Two Hundred Thousand Miners Out on Strike.

S. Coal Fields Now Idle - Moorish Tribesmen Cut Up French Column - Royal Assent Given Irish Free State Bill.

THE EYE OF ALL FOOLS DAY. NEW YORK, March 31. About 100,000 Union miners quit to-night in the bituminous and anthracite coal fields to enforce the wage contracts.

FRENCH KILLED IN SURPRISE ATTACK. LONDON, March 31. Seven hundred men belonging to French columns have been killed wounded in a surprise attack by Moors in French Morocco, according to a despatch to the Times.

NOW LAW. LONDON, March 31. The Irish Free State Bill became to-day when King George gave assent to the measure.

TOO EARLY TO REJOICE. LONDON, March 31. Speaking to the new Irish agreement to-day, Winston Churchill said as not yet time to rejoice over the development, as there was a period of anxiety and uncertainty.

CANADIAN REVENUE DECREASE. OTTAWA, March 31. The total Canadian customs and excise revenue for the fiscal year ending to-day was \$229,800,274, compared with \$234,407,668 for the previous year, being a decrease of over sixty-four millions.

CANADIAN RAILWAY STATISTICS. OTTAWA, March 31. Sixty-one million passengers were carried on Canadian railways last year. Four were killed and 240 injured. The total railway employees were 187,177, and ninety of these were killed and 1344 injured.

AN APPEAL FROM JUGO-SLAVIA. PARIS, March 31. The French Foreign Office has received a note from the Government of Jugo-Slavia, suggesting that Britain and France co-operate to re-

establish order in Fiume and assure the execution of the Treaty of Rapallo.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN THE BAHAMAS.

MIAMI, Florida, March 31. The three hundred room Colonial Hotel, Nassau, Bahama Islands, was destroyed to-day by a fire which threatened the destruction of most of the city, according to a radio message. The conflagration caused damage running into millions.

MALCONTENTS BUSY.

LONDON, March 31. Irish Republican Army insurgents held up a train at Newton Cunningham, County Donegal, and burned all newspapers. Insurgents shot the Free State troops from the barracks at Carrionagh and Moville.

ADMIRALTY EXPLOSIVES SEIZED.

LONDON, March 31. Raiders to-day seized a cargo of explosives aboard an Admiralty ship off the Irish coast and stowed safely away in an unknown place, according to a Cork despatch to the Times.

SNOW AND SLEET IN ONTARIO.

TORONTO, March 31. Communications in Western Ontario have not been so badly crippled for years as to-night following a storm of snow and sleet for two days.

Grand Jury's Presentment.

YOUR LORDSHIPS:
We, the members of the Grand Jury, acting on your suggestions, have visited and inspected the following public institutions and now beg to present our report on same.

PENITENTIARY.

On arriving at the Penitentiary we were met by the Superintendent who gave us every facility for our inspection. We visited the cells and found them very clean and well kept and that all the surroundings were conducive to the health and well being of the prisoners. We then inspected the broom factory and were very pleased with the arrangements of the place and with the work produced. We would strongly advise that similar industries be introduced to occupy the time of the other prisoners who are now compelled to be idle; this would be of great benefit to them and would also help the finances of the Institution. Generally speaking, we are of the opinion that the state of affairs is most satisfactory and redounds to the credit of the staff. There are now 62 male and 7 female prisoners there.

POOR ASYLUM.

We next visited the Poor Asylum and were shown through by the Superintendent, and found everything as satisfactory as could be expected under the circumstances. We concur in former reports as to the necessity of a new and up-to-date building but in the meantime think some improvement should be made. The sanitary and toilet arrangements are most unsatisfactory and quite inadequate to the needs of the inmates. There are 70 on the male side and in the female and for the use of the former there is only one bath and three toilets and for the latter only one bath and two toilets. We are of the opinion that this matter should receive immediate attention; in fact, we would suggest that the attention of the Board of Health be directed to this matter. The Superintendent wishes to call attention to the necessity of a general clean-up of the whole place, both inside and out, painting, repairing, etc., and would suggest that as far as possible this work and in the general upkeep of the place those inmates capable of working should be employed, which would make them healthier and happier than remaining idle. As there are a number of sick inmates we think a doctor should visit weekly as well as on special occasions. We think the officials are doing their best for the comfort of the inmates as far as facilities will permit.

INSANE ASYLUM.

A Committee of the jury visited the Asylum and were met by the Doctor in charge who explained the arrangements and work of the Institution, and we found everything satisfactory and up to date, with the addition of the new building everything seems to have been provided for the welfare of the inmates. The roomy corridors, neat and well ventilated rooms, ample provision of light and heat combined with the beautiful surroundings of the building provide ideal conditions which should effect the objects aimed at, and we believe the Medical Superintendent and Nurses are keenly interested in their work and do their best for the welfare of those committed to their charge. We understand that the portion of the building set apart for acute cases is badly heated and poorly ventilated. We understand that this is the class of cases which requires most treatment and the least possible disturbance from noise, and it is absolutely impossible to get this in these wards. They are part of the original building and are very badly heated and the wonder is that some of the patients have not suffered severely from cold. Regarding the protection, there is, other than the stairs, only one fire escape on each side of the building, and these are so constructed that it would be practically impossible for even a sane person to escape. We understand the cost would be very small to place an adequate fire escape on this building. Respectfully submitted on behalf of the Grand Jury.

Sharpe drove to Blaketown to attend the funeral, which was conducted by the Incumbent, Rev. C. Jeffrey, who was at that place for the Sunday services and remained to perform the sad ceremony. Condolences to the bereaved relatives.

Mr. Geo. Simmons lost one of his horses on the 15th inst. The poor animal in endeavouring to get free, in the stable, managed to get entangled in the halter, and owing to injuries sustained had to be destroyed.

A BIT VAGUE.

DUBLIN, April 1.
A proclamation has been issued from Republican Army headquarters, urging men "to stand by the Government set up by the Irish people." It requires officers and men to report to any of the six brigade divisions of battle headquarters, named prior to ten o'clock this morning.

HUGE FORCES.

MOSCOW, April 1.
It may be possible to further curtail the Red army, War Minister Trotsky told the Communist Congress yesterday, but it all depends on the international situation and events in the spring. The army is at present 1,640,000 men, and the navy 25,000.

DE VALERA'S DESIRE.

LONDON, April 1.
Hope, tempered with doubt and fear, is the keynote of morning newspapers editorial comment on the outlook in Ireland. The Daily Mail sees indications that Mr. De Valera is meditating a coup d'etat, and calls upon Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins to show their strength, declaring if they

fall to govern, De Valera will make short work of them. The Daily Chronicle sees Mr. DeValera working towards a military dictatorship. One feature of press comment is a universal tribute to the statesmanship of Mr. Churchill, who earns the highest praise, even from political opponents.

LONDON, April 1.

The Dublin brigade of the Irish Republican Army, has been mobilized for parade Sunday morning to take a new oath of allegiance or an oath with new implications, says a statement issued from army headquarters, Beggars Bush barracks, telegraphed in the Daily Mail's correspondence.

TRINITY.

THE BURIN STORY—(Continued and Concluded) from last week.

—And yet that man was Ambrose B— who had left Burin twenty-six years before, and who was supposed to be dead. No one recognized him as he passed down the road to Port au Bras, and one of his daughters, as he passed her house, remarked "another pack-man has come to town." He went on his way to where his brother lived, but when he got to the bottom of the Cove on the opposite side, standing in the doorway of a house that stood out from the other houses, was a woman, and being thirsty he asked her for a drink of water. His voice startled her; she looked at him, and instead of going for the water, she fainted and fell to the floor. That woman was his wife and she knew him. In the meantime Captain B— went on around the Cove to his brother's house. His brother was seventy-five years old. After a day or two it was known all through the settlement that Ambrose B— was alive and home again.

At the time his two sons, Samuel and George were on the Grand Banks in their fishing vessel. By another banker captain who left Burin a few days after the report became generally known, a message was taken to Captain Sam, that his father was alive, and home to Port au Bras. Samuel was old enough to remember his father when he went away, but George was too young at the time to have any definite recollection of him. As soon, however, as they heard the news, they decided to return home. Neither George nor any of his sisters showed any great interest in their father. When it was time to return to the Banks, Samuel decided to remain at home, and George went in charge of the schooner. Captain Ambrose B— did not get a very warm reception from his former friends and he did not stay long at his old home. During his stay, however, his son Samuel never left him, and when the captain decided to leave, Samuel accompanied his father to Port aux Basques, by the s.s. Glenace, and gave evidence of much filial love for him.

While the captain was at home, he called on his wife—Mrs. F— and told her not to worry. "You," he said, "have a husband and I have a wife." It is not known how he got away from Brig Bay; but it is generally supposed that he left there in a banker during the fall after he had left his schooner. He probably landed at Gloucester, and from there he came to the State of Maine, married, and settled down in one of the seaports. At the time he visited Newfoundland he said he was the owner of a large lobster factory and employed a large number of lobster fishermen.

Some one asked Ambrose's brother John why Ambrose did not return in the schooner so many years ago. John replied that he had given him no satisfactory explanation of it; but, he said—"before Ambrose went away to the Straits twenty-six years ago, I noticed something wrong about him, and though I never mentioned this before, I asked him what was wrong, but all he said was—"John, I know my own know," and that's all the satisfaction he ever gave me."

Some people doubted that what Ambrose B— had said about his wealth, and wife and children in Maine was true. It was, however, proven to be all true by a man and his wife whom he took away with him and who returned. Ambrose persuaded this man to go with him to the State of Maine, and promised him steady and profitable employment all the year round. The man left Burin with his wife and child, and when he got to where Ambrose B— lived, he found that everything Ambrose had told him and others were quite true, and he settled down to the work assigned to him. He remained there about two years and then he returned to Burin, giving as his main reason for doing so, that he had to work on Sundays there. He spoke very highly of Ambrose B— in every other way, and to the everlasting disgrace of the Ambroses—had a fine home in — with lots of land, cattle and horses, and plenty of money. The coming back of Ambrose B— to Burin after his absence of twenty-six years, when he was supposed to be dead, was just a nine days' wonder, and within a month after he had left again his name had ceased to be mentioned.

Thus ends the first story that I have written under the heading of Trinity, without there being any reference to, or association—directly or indirectly—with Trinity. I thank the person who so kindly sent me the skeleton of the story, and I hope that I have clothed it in such a natural sequence of possibilities, as will command to those to whom the details are more fully known than they are to me. It would be a boon to the fishermen of Dunfield, and it would also enable the motor-ferry to make Dunfield a port of call, and this would be a deserving convenience to the travelling public.

We fully appreciate the kindness of the Postmaster General in arranging for our mail to come to us by aeroplane. We were all glad to get the mail, but doubly so to have the pleasure of seeing the aeroplanes in motion and in repose. No doubt, fifty years hence people will laugh at our actions when we saw a plane for the first time, but "the laughs best who laughs last."

Leutenant Batson, wife and child, have taken up their residence in Mr. Ralph Pittman's house. Mr. Batson has taken a position in connection with the firm of Joseph Morris, and we wish him every good success.

The winter of 1922 will be remembered as the winter when the whole gamut of methods of mail delivery was run up. First it came to us by train, then by dog-team, then by steamer, and then by aeroplane. It took us back in quiet thought to the comparatively recent past, when Peter Coleman brought it to us once a week from New Perlican, and took it up to the Post Office in his red bandana pocket handkerchief; and in later years when Thomas White carried it (sometimes eighty pounds weight) on his back all the winter long, to Catalina, Bonavista, and sometimes to Bird Island Cove. "There were giants in those days"—at least there was one, in bodily strength and endurance, in the person of Thomas White, and to the everlasting disgrace of the Government of his day—when, though every effort was made to secure for him retirement, and a pension, after long years of such faithful work, and painful endurance, it was refused.

Some Interesting Incidents in Our Newfoundland History.

In one Nathaniel Phillips' time (1790), clerks had a very hard life, they were treated almost like menial servants. One day Phillips' faithful old Irish servant told his master the appalling news that the young gentlemen (his clerks) wanted a change in their dinner—all three had declared they would eat pork no longer. "Not eat pork," said the old man in a furious rage, "I'll make 'em eat port until the bristles grow on 'em." The three clerks referred to were Henry Shea (father of Sir Ambrose Shea), George Lilly (afterwards Judge Lilly)

and William Lilly, of Harbor Grace. (Vide Provese page 348).

During the year 1625, Newfoundland was in great peril from Turkish pirates; and such names as "Turk's Gut" and "Turk's Cove" in Newfoundland to-day, record the memory of these terrible corsairs. (Vide Provese p. 146).

In and about 1700, besides the fishing-admirals there were other functionaries with still more high-sounding titles. We read in the records of those times of the violent acts of one Ford, the "Governor of Petty Harbor," and also of the truculent humors of the "King of Quidday Vitty." The oldest ship-fisherman in each harbor was called the "King."

In 1762 St. John's, Carbonar (query—Editor) and Trinity were captured by the French.

Some fifty years ago my old friend John Murphy said to my father: "Large, are you going to the shooting match to-morrow?" "What shooting match?" my father asked. "Why," John said, "sure it's St. Patrick's Day and John Doherty is going to put up a watch of his shot at." Well, since I can remember, with every St. Patrick's Day, when fine, there has been associated either a bowling, or a shooting not at, but for a prize. This year the day was fine, and some of our local sports equipped a shooting gallery on the S.W. Arm. The prize was a 22 rifle, the distance 50 yards, and the charge 10 cents a shot. Some 200 shots were fired, and the target had several narrow escapes. The two best shots were those of Mr. Harry Hayter and Mr. Harry Rowe, who made two bullseyes and an outer, and one bullseye and two outers, respectively. The gun, valued at \$20, was won by Mr. Harry Hayter.

March 19th, fifty years ago to-day, the East Coast of Newfoundland was swept by one of the worst N.E. snow storms that the oldest inhabitant can remember. Five sailing vessels that had left Bay Roberts for the ice some days before, and had got north of Cape Bonavista, were driven back by the beginning of the storm, and had taken refuge in Trinity. It was a beautiful morning, and the Captains Dawe (4) and Wilcox together with dozens of other men and boys (myself included) belonging to Trinity, spent the afternoon at bowling in the loft of the stores at the upper "room." Some children perished on the ice in Catalina Harbor, and an old woman was blown into the sea whilst crossing on the ice at Salmon Cove. I shall never forget what fine looking men those captains were, and how thoroughly they enjoyed the bowling on that day. They left Trinity some time the next week and Capt. Robert Dawe and some twenty-four of his crew were lost in the farther north a few weeks after—May God be good to them.

Answers to Correspondents.

"J.R."—Your paternal grandfather was born in the parish of Sandwick in the County of Dorset, England, and came out as a youngster.

"A.T."—Mary March was a Bethleh, or Red Indian. She was brought from the interior to Trinity, and Mrs. Kelson (Mrs. Pittman's mother) made her first dress, which she wore when she was taken to St. John's. She died of consumption in 1823.

"A.T."—Yes, thank you for the correction. The Bell in the Roman Catholic campanile, is in memory of Priscilla Doherty, who was a Hiscock and the widow of Edward Doherty, and not Ann Doherty, as I reported last week.

"Curiosity."—The original names of several of the Capes on the East Coast of Newfoundland were given by the Portuguese. For instance Cape de Frey Line (Cape Freelo), Ylla des Rosellas (Baccalieu Island), Cabo da Espers (Cape Spear), Capo Race (Cape Race), Boa Vista, corrupted by the French into Bonne Vista, and by the English into Bonavista.

"Trinitarian."—All the Micmac Indians are Roman Catholics. They were Christianized by the Jesuits. Those in Newfoundland came from Cape Breton, or Nova Scotia.

"Inquirer."—"Calabogus" was a fa-

The Mystery of Middle Bight.

And the Hero of Bird Rock—Mr. Haines' Awesome Recital.

The story of those "mysterious fires" near Antigonish, N.S., published by one of the city papers a day or two since, reminds me of another somewhat similar tale—"The Mystery of Middle Bight"—that Mr. John Haines, of the latter place used to tell, more than a quarter of a century ago. When visiting his place, I often listened with peculiar interest while he solemnly dilated upon the awesome incidents connected with certain "supernatural lights and shadows" occasionally seen there. He also wrote me about the matter, and I have at this moment on my desk a letter of his, dated August 14th 1891, in which he says: "I have heard many ghost stories talked over by the people of this and adjacent villages, and I have also read some thrilling accounts of those supernatural beings and strange lights and signs and tokens perceptible only at night. Perhaps some of our city visitors are aware that, about a furlong's space from Kelligrew's Station, a beautiful, verdant point of land stretches for a considerable distance into our noble bay. This point, known as Kelligrew's Head, contains not less than three acres of meadow land. On the eastern side is a dilapidated wharf, and a store, still used by the present owner. Close to the margin of the water is built the railroad, which severs the connection of the piece of land with the point.

AN OLD UNTENANTED HOUSE.
On the southside of the railway track stands an old house, untenanted for a number of years. Near this house are several graves; but the interior of the bodies must have taken place a very long time ago, as the oldest men here know nothing of it. Some years ago a small cannon was found on the headland, which, perhaps, some other race than ours used to defend themselves against the attacks of their enemies. As far back in the past as the adults of this place can trace, an old man, by the name of Gillingham, claimed possession of this strange property, then, after his death, Hodge became owner, and put it in a state of cultivation; after which it was handed down to Parmiter, who was related to Hodge by marriage. Parmiter added many acres to it, and put it in ample order.

STRANGE LIGHTS SEEN.
But strange lights, and so on, were seen and heard; so Parmiter sold it to its present owner, Michael Cronan (a native of Wexford, Ireland), for the sum of \$800, and started out west to earn a better livelihood and to say "farewell to the ghosts." Since Parmiter's accession to the property up to the present day many are occasionally seeing those mysterious lights. One night I, with several others, went on the "gallery" which overlooks Kelligrew's Station; we included the stationmaster and two ladies from town. The train had left just twenty minutes when one of the number directed our attention to a light in the old house before mentioned.

GREEN LIGHT THROUGH THE SASSLESS WINDOW.
To our great surprise we saw a large light shining through the sassless window down stairs. It illuminated the house, so that we were able to count plainly the clapboards even at such a distance. It then went up stairs and shone for a minute only; next it came out, crossed the track and disappeared about seventy yards away. Five green lights shone out like this at intervals of about three minutes; then came a bright red light, and a noise was heard in the house. The light did not remain in the house longer than half a minute, but spread out and went rapidly over the ground. Two shadows of what seemed to be supernatural beings were in the light. Five of us walked quickly from the station towards the house till we got not more than twenty feet distant. We waited patiently for an hour. Then, seeing nothing, we began to retrace our steps, when suddenly we saw three lights more in succession. Then all was over!

The Story About Bird Rock.

"A SPECK ON THE MAP."

In a recent number of the New York Outlook I find a most interesting story from the pen of Pullerton L. Waldo, entitled, "An Island Hero." The whole tale is told in a pleasing manner, and relates to "a speck on the map" with which many of our "lovers of the sea" are familiar, including, of course, Capt. Will Bartlett and the sturdy crew of the S.S. Viking, who know all about "the Rock" from personal experience, having prosecuted the seal-fishery in that direction for the past twenty years, more or less.

THE BIRD NURSERY OF THE ATLANTIC.
Northeast of the Magdalen Islands, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, says the writer mentioned, is an islet upreared to a height of nearly two hundred feet above the mean of the tides. It is called Bird Rock, and it is the finest bird nursery of the North Atlantic region. 'A brow is forever beclouded with a flapping and crying myriad of gulls, auks, kittiwakes, murre, gannets and other fowl, and round its base the waves break like wild creatures in a white and roaring fury that never wears itself out, though it has bitten and torn the living rock away. A moving-picture operator visited the island, and was dangled over the brink of the cliffs at the end of a rope to secure his pictures. He was warned not to look down as he mounted the rickety ladders, lashed end to end, through the crevices to the top of the rock. The leaping sea at the foot of the ladders and the deafening birds flying about him, affrighted for their eggs and their eyes, made the ascent as perilous a venture as the taking of the photographs. Peter Bourgo, was lord of this tiny insular domain. Peter had been there for twenty-eight years.

THE HORRIBLE LONELINESS.
His story was this: Before his coming two keepers of the island light had lost their reason, owing to the horrible loneliness. The second had to be taken to the mainland in a strait-jacket. The Canadian Government was greatly concerned to obtain a successor in his place. For a long time no man offered himself. Then Peter Bourgo came forward. "I will accept the place," he said, "if you let me take my wife and son with me." The authorities gladly consented. When Peter came to the island, he resolved at once to do everything possible to keep the family life on a sane and normal plane, in order to avoid the fate that overtook his predecessors. He had at first only his wife and a son to consider; later a daughter was born, and a welcome flower she was, abloom among those gaunt and barren crags.

BEWILDERED BY RIVAL SOUNDS.
The lighthouse steamer came out once a year, bringing letters and newspapers. Peter made a box with a compartment for each day. Then he took this annual mail and divided it among the pigeon-holes; and every morning at breakfast they could pretend they were getting the post for that particular day—though it was a year old. The evenings in rotation were given to study—the French language, the poetry of Robbie Burns, the lore of the rocks and the birds about them. Each of the four studied music—cabinet organ, violin, cornet, voice; and the birds that fluttered and cried round the faithful light must have heard in bewilderment the rival sounds. As for the light itself—when there was fog (and that might be for weeks and months at a time) it was necessary not only to keep the fog-horn going but to fire guncockton bombs at twenty-minute intervals. Father and son reviewed each other at this task; and if the boy for any reason failed, the father was awake immediately to know why. He could not sleep unless the noise stilled the silence on the very instant.

A BRAVE AND RESOLUTE MAN.

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

Royal Princesses and Their Weddings.

SOME OLD-TIME CEREMONIES.

(Glasgow Weekly Herald.) Of the marriages of most of the early Scotch Princesses little is known except the record of the fact, there was the "wedding" and the subsequent marriage.

Matilda, daughter of Henry I, is really the first English Princess whose marriage is recorded in history. She was born in England, and was descended on her mother's side from the house of kings, and she was only seven years old when an army of German nobles came to England to ask her hand for the Emperor Henry V.

The first really lawful marriage, however, of a Princess Royal was that of Joanna, the daughter of King John, who married Alexander II, of Scotland, in 1215.

The married daughters of Edward IV, experienced very different destinies. The marriage of the eldest, Elizabeth, with the Earl of Richmond, united the "Two Roses."

Henry's daughter, Margaret, found a husband in James IV, of Scotland. The marriage did not take place in England, but the betrothal was celebrated at Richmond in 1609.

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The first marriage in England of a Princess of the Georgian era occurred half a century after that last recorded. In March, 1733, the Prince of Orange, whom Queen Caroline called an "anti-mat" and George II, a "baboon," was married to the Princess Anne in the French Chapel, St. James's.



The Vindication of the Law.

An Incident in the Life of the Mounted Police When the Canadian West was Young.

By Captain R. G. Mathews, Who Was "The Kid" in the Tale Set Forth.

(Saturday Night Toronto.)

To any one not familiar with the lay of the land in Southern Alberta, the name of "Standoff" will not convey much information or meaning. If a person, however, will examine a map of the Canadian West he will find that there is such a location on the north bank of the Belly River just above where the Belly and the Kootenai, or Waterton rivers come together, about 40 miles north of the Montana Boundary. What, however, the map will not inform him is the fact that this rather peculiar name came into being owing to the fact that it was in this vicinity that "Liver-Eating Johnson" stood-off a posse of

the North West Mounted Police in the days when the West was an infant in swaddling clothes. Poses of Mounted Police did not take kindly to such a process, neither was it one which was permitted to occur more than once in a blue moon. Indeed it is doubtful if the entire annals of the Police Force include a single other similar instance, which perhaps explains why those who were concerned in it considered the incident of sufficient importance as to warrant its being perpetuated for ever and ever, or at any rate as long as Southern Alberta has its being.

This being satisfactorily explained, it is proper to state that what follows is not a realistic description of how "Liver-Eating Johnson" stood the "Posse off", or why, but is merely an introduction to the fact that on a certain morning in the Spring of '88, there was a posse which possessed the N. W. M. P. Detachment at Standoff and which stood on the North bank of the Belly River just above its junction with the Kootenai, were at their wits' end to accommodate all comers, for in addition to the one Sergeant, one Corporal and fourteen Constables who composed the regular strength of the detachment on that date, it had also as temporary guests a four-hand teamster with his off-man who had arrived with a load of rations the previous day from the post at Fort Macleod, in addition to a flying patrol of three men and a non-commissioned officer who for the last month or so had been keeping their eagle eyes on the doings of a predatory band of Stoney Indians which had just "blown in" to get washed-up and rested. As the shack consisted merely of four log walls with a mud roof and a board floor, two windows and a door, and as most of the available space was taken up with just enough two-decker bunks to accommodate the permanent residents, the transient visitors piled themselves around in the few odd vacant spots which presented themselves. There were no unnecessary frills inside, no partitions or cupboards or anything of that sort; merely the one room which while remaining outwardly the same, really transformed itself, automatically, into bed-room, dining-room, kitchen, smoking-room, etc., etc., without causing its occupants the inconvenience of having to walk from one to another. A stable with accommodation for 20 horses completed the establishment of the detachment. On the other side of the river stretched the Blood Indian Reservation, a wide expanse of some 400,000 acres inhabited at that time by between four and five thousand Blood Indians. With the exception of a couple of trading posts and three or four scattered ranches along the river, and the officials of the Indian Agency some distance below, there was no undue crowding on the prairie.

On the morning in question two Mounted Policemen were making their way at a jog trot along a trail which skirted the north bank of the Belly River. They were travelling due west towards the blue peaks of the Rockies, some thirty miles away, and as the trail followed the bench-land, the winding river and the wooded bottoms were unfolded from time to time below them, and the acrid smoke of drift-wood fires arising from Indian villages and the incessant barking of Indian dogs were evidence of life otherwise not discernible. Both policemen wore the brown canvas stable-jacket and peaked fore-and-aft caps, the blue-black breeches with the wide yellow stripe and the black riding boots which was the usual prairie uniform in those days; both had their respective Winchester carbines slung across the horns of the saddles and around the waist of each was strapped

a service revolver of the British bulldog pattern. The similarity of the costumes did no text to the wearers for Rory O'Moore was an old hand with a record of twelve years' service in the Force, and would never see forty again, while his companion, "The Kid," was a mere boy who had yet to complete a year's service and who less than a year before had been an insignificant city clerk in old London and who had never heard of the N. W. M. P. Fate has an autocratic habit of moving human pawns around so that it almost seems hap-hazard, and fate must have been working overtime this morning when it selected these two Policemen to carry out the little job it had in view. Word had filtered thro' to the Detachment that a certain young Indian had ventured back from across the International Line whither he had executed a strategic retreat a few months previously after having pulled off a successful horse-stealing stunt the details of which had later on been painstakingly gathered up by one of the detachment. The details of the crime together with a description of its perpetrator were subsequently tucked away in a pigeon-hole of a certain cabinet which was to be found in the orderly room at the headquarters of the division, and a police circle setting forth the necessary details was sent to all the outlying Posts, while the force calmly proceeded with its daily round and waited in confidence for what was sure to occur sooner or later, viz: the return of a certain young Indian. They always came back, so had this one; it was a lead-pipe clinch.

What rather took the gift off the gingerbread in this particular instance, however, was the fact that the young Indian happened to belong to the band of Crop-Eared-Wolf, and it was this circumstance that seemed to indicate that fate had deliberately gone out of its way to test the calibre of the two men jogging westward that spring morning. Crop-Eared-Wolf was a minor chief who in accordance with the tribal system prevailing in the Blackfoot Nation (of which the Bloods formed an important part) was the head man in the village or camp which bore his name and was in a large measure responsible for its conduct. These camps occurred every mile or two along the river for a matter of 400 miles or more; Crop Eagle's Camp, Running Wolf's, Bull Black Fat's and so on, and some distance up the river was Crop-Eared-Wolf's, in the shelter of which the young man wanted was, it had been reported, to be found. The minor chief bore the reputation of a bad Indian, notwithstanding his prominent position, and the members of his band were constantly getting into trouble, knowing well that Crop-Eared-Wolf could always be relied upon to place every possible obstacle in the path of those whose duty it was to carry out the law. Vary-

ing their progress with an occasional center, the two policemen followed the gradually rising land towards the foothills; discussing as they rode along the probable difficulties which lay ahead of them.

Crop-Eared-Wolf's camp was much as usual that morning. Seen from a distance it was beautiful, with its background of green cottonwoods and grey buck brush, the river winding and sparkling in the sunshine, and the mountains towering behind. Blue wisps of smoke curled upward from the open tops of the tipis scattered about in picturesque disorder, while a few old squaws poked around attending to the chores of the camp—gathering fire-wood, fetching water from the river, etc. The beauty of the distance ceased abruptly as actual contact with the camp was made, for rags and decaying bones and refuse of every description littered the ground in all directions and poisoned the atmosphere. The return of "The man-who-never-ties-his-moccasins" from across the Line, where he had been visiting some relatives on the Blackfoot Reservation waiting the time when the details of a certain horse-stealing escapade might reasonably be expected to have become dulled in the recollections of those concerned, had been looked forward to by his relatives and friends and he had received a warm welcome on his arrival. He had been quite an ordinary meslin-bred youth previous to his hasty Southern trip, but he had come to be regarded since as more or less of a hero who was entitled to take his place amongst the warriors of the tribe. The fact that he had flouted the Police and stolen a bunch of horses being looked upon in much the same light as though he had successfully passed through the ordeal of the sun dance. There were, of course, these same police to be reckoned with, but the exercise of a reasonable amount of caution and the assistance of his admiring friends, should trouble arise, would doubtless smooth over any unpleasantness along that line, and anyway they had probably forgotten the whole affair. So the returned hero smoked his Kin-i-kin-ic and preened himself before the young maidens and swaggered around amongst the young bucks—and Crop-Eared-Wolf gathered around him some of his cronies and spat and smoked over his lodge fire and talked of many things. Forging the river half a mile below came riding along the two men from the Standoff Detachment.

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been and it was just at this moment that "The Kid" observed a man creep out from a teepee in the rear and bound away into the adjoining brush, word of which was duly passed along to his companion. Very deliberately O'Moore unclasped a pair of hand-cuffs from his belt and dangling them before the Chief, he bluntly told him that he was a liar, and that if the man wanted was not forthcoming within five minutes then Crop-Eared-Wolf himself should go in his place and answer to the charge of interfering with the police while in the performance of their duty. Paying scant attention to the angry mob which crowded around him, he pulled out his watch and calmly waited results. The Chief, black with wrath, harangued and gesticulated amongst a number of the older men while the rest buzzed like a swarm of angry bees. Discretion finally won out and the fear of the consequences overcoming the desire to help the culprit, some of the young men were despatched into the brush, soon returning with the cause of all the trouble.

The snap of the steel bracelets round the young man's wrists let loose a torrent of shrill abuse from the squaws and sullen mutterings from the men and the slightest false move by either of the policemen would have fanned the smouldering wrath of the band into a conflagration which might have had disastrous results. But there was no false move; and any hope that the man-who-never-ties-his-moccasins may have been hanging to himself that the Chief and his friends would never let him be taken, must have been finally even up when he found himself astride of a cayouse with his ankles securely coupled together beneath the pony's belly, and a rope around the cayouse's neck with an end stretched from either side and made fast to the horns of his escorts' saddles. As they moved quietly off the young Indian took his last look at the beautiful river and the mountains beyond and at the faces of his friends, for he never came back, dying some two years later in the Penitentiary before the completion of his subsequent sentence.

So the law was vindicated and the reputation of the N. W. M. P. for handling fearlessly and tactfully whatever situation might arise was once more upheld and that without the assistance of the Winchester carbines, which never left their slings, or of the revolvers, which remained snugly in their holsters. Nor was there even the glamour of a red coat cast over the scene, for red coats in those days were worn for show and not for force. Just two isolated members of the force extricated themselves from a position of extreme delicacy while successfully accomplishing what they had been sent out to perform.



HEATED DEBATE ON LOAN RESOLUTIONS—OPPOSITION LEADER MAKES FOUR HOUR SPEECH—DEBATE ADJOURNED—MR. JENNINGS AS A CYNIC.

The Loan Resolutions were debated the whole of yesterday's session, the Leader of the Opposition making a 4-hour speech in which he severely criticized Government waste. Some bitter cross firing took place between Sir Michael and the Prime Minister during the last part of the night sitting. The Loan Resolutions are not yet passed, but it is evident that the Opposition has had its say and will refrain from further comment, so, the Resolutions are bound to go through on Monday.

RECKLESS EXPENDITURE.

Mr. Walsh opened the debate on the Resolutions. Early in his speech he quoted a statement made in the House on a similar occasion by Sir Robert Bond. It was that "the reckless expenditure of borrowed millions is causing a temporary shelter which must necessarily bring disaster before long and then we shall feel the full blast of the storm." This was said by the great Liberal leader when he was Leader of the Opposition at the time that the branch railways were being built. Mr. Walsh said that apparently the people did not realize the true state of affairs as only that very day, a petition had been presented from Bonne Bay for a branch railway. The trouble was that so many millions had been squandered within the past few years that the people thought the Government had an inexhaustible supply of money. The Loan Resolutions, said Mr. Walsh, were nothing more or less than an act of indemnification to enable the Government to borrow money to pay the debts incurred by them.

CONDEMNNS SUPPLYING.

Mr. Walsh roundly condemned Government supplying for the fishery. He would not hesitate to take his full share of the blame for what happened last year, but the Government had to admit that he and his colleagues had sounded a warning to which they had paid no heed. Speaking of the need for economy, Mr. Walsh declared that it was a sorry day for the colony when it lost its ablest financier, Sir Michael Cashin, for it was very evident that the present Finance Minister was not capable of carrying out the duties which that office entails. Only wise and sane administration could carry the country through its present crisis. Our revenue is derived from our earning power. How then could the Government seriously consider passing estimates for eleven millions of dollars when our earning power was not nine millions and this came from the fishery alone, for Bell Island, Grand Falls and other sources of revenue had failed us. Was it intended next year to add ten millions to the Public Debt?

TOO MUCH COAKER.

Mr. Walsh then traced the history of the F.P.U. which had exercised a baleful influence during the past few years. Mr. Coaker had been responsible for all the big Government extravaganzas, said Mr. Walsh. There had been talk of a coalition but he for one would never join a party of which W. F. Coaker was a member. Mr. Walsh concluded a lengthy speech with some suggestions for economy. His final statement was to the effect that a general exodus of the young men of the country would take place if conditions did not improve.

NO PUBLIC OPINION.

Mr. Moore deplored the fact that there was no public opinion in the country. He condemned Government squandering and declared that the sole existing source of revenue was "the rum shop on Duckworth Street." Business men all over the country were retrenching but Government extravaganzas continued. Yet, while hands are being paid off daily, while depression was in our midst, Dr. Campbell was given full control of the expenditure of \$800,000. He was going to support the resolutions only because he realized the money was needed.

THE CYNICAL MR. JENNINGS.

Mr. Vinicombe was the next to speak to the Resolutions. Early in the course of his speech he criticized the manner in which the Public Works Department had looked after the supplying of the Sanitarium. Mr. Vinicombe charged that the butter supplied to the patients was unfit to eat. Mr. Jennings seemed surprised. He was under the impression that the best, locally manufactured butter was supplied.

Mr. Vinicombe—"Did you buy it direct from the factory?"

Mr. Jennings—"No, it is obtained from Water Street firms."

Mr. Vinicombe then inquired if it were not possible that cheap Canadian butter was provided without the Minister knowing it. Dr. Rendell had told him that the butter supplied to the Sanitarium was abominable and not much better than axle grease. The blame Mr. Jennings was not worried by this. "Oh," he replied, "it is good enough considering that it is free." This remark was ample evidence that the Minister who had always the interests of the under-dogs at heart, did not have to eat axle grease with his bread each day. Previously during the session, it was the practice to condole with Mr. Jennings rather than to treat him harshly. Now, he will get all he deserves, and if he is to be judged by
