

NEAR EAST STRUGGLE.

LONDON, Oct. 18. Reports that the Allies have occupied Strumitza, and landed at Enos, eccently transferred from Turkish to Bulgarian rule, has caused a more opimistic feeling throughout the Allied ountries as to the progress in the near Eastern campaign. It is known from both Serbian and German accounts, that Field Marshal Von Mac-Kenzen's army is meeting with greater resistance than expected, although t is probable that the Serbians eventually must fall back to stronger strategic positions in the north. The fact that the Allies are bringing heavy orces against the Bulgarians, and so placing them that the Bulgarians will be compelled to divide their armies, gives hope here that the Germans may be baulked in their attempt to reach the sea to bring assistance to the Turks. All along the line the Serbians and their Montenegrin neighbors Russian Government reports who are also being attacked, are offering stubborn resistance both to the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians. While they have given up a number of towns and positions, they have not yet reached the line on which they expect to make their seand. The Bulgarians, so far as can be learned, have made progress only in Zlotokopalla Valley, near the River Morava, north of the town of Vranya, where they blew up a bridge. There is no confirmation of the report that they cut the railway in this district, the bridge which they destroyed being a wooden one near the railway. 

### Greece Badly Off Financially.

She Must Soon Come Off the Fence or go Bankrupt.

(By Gordon Gordon-Smith in the New York Tribune.) Salonica, October 12.—It is absolutely certain that Greece is unable to stand the strain of armed neutrality created by mobilization. She has put under arms 350,000 men who have Sir Percy, who is sixty-two years to be clothed, fed and equipped. Greece must have aid from without to bolster her financially. Who is going to give it to her-the Quadruple Aliance or the Central Powers? While Venizelos was in power there was a guarantee that no assistance would be sought in Berlin or Vienna.

Now it is a different question, but perfectly plain that Greece must come, off the fence or go bankrupt. There s no disguising the fact that the long drawn out negotiations with Bulgaria, during which great pressure was brought to bear on Serbia, Roumania and Greece, hurt the Allies' cause. alienating thousands of persons who formerly favored the entente.

Every one in Serbia, Roumania and Greece knew that Bulgaria was only fooling the Allies and sparring for

What is needed is a clear public declaration that the Allies are prepared to put a sufficient army in the Balkans to back up the efforts of Serbia, Roumania and Greece, if the Entente hopes for favor from these States. The flasco of Bulgarian diplomacy does not make for blind confidence on the part of the other Balkan States. 

WHY WOOD PULP EXPLOSIVE CAN'T BE USED.

"What's the use of cutting off the cotton supply when the Germans can use explosives made from wood pulp That question is often asked, but


not so often answered. It's quite true that the powders for propelling shells can be made from wood instead of cotton, but the fact is that wood pulp explosives are not of the same strength as cotton explosives.

The result of this is that a shell fired with wood pulp explosive will not explosive. That means that all the existing range tables of the German guns are useless.

Not only that, but to make the German artillery carry as far as at present it would mean using a greater quantity of wood than cotton explothe constipated waste matter and sive, because the former is weaker, This would mean larger propelling cartridges, and the alteration of the field and other big guns used by the

To alter the guns would be impossi ble during war, so though wood pulp explosive may be used, it is unlikely that it will be.





cared for; when it is streaked with yellow, and to be brutally frank, when it isn't clean. Gray hair should have a regular fortnightly shampoo. For this warm water and a mild white soap should be used and the strands rubbed between the hands until every trace of oil has been cut loose by the lather. Following the soap washing there should be a rinsing with clear warm water. Let the temperature of the rinsing water be gradually increased until it is as hot as can be borne with comfort, and then gradually lower the temperature until it is

Never shampoo the hair at night as the best time is in the morning when the drving can be done beside an open window where the strands will get the benefit of fresh air and sunshine. Do the drying with warmed Turkish towels, gently rubbing the strands until every trace of moisture has disappeared. Then, very gently, comb out any tangles; don't brush them out, as if you do you may break some of the

strands. After combing and brushing, separate the hair in parts all over the head and rub the scalp, very lightly, with pure olive oil. Use very little oil, just enough to moisten the finger tips. The next day dust the scalp with rice powder and, with a soft brush, rub the powder around until all trace of the oil has been absorbed. In between these semi-monthly shampoos there should be a dry shampoo. This begun by carefully combing and brushing the hair and then generously sprinkling rice powder thick on the calp and through the strands.

Rub the powder in the scalp and through the strands until any oil has been absorbed and then cleanse the hair of the powder by another careful combing and brushing. This treatment, regularly used, will keep gray hair fresh looking, silvery and fluffy. And that means it will keep it attractive.






