Prince Edward Island. Rules Relating to Private Bills. 36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commeacement of the season ex-

plusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of

very Session consisting of five mbers of whom three shall be quorum, to be denominated. The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Comimttee has reported thereon to the House.
