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

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

POTATO BREAD The following recipes for potato bread to have been so made as to use a large 4 amount of potato as compared with 4 four. Excellent bread can be made with less potato. In making recipes it should be remembered that a pound of mashed potato contains about 14 cupfuls of water and starch and other substances about equivalent for the purpose to those in 1 cupful of wheat flour. STRAIGH-DOIGH METHOD Four 1-pound Loaves 3 pounds boiled and peeled potatoes (equivalent to about 34 pounds water and 3 cups flour). 425° F

The Flettner Rotor Ship "Buchas", which left Danzig recently, and ar-rived at Grangemouth, Scotland, twelve days later with a cargo of timber, is shown proceeding up the Firth of Forth. This novel ship weathered heavy seas which proved a good test for her capabilities. The TRotor ship is a new de-years ago that wind has a greater propelling force when acting on a moving sur-face. The large funnels are revolved by small electric motors, plus the action of the wind gives the boat its motive power. The vessel-is stered by stopping one of the funnels from revolving. A very small crew can operate this boat com-pared with the crew necessary on the average steamboat or sailing vessel.

greased pans which have been warmed slightly. Allow the loaves to rise until they have doubled in volume and bake 45 minutes at a temperature of 400° to  $\frac{925}{2}$  b

425°F. SPONGE METHOD Forum 1-pound Loaves 3 pounds boiled and peeled potatoss (equivalent to about 3<sup>2</sup> pounds water and 3 cups flour.) 21 pounds bread flour. 14 level tablespoons sugar. 1 cake compressed yeast. 4 tablespoons water. Clean, boil, peel, and mash the roo-tatoes as directed for the straight-dough method. In the evening take 1<sup>3</sup> pounds, or 2<sup>3</sup> solidly packed half-pint cupfuls, of the cool mashed potato, add

to it the salt, 4 ounces of flour (or 1 scant half-pint cupful), and the yeast, rubbed smooth with water, reserving 1 spoonful to rinse the cup. In the morn-ing add the remainder of the potato, the sugar, and the rest of the flour. Knead thoroughly until a smooth and very stiff dough is formed. Set away at 80 to 86° F. for about two hours, or until the dough has trebled in volume. Make into 4 loaves and proceed as in the straight-dough method.
