LONDON, July 2. The caution scandals which culminated last May in connection with nine British Army Officers and eight civilian employees of Liptons on a charge of being implicated in a conspiracy to offer or accept bribes in connection with the allotment of army contracts, had an echo in the Lords to-day. He declared he had been deeply wronged. Sir Charles Darling, who in his judgment said in reference to a letter sent by Lord Saye and Sele, said it shows the sad decadence from the traditions of a great family. I myself, if I belonged to such a family, would rather starve than get my living by cadging for orders for beer. Lord Saye and Sele to-day debarred man from earning an honest living in trade or otherwise.

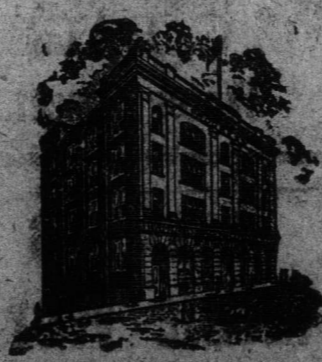

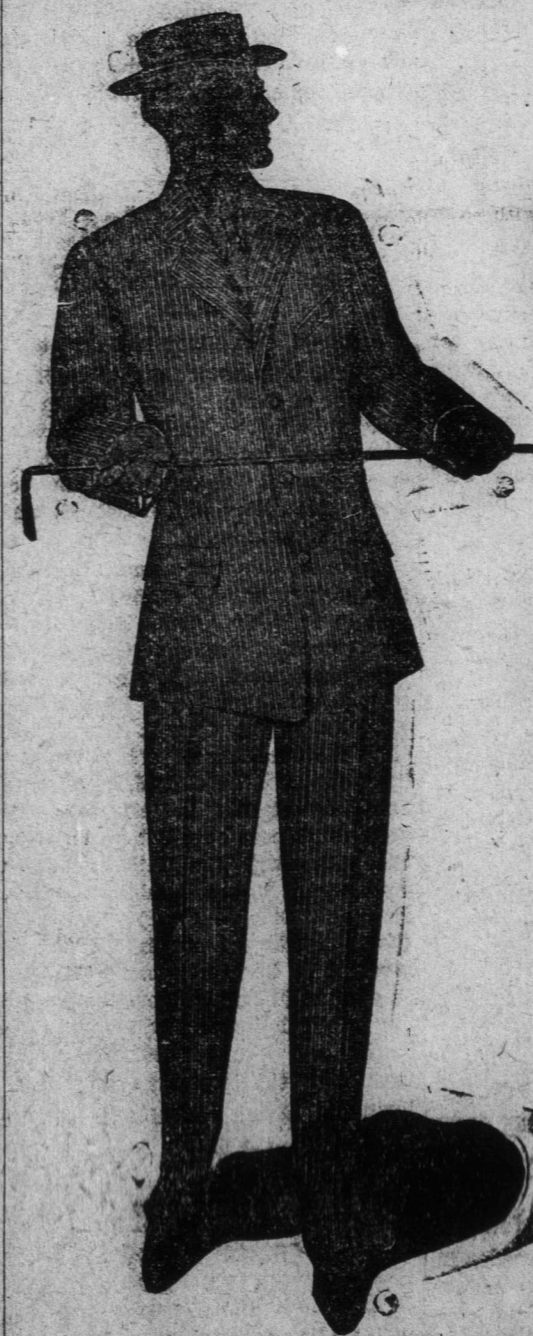

SYDNEY, July 1.
The Grand Jury found "No Bill" in the case of Mrs. Atkinson and John Donalds, both of whom were charged with murder on the information furnished by the confession of Frank Haynes, who was hanged for the murder of Benjamin S. Atkinson, last month.

OTTAWA, July 1.
Colonel Sam Hughes, this afternoon received a "black hand" letter, with red inscription, which ran: "Be aware," bearing an Ottawa postmark. Colonel Hughes treats the matter lightly, and attributes his recent vigorous letter in answer to the Socialist propaganda against young men joining the militia, as the cause.

LONDON, July 1.
Marconi contemplates being able to telegraph from Carnarvon, Wales, to New York, before the end of this year, was the statement made today by the manager of his company in testifying before the Dominions Royal Commission, on Imperial Communication. It was added that Marconi also anticipated increasing the speed of wireless to 300 words a minute.

LONDON, July 1.
The tragedy which has befallen the House of Hapsburg, according to all available news reaching London, was the result of a carefully prepared Serbian Nationalist plot, in revenge for the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, which defied the dreams and aspirations of those who hoped for a greater Serbia. The assassin has confessed that the plot was matured at Belgrade, the terrible event which thrilled Europe was only another illustration of how well justified is the anxiety always prevalent in the minds of European politicians and diplomats about the unstable conditions prevailing in the Balkans, and even in the dual monarchy.

MEXICO CITY, July 1.
Members of the British Colony here are unwilling to follow the advice of the British Minister that they should temporarily leave Mexico. Only 42 persons so far have signed the agreement to travel on the special train to the coast. More than half this number are women and children. Most of the British subjects now residing here have been in Mexico for many years, and they declare it to be their intention to remain and take their chances with the Mexicans. Members of the French, German and Italian Colonies, at a meeting held here, decided to stay in the capital.

VIENNA, July 1.
Anti-Serbian demonstrations which began on Sunday in Bosnia, have now extended to Vienna. Three hundred German Nationalist students joined in the demonstration here. They burned the Serbian flag, which was flying half-mast at the Serbian Legation, and the police had much difficulty in dispersing the students. The affair created nervousness in the aristocratic quarters of the city, where the legation is located. Similar demonstrations occurred outside the War Office and in other parts of Vienna. The declaration of martial law at Sarajevo has had the desired effect. That city is now quiet, but disorders continue in other parts of Bosnia.

VERACRUZ, July 1.
The fear of famine, resulting from the advance of the Constitutional Army, and the cutting of the railway, rather than anticipation of disorder in Mexico City, prompted Sir Lionel Carden's warning to British subjects to leave the Federal capital. According to passengers who arrived here yesterday, the impression among Englishmen, all of whom had come down on business, was that few persons would take advantage of the special

VIENNA, July 1.



Cable News.

LONDON, To-day.
In the debate in the House of Lords on the Home Rule Amending Bill, Lord Bryce expressed the belief that all difficulties could be surmounted. He admitted that some form of exclusion was necessary, but he declared he did not attach much importance to the time limit. A rumor is current that fifty thousand rifles have been landed on the coast of County Mayo, for the Nationalist Volunteers, but it cannot be confirmed. The precise effect of the Lords' proposed amendments to the Government's Amending Bill will not be known until the Bill reaches the committee stage next week, but a favorable omen is drawn by London newspapers from the conciliatory tone of speeches on both sides in the Lords yesterday for a renewal of negotiations between the party leaders which it is believed will result in an agreement. The Daily Mail asserts that Asquith's attitude has undergone modification and that he is now ready to grant exclusive to Ulster by Statute instead of by ballot. Lansdowne outlined the Unionist Peers' course with regard to the Home Rule Amending Bill. They will vote for a second reading, then move amendments giving Ulster complete exclusion and also removing the time limit. The decision to vote for the second reading was only taken to avoid civil war. Viscount Morley in moving the second reading quoted Grant's saying that England governing Ireland had gone to Hell for her principles and Bedlam for her policy. Sarcastic cheers showed the Unionists thought this applied to the present Government. Lord Willoughby de Broke moved rejection and the debate adjourned. The Times' political correspondent says the Government policy has undergone great modification. Asquith favors abandoning the principle of exclusion by Statute to four counties, Londonderry, Antrim, Down and Armagh, while the Ulster Council demands the exclusion also of Tyrone and Fermanagh which regarding the Protestant areas of the last two counties may yet be granted. The Nationalists in the Commons fear these terms will be carried by a combination of Liberals and Unionists, though Ireland will likely receive more money from Britain as a compensation.

LONDON, July 2.
Prince Alexander of Teck, the new Governor General of Canada made a most favorable impression at a dinner to celebrate Dominion Day. The passage in the Prince's speech which was most cheered was that in which he dealt with the signs of permanence and prosperity which Canada had shown during the present time of financial stringency, such as increased acreage, under crop and the fact that the banks have advanced money necessary for legitimate commercial progress, so that only gamblers have been left without.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 2.
Ambassador Da Gama, Brazil, formally announced the practical settlement of a conflict between the States and Mexico. He explained that while mediation would take an indefinite recess, awaiting the outcome of the efforts by representatives of the two Mexican factions to solve the internal problems of Mexico, the task of mediation is not yet concluded, though an essential part of its work has been accomplished.

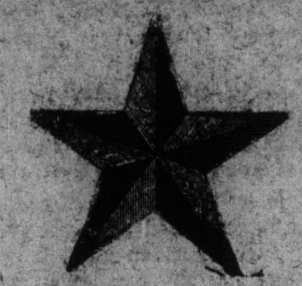
VERA CRUZ, July 2.
"Before I resign half the people of Mexico city will die with me," is a remark, Huerta is credited with having made to friends on Monday at a party discussing the efforts of the mediators at Niagara Falls to find a solution of the Mexican problem. Huerta was more grim and taciturn than usual.

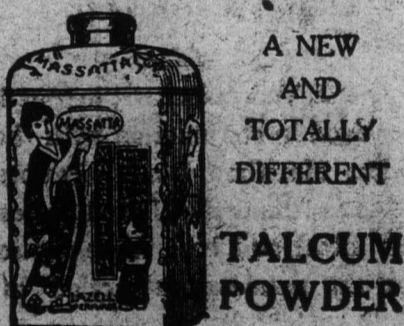

Fishery Outlook

MORE ENCOURAGING.
During the past few days the cod fishery on the western side of Placentia Bay has assumed a more cheerful aspect. On Monday last large quantities were taken with traps operating from Flat Islands to Samaline. At Tide's Cove, Jean de Bay, and Rock Harbor some good hauls were secured, the traps averaging from 25 to 35 quintals. At Berin the outlook was promising and traps operating from Flat Islands to Lamaline of 25 quintals for one haul.
A shoal of fish seems to extend along the coast to Lamaline, beyond which point very little has been done, except at Brunette Island, T.B., where one trap secured 70 quintals on Saturday last.
Caplin are running far inland at Margstown and a few days about some 5000 barrels were taken at a distance of over four miles from the entrance to the Bay.
The Cape St. Mary's fishery is also appearing brighter and traps at Cape Cove, Point Brim, Northern Head did well on Friday and Saturday last.
At Bailline one man named King has 300 quintals of fish for one trap to-date, but very little was taken by the local fishermen to-day.

Meth. School Report.

We have before us the report on Methodist Schools for last year. Rev. Dr. Curtis expresses gratification at the percentage of enrolment on the school registers of the Methodist population. It reaches 22.65 per cent, which he shows is higher than the percentage in several of the provinces of Canada and also of the United States, although there is no legal compulsion in Newfoundland for school attendance. He also sets forth that the progress obtained by Methodist schools at the C.H.E. examinations form 42.28 per cent of the whole number. On salaries, he offers the opinion that younger and lower grade teachers are paid reasonably, but that the experienced and higher class of teachers "are very inadequately remunerated for the heavy and responsible duties which devolve upon them." There is much force in the comments of the Superintendent on this matter.

Supt. Curtis dwells at length on the great problems which is so severely felt in Newfoundland. He reports that 70 teachers have withdrawn from Methodist schools during the past year. "A limited number may, probably will, resume teaching at some future time, but the great majority have definitely left the profession." He points out that this problem faces other countries and that in many an adequate supply is lacking to carry on the work. "The problem will have to be faced," Meth while any steps, practicable and reasonable, within the limit of our resources, calculated to increase the attractiveness of the profession, should be taken, and taken speedily.

As to the Domestic Science School, managed by the three Superintendents of Education, he reports "it is doing splendid work. Pupils are drawn from all the lady colleges, pupil teachers, having the right of way. In view of the value of a course in Domestic Science, this small beginning should speedily expand into a much more pretentious and useful institution."

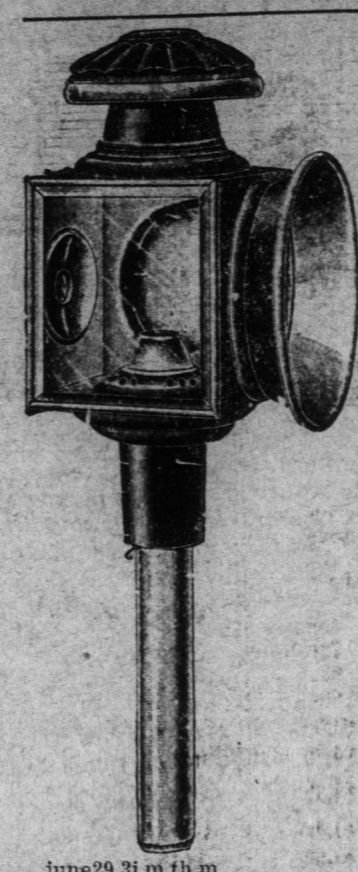

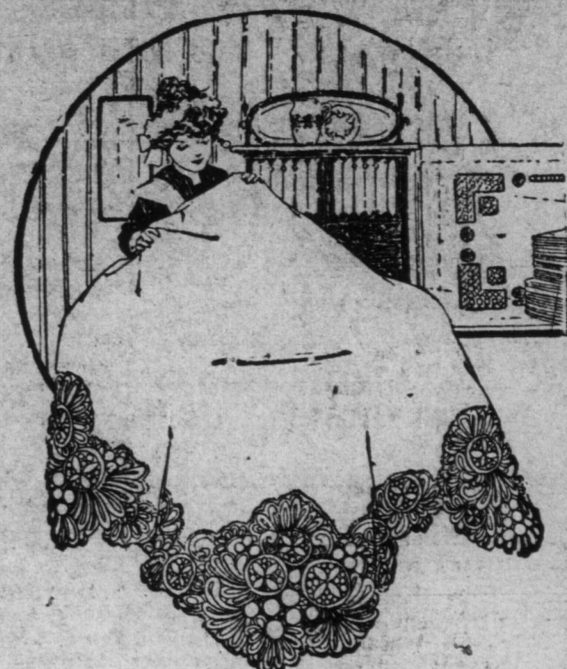

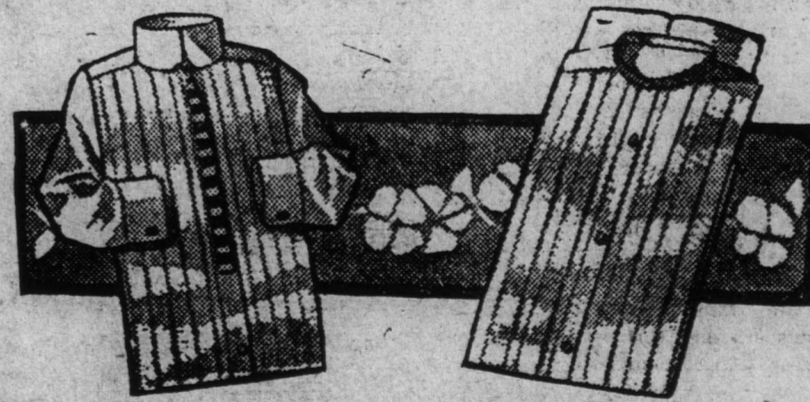

Judge's Early Struggles.

STORIES ABOUT LORD MERSEY.

In many ways the life of Lord Mersey, the famous Judge who is to be one of the three members of the Court of Inquiry, which will investigate the loss of the Empress of Ireland, has been an eventful one. The son of a Liverpool merchant, he was at first intended for a commercial life, and spent five years on the Liverpool Exchange.

Then, to quote his own words: "When I was twenty-six years of age, I made up my mind to go away and try my fortune elsewhere. But the start was far from encouraging. I came up to London with a letter of introduction to Mr. Charles Russell, afterwards Lord Russell of Killowen, who, when he read it, turned round and said, 'What on earth induced you to think of going to the Bar?'"

"However, he was good enough to say immediately afterwards, 'Come and dine with me to-night.' I went and dined with him, and I can say of him that, although his manners were rough, and although at times, perhaps, one was not pleased with what he did, he was a good friend to me."

Profits of Legal Work.

For a time, however, the future Lord Mersey—he was plain Mr. Bingham then—did not find much profit in the law, and he has told how the first year he was at the Bar he made only seven guineas. "The second year, I think, I made seventy, the third about £140, and the fourth about £400." And then he went on to prosperity.

Undoubtedly Lord Mersey's success was due not a little to his wonderful energy. Few lawyers, indeed, have lived a more strenuous life. "I used to start work at four o'clock in the morning," he once said, "and go on till eight, breakfast, and then go to the Temple at 9.30 or 10, where I worked until six; and then, after six I did nothing. Such was my programme for twenty-seven years."

Apart, however, from his wonderful legal knowledge which has won for him such a great reputation in the Divorce and Admiralty Division of the High Court, Lord Mersey is known as one of the quickest and most fearless of judges. There is a story told of one occasion when Lord Mersey, then one of the busiest advocates in the Common Law Courts, waited twenty-five minutes for a certain judge, distinguished among other things for his unpunctuality. Having a second case to attend to in another court, Lord Mersey went out to see how it was faring, and while he was away the unpunctual judge made his appearance on the Bench.

"I have waited five minutes for you, Mr. Bingham!" exclaimed the judge, impatiently, when the busy counsel returned.

"My lord," was the bold reply, "I waited five times as long."

The Home Rule Bill.

Special to the Evening Telegram.

LONDON, July 1.

When the Home Rule Amending Bill came up to-day for the second reading in the Lords, the Marquis of Lansdowne, Unionist leader, announced as Ireland was one vast armed camp, it was necessary to find a way out of a calamity that was threatening. The Unionists, therefore, would give the Amending Bill a second reading, and would introduce amendments during the Committee stage, which would be the great to be expected from the operation of the Home Rule Bill, the duration of exclusion, and the Government's excluded area. Unionists, he declared, would not agree to a second reading of the Home Rule Bill itself. Lord Lansdowne added that their action in passing the second reading of the Amending Bill would be misunderstood and misrepresented in many quarters, but there was no other way by which breathing space could be obtained with the prospects of averting the horrors of a civil war. The amendments to be introduced in the Committee stage would be directed solely to making the Bill already adequate as an exclusion Bill. With a touch of pathos, he said: "The peers are so fast bound by the meshes of the Parliament Act that there is no other course open to them which would be likely to prove effective." Most other speakers were equally conciliatory in tone. The notable exception was Lord Willoughby de Broke, leader of the "die hards," who moved the rejection of the Bill. The Archbishop of York said that what the country wanted now was not an election, but a settlement of some form of Irish self-government, which he declared was now inevitable. The Earl of Arran announced he could not vote for the second reading, because it would be violating the oath of the Ulster Covenanters.

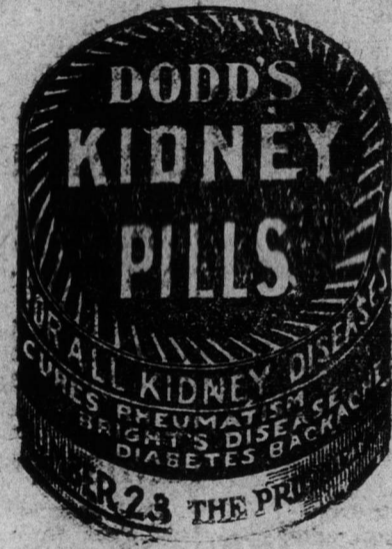

Trans-Atlantic Flyer

TAKES ON AN APPEARANCE OF READINESS FOR FLIGHT.

Hammondsport, N.Y., June 17.—

The Rodman Wannamaker trans-Atlantic flyer will begin to-morrow to take on the outward appearance of an aeroplane. To-day it is a huge red snapper fish, fresh coated with its finishing layer of paint. The tail is in place, the struts are up for carrying the two 100-horse-power motors, the cabin is finished and the steering gear, or control, is ready for its connecting wires.

Don't imagine we have chosen bright red as the color for the flyer to have it in keeping with the sensational nature of the trans-Atlantic exploit, said Lieut. Porte, to-day, for the once lapsing from his accustomed seriousness. "It is because red is the most easily discernible color, at a great distance," he continued.

Take all Precautions.

While I do not expect to be needing rescue, I know that every possible precaution should be taken, and every little detail like this is being looked after by one or many of our good friends, who are thinking of our safety. It is highly desirable, of course, to be in touch with passing steamers, even if we cannot communicate directly with them. If they sight and report us by wireless to the next ship, we are almost certain to be picked up soon if we should be in distress.

To-morrow the big red boat will take on one side of the wings, and then it will have to be removed from the shops to the flying field at the foot of Lake Keuka, since it cannot be assembled in the Curtiss shops, with its entire spread of 78 feet of wing surface, 72 feet wide. All of the supporting surfaces were finished to-day with the exception of the temporary covering of one wing. The silk covering will not be applied until after the preliminary flights.

Put Tanks in Place.

The gasoline tanks, of which there are seven, were put in place to-day. The stowing away of 300 gallons of inflammable fuel and twenty-five gallons of cylinder oil has been one of the biggest problems for the constructors. How to arrange them so as to empty them without disturbing the equilibrium of the craft; whether to arrange them so that the "empties" could be dropped overboard and where best to place them with respect to safety, these were a few of the questions the designers had to answer. Life or death, success or failure, might rest with the decision.

In this work, as in everything else connected with the designing of the cross ocean flyer, common counsel has prevailed after much discussion among Glenn Curtiss and his engineers. Dr. Zahm, of the Smithsonian Institution, Capt. Chambers, aeronautical expert of the United States Navy, Lieut. Porte and others. While the "liner" is essentially a Curtiss flying boat, in details it will be the product of many men's genius.

The six gasoline tanks will drain simultaneously into a smaller supply tank from which the fuel will be pumped up to the motors, eight feet above. Danger of explosion is thereby minimized. The simultaneous draining of the tanks will not affect the balance of the load. The six tanks are located in the middle of the hull.

The three largest ones of 150, 50 and 50 gallons, are in one compartment separated by a partition from the cabin. Four 25-gallon tanks are stowed in corners of the cabin. The tanks are fitted with splash boards and set on pads to prevent vibration starting leaks in the connecting joints.

The installation of the tanks virtually completed the placing of machinery with the exception of the two motors, which will go into their cradles to-morrow. A temporary motor was tried in one of the positions to-day. The first trial flight probably will be earlier on Friday morning. Those who wish to witness this launching of what looks like the first trans-Atlantic air liner, should come the night before, for the ideal flying conditions of early morning are most likely to be chosen for the first attempt in the air.

Several Trial Flights.

There will be several trial flights here, as the lifting capacity of the planes must be thoroughly tested under various speeds. It is likely also that trials will be made in rough weather on the lake to determine how the flyer would act if compelled to come down in the middle of the Atlantic in a moderately quiet sea.

George Hallett, the young mechanic chosen by Lieut. John C. Porte as his assistant, is getting himself into practice by going out in every Curtiss boat that flies over Lake Keuka. Hallett is up early and late with the flyers, giving them the benefit of his experience with the Curtiss engine, on which he is a recognized expert, but for the time being adding to his own knowledge by questioning each aviator here on details that might serve him in his flight.

Not being yet a licensed pilot Hallett is "gramming" with flying experience so that he may feel perfectly at home at the helm, though his duties will be mainly with the motors while Lieut. Porte holds the air liner to her course.

Lieut. Porte's plans for navigating the craft and overcoming the obstacles heretofore considered insuperable in aviation over the sea are secret, which he purposes to keep until he discloses them in subsequent articles in the Montreal Star and the New York World, it may be stated, however, that Lieut. Porte is confident he has surmounted these obstacles, and that he will be able to hold his course almost, if not quite, as accurately as on a ship at sea.

Since the above was put in type, information has been received in town that it has been found necessary to make some alterations to the flyer, and it is not likely therefore that the machine will be ready for shipment here before the first of next month.

That Fire at Clam Bank Cove

A HEAVY LOSS.

From passengers who arrived in the city by yesterday's express we have gleaned some information regarding the fire which destroyed the Abbott-Halliburton premises at Clam Bank Cove on Saturday last. The real origin of the fire is unknown, but the theory is voiced that it started from sparks which originated away from the premises. The manager, Mr. McIsaac, left the premises at noon on Saturday to go to Port au Port, and when he set out everything was apparently all right. When about eight miles on the road he looked back and noticed smoke rising from Clam Bank Cove, but as they had been boiling lobsters in the factory near the premises who he left, he did not pay any attention to the matter. Shortly afterwards he was overtaken by a messenger from the Cove, who informed him of the occurrence. The whole premises had been razed to the ground in less than three hours after the manager had left. Mr. McIsaac had often lighted his pipe before leaving the store, but on Saturday last he did not smoke until he had gone about a mile on the road. It is thought that sparks ignited some straw and shavings from packing cases and thus started the blaze, which spread rapidly, as everything around the premises was like tinder. Three kegs of powder which were stored in the building exploded, and the flames spread over the entire shop before anything could be done to control them. The estimated loss to the Abbott-Halliburton Company is in the vicinity of \$13,000, though the exact loss will not be ascertained, as all the books and records were destroyed. They had supplied largely during the season, and such loss at this time of the year will seriously interrupt their trade, particularly as no insurance whatever is carried.

SEVENTH DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House met at 3.30, the Lord Bishop presiding. There were 38 clergy and 22 lay members present. The minutes were read and confirmed.

The following committees were appointed: Directors of Bishop Field College, Education Committee, Sunday School Committee and Temperance Committee.

Mr. W. Warren presented the report of the Committee appointed to enquire into matters relating to the late Rev. T. Godden's connection with the C. W. & O. Fund.

Rev. A. G. Bayly moved a vote of thanks to His Excellency the Governor and Lady Davidson for their kind hospitality to the members of the Synod and their friends, and of congratulations to Sir Walter Davidson on the recent honor conferred upon His Excellency by His Majesty the King. This was carried by acclamation.

Mr. Luke Pittman moved a vote of thanks to the C.E.W. Associations and other kindred organizations at work in the Missions and Parishes of the Diocese.

Mr. Stirling moved a resolution dealing with Temperance. After an interesting discussion it was withdrawn, as it did not receive the approval of the Synod in its present form.

EVENING SESSION.

The House resumed at 7.30. There were present 40 clergy and 33 lay members.

The Statistical Report was presented by Mr. W. B. Stirling and received and adopted.

Rev. Frank Smart moved for the adoption of the Report on the S.P.C.K. Depot. It was forthwith adopted.

Canon Bolt intimated to the Synod that the Executive Committee would be prepared to double the offering sent from the H. & F. M. Fund to the Foreign Mission Field.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Sir,—This is the life. Imagine me sitting comfortably in the wheelhouse of the tugboat Peter St. French, Capt. D. J. McCarthy, my son-in-law, a Riverhead man too, enjoying the salubrious air sailing around Boston Harbor and lots of excitement, as I spent a good part of my boyhood days on the water. The sea always has beautiful charms for me; it is invigorating, it seems to make me ecologically inclined. I am writing with a Laughlin automatic non-leakable self-starting and filling pen. It was presented to me by Capt. Michael J. Clancy, another Riverhead man, and one of the smartest men sailing out of the Docks, a brother-in-law of Mr. O'Dwyer, teacher, Holyrood. I feel a kind of an inspiration when I take it in my hand. I suppose it is on account of the high regard I have for the donor.

I am a naturalized citizen of the United States, I cherish its Constitution, I am obedient to its laws, but I am naturally interested in the welfare of the land of my birth. I want to make it plain to a certain clique that Newfoundland with its Dependencies is very much on the map of North America.

I will not concede to any power that I am any more of an American to-day than I always was, unless it can be clearly shown to me that Englishmen, Irishmen and Scotchmen are not Europeans.

To another class of swelled heads I say, that I do not at all agree upon the phrase "American Citizen." It is an affectation.

And still farther it makes my feelings curl and twirl to hear those discontented foreigners of Europe chatter when they get naturalized. Those rubes imagine that Uncle Sam got nothing else to do only go across and spank the crowned head of Europe.

I also glean from the papers that it is the aim of some parties in this country to have the National Anthem entitled "America," as a big difference of opinion exists respecting the name. It would be better in my opinion to frown it down. I would recommend them to take a few lessons in geography from Professor Isaac Swain, B.A.

A word as to Mr. Roosevelt's "River of Doubt." He says the rapids were so swift, that he could only average 1 1/2 miles per day. It seems to me he has a curious notion on the rapidity of rivers. Household Notes

Be sure to boil soda in the coffee pot once a week. White laces should be laid away in blue or yellow paper. Oranges, bananas and figs cut up together make a very delicious dessert. Laces, continually cleaned with gasoline or naphtha will turn yellow quickly. Good lard is much better than butter for basting roasted meat and for frying. Bread will cut thinner and in more even slices if you turn the loaf upside down. To smooth an iron, plunge it while hot into cold water with a little soap in it. Eucalyptus oil will remove grease, including machine oil, from any fabric without injury. To keep lemons, put them in a stone jar of clean, dry sand, so that they do not touch. Every kitchen should have among its supplies a saw for trimming meat and some larding needles. A pretty and novel idea is to serve hot biscuits, folded in napkin, in little sweet grass baskets. Silk dresses should always be reinforced with silk under the arms, where the most wear comes. It will save fine hose if a piece of velvet is glued inside the heel the moment the shoe begins to rub. A tiny piece of garlic laid on the lettuce half an hour before serving will give a slight savory flavor. The cloudy look on a piano can be removed by a cloth dipped in soap and water and wrung very dry.

Glasgow Wants to Learn From Canadian Cities.

Looking Into Relative Merits of Different Taxation Schemes.

To weigh the relative merits of taxing land on income values as is done in Glasgow and on capital value as is done in this country is the special object of a trip now being made by Thomas McMillan, senior magistrate of the city of Glasgow, and Alexander Walker, chairman of the board of assessors in that city.

Both gentlemen are in Montreal today and will remain here until Wednesday. They went to the City Hall yesterday and visited the Mayor, spending some time in the assessment department.

"Up to the present I am certainly more in favor of taxing capital than income values," said Mr. McMillan, and Mr. Walker agreed with him. "The object of our trip is to make a special report for the people of Glasgow, for we are desirous of getting as much result as possible. At present we have a general rate, etc., and now the question of changing the rate on land is occupying the Corporation of Glasgow. On our report will depend largely whether any change is made."

The two gentlemen left Glasgow on March 28, and have made a tour of the United States and Canada. They will go from here to Boston and New York, whence they will sail for home in a week's time.

"British Columbia was especially the object of our trip, for there they have tried the capital value of land as a basis of taxation," said Mr. McMillan. "We have called at other cities more because they were en route than for anything else, although we have learned a lot from staying in many of the places. You have some fine cities in the West, and Edmonton, where the single tax is in operation, struck me as being especially so."

Asked whether they had taken much notice of civic loan flotation here, the visitors confessed that they had not. They did not see where they could improve on their present method in Glasgow. "We have not yet found any place on this side," said Mr. Walker, "where the city has to post up a notice that no more applications to lend money can be received. We get that in Glasgow every time we ask for a loan. We usually pay about 3 per cent, although on the last occasion we raised it to 3 1/2 after your Canadian loan had failed.—Montreal Star, June 16.

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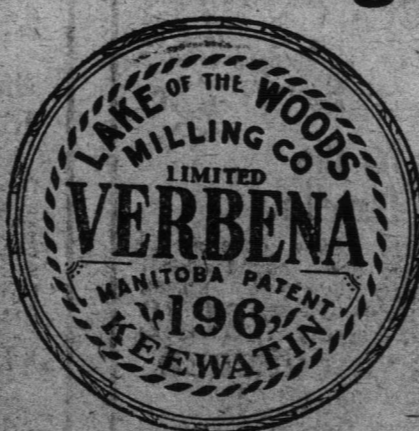
