## current trade conditions. ovtario.

Thif. present month unce ended, and it ma. be expected that lumber here will look up, but in the meantune it is decidedis dull. The report is current, that with the neiv cut coming rapidly forward, the temptation to break prices is assuming practical shape. It is stated that more than one lumber concern in the north has been willing to make concessions in pices in order to effect a relluction of the large stuc:s held. Mr. F. M. Cox, the larrge English lumber merchant, with a branch office at Ottawa, and who is at present in the country looking atter Brtish shipments, has said this of the st:uation : "The lumber trade is dull; it is quiet in England, and worse than quiet here. It is a peculiar trade. It does not feel depression until two ycars afier other trades, and does not revive for an equal length afterwards. You see a man who has begun a house must finish it, but no one will begin a house until he can pay for it. Then Pensacola pitch pine is being very much used for interiors. Three times as much Pensacola pine is being used as white pine, and it is much che:iper. We have lind five good years and are not do. ing badly non:" This vien of the situation is, at least, philosoplical and provides a way out, if lumbermen will only wat. They got the best end of the depression when it first showed itself, even of they are getting the worst end now that a turn in affairs is believed to have taken place.

## quebec and new brunsyick.

Of lumber business at Quebee ports there is nothing spectal to note. Shippers are busy getting forward cargoes as rapidly as possible, and as far as the demand on the other side of the Atlantic makes requisite. In New Brunswick, mills are reported to be running night and day with good olders ahead. The Stetson mill that has been closed for three years is now being opened, and will run full time. Contrasted with the complaints that are heard in Ontario, the news from the Maritime Provinces is full of brightness.

## mritisit coltmara.

The demand for lumber on the Pacific Coast is quite large, and shipments to San Francisco are on the increase. A result of this is that prices are of their own accord growing firmer, and in some cases mill men are disposed to refuse orders, believing that the advance wall be such in a short time that is wall watam them to hold theit stocks. The demand for shingles is swas ahead of the July demand of any other je.ar, but puices continue to remain depressed.

The opinion is expressed by the Timberman, of Chicago, notwithstanding the midsumper dullness which is a feature of irade at the present tme, that neally orquite as much lumber is going into consumption rieht now as there was three months ago, and when fall trade opens it looks as though theie would be a marked increase in the movement, which would put the lumber business back into the position for which it has been longing fur the past two years. In the meantime, the movement of stocks is very slow, and especially white pine and spruce. On the Sag. inaw Valley piling supply is becoming exhausted, and some of the mills have already closed down and others will likely do so in a short time. A surfeit of coarse stock exists at white pine mill points, less of this having been called for during the seasnn thus far than is usually the case. Yellow pine men are having a better time thinn white pine, though they bate caught up to their orders and are now equal to the current demand.

## forestis.

The wood market, says the Timber Trades Journal, occupies just now a very unicue position, especially in London, where stocks are moderate and the public sales are on an equally confined basis without the harmonious improvernent in prices, which under such conditions mughr be reasonauly expected. At the week's anctions the results were of this contradictory character. Deals are reported still out of favor with buyers, many of whom seem to fear that prices have not yet reached their lowest. The opmion was expressed, however, as a result of careful enquiry that no further fall will take place as the outside demand for the Cape and colonies has now taken surih considerable quantities off the market, as $t 0$ render sellers pretty well independent of the English trade. Trade in Liverpool is very quict. In Glasgow there is a growing fecling of confidence in the market for timber, and good business is likely to be heard of within the next few weeks Supplies of Canadian pine stock, according to Timber, are not expected to reach beyond requirements and quotations are firm. A late report from, Australia tells of a better tone in the market. At other forcign puints trade, if not artive, is hold ing a steady average.

Conversing wath luinbermen during the week the ampressom of the hardwoud wade secmed to be that this difference, at least, existed between hardwoods and pine that where whth the later sales were indeed few, with the former, some
business was doing from week to week, even if not on a large scale. One dealer remarked that mill men were more than ustally stiff in regard to prices, whatsver this misht indicate. Enquurics from the States are usually for specific lines of wood, which are sometimes difficult to obtain.

## STOCKS AND PRICES.

An arraal from Bay City, Mich., of 3:5,00 feet of lumber for Windsor, Ont., is to be noted.

The stcamer Patkland has saled from入ell Brunswick for Manchester, Eng., having on board 1,159 standards.

The steamer d'arkland, which sated from Hopewell, N. B., last week for Manchester, Eng., carried 2,300,000 spruce deals.
H. H. Spicer \& Co., Vancouver, I3. C., handle trade of upwards oi $85,000,000$ shingles per year. A large quantity of their product enter the New England States.

The baik Northwest, has cleared the customs at British Columbia for San Francisco, carrying 508,791 feet of lum. ber and 333,500 laths loaded at the Brunette Saw Mills.

Shipments of lumber from St. John, N. 13., for the week were lighter than for some recent weeks and included of long lumber $2,263,444$ feet, 2,529,000 lath, 2,. 620,00 shingles and 295 cords of wood.

Saginaw, Mich., records tell of the arrival of two stcamers at that point with 690,720 fect of lumber, and 2 barges with $1,295,268$, feet. A cargo of 120,000 feet of lumber and 60,000 pieces of lath were sent from Saginaw to Canada.

IMPORTANT LUMBER CASE.
tile question of owsersilif in thecase of ross
vs. w. C. E' wakds \& co.
This was an appeal from a judgment of the Court of Appeal for Ontario, of Nov. 13th, 1894, affirming a judgment of Mr. Justice Meredith, dismissing the appellant's action with costs. The appeal was heard before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, London, Eng., on the 18th July.

Mr. B. B. Osier, Q. C., and Mr. A. Ferguson, Q. C. (of the Canadian Bar), were counsel for the appellant ; Mr. C. Robinson. Q.C. (of the Canadian Bar), for the respondents.
The action was brought in November 1891, by the appellant, as the legal iepresentative of the late Mr. James G. Ross, to recover damages from tive respondents for alleged inisrepresentations by them as to the ownership of a quantity of deals. The facts of the case were shortly as follows : - In January, 1888, the respondents, who are manufacturers of lumber, and carry on business at Rockland, in the Province of Ontario, sold to N. Hurteau et Fiere, lumber merchants, a quantity of deals then in the respondents' lumber yard. Subsequently iv. Hurteau et Fiére by their agent, Mr. Lemay, sold to Wm . Little, a lumber dealer, a portion of deals upon credit. In the February following Little applied to the late. Mr. James G. Ross, a mercliant, carrying on business as Ross \& Co., for a loan of $\$ 7,500$ upon the lumber which he stated that he then had in the respondents' yard at Rockland. Mr. Ross made the advance to Litle, and Little requested the respondents to hold the deals subject to the order of Messrs. Ross \& Co., and the respondents undertook to do so in the following words: -" Wrill hold within deals subject to order of Messrs. Russ \& Co., as above author-iscd.-IV. C. Edwards \& Co., Rockland, Dlarch 15 th, $1888 . "$ A small portion of the lumber having in the spring of 1888
been sold by Little, it was upon the order of Ross, duly delivered by the respondents to the purchaser, and the purchase-money therefor was received by Ross on account of the advance made by him to Little, but the respondents refused to deliver the remainder of it pursuant to the order of Ross, statiog that they so refused in obedience to a notice from N. Hurteau et Fíre, who claimed to be entitled to hold the same as unpaid vendors, Little not having paid them for the deals in question. Upon the application of the respondents, who did not claim any interest in the lumber, an interpleader issue was directed to be thed between Ross and N. Hurteall et Fiére to determine which one of them was entitled to the lumber, and it was decided that the lumber was, as between $N$. Hurteau et Fiére and Ross, the property of $N$ Hurteau et Fiére. Little not having repaid the balance of the loan, the appellant subseguently broukht he present action against the respondents to recover $\$ 6,538.79$, being the balance of the money advanced to Little after deducting the small portion of the lumber sold and delivered on the order of Ross, as above stated, the appellant alleging that the money was advanced by the late Mr. James G. Ross to Little, relying on the undertaking of the respondents, dated March $15 \mathrm{th}, 1888$, above set forth, the appellant contending that by that undertaking the respondents represented that the deals in question was the property of Little. The respondents denied the alleged misrepiesentation, and set up the interpleader action and judg. ment as a bar to any recovery by the appellant. Mr. Justice Meredith dismissed the appellant's action with costs. The appellant appealed to the Court of Appeal for Ontario, which, on Nov. 13th, i894, dismissed the appeal and affirmed the judgment of Mr. Justice Meredith. From that judgment of the Court of Appeal for Ontario, the appellant referred this appeal to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.
At the conclusion of the argument for the appellant, their Lordships did not call upon counsel for the respondent.
Their Lordships in giving judgment said that it was proved or admitted that Ross \& Co. knew that Luttle had not paid for the goods, while Edwards \& Co. knew nothing about the matter. It was found by the courts below that Ross \& Co.-did not accept Little's drafts on the faith of Edwards \& Co. accepting the delivery order in their favor. Their Lordships would, therefore, humbly advise Her Majesty, that the appeal ought to the dismissed. The appellant would pay the costs of the appeal.

## LUMBERING IN QUEBEC.

Charlemagne $\&$ Lac Ouareau Lumber Co., Ltd., Charlemagne, Que., write: "Our cut is principally spruce. This season we will cut about 16 million $f$. of spruce and four million ft. of pine ; the spruce is mostly cut into 3 inch deals for export. We shipped it almost as fast as we could saw it during June and first patt of Julv, but the last 15 days very latie is moving, except our spruce boards which go to New York and Burlington, Vt. These we ship as fast as they are in ceucution. We are commencing to-day 10 cut New York spruce stock, $1 / 4 \times 658,1 / 4 \times 9$ and $2 \times 9 \times 13$ fi., with a view of testing that market for stocks this season."

## CONDItIONS in GREAT BRITAIN.

Farnworth\& Fardine, Liverpool, Eng., in their August wood curcular, say: The arrivals from British North America during the past month have been 46 vessels, 44 , 260 tons, ap,ainst 47 vessels, 44,911 tons during the last year, and the aggregate tonnage to this date from all places during the years 1893,1894 and 1895 has been $170,0,44,184,061$ and 189,217 tons respectively.
The business during the month shows a slight improvement, although no advance in value to report. Imports have been moderate, the deliverics fair, but stocks atre all ainple; in a few articles too heavy.

Canadian Woods.-Both waney and square have been imported very moderately; the arrivals are chefly going direct into consumption, and the stock is moderate ; prices are steady without change. Red Pine: Several parcels of special sizes have been imported on contract, for which there is a fair enquiry ; ordinary wood is almost unsaleable. Oak: There has been rather more enquiry for 1 st class wood for railway work, but it is difficult to realize cost of importation, and the stock is sufficient. Ash still comes forwarit too freely; the deliveries have been fair, but recent sales have been at lower rates. Elin has been imported moderately; values are difficult to maintain, and recent sales have been at lower rates; the stock is too heavy.
New brunsivick and Nova Scotia Spruce and Pine deals.-Spruce deals have been imported freely, viz:- 13,439 standards, against 12,746 standards same month last year ; the deliveries, however, have been satisfactory, viz, 11,630 standards, against 11,364 standards same tune last year; there is no improvement in values to report, but prices are steady; there have been no sales of pine deals.

British Columbian and Oregon pine.-There have been no arrivals, the demand continues dull, and the stock is still too heavy; there is no change in value to report.

## rafting.

During July nine tugs with rafts of logs from Canada reached Saginaw.
Tug Peter Snith arrived at Bay City, Mish., within the week, with a raft of logs from Little Current, for Howry \& Sons.
The Fredericion Boom Co., of New Brunswick, have rafted $84,000,000$ feet of lumber so far this season at the Douglas \& Mitchell boome.

The large Howry drive of saw logs has arrived safely in Caineron lake. This drive contains 80,000 pieces of grod timber, all pine. This will be all manufactured at the company's mills at Fenelon Falls.

The Gilmour Co., of Trenton, have a drive of 40,000 logs now running over the Coboconk slide into Balsamlake. This is the company's second drive this season. Three more large drives are on hand, and have come down over the new.tramway built last year from the Black river waters on the Gull river. These large drives will all be floated down to Trenton.

## UNITED STATES HARDWOOD MARKRTS.

lı New York stocks are not heavy, though egual to all demands, and the disposition is to withstand buying just now. Quartered oak is in better denand than any other grade of hardwood. The boom that was expected in furniture manufac. turing has falten shot of expectitions and this has lessencd the anticipated consump. tion of several lines of lardwoods. A correspondent of Hardwood says there is a prospect of an increase in the manufacture prospect of an increase in the manuacture which would mean an inproved market for the best grades of white oak, birch and cherry.

The month of July in hardwoods Buffalo has exceeded that of the same month of a year ago. A correspondemt says that considerable hardwood is reath. ing Bufalo from Canada, the waterwas being utilized as a method of shipme: : These cargoes include red oak, basswon. elm, birch, with maple in sonsideratue quantities. Some red oak is also commig into Buffalo in the same way.
