

## A WARNING TO **NEW BRUNSWICK**

Imports Lumber

Michigan's wood-using industries riculture, experts which are engag ed in a study to determine the effects of forest devastation on popula-

ion, agriculture, industry and econ-mic life in that State.

The forests of Michigan, the state ment continues, are now so greatly depleted as a result of devastating fires and reckless cutting that they produce chiefly fuel wood and other minor forest products instead of high grade lumber on which the State's main industries depend. The building trades and the automobile and furniture industries of Michigan must largely import their supply of high-grade lumber from other States instead of growing it at home.

For the most costly classes of roods, such as those used for autonobiles, furniture, and buildings, Michigan goes as far South as the Gulf of Mexico and as far West as the Pacifica it imports, all told, a little more than a billion board feet of umber and timber annually, of which Coast region and nearly 180,000,000 feet from the Pacific Northwest. For these amounts the State pays not only an enormous freight bill, but also the high prices incident to constantly dwindling forests.

The reforestation of Michigan's lenuded lands would, after a few ecades, say forest experts, not merely stop these costly importations but go far toward re-establishing the State's lost leadership in her once greatest industry, lumbering, it it upon a permanent basis.

The four-William Howard Taft, chief justice of the United States and former president, Lord Shaw, of Dunermline, member of the British House of Lords; George W. Wickersham, former attorney general of the Inited States and John W. Davis, ormer ambassador of the United States to Great Britain are here for he convention of the American Bar Association which opened today. Lord Shaw expressed a desire for

wider understanding among English-speaking people. "When we stop troubling about our poorer qualities and find the best ones we will all understand," he said. 

#### **EX-SERVICE MEN** ARE ASSURED OF **DECENT BURIAL**

Those Dying from Disease Contracted from War to Have Gov't Assistance.

Co-operation and assistance by the Dominion Government in the burial of ex-service men, who die from wounds or sickness contracted in the war, has now been authorized by Orderan Council. The Imperial Graves Commission has fixed August 21, 1921 as the termination of the war as regards its operations, and, therefore, deaths occurring lafter that date are not covered by the author ity of that Commission or its Canadian agency. Special action has consequently been made necessary by the Canadian authorities as regards war veterans who may die after that date from wounds or illness contracted on service.
