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



Aylesford .- Early Tuesday morning he saw mill belonging to Roy Meister, in the Woodworth Road, was totally destroyed by fire. 

This represents an increase in value over the exports of 1923 of \$110,000,000 and of \$32,000,000 over the imports of that year. The chief increases in exports were noted ir agriculture, wood and paper.


