Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitobe, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son daughter, brother or eister of intending

Dotice Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

In certain districts a bomesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his hemestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-emplion six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time require bomestead patent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has oxbausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas ed bomestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
