counties railway by its threats. Failing to settle with the Western Counties Railway, Jostock asks a renewal of the charter and to be relieved from the Western Counties' claim. This means an outlay on the part of the Dominion government of \$84,000 subsidy, the branch railway worth \$1,000,000, and the settlement of the W. Counties claim of an additional \$2,000,000. Unless this is done this scheme will collapse. But there is another proposal which is certainly far better for Western Nova Scotia, viz., the consolidation of the roads by the Dominion government and their operation as a part of the Intercolonial system. The many advantages of this scheme have been frequently adverted to and the cost to the Dominion would not be much greater than if Jostock's new demand were accepted. We believe we are the latter scheme will be consummated.
