Troops.

PARIS, July 7—Sharp checks administered to the Riffian invaders by the French in Morocco are reported to have materially relieved the situa-

tion in the Taza Region. Abd El Krim's followers are said to have been so discouraged by their heavy losses that they made little or no effort to react to the French counter attacks.

The appointment of General Naulin as commander of the French operations in Morocco, came as a surprise. The government had decided on General Guillaumat, head of the troops in the Rhineland, but he declared a change of command there inadvisable at this time and suggested that Naulin

be sent to Africa. General Naulin, although little known to the public, enjoys a high reof Marshal Foch's pupils and rapidly came to the front during the war.





ORGANIZATION. Organization is necessary if any enterprise is to be successfully carried on. Perhaps sometimes we are inclined to criticize and say we have too much organization, too much overhead-top heavy. This is a possible fault in organization, but not an argument against it. In all phase of modern activities, Organization, Co-operation, even Unionism are dominating ideas, whether it be in Business. Philanthropy, or Religion, Now an organization of the members of a profession can only be justified if it furthers objects and aims of that Profession. Putting to one side Synods and Conferences, Industrial Combines and Labor Unions, and the many other instances where people get together for their own or the common good, there is only this one reason to offer in favor of medical organization which can be consistently and persistently presented to the Medical Profession in this or any other country. Only in this way can the great aims of our Profession be most fully accomplished.



There is a flowing well of asphalt at Newport Beach, Calif. It was sunk for oil to a depth of 1,800 feet when an accident stopped operations. It was then cemented and perforated back to 750 feet, when asphalt began to flow. As the 41/2 inch casing was too small to permit the viscous material to issue readily, another well was sunk to a depth of 1.000 feet. By circulating hot water around the casing of this well a flow of from 50 to 80 barrels was obtained. Other wells in the same system are now producing 200 barrels a day. The asphalt cannot be conveyed

like oil through pipe lines, but is transported entirely by truck, says Compressed Air Magazine.


