SEALED UNTO HIM.

The following is a summary of the resolution passed by the House of Representatives, moved by Mr. J. Power, of Halifax, on 26th inst., in the House of Assembly. (A correspondent refers to it in another column.)

Whereas, it has been brought to the notice of the members of this House, that great injustice has been done to the Province of Nova Scotia in the matter of giving information to immigrants seeking to settle in that Province, and whereas, such information, in many instances, has been given in a manner calculated to induce persons to settle in that Province, who would not have done so had they been properly informed, and whereas, it is the opinion of this House, that the Government of Nova Scotia should take immediate steps to bring to the attention of the public the true character of the Province, and to the fact that a repetition of the same may be prevented.

In referring to the matter, when notice was given to the House of the resolution, Mr. Power spoke of the injustice done to Nova Scotia in the conduct of the Immigration Office in London. The matter was one exciting a deep attention every quarter. While many persons had been using efforts to induce persons to remain in this country, and finding that impossible, had been endeavoring to induce persons into the Province who would be a credit to it, he did not think those efforts should be thwarted by the officials of the Dominion Government, to whose salaries the taxes paid by Nova Scotia contributed. He held in his hand evidence of charge he had to make. The gentleman, whose name was attached to the document he was about to read, was no doubt a well known name to the hon. members for Colchester, as he had been engaged in working farms, and in establishing cheese factories in that country. This gentleman, in a letter written by him to the *Truro Star*, made the following statements:

"My first step on thinking of settling in Canada was to call upon the secretary of the Canadian Commission in London. When I announced that I had thought of settling in Nova Scotia, his face became very long, and he gave me to understand, that whilst it was none of his business, or done in his name, he would not do anything to help me up any one part of the Dominion at the expense of another, yet, as a friend, (not as a friend as you will imagine of Nova Scotia, but of mine) he advised me not to settle in Nova Scotia. I wonder how many possible settlers that gentleman has turned away from this Province. Certainly, if I had not made the acquaintance of the hon. P. C. Hill, and Major-General Laurie in England, I never should have settled here after the impression made upon my mind by Mr. Colmer."

This letter was signed by Arthur P. Gurney. On moving the resolution, Mr. Power said:

He was acting in the interests of the farming population of the country. It was a serious thing, when Nova Scotia was going behind hand every day, that persons in England wishing to emigrate to this country to fill up the places left, and to purchase the farms abandoned by our own people, should be met by statements calculated to hinder them from coming to this Province. He did not care whether the Dominion Government was Liberal or Conservative; if he found an instance occurring such as that described, he should endeavor to have an end put to it, and see that the interests of Nova Scotia were protected. He thought it must be a serious thing, that in this immigration office in London full information was to be found, as to every part of the Dominion except from Little Nova Scotia. Was it not important to have gentlemen of the means and experience of Mr. Gurney coming to Nova Scotia? There were certain other classes whom agents in London were willing to have come here, but the gentlemen of his stamp, desirable immigrants to this Province, and to send further west. While pamphlets were circulated to every printing in the west, and were being held with our money, we could not even have a paltry pamphlet published in the old Dominion to induce people to come here. These things had been heard of often before, but the present was a more serious case.

House of Assembly.

Mr. Bell asked the Government to lay upon the table returns showing all changes in the office of Sheriff for the various counties since the last meeting of the Legislature, together with all papers and correspondence relating thereto, including the Minutes of Council making appointments, and the charges upon which the removal of any persons from the said office of Sheriff had been made.

The bill to amend the Act to Incorporate the Nova Scotia Railway Company was read a second time and referred to the Committee on Private and Local Bills.

Mr. Longley gave notice that on a future day he would move a resolution to the effect that in the opinion of this House a Union of the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island into one Province on a fair basis would be advantageous to the common interests of all.
