NATIONS TO BE MAINTAINED.

Details of the Proposed Strengthening of the Fleet Will Not Be Published, At France and Russia Would Immediately Place New Vessels On the Stocks -

England Can Outclass Them All, London, Feb. 8.-Mr. Edmund Robertson, one of the Lords of the Admiralty, addressed a meeting at Dundee to-day. He said that the naval program of the Government for 1894 and 1895 would show no intention to forfeit or even risk in the slightest degree Great Britain's position of superiority over other nations. The estimates that would soon be published would satisfy the rational advocates of a strong navy. These estimates would only be for a year, though part of the program for a period of years had been elaborated in all

There was good reason, Mr. Robertson added, for the refusal of the Government to publish all the details of its program. When the last naval defence act was announced France and Russia immediately increased the expenditures to keep pace with Great Britain. The net result was that Great Britain had been left in a position relatively the same as she had before occupied. 


