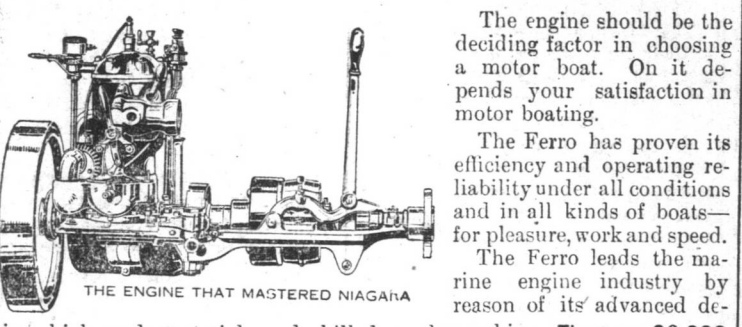

It is Minister Piccott's Own Statement.

We notice that a letter appearing in the Daily News of this morning over the signature of Elijah Mercer, of Bay Roberts in which the following statement appears:-

"Editor Daily News:-
"Dear Sir:-Will you please through your much esteemed paper, contradict a false statement which appeared in the Telegram of the 15th, saying that the Government paid me \$325 per month for the hire of my schooner on the Labrador last summer, erecting the Marconi stations. This is a downright falsehood and misleading. The Government paid \$225 (two hundred and twenty-five dollars) per month for the schooner. There were three months and twenty-one days; they joined her the first of July, and were paid off the 21st of October. That was the time, Mr. Editor."

On the 15th ult. we published a copy of a financial statement made by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Mr. Piccott, in answer to the following question of which Mr. Kent gave notice in the following words:-

To ask the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to lay on the table of the House a statement showing, in detail, amounts paid for material, supplies, hire of vessels, names of men employed, with amounts paid each, in connection with the erection of Marconi Stations; also specifying number of stations, and where each is situated at Labrador, from January 1st, 1910, to date.

On March 15th we published a letter and also a copy of this itemized statement furnished to Mr. Kent. In it was this item:-
"Capt. Elijah Mercer. Hire of Schooner, \$325 per month. \$832 50
This was how it was published. This was how it appeared in Statement furnished by Mr. Piccott to Mr. Kent.

As we are writing, now, we have before us the original statement handed by Mr. Piccott to Mr. Kent, and the item as we published it is absolutely in accordance with the item in Mr. Piccott's statement.

We invite Capt. Mercer to call at this office, or send any friend, say the Editor of the Daily News, and we will show any of them the original statement furnished by Mr. Piccott to Mr. Kent, in which the hire is entered as \$325 per month.

If this item is false and misleading then Mr. Piccott, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries Department is responsible for furnishing to Mr. Kent what Capt. Elijah Mercer characterized as "downright false and misleading."

This statement was furnished to a member of the House of Assembly in answer to a question put to the Minister in ordinary course, which he was in duty bound to answer, and to answer truly. We repeat that the item in the original statement furnished by Minister Piccott to Mr. Kent is as follows, and that we are now copying the item from that original statement:-

Capt. Farquhar's New Steamer.

S. S. SEAL LAUNCHED MARCH 22. Messrs. Napier and Miller, Old Kilmatrix, launched yesterday the steel screw steamer Seal, which they have built to the order of Capt. J. A. Farquhar, Halifax, Nova Scotia. The dimensions of the vessel are: Length, 175 feet; breadth 26 ft. 8 in.; depth, 20 ft. 5 1/2 in., with a gross tonnage of about 520 tons. She has been built under the rules of Lloyd's Register for their highest class, and is rigged as a two-topmasted schooner. She has upper and shelter decks, water ballast in double bottom and aft peak and has been specially strengthened for working in the ice when sealing off the Newfoundland coast. She is admirably suited for cruising in northern waters. The machinery, which is being supplied by Messrs. Aitken Blair, Clydebank, consists of triple expansion engines and one large main boiler and donkey boiler. During construction the vessel has been under the direction of the owner, assisted by Mr. Alex. Craig, consulting engineer, Glasgow. The naming ceremony was conducted by Miss Bea Farquhar, daughter of the owner. -Glasgow Herald, March 23.

Bonaventure's Turnout

The Bonaventure finished discharging her seals this forenoon and hauled down to A. J. Harvey & Co. pier. She turned out 26,289 seals apportioned as follows:-

Old Harps 574
Old Hoods 4058
The gross weight was 646 1/2 tons, nett 595 tons, 8 cwt, 2 qrs, 14 lbs. The young harps averaged 32 1-10 lbs., and the gross value was about \$46,000. Her crew of 270 men should share approximately \$56,000. Up to 1 p.m. the returns of damaged skins had not been received, so that the valuation of the fat could not be definitely determined.

Died Suddenly.

Mr. J. T. Phelan died suddenly at his late residence, Springdale Street, Sunday morning. He arose from bed early in the night and went downstairs. Sometime after his wife heard a noise and going down to the kitchen found that her husband had fallen off the chair and was dead on the floor. A doctor and a priest were summoned but it was too late to do anything for him. A widow and three children are left to mourn their great loss.

Day of the Little Man.

As an object of admiration the six-foot guardsman is out of date, according to the views expressed by Dr. Arthur Keith, conservator of the museum of the Royal College of Surgeons. In the course of a lecture on "Pigmies" at the Royal Institution recently.
"We all want to be tall," he said, "but the idea of great stature is an absolutely wrong one. This is the time of the small man. More than ever before in the world's history, energy, alertness and quickness of brain are required, and these are characteristic of short men rather than of tall. Great stature brings its burdens, and giants are usually dull of wit."

The King and Brave Man.

Gold Medal for Rescue at Sea. The King yesterday received at Buckingham Palace a deputation from the Royal Humane Society, of which His Majesty is patron, and presented the society's Stanhope gold medal to Chief Engineer Frank Fraser, of the Aberdeen trawler Donalde, for a gallant rescue at sea.
The deputation was composed of Admiral Sir G. Digby Morant (chairman), Mr. A. Travers Hawes (vice-chairman), Lieut.-Gen. Sir William T. Adair, and Mr. J. H. Blackwood.

Heroism in a Gale. The rescue for which Mr. Fraser was awarded the medal is described in the Court Circular as follows:-
"At 12.30 a.m. on August 27, 1910, the Aberdeen trawler Donalde was fishing on the Viking Bank, about 225 miles north-east by east of Aberdeen. Although it was blowing hard with a heavy sea running the captain decided to shoot the trawl and when he thought everything was clear shouted to let go, but unfortunately the deck hand, John Fraser, was standing on a part of the net, and was carried over the side of the vessel.
"Hearing the shouting on deck the chief engineer, Franks Fraser, rushed up from below and instantly leaped overboard and managed to reach the man, both then drifting to windward. There being a light in the after rigging the men could be seen, and a rope was thrown which the chief engineer succeeded in grasping, but his hands being greasy with oil from the engine room he had the utmost difficulty in retaining his hold and continually slipped back.
"It was only after fifteen minutes patient work that both were got safely on board, the sailor being much bruised from knocking against the side of the vessel. Extreme risk was incurred, the night being pitch dark and the sea very rough." - Daily Mail, March 24.

NO EMPLOYMENT.-The Bellaventure's message, the latter part of which could not be deciphered when received Saturday afternoon, stated that there was no improvement in the sealfishery up to the time of its transmission. Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. had a wireless to that effect to-day.

NOT ON BOARD.-The rumor current for some time past that Clara LeNeve, who figured in the Crippen murder case, would be a passenger on the Mongolian, appears not to be true. None of the saloon, intermediate or steerage passengers know of such a lady being on board.

DEED.-At Stephenville Crossing on Saturday night last, after a long illness, Ellen (Nellie), only daughter of James L. and Jane Parsons (deceased), a native of Coley's Point, Bay Roberts, aged 22 years leaving one brother to mourn her loss.

Attractive Wedding.

A very interesting wedding was solemnized Friday evening at the residence of Rev. Mr. Plotsky, Dicks' Square, when Mr. Nathan Cohen, merchant, Bell Island, was united in wedlock to Miss Lottia Sweedlin, late of Russia. There was a large attendance of friends. The groom is very popular. The festivities were kept up till a late hour. Nearly all the Hebrews in the city were present and a very enjoyable time was spent.

Since the Mongolian was last here there have been considerable changes amongst the officers. Mr. Smallie, who was purser on the Carthaginian is on the ship now, and Purser Fulton is on board as a passenger going to British Columbia. 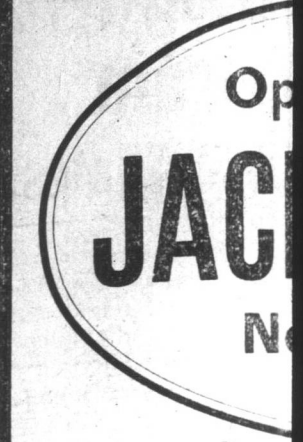

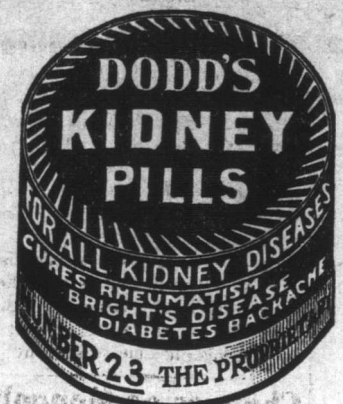

PRACTICAL AND ELOQUENT SERMON BY REV. MONSIGNOR ROCHE.

Right Rev. Monsignor Roche preached at Vespers last night. His text was taken from the first Epistle of St. Paul to the Thessalonians, 4 chap. 6th verse: "Let no man over reach or circumvent his brother in business." It was the ablest discourse on the Commandment "Thou Shalt not Steal," heard in the Cathedral since the days of the Mission given by the Jesuits. The different ways in which dishonesty may be committed were denounced by the rev. preacher; first there was domestic theft whereby the wife stole from the husband and the children from the parents; second, there is the theft of the employee who stole from his master; the other common cases included defrauding insurance companies by casting away ships and burning down houses; the thefts in using false weights and measures; putting bad material into work contracted for; keeping money paid one by mistake; retaining goods belonging to others; getting goods from dealers and contracting debts beyond one's means and refusing to pay for them. This was as bad as stealing or the work of a burglar. Too many people were dishonest on account of the craze for living beyond their means and a foolish desire to shine in fashionable clothing. This kind of theft was as bad from a moral standpoint as any other when the persons concerned took the goods of another without any intention of paying for them. There was some excuse for those who were poor and stricken with illness in not paying the debts promised that they had an honest intention to pay for them when they contracted the debt. Almightly God would not be hard on the poor. He forgave the poor man who owed a debt in the Bible parable whereas the rich man would not in turn forgive him. No scruples of having a poor tenant put out on the street should be not be able to pay the rent, and the rich man will distract on the poor man's furniture should he fail to pay the debt. God does not expect impossibilities but requires in the words of St. Paul: "That no man over reach or circumvent his brother in business." Every man's conscience will tell him when he does this. It is no avail to know it, however, without applying the remedy, viz., restitution and resolving to sin no more. Now is the time to do it while we are in life. Don't wait till the grave closes over us, depending on friends to do it; they may forget us. This is the Holy Season of Lent an acceptable time, the day of salvation. Let every one pay his debts and make restitution, resolving to live a straight, honest life in future, for even worldly philosophy avers that "Honesty is the best policy," and the poet says that "An honest man is the noblest work of God."

READ CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Monsignor also read a circular letter from the Archbishop to the faithful all over the Archdiocese. It referred to the celebration called for by the Civil Authorities under Mayor Nathan, a Whitecap Jew, to commemorate the taking away of the Papal States and the sealing on the property of the Pope by Victor Emmanuel and Garibaldi in 1870. The Circular Letter asked the prayers of the faithful for His Holiness in attacks that were now being made upon the Church by her enemies.

Ontario Murderer Confesses Crime.

Claiming Temporary Insanity. Gardiner, Ont., March 20.—Edward Jardine, aged 22 years, now confined in the county jail here awaiting trial at the spring Assizes next month for the alleged murder of Lizzie Anderson, has made a complete confession that he alone committed the deed. This confession was secured by Dr. R. W. Bruce Smith, inspector of prisons and asylums of Toronto, who was here, Saturday. Chief Coroner Arthur Jukes Johnson, of Toronto, was also here to examine the sanity of Jardine and George Vanstone. The latter is awaiting trial on a charge of murdering his six year old son here last fall. In the statement said to have been given by Jardine admits that he enticed Anderson girl from the Fair grounds to the "vacant" building a short distance away. After some alterations, in which she threatened exposure, he struck her once with the jack-knife and she died almost immediately. This murderous attack, Jardine alleges, was due to a fit of temporary insanity. Later, he returned and stripped the body off its clothing by slashing away each article with his knife. Insanily will be the defence in the case of both Jardine and Vanstone.

Her engines and boilers were given particular attention and her steaming capacity has been greatly increased, a fact which was displayed on her run to port, which she did in 9 days, though running south and thus lengthening the voyage.

LONDON To-Day.
Except as an advertisement for the cause, the opposition of the suffragists to the taking of the Census in London last night, was apparently a futile demonstration. The midnight meetings which they proposed to hold at Trafalgar Square and at Westminster, with the object of marching in procession to the Skating Rink, where the women were to spend the night, proved fruitless. Not a score of suffragists appeared at either rendezvous. There were exciting scenes at the Skating Rink, though enormous crowds had gathered to watch proceedings, and blocked the entrance and prevented the ingress of the suffragists, many of whom fainted in the crush. A large force of police was called to clear the neighbourhood. Many women spent the night in the rink, but were counted by the census officials. At Edinburgh, Birmingham and other cities, the suffragists adopted similar tactics.

City Rule in England.

Illuminating Discussion by Ambassador Bryce Before the City Club of New York.

New York, March 14.—The British Ambassador as the guest of the City Club lectured before members and guests on "Municipal Government in England." Toward the end questions came from all parts of the hall. Mr. Bryce responded quickly, although at times he had to admit that the subjects on which information was sought were so complex and involved that they could not be explained in a few minutes. Possibly the comment on municipal government in his own country that England is appreciating more and more the value of permanent retaining in municipal office and liberally paying expert officials. In the course of his two-hour lecture Mr. Bryce gave a general description of the workings of municipal government in England and finished with a detailed explanation of individual responsibility.

H. Strong of the club sat at the left of Mr. Low. Elsewhere at the main table the City Government was much in evidence. President Strong introduced Mr. Low and Mr. Low spoke for half an hour about what the British Ambassador has done to make himself liked by the American people. "No ambassador from Great Britain has ever accomplished so much for his country as Mr. Bryce has done," said Mr. Low. "The wide range of his knowledge—encyclopaedia as it is only exceeded by its unflinching accuracy. Certainly no public man has visited so many countries of the world for the purpose of acquiring information as to their institutions and peoples. And he takes with him everywhere a spontaneous sympathy and a healthy curiosity."

but is chosen by the council, not necessarily from among itself. As a rule, I should say in the great majority of cases, the enormous majority of cases, the mayor is chosen from the council. The same may be said of some of the important special functions which belong to the mayor here. He is merely the chairman of the council, and he has no more influence than belongs to a chairman whose business it is to see that the business is properly conducted.

"Very much depends upon his personal quality. It is, however, a position of dignity. He is always addressed as 'Your Worship' or 'Your Honor.' He wears a gold chain; the gold chain is often an object of great beauty, and it comes down sometimes from somewhat distant antiquity, and these attributes mark out the post as a post to which some importance is attached and in which it is always an object to secure a man of ability and character, and if possible also of high social position. I suppose that there are very few mayors who are not considerably out of pocket at the end of their terms of office by the expenditure to which they are put in sustaining the dignity of the towns by the entertainments that they give."

"I may say that in general we have apart from the councillors no elective officers. The Government is in touch with the people only through the election of the councillors. Everybody else is elected and appointed by the council itself. Therefore every council divides itself into committees and the government of the boroughs is practically vested in these committees. The committees are appointed not by the mayor but by the council. We have no custom in England at all of leaving any individual person to form a committee neither in the House of Commons nor the House of Lords nor in any county council nor in any municipal council do we give so important a function as the appointment of a committee to a single officer. These things are always vested in the body itself."

Although it was 11.30 p.m. before the ambassador concluded, not more than half a dozen of the audience left their seats. When he closed he was applauded for two or three minutes.

Disorderly Scene

At Ottawa When an M. P. Calls Another a Liar—Retraction Only Secured by Order of Deputy-Speaker.

Ottawa March 17.—There was a scene of disorder in the House this afternoon while Mr. Campbell, member for Dauphin, Manitoba, had charged that there was political discrimination in the administration of homestead laws, and Dr. Neely, Liberal for Humboldt, Saskatchewan, retorted by the statement, "It is known that my honorable friend (Mr. Campbell) has taken steps himself on certain occasions to lead even officials of the Government to do what was not in the best interests of the country."

"My hon. friend is a liar, absolutely a liar," declared Mr. Campbell. The Deputy Speaker at once interposed. Mr. Sam Hughes tried to get the floor, but Mr. Campbell interrupted, "I call him a liar," he retorted.

Mr. Campbell, who was in a white heat, vigorously pounded his desk and his voice trembled in anger. "What I said goes, he is absolutely a liar," interjected Mr. Campbell. "But if it is not parliamentary I take the words back. But he is absolutely a liar."

The Deputy Speaker again called Mr. Campbell to order, but he came back again with an even more emphatic statement, "I will not take a word back, he is a liar, first, last and all the time."

Deputy Speaker McIntyre was only able to secure a retraction of the words, after warning the Manitoban that he must otherwise report it to the House for action. He said he did so only at his orders.

Then came from Mr. Schaffner and Col. Hughes a demand for a retraction on the part of Dr. Neely, and a further

LONDON, April 2. The attitude of the Imperial German Chancellor has not dampened British zeal over the Arbitration Treaty. The projected demonstration to be held in Albert Hall has been abandoned in favor of a wider national movement, which took the form of nine hundred meetings being held yesterday and to-day in all cities in the Kingdom. Councils representing nineteen hundred Evangelical Churches passed resolutions supporting proposed treaty and welcoming the idea of American Churches observing April 2nd as Arbitration Sunday, and copies of the resolutions were forwarded Taft and Grey. News that negotiations had actually begun, was received at the meetings, and "Arbitration" was the theme of the sermons at most churches. A great peace demonstration was held at Whitefield's Tabernacle, where Lord Coleridge presided. Augustine Birrell was the speaker, and after quoting "There is a tide in the affairs of man," he said, "To-day there is a great tide and peace wave rolling across the Atlantic, that ought to be taken at the flood." Referring at length to Von Holweg's speech, he said that in his opinion, though it was below the grandeur of the theme, yet it contained passages of hope.

MADRID, April 3. The Cabinet of Premier Canalejas has resigned. It was formed in February, 1910, and reorganized in January of this year. The Premier is facing religious reforms encountered bitter opposition from Roman Catholics, which resulted in the practical suspension of diplomatic relations between the Spanish Government and the Vatican. The Premier is credited with having the support of King Alfonso. His bill, aimed to regulate religious and other societies, which he refused to submit first to the Holy See, was approved unanimously by his Cabinet on Tuesday.

LONDON, April 3. The University boat race on Saturday resulted in Oxford defeating Cambridge for the third successive year, winning by 3 lengths. The time was 18 minutes 29 seconds. Time last year, 20 mins. 14 secs. Oxford has thus achieved a new record, 18 mins. 47 secs., in 1893, and again in 1900. Betting was 5 to 1 in favor of the winning dark blue.
