SIGNS OF THE TIMES.

DURING the past month unusual activity in produce has continued and duce has continued, and we look forward with some curiosity for the Bank statements for October, although it is probable the circulation will not show so large an increase as the transactions in produce would indicate, simply because a large amount of the bills have been returned to the Banks in payment of obligations due to wholesale merchants. Several banks in Western Canada have had their circulation taxed to its utmost. The Bank of Toronto on two occasions ran out of bills and had to borrow from other Banks, while they sent to New York for an increased supply. The Gore Bank also, during the early part of October, had its buls entirely exhausted, and required supplies from sister institutions until they could get new bills. This is an indication of extraor. dinary activity in trade. The man who would this time last year have predicted such a result, would have been deemed little less than mad. We understand that the amount of money coming into Toronto and other Western points in payment of farm mortgages, is quite unprecedented, and brokers and investers are experiencing unusual difficulty in finding investments for their surplus funds. It is a most gratifying feature, that farmers are thus enabled to liquidate obligations of this nature, for nothing can so seriously hamper their industry and so meritably result in embarrassment than the continuous payment of high rates of interest, with the grip of the money-lander upon their farm. Farm business in Canada is too precarious and not sufficiently profitable to permit the borrowing of money at any thing like the rates of interest intherto paid, and there is no sign of the times more promising than the ability and disposition of farmers to rid themselves of this class of obliga-

We are told that not over one-half the crop of wheat has yet reached market. Farmers have been so busy during the last two months in disposing of their barley, cattle, sheep, fruit, hogs, &c., that they have had thttle time to thrash and get out either the Fall or | Spring wheat. Another good sign of the times will be seen in the first rate payments being made to our wholesale merchants. It is something almost extraordinary. Houses in this city are receiving three, four, six and even eight thousand dollars a-day in payment for last spring purchases, and for each parcels bought this autumn There never was a season in which payments were so promptly met, so few renewals sought, and such promptitude generally experienced. It will be a wonderful consummation and one most devoutly to be grateful for, if a single crop should restore the country from such a state of depression as we experienced last year, to a normal and health, condition. Such, however, is rapidly becoming the fact. Very little overdue paper is now to be met with, and the lawyers and collection agents all complain of the dulness of business. The number of writs issued, and judgments obtained, during the current quarter, will not be one-third of these issued during the same period of last year. Almost every article of merchandize has advanced in price, and all our importers have made excellent profits during the season. Even retail stocks, espe ially in such staples as dry goods, hardware, and groceries, have consider ably appreciated in value, and the general condition of the mercantile community is emphatically one of prosperity. A most important feature too may be found in the fact, that our importations do not yet approach those of the same period of last year. In some few articles of groceries there is a slight increase, but the general totals of the two seasons thus far show a con siderable balance in favour of this season. This, at the end of so prosperous a season, implies that the stockin the hands of importers are not excessive, and as there is a continuous activity in the demand for handthere is every indication that the stocks in all hands will be barely sufficient for the winter's consumption In manufactured goods of all classes the same remark holds good, and indeed it is with difficulty that orders are supplied. The general condition of our manufatures is most gratifying, and every one engaged in them is making first rate profits.

Another good sign of the times is the large amount of American capital coming into this country for investment in oil lands. Few persons outside of the oil regions can form an idea of the amount of Americal capital that has found its way in this direction, not only for the property itself, but also for the erection of steam engines and other machinery necessary for working the wells. Several Western Machine shops are employing fifty men now, where formerly ten call were employed in this description of work. It is therefore exceedingly encouraging to find that from all points of view the signs of the times are propitions and while our farmers, merchants and manufacturers are in this prosperous condition, we have every reason for thankful gratitude for the present, and hope for

THE COMING CRISIS.

EVER since the outbreak of the rebellion in the United States, and the disorganization of the currency of that country, there has been a continual apprehension of a great crisis. It has been periodically predicted that embarrassment and disaster would surely result from the extraordinary increase in the currency, and the continuously unsettled values of all commodities. It was a most natural expectation. Guided by the teachings of history, no other conclusion could be arrived at. The experience of all countries in all ages bore out the impression, and no one has over conceived that the United States would prove an exception. The vastness of its commerce, the magnitude of the transactions of its merchants, the speculative character of its people, and the reckless extravagance of society, all favoured the conviction that sooner or later a crisis would come, which for extent and magnitude would exceed all its predecessors. But, however natural this expectation, however probable it has appeared, four long years of devastating war have come and gone, and nearly a year of peace, without bringing about the anticipated result. During that period, an expenditure exceeding in vastness all previous experience, has taken place; half a continent has been laid waste; the sacrifice of property and of human life has been unparalleled in history, and a paper currency has been created of un-Values have fluctuated with the surnassed extent greatest violence, and every element necessary to the creation of a panic has been gradually developing, but without as yet producing any great commercial disaster. No one dreamt that the war could close. and gold tumble from 280 to 139 without producing a crash, disastrous alike to the producer, the merchant, and the consumer; but even this has occurred, and nearly half a year has clapsed, and yet we find no check to the prosperity of the country. Indeed, were we to judge by appearances, there never was a period in the history of this remarkable country, in which prosperity seemed more universal than at the present moment. However artificial it may be, however groundless its basis, and whatever the result, there is no denying the fact that the vast majority of the people of the United States are enjoying a condition of competence and wealth never before experienced,

and indeed hardly over anticipated. We seek in vain for an explanation of this remarkable state of things. One reason only affords any ground for it, and that is, the hitherto steady adherence to the cash system. As has been before remarked, it was impossible for men to fail unless they owed something. Without any internal indebtedness, and with limited external obligations, it seemed impossible that a crisis should come. The success of the fluancial system of the United States is unquestionably to be found in the fact that the credit of the Goverument was substituted for that of the individual. That instead of merchants buying on time, and giving their own notes of band, they gave the notes of the Government, and that greenbacks and bank bills formed a universal substitute for the promissory notes which hitherto represented the internal commercial indebtedness of the country. The promissory notes of a mercantile community like that of the United States are, under ordinary circumstances, vast alike in number and amount. We have no means of arriving at a correct estimate of their extent, but taking our own country as an example, we find that in the banks alone, there are at the present moment under discount nearly forty-five millions of dollars, an amount equal to the total importations of foreign goods for a year. We have only two millions of people, the United States had over thirty, and a commerce very much more, in proportion to each individual, than that of Canada. It will therefore be readily conceived that the substitution of Government "Promises to pay for the enormous volume of private promissory notes, acceptances, and bills of exchange, accounts in no small degree for the absorption of the currency. So ong as the indebtedness of the Government to the people did not exceed the amount of private internal indebtedness which hitherto existed, just so long was there little reason to fear a crisis from a redundant currency, provided always that the cash system was readly adhered to. It is true that the largely increased currency necessitated speculative operations, and that increased values could hardly fail to obtain, but it seemed impossible that any degree of calamity could overtake the commerce of the country, so long as the obligations of the merchants were nil, and their assets either in goods or Government issues. The

greatest danger which appeared to beset the American people was, therefore, that of again reverting to universal credit transactions. The currency was ample for the immense commerce of the country, without a dollar of credit. Nothing but evil could come of forsaking the cash system. They were safe just so long as they kept their sails trimmed and owed nothing; but as soon as they permitted the internal commercial credits to increase, in addition to the credit already used by Government, just so soon did the certainty of revulsion become apparent.

Into the adoption of this dangerous policy the Americans appear now to be drifting. The magnitude of their operations in every staple of the land, the high prices, and large stocks of grain, tobacco and general merchandize which are being carried over, and the universal spirit of speculation which is apparent in every article, locks up an amount capital in the North, which has hitherto been unequalled. The excessive importations, largely overbalancing limited exports, adds to the amount thus absorbed. The immense necessities of the South, and its poverty in money, opens a much wider field for the diffusion of the amount of currency hitherto confined entirely to the North. So that without an increase in the issue of the Government, the demands upon the currency are vastly greater than they were a year ago. This in some measure accounts for the increase in the use of private credits. We are informed that in New-York and other centres, there is now a much greater disposition to extend business than there was ten years ago; and that instead of thirty day bills for goods, three, four, and even six months' paper is freely accepted. A strong indication of the change in this respect will be found in the fact that the enemiries at the Mercantile Agency in New-York, and its various branches, in September and October, were over double those of the corresponding months of the year previous; and the returns of the New-York and other banks, indicate a much increased investment in notes and bills discounted. We cannot but deplore the adoption of this policy. Notwithstanding the war and its retarding influences, the great country up on our borders has made great progress in the last four years, and it is an undoubted fact that the development of many of its resources within that period is largely attributable to increased monetary facilities and the largely increased currency. A gigantic struggle has been successfully contended with, followed by an unexpected condition of general posperity. But whatever progress it may have made, and however prosperous, as a community, they may be, one result only can follow the abuse of the credit system-and that result is embarrassment and disaster. If they could only be content to permit the government to use that credit for the general good, furnishing the community with a currency at once uniform and safe, and adhere strictly to it as a basis for their commercial transactions, there might be some hope of averting a crisis, but there can be none if, in the face of the fluctuating values and an unsettled financial system, they plunge headlong into the vortex of extended credits. How long it may be postponed, and in whatever shape it may come, it is of course impossible to predict. The coming session of Congress will doubtless witness a great battle between that party which advocate immediate return to specio payments, and the party who seek for even a further increase in the volume of currency. Upon the financial legislation of this session will largely depend the condition of the money market, but aside from the political view of the question, the commercial elements seem all tending towards a crisis. The rise in labour, the cost of production, the extraordinarily high prices, and the large and increasing balance against the trade of the country, are indications that but too plainly point to a day of reckoning not far in the distance. We in Canada have been largely benefited by the prosperity of our neighbours across the line. We have derived all the solid advintages of that prosperity, Let us be careful that we do not share with them the disadvantages which must result from the inflated and artificial condition of their business affairs.

We may watch with the greatest possible interest the great financial drama which is being acted out on the same continent with ourselves; and our people will be only wise in persevering in a conservative policy, cautious trading, reduced credits, and strict economy.

The exports of petroleum from the United States to England from January to August of this year are but 2,300 tuns, against 8,850 in the same period of last —a decrease this year of seventy-five per cont.

IMPORTANT INDRED.

IT is announced, apparently on official authority, that the Washington Government have issued instructions to all collectors of lake ports, that as the Reciprocity Treaty will expire on the 17th of March next, they will thereafter exact full customs tariff on all Canadian products hitherto free under the Treaty. This action is of a sufficiently definite nature to convince all parties of the intention of the American Government to abrogate the Treaty. It confirms what we have all along regarded as a foregone conclusion.

We are glad to know that this annonneement and other circumstances have at last convinced our Government that some action is necessary upon this question. At a Cabinet Council held in this city on Wednesday, the matter was freely discussed, and we believe a conclusion arrived at that steps should be taken to furnish very full information upon the topic, and arrangements were in contemplation to bring the matter favourably before the American people. We also understand that arrangements are in progress to obtain the fullest information as to markets, to which our products could be sent, other than those of the United States.

DREADFULLY SLOW.

THE Bank statements for the month of September have not yet made their appearance in the Official Gazette. They were due in the middle of October, but owing to the removal to Ottawa the result is not yet before the public. A little foresight on the part of Mr. Langton or his staff might easily have prevented this delay. The public are impatient to see the result of the first month of a most remarkable cereal year, and the neglect of the Government officials could hardly ever have been sostrongly felt as on the present occasion. We give below the statements of five Banks out of the eighteen:—

Town and City Property.

The increased prosperity which has so opportunely dawned upon our Province must soon affect the value of real estate. In fact, we hear from Western Canada that already property is beginning to look up. During the past few years City and Town property has been a drug in the market. Some few transactions have undoubtedly taken place, but, generally speaking, men with capital met the request to invest in such property with a shrug of the shoulders. We are glad to note this improvement. In many parts of the country property had fallen unreasonably low-in fact many holders could not begin to realize the amount of their investments. We do not expect, nor could any sensible man desire, a return to the inflated prices of 1856 or 1857, but it is only proper that City and Town property should rise to prices which will enable property holders to realize judiciously made investments, and induce others to invest their surplus capital in a similar manner If the Province continues to prosper as at the present time, this result must speedily be attained. There is no good reason why the real estate of our Cities and Towns should not be as good an in . vestment as any other, and we think the owners of such property may congratulate themselves that better prospects are before them.

"ENCOURAGE HOME MANUFACTURES!"

OW often do these words strike the eye! In flashy bills and spicy advertisements, how frequently "Encourage Home Manufactures" form the most conspicuous line? And yet, how few of those who read them feel that they have either interest or duty in sustaining our Provincial manufactures. This should not be so. Some philosopher has said that he who causes two blades of grass to grow where one grew before, is his country's benefactor. In like manner we regard every man who begins any branch of manufactures, however bumble, which can be successfully carried on in Cam Ja; and we hold that he has a claim upon the public support which foreign manufacturers have not, and that whenever he furnishes an article as good and as cheap as that imported, that article should invariably have the preference. "Eucourage Home Manufactures" ought not to be-as it too often is-a barren appeal. It ought to meet a cheerful response from the community whenever the manufacturer shows the necessary energy and enterprise to supply the public wants.

We do not intend to enter into a discussion of the mysteries of political economy, but we lay down the broad proposition-that it is the duty of our Government, and of the people individually, to sustain and foster our manufacturing industry in every legitimate manner. It may be true that Canada is essentially an agricultural country. But it is equally true that the sparkling waters of our splendid lakes and riverscoupled with abundance of raw material-afford unusual facilities for manufacturing; and if we display Anglo-Saxon enterprise and spirit-it we desire to become a great nation-we must avail ourselves of the manufacturing facilities which Nature has bequeathed us, as well as of the wealth of our fair fields and fertile valleys. History would probably have lost the glorious record of Great Britain but for her manufacturing industry, which has rendered her " mistress of the seas," and the workshop of the world. If we desire to strive after similar national wealth and influence, whilst not neglectful of agriculture, let us stimulate and promote that important interest which has been one of the chief sources of Britain's presperity

Ten or twelve years ago the manufactures of Canada were very trifling, both as regards extent and importance. But few branches were engaged in, and most of these were in a very sickly condition. About the year 1856, in consequence of the rather lavish expenditure of the Government of the day, the Provincial revenue had to be increased. The finance minister wisely adjusted the tariff so as to encourage our infant manufactures-and what has been the result? Already nearly all parts of Canada resound with the busy hum of manufacturing industry! Formerly the commonest articles in use were imported-thus annually sending large sums of money out of the country. Now we make wholly, or in part, our agricultural and other machinery, our edge tools, our woollens, cottons and linens, our leather, boots and shoes, india-rubbers goods, wooden ware, glass ware, oils, ropes, musical instruments, and many other articles of necessity or luxury Many of these departments of trade are but partially developed, but most of them are progressing steadily, and promise to become highly prosperous. The number of skilled workmen and the amount of capital engaged in these pursuits has become large, and is annually swelling and increasing. The rapid progress made of late years in manufacturing must be very gratifying to every friend of Canada, and should incline all classes to "encourage Home Manufactures" more strongly than ever.

That it is the " interest and duty" of the community to give a proterence to home-made articles, must appear from a moment's consideration. It is the duty of every patriotic citizen to aid in every lawful manner to build up the power and wealth of the state, and in encouraging Home Manufactures, he takes one of the hest means to accomplish that end. But in matters of business, interest weighs with people generally more than duty, and right sure are we that the hundreds of manufactories now dotting the face of Canada promoto the interests of all classes of our population. They assist in decreasing the drain of gold from the country each year to pay for importations-they attract large numbers of skilled workmen from all parts of the world to swell the number of good citizens-they largely assist us in paying the demands of the public creditor, -and they afford a home market for much that our farmers raise both of raw products and of the necessaries of life. These advantages cannot be too highly valued. They he at the root of national prosperity.

What nation has become truly great and powerful in modern ages without manufactures? The lesson is plain. To "encourage Home Manufactures" is at once our interest and our duty.

The termination of the Reciprocity Treaty, and the opposition of the Americans to its renewal, must show every sensible Canadian the folly of Canada relying solely upon agriculture. No country should rely for its prosperity on a single interest, however important. When this is the case an injury to that interest serious. to affects all the branches of trade. Thus might the loss of Reciprocal trade have produced a crisis in Canada but for the extraordinary high prices which the civil war has produced in the United States, and the home market which our manufactures have provided us. But under present circumstances, the loss of the Treaty will be less seriously felt. Did we manufacture all the articles we import at present, we would becomparatively speaking-independent of our American neighbours. The loss of Reciprocity would not be the bugbear it is at present. We would have achieved true national independence. We would have the "balance of trade" in our favour, and would consume most of our agricultural productions among our own population.

But how, the reader may ask, are we to "encourage Home Manufactures' We reply, by the Government arranging our fiscal policy—at least so long as they have a large revenue to raise-so as to encourage those branches of manufactures already existing, and the establishment of new ones. As individuals we should give Home Manufactures the preference. Let our ladies not disdam to look at Canadian cottons, Canadian hoslery, flannels, clouds, &c. ; let our gents cease to worship broadcloth, and feel proud to wear Canadian tweeds! How often is it that our articles of Canadian make-equal in quality and price to any in the market-is passed over for an imported one? This is most unjust, most unwise, and he only is a true friend to his country that adopts a different policy, and "encourages Home Manufactures."

Still Another.

A few weeks ago we draw attention to the "Substan. tial Progress" of Canadian manufactures, and remarked that it was only when an attempt was made to enumerate their number, extent and variety, that any adequate idea could be formed of them. We are constantly reminded of the truth of this, and almost every day we hear with satisfaction of the establishment or the existence of new manufactures in all parts of the country, the progress and prospects of which are not sufficiently known outside of their own locality. As an instance of this, we may mention the Hamilton Glass Works, a manufactory which for some time has been in successful operation. Some seventy. three persons are constantly employed, and the product amounts to about \$5,000 per month. A great variety of articles in green and flint glass are turned out, and in such perfection, and at such a price, as effectually to shut out foreign importation Messrs. Rutherford & Co., the proprietors, deserve the greatest credit for their enterprise, and we are glad to know that they are meeting with success quite encouraging.

Freights.

Rates for the Fall season, up till now, have been very poor, nor have we'ven had any temporary excitement on the arrival of English mails advising a slight advance in prices, which has usually been the case in other seasons. Lifolessness has characterised the market all through, and this is not to be wondered at, when we consider the quantity of wheat and corn that have found their way to the other side of the line, the relative prices of flour here and at home, and the depressed state of the Quebec Freight Market.

On account of the low rates for grain and the difficulty of getting freight, one or two vessels have gone to Quebeo to load, one has accepted a charter from Three Rivers to Cardenas at 35 cents shooks and 60 cents for nails,—port charges paid,—and another proceeded to Three Rivers to load sleepers for London at 27s. 6d. per load. Some charterers and owners are still hanging on, slow to make the first loss, but heedless of the heavier one that assuredly awaits them

heedless of the heavier one that assuredly awaits them by reason of their delay.

The rates by steam to Liverpool and Glasgow are quoted at 6s Grain, 30s Pot Ashes, 40s Pearl Ashes, and 60s provisions, but we expect a less rate could be done for grain, as the last clasgow steamer loaded on ship's account. By sail 4s is nominally the rate, but we believe 3s 9d was done to Glasgow, and from all appearances lower rates must be looked for before the close of the navigation.

It will be seen that although the Government has been disbursing millions in payment of arrears due to soldiers and sailors mustered out of service—they have actually reduced the aggregate principal of the National Debt more than Sixteen Millions of Dollars within the last two months. No doubt, the sales of gunboats, steam and sail transports, and other public property purchased for use in the war, and no longer required, has materially contributed to this result; but they have meantime paid out two dollars in discharge of anterior obligations to soldiers, sailors, contractors, &c., for every dollar received, from these closing-out sales. It is certain, therefore, that they have passed the turning-point, and may henceforth steadily re 'ice their vast debt, if they but keep out of foreign complications and wars.

It will be seen however that thus far the interest has not been diminished, but rather increased, by the liquidation of indebtedness which frmerly paid no interest with obligations whereon interest is according. We presume this conversion will have to be carried further, so that, while the principal of the debt will be still further diminished, the interest thereon may be somewhat increased.

Resumed Business.

We have great pleasure in directing the attention of the Grocery Trade to the announcement in another column of the resumption of business by Messrs. Henry Chapman & Co. The numerous friends of this house and the trade generally will be gratified at this result, and we are certain that the firm as now constituted will merit the same confidence and esteem which for so many years was so deservedly enjoyed by the previous one.

Fankers and Brokers at New York.

We direct particular attention to the card of Messis Adams, Kimball & Moore, Bankers and Brokers, New York. The members of the firm have been well known residents of Toronto for some years, and they cnjoy the confidence and esteem of a very large circle of friends, including some of the wealthlest capitalists of that city. Personally we can speak in the strongest terms of their reliability and capacity, and as they command an abundant capital they are entitled to a liberal support.

Retail Trade in Quebec and Ottawa.

It is estimated that about five hundred families have left Quebec with the Government. If each family spent \$1000 a year, and the average would not be below that figure, the loss to the retail trade of Quebec will be equal to half a million of dollars. It is thought however that the loss of this custom will fall to a great extent on the larger and stronger class of retailers who are better able to stand it. On the other hand, the traders of Ottawa, being fewer in number, will be largely benefitted, and a general condition of activity and prospective prosperity is evident there

BUSINESS during the week has been active both by auction and private sale; large operations have taken place in the various staples at very full rates. The arrivals of groceries during the week have been large, comprising the bulk of the cargoes of the St. Luwrence and Peruvian. This contribution will effectually sort up stocks, which have been greatly depleted by the heavy purchases of the past few weeks. The rates at which those fresh importations have been purchased, the lateness of the season, and the activity of the demand, all point conclusively to a firm market. Thetrade sale of Messrs. Gillespie, Moffat & Co., of teas, Ac., passed off with spirit, the attendance was good, and the bidding active; prices realized for Green and Japan teas were fully up to values realized at the trade sale of the previous week, and holders are very stiff at advanced rates, the stock being light, there is not likely to be any concession in prices this senson. All the advices from England strengthen views of holders here, another advance is noted in London Market on all desirable grades of 3d por lb. The "Cissy"is reported as arrived in shove Market, and all the Greens in the cargo were eagerly taken at advanced rates, and excessive prices given for Moyune Young Hysons. Coloured and Uncotoured Japans are also much advanced; another 1d is reported in Uncoloured.

Sugars-Remain steady, with fair demaid. The transactions of the week are considerable, with firmuess in quotations.

FRUIT-Continues in short supply, with great activity in the demand The anticipated arrivals are very light, and we are of the confirmed impression that as the season approaches when these goods go largely into consumption, prices must still further advance. Quotations as per next page

COLFEE-Is very firm, with fair stock and moderate arrivale.

TOBACCOS .- The market is only fairly supplied with good sound tobaccos, with slight prospect of a decreased manufacture for a time, in view of the destruction by fire of a leading factory The demand has revived to a considerable extent, and prices are firm.

FIRM.—There is a good demand for all descriptions of fish, and prices are high. This arises apparently not so much from any falling off in the supply, as from the fact that all other classes of provisions are scarce and dear. At the trade sale of Messrs. We make the following extracts from the London fea Report of Floyd, Matheson & Co., of October 24th, by the Peruvian :-

"The China Mail arrived on the 16th inst., with dates from Hong-Kong 28th, Foo Chow 23rd, and shanghar 21st August. The total export from China and Japan to Great Britain was then 40,500,000 lbs, against 46,200,000 lbs to same date of previous season, a decrease of 6,000,000 pounds. The arrivals during the past fortnight have been numerous, placing an excellent assortment of goods and fine Congous, both kaishow and Moning, before the trade, and sales have been most extensive; the market closes very firm for all quantums under 2s. 6d. per lb.; which have been taked freely by the country buyers. Scented teas have not been so favorably received, and continue slow of sale, at unsatisfactory prices, though the haures of stock and consumption look well. Considerable transactions are reported in Colongs, Japans and Green teas for America, and sales show a marked advance in value. The market for Green Teas took a sudden start on the arrival of the "Cissy," and we advance our quotations about 3d, por lb. on all desirable qualities; these high rates have, however, caused most of the export buyers to withdraw from the market, which closes more quietly. Japan Teas have been in great request for America during the past week, the coloured kind advancing in proportion to other Green Teas, and uncoloured to still greater extent, prices hitherto unknown being paid for low grades, which show 100 per cent advance,"

THE past has been one of the best weeks ever experienced in this department of trade at this late season of the year. Indeed it has hardly been surpassed by any that has preceded it this year. Quite a number of heavy buyers from the West have been down to attend the trade sales of groceries, and have made purchases of dry goods at the same time. There have also been not a few exclusive dry goods buyers in the market, and the sales during the week foot up to a large sum It is a noticeable feature that the purchases have been largely for the interior, and not so much intended for frontier points as heretotore. From extensive encuirles we are inclined to think that the stocks in the sands of retailers are rapidly diminishing, and that the purchases made so late in the year will not be carried over to any extent. The satisfactory nature of the remittances is confirmatory of this impression The news by the Cuba indicates a further advance of a penny per pound for cotton in Liverpoor but in Manchester goods did not sympathise with the advance in raw material. It is probable that the great, activity in manufacture is to be seen in enlarged stocks, and this with the point which prices have reached tends to make the market for goods more steady and less liable to advance. During the week just closed very few goods have come to hand. Three steamers have arrived tetching only three hundred packages-the bulk of the arrivals having been hardware and groceries. It is now a pretty well ascertained fact that any large augmentation of the stock of dry goods is improbable this year. One more steamer only is to come to this port, the rest going to Portland. It is not likely, except for sorting purposes, that there will be any considerable receipts until the opening of spring navigation Stocks continue to be fully sorted, and the buyers experience no difficulty whatever in making a very general selection. In view of theactivity of the trade, and the completion of supplies, purchased at the recent high rates in England, there is no probability whatever of any decline in prices. The market may be said

to rule firm for all grades of goods. COTTONS.-Grey cottons have been run upon very largely. Notwithstanding very considerable additions to the stock is not now large; in fact a few weeks like the past would pretty well exhaust it.

WOOLLENS.-The appearance of snow seems to have imparted great activity to this class of goods. All heavy winter cloths, overclothing &c., are in improved domand, and selling freely.

COTTON YARN.—Considerable arrivals from the

States are supplying the demand, which at present is very active, at about 621 to 65 cents. There is no Eng. lish yarn in the market.

In other descriptions of dry goods there is no particular change to note, firmness is the prevailing characteristic.

The Currency.

In Canada the currency at present is about twelve millions of dollars, or equal to about six dollars per head. In the United States it is nearly nine hundred millions, or equal to about thirty dollars per head of the population. No wonder that speculation is rampant with such an excess of paper money. The United States currency was officially stated as follows on 31st October:

Groundless Speculation.

It has taken the Agricultural Department at Washington some two months to find out the truth of what we stated about 1st September-that the wheat crop did not suffer so much from wet weather as was feared, and that the deficit in quantity and quality will not prove to be one-half as large as the August report predicted The report for October furnishes a most favouratle exhibit of the cercal crops for 1865. Of wheat, rye, barley and oats together, there were raised in 1863, 385,355,584 bushels, in 1864, 367,801,040, and in 1865 404,710,315 bushels, an increase over last year of 38.818,275 bushels. The yield of hay is more than five millions tons larger than last year. The corn crop is the largest ever raised in the United States. The speculation in grain, based upon the short crop theory, is thus shown to be without reasonable foundation.

The Public Business.

Our Ottawa correspondents inform us that the various departments of the Government have not yet been enabled to resume business. With the exception of the Post Office department, none of them can do any. thing beyond the simplest correspondence, or can attend to important matters requiring the consulting of documents of record. It is said that's month will elapse before the machinery of Government is again.

THE PRODUCE MARKET.

MHERE is no new feature to notice in either Breadstuffs or Provisions. Prices remain firm and without material change in any article. It is, however, highly satisfactory to note the steady and healthy tone of the British markets for every article of human food, so that with a very small additional rise in flour, which is confidently looked for, even that staple, which had almost ceased to be among the number of our exports, will once more resume its place as a leading article of shipment, with a fair prospect of remuneration. This is the more important at this juncture, as with the abrogation of reciprocity we shall shortly have to look to Britain as our main if not only outlet for every article of production, thus reverting to the state of trade that existed among us until the American war, by diminishing production among our neighbours, compelled them to become large purchasers in our markets.

FLOUR -The receipts during the past week, although limited for the season, have exceeded the demand, which has been very moderate. Buyers resolutely resisting any advanced pretensions on the part of holders, and contenting themselves with securing all desirable brands, offering at \$6.20, and only paying in the neighbourhood of \$6.25 for even known and favourite brands when pressed to fill up barge load for Quebec. The demand from the city trade has been very light for some time past, the complaint being general of small sales amongst the dealers and retailers; holders, however, are firm, and it is not likely that any further decline from rates now ruling will take place. As the advancing tendency of the British market promises soon to reach a point admitting of free export even at existing prices here, which if the case, will impart a healthy stability to the market by creating an outlet less liable to the violent fluctuations occasioned by a variable currency or the contransference of supply and local demand, thus to a large extent, it may be presumed, obviating those oft recursing seasons of excitement and depression so fruitful ofspeculation, disappointment, and loss, to which we have been so long subjected. The main enquiry has been for Supers, little being done in the lower grades. Extras are still held considerably above the views of purchasers, and we are therefore without transactions to note.

BAO FLOUR—Is in large supply, and the dealers are purchasing very lightly; holders, however, decline to submit to any material reduction, in the expectation of ademand from the neighbouring district to stock before the close of navigation, which, from present appearances, promises to be an early one.

WHEAT.—There are no transactions in Canada Spring; the arrivals are small, and only to millers.

PEASE—Continue firm, and in request at from 90c. to 92]c. according to quality, place of delivery, &c.

OATS—Are very dull at about 33 to 34c. per 82 lbs.; a decline would enable English shippers to operate at the present low rates of freight; but holders are firm, loping for a rise in the American markets, which for some time past have been dull and declining.

Ponk.-Stock very light, and held at unchanged

Intes.

Butten.—The receipts are still small, and with a good demand for choice qualities both for Britain and the States, prices are very firm, and in some instances higher rateshave been obtained for strictlyfine selected parcels. Medium and ordinary have been for some weeks accumulating in New York, and are only saleable at a very material reduction from the prices of fine. Great discrimination is used by purchasers here, who, white paying full rates for what is fit for rotaling out to families, only buy medium at comparatively low prices, holders being as a rule willing seliers of such qualities on the best terms obtainable, as any declino renders them utterly unsaleable.

LARD AND TALLOW—Are both in only considered.

LARD AND TALLOW—Are both in only occasional supply—sales of small parcels are made at full prices from time to time.

Astes—Pots have been greatly excited, and sold at prices rising day by day, closing at from \$7 to \$7.50 for interiors and firsts. The British Markets I: we risen to \$8.—but the prices here have gone considerably beyond a shipping point, leaving no margin, so that without a further and considerable rise in England, présent rates can hardly be maintained. Pearls have also advanced, but not to the same extent as Pots.
